

## First National Disabled Day April 7

The first National disabled Day will be observed in the country on April 7, reports APB.

The Ministry of Social Welfare and National Forum of Organisation Working with the Disabled (NFWO) have jointly taken up elaborate programmes to observe the day.

The three-day programmes include a colourful rally from National Museum to Shishu Academy on 4.30 am on Wednesday, inaugural function at the Academy auditorium at 5 pm, discussion, exchange of opinion and cultural function.

State Minister for Social Welfare Dr Moazzam Hossain will address as the chief guest at the two functions.

## Factory owner stabbed

A plastic factory owner was seriously injured in stabbing and his industry looted by extortionists in the city's Lalbagh thana today, reports UNB.

Hospital sources said Mohammad Kazi Billah Hossain, 48, of Shahidnagar in the thana was attacked by a band of five blackmailers at his factory in the same area as he refused to pay them Tk 50,000 in the morning.

The thugs stabbed him in the chest and looted the factory before decamping safely.

Billah was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital from where shifted to Chest Diseases Hospital in critical condition.

A case was filed with Lalbagh police.

## No operation theatre at neuro-surgery ward after 8 years

RAJSHAHI, Apr 5: Though the neuro-surgery ward at Rajshahi Medical College Hospital was inaugurated eight years ago, it has no operation theatre and surgical equipment, reports APB.

Neuro-surgery operations are done at the orthopaedic department with old and outdated surgical equipment, sources at the hospital said.

The hospital authorities have repeatedly requested the authorities concerned to supply necessary equipment but there has been no positive response yet because of alleged bureaucratic tangle, they said.

Tenders for purchase of equipment were floated in 1992, but no purchase was made as suppliers demanded higher prices. No more tenders were floated.

Whenever an emergency operation has to be performed, work at the orthopaedic department has to be suspended, and whenever the OT of that department is being used for emergency orthopaedic operations, the neuro-surgery operation has to be delayed, no matter how serious the patients' condition is.

Neuro-surgery operations are done once a week as per prior arrangement. So if a dying patient arrives on any other day, doctors can do nothing.

## 12-year old girl escapes attempted rape at JU

A 12-year-old girl escaped an attempted rape on her by a security guard of Social Science Faculty of Jahangirnagar University (JU) on Thursday.

The security guard Abdul Mannan Hawlader (40) was suspended after he confessed that he had lured the girl to the second floor of the Social Science Building at around 12 noon on Thursday when the university classes were closed.

Bakul, who is a student of class seven at Gokulnagar High School under Savar thana told JU teachers, who later interrogated her, that the security guard had proposed to pay her money when she refused his proposal. When the guard began to force her she somehow managed to flee and took refuge to a teacher's room on the ground floor. Her clothes were all torn.

The teacher Prof Mujibur Rahman told statements from both the victim and the security guard. He later sent a report to the university Registrar Mohammad Ali after the offender admitted that he had attempted to rape the girl.

JU authorities formed a three-member probe body with Prof Kazi Abdus Samad of Statistics Department as its chief to investigate the matter yesterday.

No case was lodged with the thana till writing of this report.

## Jhum cultivation in hills no longer sustainable

RANGAMATI, Apr 5: Chairman of the Chittagong Hill Tracts Development Board (CHTDB) Bir Bahadur, MP, today said, "Jhum cultivation in the hills is no longer sustainable as it depletes the top soil and gradually diminishes fertility of lands, reports BSS.

"Upland farming system in the hills need renovation and contour hedgerow barrier-system, commonly known as sloping Agricultural Land Technology (SALT) has already emerged as simple, cost effective and replicable farming method," the CHT-DB chairman said.

Bir Bahadur was addressing the inaugural session of the three-day annual review and planning meeting of the regional coordinators of the appropriate technologies for soil conserving farming systems held in the conference hall of CHT-DB here this morning.

International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development (ICIMOD), Kathmandu, Nepal, and CHT-DB jointly hosted the conference.

Head of mountain farming systems division of ICIMOD, Dr Tej Parajapati, chaired the inaugural session. Twenty representatives from China, India, Pakistan, Nepal, Bhutan, Myanmar and Bangladesh took part in the deliberations.

The chairman of CHTDB said traditional jhum farming or shifting cultivation method with a rotation cycle of 10 to 20 years was the prime mode of cultivation of the hilly people.

