Serbs may have killed 1 lakh Kosovars

WASHINGTON, Apr 19: Tens of thousands of young ethnic Albanian men possibly as many as 100,000 - may have been killed by Serb ethnic cleansing of Kosovo, the US ambassador for war crimes said Sunday, reports AP.

David Scheffer also said Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic "certainly (is) a prime target for investigation" as a war criminal. Milosevic has been advised of that in a letter from prosecutor Louise Arbour of the UN war crimes tribunal in the Netherlands.

Scheffer, appearing on Fox television, "brought side-byside photographs of the westcentral Kosovo ethnic Albanian town of lzbica that he said proved mass killings by Serbs.

The photos, released Satur-day by NATO, depicted an area taken at different times. In the photo on the right, up to 150 graves had appeared where nothing existed before. Scheffer called it "a classic example of ethnic cleansing."

"The Serbs came in, torched

the town and then proceeded with massacres of individual

groups of Kosovars," he said. Asked about a NATO claim that ethic Albanian refugees had reported 3,200 deaths at the hands of Serb security forces, Scheffer said: "That's a very low

Based on unconfirmed refugee reports and other sources of information. Scheffer said: "You're actually looking at the possibility of tens of thousands of Kosovars who not only are at risk, but also may actually have perished by this stage. ... We have upwards to about 100,000 men that we cannot account for."

Refugees have spoken of ethnic Albanian men, largely those of fighting age, being separated from relatives before the families were forced to flee. "We have no idea where those men are now," Scheffer said.

Scheffer, the United Stages' first ambassador-at-large for war crimes, said the United States will provide prosecutor Arbour with "as much informa-

tion as possible ... to support her investigation.

Meanwhile, President Clinton branded Slobodan Milosevic a "belligerent tyrant" and said Sunday the Yugoslav president could not be part of any democratic transition by his nation into a free Europe. Clinton stopped short of calling for Milosevic's immediate re-

Writing in a London newspaper, Clinton said NATO airstrikes that began March 24 will continue until Milosevic's Serb forces are too weak to fight in Kosovo or until he agrees to peace and autonomy for the Serbian province's ethnic Albanians.

"Our campaign will continue, shifting the balance of power against him until we succeed," Clinton said in an opinion piece in the Sunday Times. "Ultimately, Milosevic must either cut his mounting losses or lose his ability to maintain his grip on Kosovo.'


Reuter adds from Geneva: The United Nations refugee agency, the UNHCR, said today Yugoslav forces appeared to be turning back ethnic Albanians trying to leave the country.

UNHCR spokesman Kris Janowski said the latest flow of refugees from Kosovo into Albania had stopped overnight. He said refugees had also stopped crossing into Macedonia and Montenegro.

AFP says from Moscow: Russian President Boris Yeltsin met with his special envoy on Yugoslavia, Viktor Chernomyrdin, and other top officials today to devise a new strategy to defuse the escalating Balkans crisis.

Yeltsin told the session of government ministers and defence officials that the Yugoslav crisis was "a very serious question," ITAR-Tass reported.

Chernomyrdin for his part said that the Belgrade-NATO conflict would be harder to stop than it had been to start.

Her political career hangs in balance

Benazir's lawyers prepare to appeal against conviction

Lawyers for Benazir Bhutto prepared to appeal her conviction, but party stalwarts said Monday that it's likely to be two weeks before the embattled former prime minister returns to Pakistan, reports AP.

"We will try to get a stay (order) against Benazir's conviction from the Supreme Court," said Iftikhar Gailani, a lawyer and a senior official of Benazir's Pakistan People's

He said Benazir, who currently is in London, won't return home until the appeal has been filed and it's certain that she won't be arrested when she arrives in Pakistan.

Her lawyers will be asking the Supreme Court to suspend her sentence until her appeal on corruption charges are heard. That process is expected to take two weeks, said Gailani.

Benazir and her jailed husband Asif Ali Zardari were convicted of corruption and abuse of power and sentenced last Thursday to five years in jail. fined 8.6 million dollars and disqualified from politics.

The court also ordered their

property confiscated. Benazir says she is innocent and accuses Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's government of trying to destroy opposition politicians in Pakistan.

It's still not clear whether Banazir has to personally appear in the Supreme Court when her appeal is filed, said her spokesman Farhatullah Babar.

Her lawyers still were struggling with that question. Despite the possibility of jail. Benazir's party workers

say she will return to Pakistan.

"Benazir is innocent and she will come back to the country despite all the odds," said Senator Raza Rabbani, deputy opposition leader of her party in the Senate or the upper house of the Parliament.

