SL board free to function

COLOMBO, Apr 26: A Sri Lanka court lifted today a restriction preventing Sri Lanka cricket board officials from carrying out their functions, reports Reuters.

But the court said fresh elections would be needed if allegations of intimidation in last month's polls were proven.

Three weeks ago the court issued an order restraining president Thilanga Sumithipala and some other board officials from functioning as office-bearers after losing candidate Clifford Ratwatte alleged that gun-toting intruders had prevented free and fair elections.

The order was not extended when the case was heard today but colombo district court judge AMA Salam said that if the trial found the elections were unfair Ratwatte could stand in fresh elections.

Salam also said a letter from Sports Minister SB Dissanayake to the board was in contempt of court because it had found fault with his court order. The judge demanded that a

certified copy of the minister's letter be produced in court by May 7 and added that he was referring the matter to high judicial authorities. He also ordered Sumithipala

and other board officials to appear before courts when the interim injuction inquiry starts on April 28.

Sumathipala was re-elected president by a 79-11 margin after a walk-out by Ratwatte and his supporters.

He has denied charges of vote-rigging, saying the election was held according to the board's constitution and with the consent of the majority at the meeting.

Ratwatte, Prime Minister Sirimavo Bandaranaike's brother, made a surprise entry into the presidential race. promising to clean up the administration and impose financial discipline.

Kenya wary of weather

MANCHESTER, Apr 26 (AFP): Kenya's cricketers flew into a damp Manchester on Monday to launch their World Cup campaign and admitted the English conditions could cause them serious problems in next month's tournament.

But despite having to struggle against the weather and their underdog status, the Kenyans are still confident of pulling off another shock victory to rank alongside their famous defeat of the West Indies in 1996.

Kenya captain Asif Karim said: "We don't know the best way to approach games here yet as we are not sure of the English conditions.

"At least eight of our squad have never been to England before so we need to learn quickly. We have some warm-up games to play and from them we hope to learn how to play in the conditions." Kenya arrived in England in

confident mood following an upsurge in their form that brought a one-day win in India last year and four wins against an MCC touring team that included several Test players. Tour manager Harilal Shah

admitted: "We are the underdogs but since the last World Cup we have had far more experience in one-day games and because of that I'm sure the boys will do

Hooper may play Shield cricket

SYDNEY, Apr 26 (AFP/ Internet): Carl Hooper is expected to move to South Australia and possibly play Sheffield Shield cricket following his shock resignation from the West Indian team, according to reports here Monday.

The veteran all-rounder's resignation was delivered to the West Indies Cricket Board over the weekend and will force the selectors to add another player to their 15-man squad for next month's World Cup in England. Hooper, who made 80 Test

and 182 one-day appearances, missed the first two Tests of the Caribbean series against Australia after deciding to stay with his wife and ill baby son in Adelaide.

He is expected to return to Adelaide and live with them

Australian Associated Press said South Australian cricket officials would sound out Hooper, 32, about playing for the state side next season.

"He's been a wonderful cricketer, there's no doubt about that, he won't be easily replaced but the point is that cricket moves on and we have to find somebody, give a young player a chance in the World Cup and beyond," said Windies manager

Clive Lloyd said in Barbados.
"We have a lot of cricket to play and unfortunately he had to retire at this early age because I still think he's wonderful player."

Asked the circumstances surrounding Hooper's announcement, Lloyd said, "He was in Australia and didn't play a lot, he said he wanted to come back and help the team and now he's retired.

"I really don't know what's caused that.'

AAP said that Hooper appeared distracted during what turned out to be his last appearance for the Windies in Bridgetown in the final match of the seven-match one-day series against Australia.