He said the ethnic communities earned their sustenance and used to enjoy the special agricultural method. But with construction of Kaptai-Hydro-Electric Dam in the 60s, 40 per cent of the best cultivable land submerged and 100,000 people were displaced.

Bir Bahadur said about 100,000 people mostly depended on the jhum cultivation were affected following the construction of the Hydro-Electric Dam at Kaptai and the total area of arable land became smaller in size. With population boom and scarcity of arable fertile land in the hills, the jhum cycle was reduced to 2 to 3 years.

The ICIMOD representatives said the organisation is determined to protect ecological balance in the Hindukush-Himalayan mountain range, which is under heavy strain stemming from population boom in the hills, abject poverty and huge environmental degradation.

## BPC condemns NATO strikes on Kosovo

Bangladesh Peace Council (BPC) yesterday condemned the "barbaric" air strikes of NATO on Yugoslavia and demanded immediate cessation of all military actions aimed at a negotiated settlement of the Kosovo problem, reports BSS.

BPC General Secretary Ali Akbar, in a statement, yesterday said by its act of armed intervention NATO has trampled upon the independence, sovereignty and right of self-determination of the Yugoslav people.

## WFP officials from Bangladesh to help refugees in Kosovo

Three World Food Programme (WFP) officials from Bangladesh will join the operation of feeding thousands of Kosovo refugees streaming into Albania and Macedonia.

The officials left Dhaka Sunday night for Rome, said a press release of the WFP.

The WFP has already despatched 9.6 tons of high protein biscuits to the northern Albanian town of Kukes, where 70,000 refugees have gathered.

The Bangladesh staff are to be transported to Albania and Macedonia by special WFP chartered plane from Rome for the emergency assignment. They will join the WFP offices in Tirana and Macedonia to prepare the logistics for the operation.

