A similar team from Calcutta is scheduled to arrive Dhaka by an Indian bus on

April 8 in a trial run. The passengers travelling from Dhaka tomorrow are due to return in their bus along with the Indian bus.

Commercial bus service between Dhaka and Calcutta is expected to start within a week of the trial runs.

The much awaited service is taking place following signing of a two-year agreement in Delhi on February 17 by officials of the two countries' communication ministries. The agreement will be reviewed after three months.

During the three months, four buses, two from Bangladesh and two from India, will operate in the route six days a week. After three months, representatives of the two governments will review the operation, fare structure, and determine the number of buses that will ply in the route.

Dhaka would insist that 60

per cent of the buses operating in this route should be from Bangladeshi, it is learnt. However, the fare structure and number of buses would be ultimately determined by market

The official teams in the trial runs are expected to see the road condition, immigration and customs arrangements and suggest measures for passengers' comfort.

It was learnt that opening of the Dhaka-Calcutta route may lead Bangladesh to consider Indian proposals to allow plying of buses in other routes connecting Bangladesh with its north eastern states.

A Foreign Ministry official said that if the government's move to connect Dhaka and Calcutta becomes successful, it may also help to open routes with other countries also.

"It could lead to opening up of other routes linking Myanmar. Thailand and several other Asian countries through the proposed Asian Highway," said a Foreign Ministry official looking after international organisations including BIM-

Although Bangladesh and India were the first to moot the idea of bus communication between the two countries, arch rivals India and Pakistan managed to open a direct bus service between Delhi and Lahore with Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee travelling in the maiden trip in February. A regular bus service between Lahore and Delhi began last month.

Negotiations for opening the direct land route to facilitate quick and easy travel of passengers between Bangladesh and India have been going on between the two governments for nearly two years.

An Indian news agency IANA reported that the authorities in Calcutta are giving finishing touches to a 45 lakh Rupee air-conditioned waiting hall at Salt Lake in east Calcutta for passengers of the proposed Dhaka-Calcutta bus ser-

The waiting hall at Salt Lake will have immigration counters, a communication centre and other facilities.

Bangladesh side is also going to press into service air-conditioned luxury coaches. Private tour operators have already lined up several 52-seater buses to accommodate only 36-passengers to make the journey comfortable. It was learnt that one-way

Dhaka-Calcutta fare would be around Tk 400 per passenger.

Current water crisis in city to be removed

Work on Tk 750 cr water treatment plant begins

The construction work of the country's first major water treatment plant began yesterday to provide surface water to the residents of Dhaka reducing increased dependence on depleting aquifer (ground water), reports BSS.

"With the completion of the Sayedabad Water Treatment Plant by 2001, the current water shortage in the city would be removed to a large extent. We expect to completely solve the water problems in the capital through erecting more such surface water plants in phases, LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Zillur Rahman said at a ceremony to work the beginning of construction of the project here.

He added that the project was part of government's mid-term planning to resolve the water problems in the backdrop of increasing population in the city. The plant will produce 22.5 crore litres water per day on completion of the project's first phase in 2001 and another 2.5 crore litres when it is expected to go in full operation in 2005. The World Bank, Japan and France are financing the Tk 750 crore project.

Officials said Dhaka WASA is currently supplying 96 to 98 crore litres of water daily against the city's maximum estimated demand of 140 crore litres per day.

State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Saber Hossain Chowdhury, member of parliament Habibur Rahman Mollah. Korean ambassador in Dhaka Tae Kyu Han, Secretary of Local Government Badiur Rahman, and Managing Director of WASA Dr Azharul Haq also spoke at the ceremony chaired by WASA chairman Dr ATM Zahurul Haque.

Zillur Rahman said Dhaka WASA has set up, as emergency interim measures, 22 pump stations at different parts of the capital while work is underway to install another 12 pumps this month to meet the increased water demands during the current dry season.

He said with these activities, the authorities would be able to supply additional 10 crore litres of water by the end of

"Long term measures have been taken with the assistance of donors to develop water supply infrastructures in consistence with increased population," he said adding that the volume of water supply has risen to nearly 99 crore litres currently against 85 crore litres in July 1998. Water from the Sitalakkha river would reach the Saidabad water plant through an approach canal. "All concerned have to be

alert against the deterioration

of water quality in the Sitalakkha as well as other rivers and I hope all nearby industrial units will take necessary measures against the pollution," the

minister said. WASA officials said 98 per cent of its total water supply comes from aquifer and only two per cent from rivers through three existing small surface water plants in Dhaka and Narayanganj. The pressure on the ground water would be reduced from 10 to 15 per cent when the project is completed they said

Saber Chowdhury said Dhaka is one of the 10 most densely populated cities of the world and ranks 17th in the list of mega cities.

But this over-population has created crises in providing civic amenities, particularly in the supply of water.

"When the project is to be completed the demand for water will also rise but we are sanguine because all our programmes are aimed at giving a permanent solution to the problems," he said adding that Dhaka WASA has planned a strategy to face the situation after 15 years. The WASA chairman said

his establishment was under severe pressure to cope with the increased demand despite over exploitation of groundwaters.
