### Launch crash programmes to increase power generation: PM

Prime Minister Shetkh Hasina yesterday asked for launching crash programmes for increasing power generation to meet the growing demand. reports UNB.

"Economic progress cannot be ensured without increased power supply," she said while presiding over a high-level meeting of energy and power ministry at her office.

After the upazila election. massive economic activities will be started at upazila levels, she said and asked the officials to set up area-based small power plants.

The prime minister suggested that small power units like 10 to 20 megawatt plants be See Page 12 Col 3

### Dhaka condemns Serbian 'reign of terror'

Bangladesh yesterday strongly condemned the Serbian leadership for unleashing 'a reign of terror' on the unarmed ethnic Albanian civilians in Kosovo, reports BSS.

Referring to the crisis in Kosovo, Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad told BSS that "Bangladesh earnestly hoped that the negotiations would provide a basis for a peaceful solution to the crisis in Kosovo.

The foreign minister said it is regrettable that the diplomatic efforts were not allowed to succeed due to the intransigent attitude adopted by the Serbian leaders.

He noted that the Serb authorities opted for "systematic brutal repression on the Ethnic Albanian population of Kosovo by Serbian paramilitary and police forces.'

Narrating Bangladesh's efforts for "concerted international endeavours" to resolve the crisis in Kosovo, the foreign minister said "Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has announced a token donation of US dollars 50.000 to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) for its programmes in Kosovo."

He said Bangladesh had already urged immediate and concerted international actions for ensuring protection, shelter, food and medical assistance for the refugees of that area.

### Jubo League leader shot dead in Khulna

From Staff Correspondent KHULNA, Apr 7: A local Jubo League leader was shot dead by three unidentified assailants near a tea stall at Daulatpur thana here at 4:15 pm today.

Bikash Barhoi, a Daulatpur thana Jubo League leader, was rushed to the KMCH with bullet wounds where doctors declared him dead.

The assailants shot Bikash from a point-blank range, wit-

## Nor'wester kills 6 in Dinajpur, Lalmonirhat

DINAJPUR, Apr 7: At least six people were killed and over 100 injured as nor'wester accompanied by hailstorm swept northern districts of Dinajpur and Lalmonirhat last night, reports UNB.

Officials said five people died in house collapse and lightning in Parbatipur thana as hailstorm pounded the area. It followed a welcome shower after a long dry spell.

The dead were identified as Solaiman, 55, of Jahanabad, Samad, 50, of Chandoa, Rahim 42 of Baniapara, Kasimuddin 48 of Pikepara and Jalal, 30, of Madhyapara.

Parbatipur power station was affected seriously and electric wires snapped in the oneand-half-hour storm that started lashing at about 10 pm.

Tins and roofs of over 1,000 thatched houses, educational institutions and mosques were blown off, crops of a vast tract of land damaged and huge number of trees grounded during the nature's fury.

Thana Nirbahi Officer visited different places of the nor'wester-hit Parbatipur today and assured the victims of emergency relief.

In Lalmonirhat, thunderbolt struck a man to death as the tropical storm lashed the district, wrecking nearly 500 thatched houses.

Identity of the victim, hailed from Kulaghat union, was not known immediately.

## Alarming rise in infection by STDs 11.5pc men, 5.4pc women carry syphilis in city slums

The number of people infected with sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) in the country is rising alarmingly, raising morbidity and mortality in men and women, according to

Various kinds of STDs like urinary tract infections (UTIs), reproductive tract infections (RTIs), syphilis, gonorrhoea and Hepatitis B create innumerable health problems bringing down the overall health condition of people. The situation is further compounded by public ignorance about the dis-

studies.

Foundation (BGF) report, compiled from 25 different surveys and researches conducted by various government and nongovernment organisations, projects an alarming picture of prevalence of STDs in the country. It also gives a comprehensive picture of sexual behaviours and practices and genitourinary complications among men and women.

At least 28 to 67.5 per cent of the sex workers carry Syphilis, 14.3 to 27 per cent Gonorrhoea and 18 per cent Hepatitis B, the report said. STDs are alarming among

the floating CSWs in the city.

centage is around 39 among the

institutionalised CSWs.

The report said around 67 per cent of the CSWs are aware of syphilis and 88 per cent of them know about gonorrhoea. Around 36.5 per cent of the CSWs know that HIV and AIDS are transmitted through sexual 'routes'. About 36 per cent women in general know that condom can prevent STDs but, they said, its use is very low. In the city slums, around
