Pak Judge to wait till WC

RA WALPINDI, Apr 6 (Reuters/Internet): A Pakistani judge investigating alleged match-fixing in cricket said on Monday he might delay his report until after the World Cup because he was "too busy" conducting the trial of opposition leader Benazir Bhutto.
"But the delay in the finalisation of the report is not deliberate," Justice Malik Mohammad Gayyum of the Punjab's province's Lahore High Court told reporters.
"I am too busy with Ehtsab (accountability) cases," he said, referring to a two-judge accountability bench that he heads and which is trying Bhutto and her husband on charges of corruption relating to the time Bhutto was prime minister.
Gayyum said he was devoting to the cricket inquiry whatever spare time was available to him after other court hearings and that he had received "concrete evidence" in the matter.
Gayyum made the remarks in response to reporters' questions about what one of them called the general impression that the inquiry report would be available after the World Cup beginning in England on May 14.
The judge appeared pleased by recent performances of the Pakistan team, which beat India on Sunday in the final of a triangular one-day series.
The results of the inquiry have started appearing, he said.
"They (players) must be feeling that somebody is watching them," he said.
"(Captain) Wasim Akram appears more committed now," Gayyum was named in late August last year to investigate allegations of betting and match-fixing against members of the national cricket team and was initially given two months to complete the report.
The last time the report was put off was in December after Australian players Mark Waugh and Shane Warne admitted taking money from an Indian bookmaker for providing pitch and weather conditions during a 1994 tournament in Sri Lanka.
The two, who together with fellow Australian Tim May had accused former Pakistani captain Salim Malik of offering them bribes to play poorly on a 1994 tour of Pakistan, were questioned by another Pakistani judge sent to Australia by Gayyum in January.
Gayyum's report, to be made to Pakistan's President Mohammad Rafiq Tarar, will include recommendations on what action, if any, should be taken against players suspected of involvement in match-fixing.
Gayyum's bench is hearing a case brought by Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's government against Bhutto and her jailed husband, Senator Asif Ali Zardari. They are accused of receiving kickbacks from a Swiss cargo inspection group.
Bhutto and Zardari deny the charge and accuse the government of victimising them and the judge of being biased against them.

Heyns rates Japan highly

HONG KONG, Apr 6: Watch Japan that was the message from South Africa's double Olympic breaststroke champion Penny Heyns after Japanese women dominated in the World Short Course Championships here, reports AFP.
Heyns, the gold medalist in the 100m and 200m breaststroke in the 1996 Atlanta Games, was forced to play second fiddle to rising Japanese star Masami Tanaka in Hong Kong.
Tanaka powered to a clean sweep in the breaststroke events winning gold in the 50m, 100m and 200m, before helping Japan's 4x100m medley relay squad to gold and a new world record on Saturday night.
Tanaka also set a new world best in the 200m event to add further lustre to a glittering championships for the Japanese who finished second in the medal standings with six golds.
The medal haul came as no surprise to Heyns.
"I've been at meets before and seen their coaches videotaping other swimmers to get information about technique and training," said Heyns.
"I'm sure they've looked at swimmers like myself and learnt from it. You've got to give credit to them because they've done their homework and it has paid off here," the South African star said.

Langer, Waugh defy WI

ST JOHN'S, Antigua, Apr 6 (AP/AF): Justin Langer and Mark Waugh hit unbeaten half centuries as Australia took control of the fourth and final cricket Test against the West Indies on the third day Monday.
Left-hander Langer hit 84 and Waugh 60 as their unbroken third partnership of 133 lifted Australia to 209 for two by the close. Earlier, the West Indies were bowled out for 222 after resuming on 197 for six, conceding a first innings lead of 81. Australia made 303 in their first innings.

The Australians must win to level the series 2-2 and retain the Frank Worrell Trophy they have held since 1995.
Langer transformed his second 50 of the match and third in his last four innings to his third highest Test score. The Western Australian batted 287 minutes and faced 222. It was his most commanding innings of the series, counting six fours and a huge six onto the roof of the Richie Richardson Stand at long on off Nehemiah Perry's off-spin.

Waugh, too, emerged from an uncertain start to bat with the confidence absent during the first three Tests. The 33-year-old from New South Wales stroked easy boundaries with typically sweet timing as he faced 118 balls during his three hours at the crease. In his 90th Test, Waugh became only the eighth Australian to reach 6,000 Test runs when he reached 23.