Bhutto has seen it all in a colourful political career, but once again her future hangs in the balance.

The former premier has vowed to fight a conviction last week for corruption which barred her from political life, and she can take heart from the fierce support she still commands in her home province of Sindh.

In a countrystill profe to feudal ways, Benazir has a cult following in Sindh, large parts of which shut down on Saturday to support a strike call by her Pakistan People's Party in protest against the conviction.

The 46-year-old opposition leader slammed the conviction as a "gross miscarriage of justice" by the special court, which she said was set up by the government of arch-rival Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif to end her political career.

Cries of foul play surrounding the conviction were given an added twist by the fact that the presiding judge was the son of the judge who sentenced Benazir Bhutto's father to death two decades ago.

An ultra-rightist group made stunning gains in Sunday's elections and could emerge as the second largest group in parliament, according to results based on a count of 50 per cent of the votes.

Analysts said voters may have abandoned the Islamic Virtue party — the largest in parliament - because of its friction with the staunchly secular military and chosen the ultranationalist movement, which is also deeply religious.

Ecevit's Democratic Left party was leading with 23 per cent of the ballots. Ecevit, who is widely respected, appeared to be picking up votes from people disillusioned by the constant scandals that have plagued other administrations.

"I am happy with this result," Ecevit said at a post-elections news conference. "I think the period of using religion for political purposes is over."

The Islamic Virtue Party was taking just 16 per cent of the votes, a sharp decline from the 21 per cent that its predecessor. the Welfare Party, garnered in 1995 to win parliamentary elections and eventually take power before being pushed out by the military.

Virtue appeared, however, to have retained control over the municipalities of Istanbul and Ankara. The party has a strong reputation for delivering social services.

The Nationalist Movement Party was taking 18 per cent of the vote. In 1995, the party did not pass the 10 per cent mark necessary to gain seats.

Known as the MHP, the ultra-nationalist party, which will likely be part of a future coalition, calls for no compromise with Kurdish activists and appears to have benefited from the mid-February capture of Kurdish guerilla leader Abdullah Ocalan.

MHP leader Devlet Bahceli appeared surprised by his party's strong gains. People "were forced to make a new choice" because of instability in the government and political corruption, he said.

In Istanbul, overjoyed ultranationalists took to the streets Sunday, waving the party's three-crescent flag and chanting, "Stand Kosovo, we are com-

NEW DELHI, Apr 19: India avoided a looming financial crisis today, when an all-party parliamentary meeting agreed to pass the pending national budget without amendment after the ouster of the ruling coalition, reports AFP.

The budget will be passed "in toto" through parliament on Wednesday, together with other pending financial business, opposition leader Sharad Pawar told reporters after the meeting. "Whatever the government proposes on the budget, we shall

agree." Pawar said. Share prices on the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) climbed 1.5 per cent on the news.

Monday's meeting had been called by parliamentary speaker GMC Balayogi, after the budget looked set to fall victim to India's current political cri-

Failure to pass the budget before a May 13 deadline would have invalidated crucial tax changes proposed by outgoing Finance Minister Yashwant Sinha and triggered a serious fiscal crisis. The main opposition Congress Party, currently

struggling to form an alternative government to replace the outgoing coalition, had been urged by President K.R. Narayanan not to delay the budget's passage. Congress leader and former

finance minister Manmohan Singh said Monday that while the budget would be passed without amendments, changes could be made in the future.

"If the new government wants to bring in amendments, it could always do so at a later stage," he said.

The 30-share BSE sensitive index rose 49.32 points to the all-party decision broke. "The market is relieved the budget will be passed. We have been waiting for this. Prices have started moving up," said broker Gaurav Sanghvi.

The index had plunged seven per cent in a special day's trading Saturday after the government lost its confidence mo-

In the immediate aftermath of the government's collapse. the budget became a political football, with the outgoing Hindu nationalists refusing to support its passage if changes were made.

The Congress was under pressure to introduce amendments from communist parties opposed to free-market reforms. which they argue will turn the country into a hunting ground for foreign multinationals.

African leaders sign pact to end Congo conflict

CAIRO, Apr 19: The presidents of four African countries meeting in Libya signed a peace agreement Sunday aimed at ending the civil war in Congo, the Libyan news agency reported. However, Congolese rebels were not part of the deal,

report AP. The agreement was reached after two days of talks in the Libyan coastal town of Sirte, hosted by Libyan leader Moammar Gaddafi, Libya's state-run JANA news agency

The rebels have previously rejected any deals without their direct participation and it was not clear how effective the Sirte pact would. Also unrepresented in the agreement was Rwanda, the principal backer of the rebels, who now hold the eastern third of the country in their