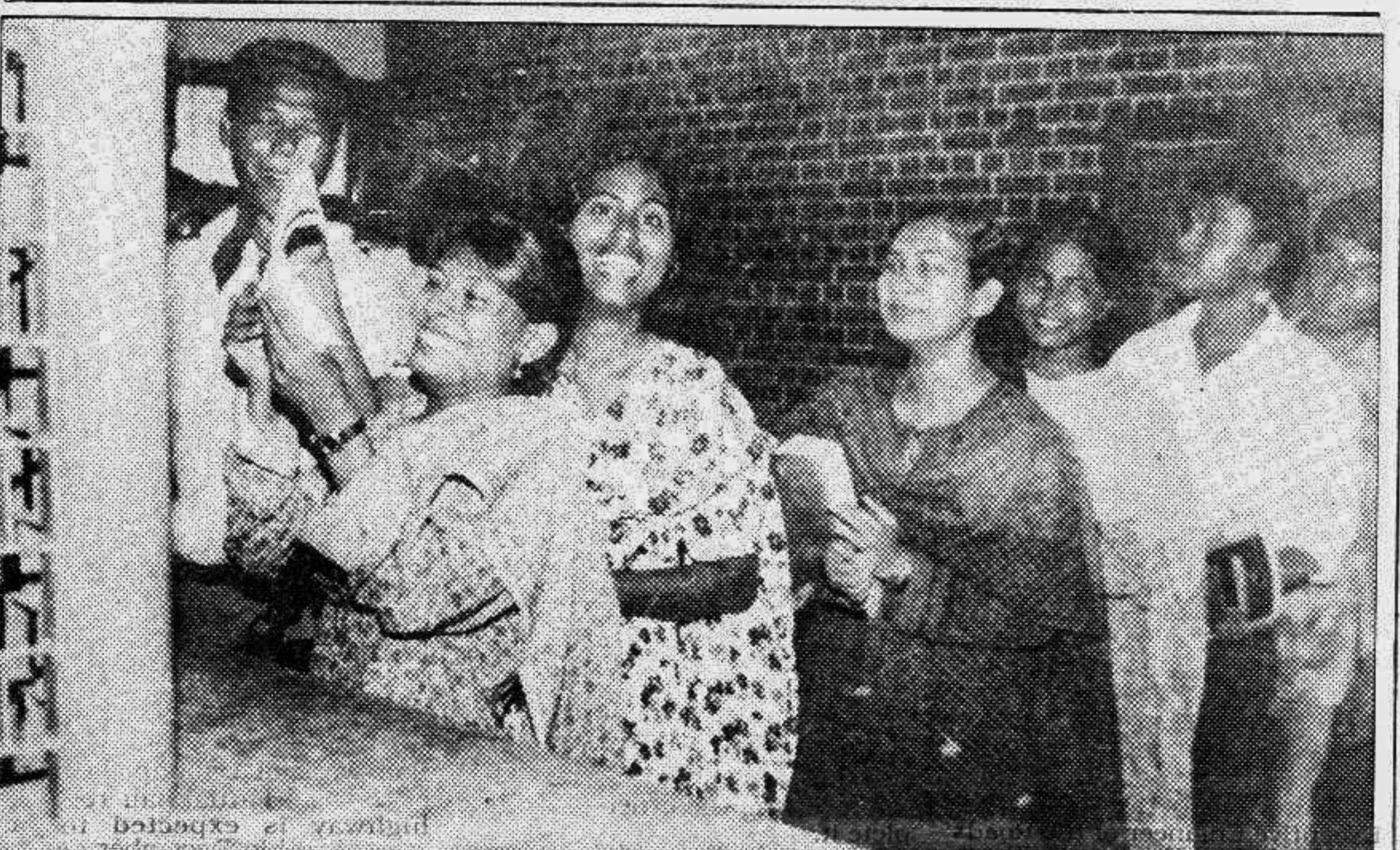
## Easter festival observed

Policy makers, academicians, researchers, senior government officials and representative of the donor community, international organisations and NGOs will attend.