Langer and Waugh came together when opener Michael Slater was dismissed for 44 to leave Australia uncertainly poised at 76 for two.
Slater chopped a Courtney Walsh delivery onto his off stump after batting 156 minutes and facing 103 balls. The New South Welshman struck one four and two big sixes.

Slater's opening partner Greg Blewett fell early for seven, a leg before victim of Curtly Ambrose's off-cutter.

Ambrose took one for 46 from 17 overs and new ball partner Walsh captured one for 49 from 21 overs.

N'castle, Spurs share points

LONDON, Apr 6: Georgian striker Temuri Ketsbaia snatched in a 25-metre goal in the 77th minute to earn Newcastle United a 1-1 home draw with Tottenham Hotspur in an FA Cup semifinal warm-up on Monday, reports Reuters.

Neither side was able to claim much of a psychological boost ahead of next Sunday's semifinal between the two sides at Old Trafford although Tottenham had more of the game.

Spurs rested French midfielder David Ginola and Newcastle did the same with England captain Alan Shearer for the Premier League game.

The Londoners were kept at bay in the first half by three good saves from Shay Given but they went ahead with a 49th minute Darren Anderton penalty after halftime substitute Warren Barton brought down Stephen Carr.

Newcastle rarely threatened until Ketsbaia's shot from out of the blue ripped past Spurs' keeper Ian Walker.

Trouble with telephone

LONDON, Apr 6 (Reuters/Internet): Frantic late telephone calls to players before a match to get a team together is often part of local amateur soccer but English first division West Bromwich Albion were forced to adopt the tactic at the weekend.

Dutch striker Fabian DeFreitas missed his team's 5-1 defeat by Crewe on Monday afternoon because he thought the game was an evening kick-off. British newspapers reported on Tuesday.

As the clock ticked down to the 3pm start, officials from the Midlands club tried to reach DeFreitas on the telephone but could not get through because his girlfriend was on the line.

The player now faces a heavy fine for the mistake.
"DeFreitas thought it was an evening kick-off," manager Dennis Smith told the Birmingham Post newspaper. "We tried to get in touch with him but his girlfriend was on the phone."

"We got through at 2.20 pm but by then the team sheet was in. To say I'm not very happy is an understatement."

Nagano residents sue IOC

TOKYO, Apr 6: Residents of Nagano sued the IOC and its president Juan Antonio Samaranch on Tuesday, demanding the return of 831 million yen (6.9 million dollars) in taxpayer money used in the bid for the 1998 Nagano Winter Games, a court official said, reports AP.

Shigeru Tomidokoro, a spokesman for the Tokyo District court, said the plaintiffs were three citizens, led by Kaoru Iwata, a former town assemblyman in Nagano, 179 kilometers (112 miles) northwest of Tokyo.

Iwata said the lawsuit is "the only way to impeach the injustice" since the International Olympic Committee and Samaranch will not punish nine IOC members suspected by the Japanese Olympic Committee of violating IOC rules by receiving "excessive" entertainment.

In Lausanne, Switzerland, IOC marketing director Michael Payne said he was "slightly surprised" to hear of the suit, given the amount of financial support that the IOC gave the organizing committee during the Games.

Japan spent 2 billion yen (167 million dollars) on its campaign to win the right to host the Games. Nagano state and local governments put up 831 million yen (6.9 million dollars) of that total, while the rest came from private or corporate contributions.

