Irregularities mar prospects of shrimp production farms

About 36 per cent of shrimp production farms in Bangladesh is not operating due to various reasons, says a recent study of BIDS, reports UNB.

Inadequate export orders. diversion of credit to other sectors, blacklisting by the importers for exporting shoddy products, unplanned and haphazard growth of the industry are among the reasons, it pointed out

The study, titled "Technological Capability in the Shrimp Processing Sector in Bangladesh" was jointly con-ducted by Kazi Ali Toufique, Research Fellow, Bangladesh In-stitute of Development Studies and Abu Hena Reza Hasan, Assistant Professor of the Department of Management of Dhaka University.

Some of the shrimp processing plants started production with bank loan but could not survive, because either they could not sell their product of failed to buy fish. Many innocent, semi-illiterate people in-vested in this sector, but they met the same fate due to lack of experience, skill, untrustworthy partners or purchasing offi-

It is alleged that Bangladeshi exporters of shrimp receive lower price due to bad reputation for supplying products of dubious quality, prompting the European Union to impose a ban on shrimp imports from Bangladesh. The ban, coupled with subsequent fall of price in international market has led to poor performance in shrimp export from Bangladesh in the fiscal 1997-98.

Bangladesh exporters, however, have overcome the situation to some extent leading to EU to be convinced enough to withdraw their ban, and price in international market has

showed a slight rise. The survey pinpointed that fraud was involved in grading. weighing and so on. Supplying products of highest quality is costly because of high supervi-

sion and monitoring expenses. Often exporters are undone when the scale-man or the purchase department does the cheating. As a result, importers blacklisted some shrimp-pro-cessing plants. These blacklisted companies are involved in the business again now having changed their names, regis-tration numbers and product brands, the survey revealed.

Tons of shrimps are also purchased in the local purchase department and the same type of problem exists there as well. There are serious problems dur-ing buying from sellers of raw shrimp in the process of

weighing and grading. There is ample scope for mal-reporting by the pur-chasers appointed by the exporters as they can report of higher grade by purchasing the lower grade causing losses to the exporters.

This dishonesty is eventually passed on to the processing and packing stages where the large fish is placed on top and small ones at the bottom to apparently maintain the required number of shrimps. Often the required number of shrimps is not maintained at all.

The study also says that Bangladesh exports about four per cent of the global exports of shrimps. Production of shrimp per hectare is slightly higher than that of Vietnam - the lowest exporter of shrimp. It is 33 per cent lower than the global average and it is about four per cent of the global best performer - China. Thus the gap between productivity of Bangladesh shrimp production farms and the global average and the global best exporters is too large.

The productivity of the shrimp firms can be substantially improved by moving from traditional to semi-intensive and finally intensive production of shrimps. This is generally agreed by the producers and exporters of shrimps in Bangladesh.


Haroon Habib, a valiant

Tejgaon police, however, denied that any motor vehicle was damaged in the incident. No case was lodged and no one was arrested in this connection till last night.

JCD calls for strike in all edn institutions Thursday

JCD leaders announced the programmes at a rally at the Muktangan near Paltan crossing yesterday evening. Addressing the rally, leaders blasted the government for unleashing ter ror and repression on opposition forces. They also asked the government to immediately step down for its failure to handle law and order situation for frequent loadshedding and price hike of essentials.

Among others, JCD president Habib-un-Nabi Sohel, general secretary Nasiruddin Ahmed Pintu and student af fairs secretary of the opposition BNP Amanullah Aman MP ad dressed the rally.

Following the rally, JCD also brought out a procession from the Muktangan which ended at BNP's central office in Naya Paltan. A huge contingent of riot police were seen covering the procession but no untoward incident was reported. The pro-BNP JCD procession

came under attack while marching towards the Prime Minister's office on Sunday to lay a siege there to press home their 12-point demands which include reduction of tuition fees, elimination of terrorism from campuses and punishment of persons responsible for the rapes at Jahangirnagar University.

"We don't want power. But Bangladesh, that we achieved, has to be run at the desire of freedom fighters." Siddiqui

He announced the structure of the organisation that he said would not be an alternative to Muktijoddha Sangsad, which did nothing for freedom fighters. It will be formed after his cross-country tour over the next three months.

"If you want, it'll be. It's not designed to confirm my ministerial job. Had I wanted to be a minister. I could be during Khaleda and Ershad regimes. And it's a matter of a couple of days to be a minister in Hasina's cabinet," he said.

