

None of the Japanese male players survived the first three

rounds. Top-seeded Gade Christensen chose a short game against his opponent, ranked a remote 166th in the world but a 15-10. 15-12 winner over ninth seed Dong Jiong of China in the second round

"He beat Dong Jiong last night. So I was telling myself not to underestimate him," said Gade Christensen after beating Chien in only 29 minutes. "I'm ter Rasmussen of Denmark and satisfied with today's match. I Malaysia's Ong Ewe Hock, who played very well and moved