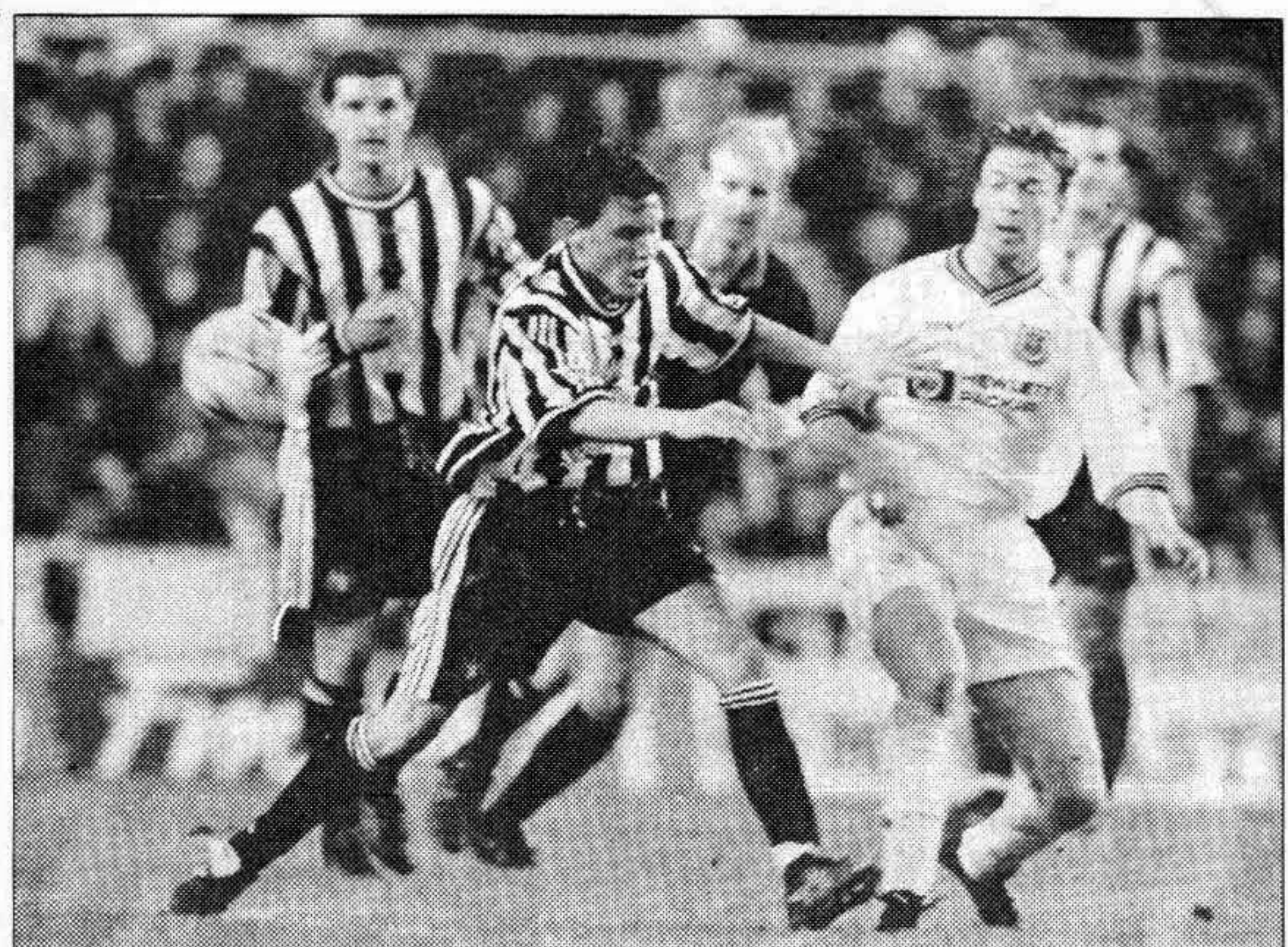
The plaintiffs argue that the IOC should have allowed its members to accept the allegedly "excessive" entertainment knowing that it had come from taxpayers.

The plaintiffs want the IOC to pay back the amount taxpayers contributed.

Iwata's group has already sued Nagano Prefecture Governor Goro Yoshimura, the chairman of the Japan Olympic Committee, Hironoshi Furuhashi, and the mayor of the city of Nagano, Tasuku Tsukada, to force them to further specify how the money was spent.

IOC Secretary-General Yushiro Yagi, who led an investigation into Nagano's bid, said on February 12 that the nine might have broken IOC rules while visiting Nagano during the city's successful bid for the Winter Games.

Yagi refused to name the nine or detail their conduct, although he said at that time that he would report it to IOC headquarters in Switzerland.

Semifinal first leg today

PARIS, Apr 6: Valery Lobanovsky's Dynamo Kiev will look to foil the European continent's in-form side Bayern Munich in the European Cup semifinals on Wednesday while Manchester United boss Alex Ferguson knows he will never have a better chance of reaching the final against Juventus, reports AFP.

Manchester United manager Alex Ferguson, meanwhile, must be starting to think this will be his year.

At the start of the tournament he would have shuddered at the thought of facing Barcelona and Bayern Munich in the group stage, followed by Italian giants Inter Milan and Juventus in the quarter and semifinals.

Last season United met the Italians in the group stages again and fared a little better, winning 3-2 at home before losing 1-0 in Turin.

In contrast Juventus have been there, done that, time and time again. Yet despite being finalists in each of the last three years, they won only once, in 1996 against Ajax with a penalty shootout.

Juve coach Carlo Ancelotti will pin his hopes on striker Filippo Inzaghi, who put one past great Dane and United keeper Peter Schmeichel in the Euro 2000 qualifier last week, grabbing a vital away goal on Wednesday and his workaholic captain Antonio Conte, who scored the decisive late goal against Olympiakos in the last round and also scored against Denmark last week.