Said Kader Siddiqui: "I can assure you that I'll never be a minister of Sheikh Hasina...J want that every freedom fighter should be a minister. I want out of 330 MPs, 280 should be from among the freedom fighters."

If the majority MPs in parliament were freedom fighters. the situation could not be like present times. "But I'm to sit in parliament with the people who became ministers after the killing of Bangabandhu," the ruling party lawmaker said.

He was also critical about not holding the trial of killers of Bangabandhu in special tri-

"Justice delayed, justice denied - will it not be like this? If Awami League doesn't remain in power when the formalities in High Court, Supreme Court will go on for the execution of the verdict, won't the killers come out of the jail like Golam Azam?"

He said the killers have been tried. "Why not the plotters?" Kader Siddiqui, said:

"Bangabandhu is my founder. I'm an Awami Leaguer. But there are many limitations in my party. Declaring that he would try

to remove the limitations, the valiant warrior further said he doesn't want to be a lackey of ruling Awami League or main opposition BNP as well as of the Jatiya Party. "I never left Awami League

for a single day. But my exchange of Eid greetings with Begum Khaleda Zia was highly criticised," he regretted. "But they held meeting with war criminal Golam Azam for power."

About the mock trial of Golam Azam in a "people's court" on March 26, 1992, Kader Siddiqui questioned the honesty of its organisers. "People didn't want to hear the verdict that Golam Azam's crime deserve death penalty. "I was at 29, Minto Road that

day. I saw the activities there as well as the fear of Jahanara Imam and Hasan Imam. Many had promised to bring lakhs of people, but they failed and ordinary people joined it." He said: "In fact, the trial was a conspiracy to provide cit-

izenship to Golam Azam...citizenship was not the vital question for the people. They accused Golam Azam of killing, atrocities and repression on women in 1971." "The verdict of the people's court was not executed during

In this regard, Siddiqui mentioned the execution of four war criminals by his own hands on December 18, 1971 at Paltan in Dhaka. "For this, was the first man against whom an warrant was issued in inde-

He also blamed the leaders of

the BNP regime. But why not

the Liberation War for misguiding the freedom fighters. "It's to your credit that you made all of us freedom fighters. But the responsibility also goes to you when some are misguided."

The "Bir Uttam" criticised the decision of the post-Liberation War government for awarding the highest title of "Bir Shreshtha" only to army and EPR personnel. "One of them even couldn't come to the country," he said. Kader Siddiqui termed the

killings of Bangabandhu. Ziaur Rahman, Col Taher, Brig Khaled Mosharraf and Genera Manzur as part of a deep-rooted conspiracy to liquidate the -freedom fighters. "It was like picking a thorn with another "Now the party of Ziaus

Rahman always tries to tarnish the image of Bangabandhu while the Bangabandhu's party do the same in case of Zia...thus the pro-liberation forces are destroying themselves while the anti-liberation forces are getting united. About the proclamation of

independence, the valiant freedom fighter said it was done initially by Abdul Hannan. "But the announcement was later made by Zia as a section didn't like to give the credit to Han-

He also bitterly criticised his Awami League and the BNP as well as their key leaders for engaging in 'silly' debates. "Country's three crore voters are undermined when Awami League terms BNP as vote thief and the BNP calls Awami League the

Elaborating the distress situation of freedom fighters and spirit of the Liberation War. Siddiqui said: "Economist magazine recently mentioned our independence war as a war between Hindus and Muslims. But none protested this."

If this situation continues, he said, after 5 to 10 years the freedom fighters will be called miscreants and there will be none to protest.

The valiant warrior condemned the activities of Muktijoddha Sangsad and its present leaders who he said, have no quality to run such a prestigious organisation. "The man who called Khaleda mother and Ershad father is now its chairman.

"Such weak leadership is very dangerous for an organisation," he said. "Weak leadership is also dangerous for the country. Female leadership comes when male leadership is weakened," he said without naming Sheikh Hasina and Khaleda Zia. About the current drive of

Muktijoddha Sangsad to make list of freedom fighters, he said it's a farce. "The freedom fighters are certified by Bangabandhu and General Osmany. No more certificate or list is needed even if some of those certified by Bangabandhu and Osmany are fake."

Some 20 freedom fighters from across the country took part in the discussion. They included Abdul Aziz Bir Protik, Ishtiaque Aziz Ulfat, Sadek Ahmed Khan, Akhter Newaz Khan Babul, Jamaluddin Ahmed, Ilias Mia and Abdul Jalal Bir Uttam.