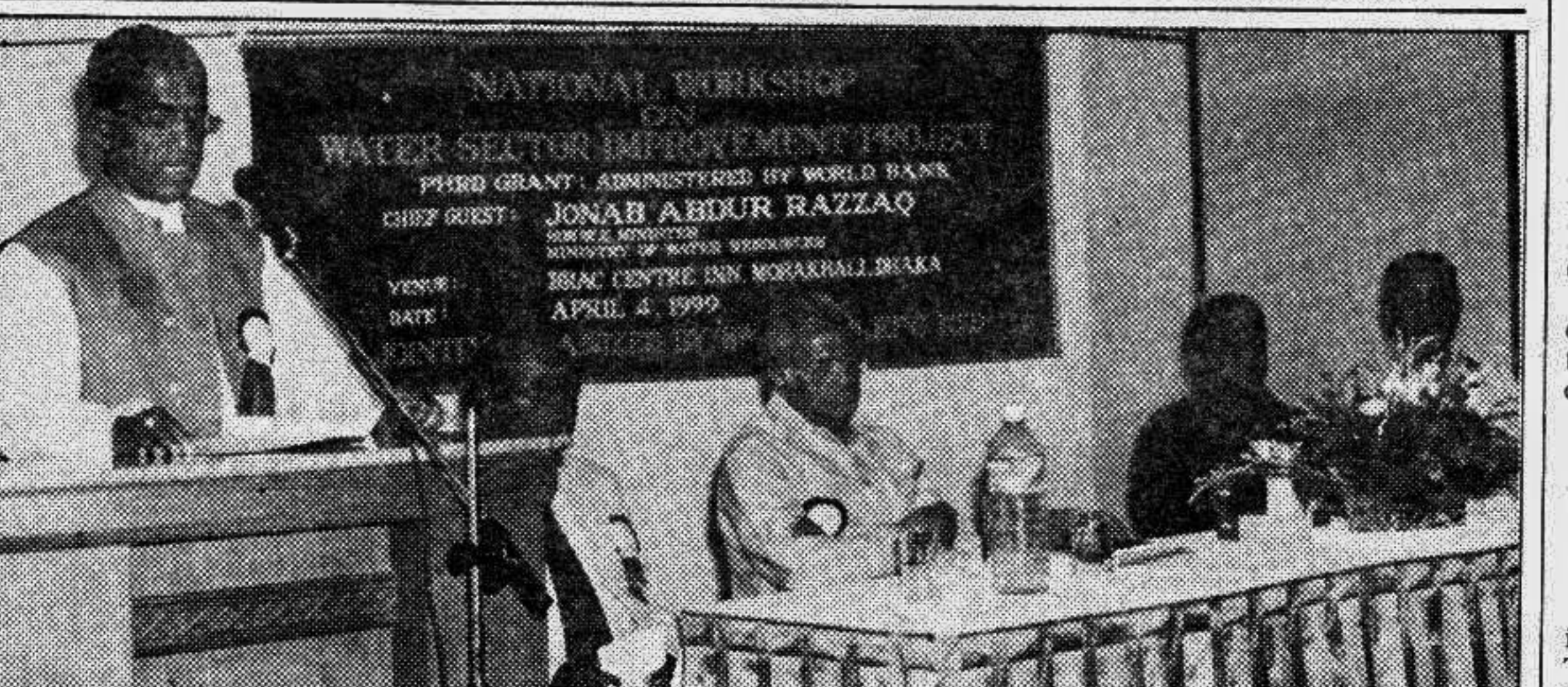
## Policeman succumbs to injuries

## Workshop on Internet begins

A four day long workshop titled "Internet: South Asian Realities and Opportunities" began the LGED Bhawan today, says a press release.

The data collectors, mainly primary school teachers, will collect the information about the related groups from the head of the family by visiting every home/family.

All have been requested to cooperate with the data collectors to make the survey a success.

## JS body on telecommunications ministry holds meet

## Prof Sayeed protests Khaleda's statement

State Minister for Information Prof Abu Sayeed yesterday denounced and protested Sunday's statement of Leader of the Opposition in Jatiya Sangsad and BNP Chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia terming it false and conspiratorial and said it was a ploy to mislead the people, reports BSS.

In a statement, Prof Sayeed said through her statement Begum Zia has exposed her heinous political design and revived the horrible memory of the rule of military dictator Zia who had usurped power through killings, coups and conspiracies. By such statement, Begum Zia has surpassed the last limit of falsehood, forgetting the anti-people and corrupt activities and favouritism of the ministers, MPs, leaders and workers of her party during her rule and that of her husband, he said.

The state minister for information said it does not bode Begum Zia to speak of rule of law, human rights and democracy because of her anti-people activities. He recalled that during her rule Begum Zia had boasted that she did not understand the concept of caretaker government and that she would not concede it saying "none excepting mad and child are neutral."

Referring to Begum Zia's demand to hold local bodies elections under a caretaker government, Prof Sayeed said this creates doubts about her knowledge of the concept of caretaker government. In this connection, he pointed out that Article 58 B and clause two of 58 B of the constitution clearly mention that the caretaker government is an interim and neutral government which will extend all possible help and cooperation to the Election Commission for holding general election peacefully, smoothly and impartially.

Under the circumstances, how she could ask for the violation of the constitution? Does not Begum Zia know union parishad elections, municipal elections and upazila elections are held at different times of the year? Does not it mean that Begum Zia does not want elected government under the caretaker government to run the affairs of the state? he said.

Prof Abu Sayeed said Begum Zia remains so much occupied with the politics of killing, coup and conspiracy that it is natural on her part to create impediments in the way of giving institutional shape to democracy. Even people of the country are not surprised over such activities.

## Body of teenage girl recovered in Patuakhali

Police were yet to reveal the identity of the 15-year-old victim till filing of this report at 9.30 pm today.

Police quoting the inquest report of the body said the girl was raped before killing. There were also some injury marks on different parts of her body.

None, however, was arrested in this connection. The body was sent to Sadar Hospital morgue for autopsy.

An unnatural death case was lodged with police regarding the incident.

Rejecting Begum Zia's views on law and order situation, Zillur said the situation was no better during her regime. Some 13,713 killing, 2,597 rape, 5,060 women repression, 7,832 kidnap, 30,890 riots and 2,27,387 law and order related cases were recorded during her rule.

Zillur Rahman who is also minister in charge of LGED asked the opposition leader to refrain from creating artificial crisis and issues out of nothing.

## Islamists kill 22 soldiers in Algeria

ALGIERS, Apr 5: Twenty-two Algerian soldiers were killed by armed Islamists at the weekend near Blida, south of the capital Algiers, the daily El Watan reported today, reports AFP.

The troops were killed in a firefight by a "very large number of terrorists" at Melahia, near Blida in farming country outside the capital.

Fighting involving government forces and armed Islamic groups have increased since March with more than 300 dead.