Conte, who played for Italy in the 1994 World Cup final, defeat by Brazil, believes United are a better side to that which reached the semi-finals two years ago, when Frenchman Eric Cantona was their star.

"I never really thought they performed as a team and that was probably why we beat them," said Conte.

"Now there is a collectivity about them. They work as a unit. They do not look at a man like Cantona to get them through when things start to go wrong."

"We have to come home with something. If we get beaten 2-0 like Inter then it will be no good. It will be the end finto."

Feyenoord firmly on course

AMSTERDAM, Apr 6: Feyenoord stayed on course for their 14th Dutch league title after beating relegation-haunted Sparta 1-0 in a Rotterdam derby on Monday, reports Reuters.

The lacklustre match was settled in the 15th minute when Jon Dahl Tomasson beat the Sparta defence to reach a Julio Cruz pass and rounded goalkeeper Roland Jansen to score.

Feyenoord lead with 64 points, with eight games to go, they are 11 points clear of second-placed Vitesse Arnhem.

Sparta moved closer to their first relegation from the top flight. They have 18 points from 27 games and are in 16th place in the 20-team league, just three points clear of bottom side RKC Waalwijk.

The bottom side is relegated automatically and the 16th and 17th-placed sides are involved in a play-off series with six Second Division teams.

Afghans all padded up

KABUL, Apr 6 (AFP/Internet): Mohammad Shafiq Masood dances from his crease and slams the ball back over the head of Jalalabad's bowler Jalil Hussein for six.

Shafiq, 21, who bats at number three for Kabul, throws his fist in the air. He says he wants to bat like the Australian and Pakistani greats, former captains Mark Taylor and Imran Khan.

In perhaps the most unlikely of countries - Afghanistan - cricket is booming. Local authorities say there are now more than 150 teams, and plans are under way to push Afghan cricketers into the international arena.

Taliban Sports Minister Abdul Shokor Mutmaen said the 28 provinces now under the militia's control have initiated a league, each fielding up to 10 teams.

There are seven in Kabul, where an unlikely mix of Islamic zeal and weekend games played in the backyard has recruited Afghan baby boomers to the sport.

Cricket has always been played in Afghanistan, but recent growth was due largely to the four million Afghan refugees who fled to neighbouring Pakistan during the 1978-89 occupation by the former Soviet Union, and the civil war which followed.

The Kyber Pass is a short ride to Peshawar, where Taylor etched his name in the history books with a Test triple century against Pakistan last year.

They learnt the game there as refugees. Many were then repatriated and they imported the game," Mutmaen said.

Locals say the game's popularity has also been helped by a deliberate baby boom in the 1980s and 1990s.

According to Nancy Dupree, of the Afghanistan Resource and Information Centre, the birth rate among Afghan women was 9.3 children by 1978, and rose to 13.6 for each woman in the refugee camps over the next 20 years.

"So many men were being killed in battle ... that women wanted to have as many children as possible. This was considered an appropriate way for women to contribute to the jihad (holy war)," Dupree says.

The baby boom has translated into thousands of young cricketers, who compete with soccer players for space on Kabul's few sports fields.

Decent bats and basic pads are rare, and helmets are a ridiculously expensive indulgence, but this does not stop Jalalabad's Hussein from pitching a short delivery that bounces head-high off a dry, dirt pitch.

Shafiq fends off the short delivery before complaining about a lack of equipment.

We are desperate for equipment. The right bats and pads cost a lot of money and we simply haven't got it," he says.

Mutmaen is plotting a strategy designed to resolve such problems and incorporate Afghan cricket with the rest of the world.

The Afghanistan National Cricket Federation has been established, and Mutmaen says

he wants the body registered with the International Cricket Council (ICC).

This would enable Afghanistan to play friendly internationals - England, Pakistan and Australia are touted as priorities.

We have already organised a national squad, and we are currently going through the selection process, and we want to be registered with the right international authorities," Mutmaen says.

The ICC have a reputation of heavily promoting the game in other countries and we have approached them, but so far we have not heard back.

But analysts say that, until the war is over, Afghan sports officials will have difficulty gaining acceptance from the international community.

In the meantime, Shafiq's side is attempting to organise a series against embassy Xis in diplomatic circles in Islamabad next year.

"We're looking at Pakistan, Australia, Britain, India and the West Indies," he said. "And I think we will do okay."
