ICC under Lillee fire

PERTH, Apr 28: Australian cricket legend Dennis Lillee Wednesday attacked the International Cricket Council (ICC) over its failure to act on crowd violence in the West Indies, reports AFP.

"The ICC can count itself damn lucky it doesn't have blood on its hands," the former fast bowler said in a West Australian newspaper column following violent disruptions during the recent Australian tour of the West Indies.

Play in the final one-day match at Bridgetown was interrupted when spectators threw bottles at Australian players. In Georgetown four days earlier spectators invaded the pitch preventing the game being com-

Recalling similar crowd control problems 20 years ago when he toured the West Indies with Ian Chappell's World Series Cricket team, Lillee said it was beyond his comprehension that the ICC "could be still sitting on its hands".

He asked: "Is it waiting for someone to be killed?" Lillee said that, despite all

the assurances after the incidents in 1979, what he saw on television this month was a mirror image of what had happened two decades ago.

"We all know the West Indies board has a budget already stretched to the limit," Lillee "But the ICC, with its coffers

bursting at the seams, has a vested interest in West Indies cricket.

"The ICC must get more involved to ensure that happens."






