## Inter chief resigns

MILAN, May 7: Inter Milan were rocked by a fresh crisis on Thursday night when president and owner Massimo Moratti announced he was quitting the Serie A club although he maintained he would remain as owner, reports AFP.

Moratti's resignation as president took immediate effect, the club said in a statement, and he was followed by several other board members quitting as well -- a new president will be elected at a shareholders meeting.

The 54-year-old, a multi-millionaire whose fortune is based on oil refineries, bought the club in February 1995, 27 years after his father Angelo had stepped down as president but he had been bitterly disappointed with his team's performances and results in recent weeks.

However, he revealed that the main reason behind his decision to resign was over the scathing criticism he had received for reappointing Roy Hodgson as coach, the club's fourth this season, less than two weeks ago.

"I am leaving because I am bitter and because there have been things that have upset me," he said.

Asked if he had decided to go because of the Italian press criticising him over bringing back Hodgson he said "Yes, its for that very reason."

## Real retaliate

MADRID, May 7: Real Madrid hit back in the war of words between coach John Toshack and Croatian striker Davor Suker here on Thursday when they suspended the player without pay, reports AFP.

The club took the action after the 31-year-old, who won the Golden Boot award for finishing leading scorer in the World Cup finals last year, accused Toshack of wrecking the image of the seven-time European Cup winners.

"We have taken these steps because his conduct reflects badly on the image of the club, he has committed a grave offence," a club spokesman said.

Toshack, who is a stickler for discipline that has earned him the nickname of the 'Iron fisted Welshman', had also been accused by Suker of trying to make him sign for either Portuguese outfit Porto or Turkish side Fenerbahce and in return he would play in the remaining six league matches.

But the 31-year-old Croat would prefer a move to England. "Toshack is a difficult coach and he loves to be the protagonist. He is doing his best to ruin the image of the club," Suker said.

The 50-year-old Welshman, who coached Real Madrid to the 1990 title when they scored a league record 107 goals but was sacked in November 1990, has barely used Suker since he took over at the club earlier in the year.

Their relationship had worsened in recent weeks with Toshack, who started the season as coach of Turkey's Besiktas, accusing the striker of missing training.

## Crazy!

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 7: The president of struggling Brazilian club Fluminense wants to play for his team on Sunday when they face a Flamengo side spearheaded by Romario, reports Reuters.

Rogério Riguetti, a 36-year-old businessman who has never appeared in top level football, said he wanted to go on as a central defender and Mark Romario, top scorer in the Carioca (Rio de Janeiro state) championship with 12 goals.

"I'm well prepared. I train every day," said Riguetti, who openly admits that he has taken on the club presidency to make a name for himself and help his political career. He intends to run for mayor of Itaperuna in the next local elections.

"I won't tremble. I've always been a sportsman," he said. The team's top player Carlos Andre, who answers the club telephone in his spare time, said Riguetti was simply trying to promote the game.

Itaperuna, who are so short of money that players had to travel to games by public bus last year, have only one point to show from 11 games and have conceded 34 goals.

The modest provincial team last made headlines two years ago when the then coach Paulo Mata ran on to the pitch during a game and dropped his trousers in protest at a refereeing decision.

# Bangladesh's first test today

Bangladesh will take on Essex County Cricket Club in their first official warm-up match at Chelmsford in Essex today. This is the ground where Bangladesh will make their maiden World Cup appearance against New Zealand on May 17. Prior to that they will play two more warm-up matches against Middlesex and Northamptonshire on May 10 and 12.

Bangladesh, the ICC champions, have been drafted in group B for the first round of the 12-team World Cup, the last this millennium.

Former World Champions West Indies, Australia and Pakistan, and Scotland, who emerged third in the 1997 ICC Trophy, are the other four teams pencilled in group B.

The other group comprises of hosts England, holders Sri Lanka, South Africa, former World champions India, Zimbabwe and ICC runners-up Kenya.

Although the official tour of the 15-member Bangladesh team, led by Aminul Islam, started from May 3, the team along with the management reached London on April 14 to get accustomed with the chilly English weather.

During their stay in England

before their official tour began, Bangladesh had intense training under coach Gordon Greenidge and his two assistant coaches for bowling - Mushtaq Mohammad of Pakistan and former England fast bowler Allan Ward. They also played three 'unofficial' practice matches against three minor local teams and won all three quite comprehensively.

# Keegan quitting Fulham?



LONDON, May 7: Stand-in coach Kevin Keegan has revealed for the first time that he is ready to sever his ties with Fulham in order to continue full-time with England, reports AFP.

Keegan declared last week in Hungary that he wanted to continue beyond his original four-match and to lead England beyond Euro 2000.

However, Fulham were hoping that he would also see out the remainder of his contract at Craven Cottage after steering the club into the First Division.

But the former Newcastle manager admitted on ITV's The Sports Show on Thursday night that combining the two roles was not feasible.

"I think the way it's going, it possibly will be a clean break," said Keegan. "I think what we've got to get back to is that you can't do the two jobs, that's what I've found, otherwise you jeopardise both parties and that includes Fulham Football Club."

"I went there to be chief operating officer and I took a manager in and then because that didn't work, I've gone in for a year and I've really enjoyed

that year. I think the fans, and I know the players have."

"If there's no role there for me to fulfil -- in other words if someone says to me, there's a certain amount of money, just come and be a figurehead -- I don't want that."

"If I had wanted that, I'd be at Newcastle United."

"I've thought about it long and hard -- I haven't just come out."

"If I had gone straight away and taken the England job with 12 games left for Fulham and Fulham hadn't got promoted, that would have been the biggest disservice that I could have done to the people who work at Fulham and the players and the fans."

"I stuck with it, I said I didn't want to go. I wanted to take it part."

"But having had it for two games, my heart tells me to take it and if the Fulham fans do not understand that, and I'm sure there will be plenty who don't, then I have to say to them well I'm sorry, that is the way I feel. I can't be more honest than that."

On the night Fulham clinched promotion by beating Gillingham last month, Keegan

insisted that he would lead the club's first bid for a Premiership place, but he now admits that that was said in the heat of the joyous celebrations at Craven Cottage.

"That's before I took my second game with England and got the bug I suppose," Keegan told The Sports Show.

"I'm not going to make any apologies for that because I think football is an emotional game, and sometimes you can say things."

"I like Fulham Football Club very much and I don't think anyone could have worked harder at Fulham than I have and the people there."

"I think it would be far worse if I said nothing tonight, didn't come on the show and just disappeared on Monday and then you would say 'that's not right either'."

"I've been up front, I've been honest as I always hope to be, everyone's got a right to change their mind."

His decision to make a clean break from the club is a double blow for owner Mohamed Al Fayed, who had his UK passport request rejected by the Home Secretary.

# European soccer scene

PARIS, May 7: Lazio and AC Milan continue their dogfight for the Italian league title this weekend in the knowledge that one of them could be heading for a terminal tailspin, reports AFP.

Their neck and neck duel, Lazio lead AC Milan by just a point, is in stark contrast with the German and Spanish championships where Bayern Munich can clinch the title this weekend with a win over Hertha Berlin and Barcelona can maintain their remorseless march on the Liga with a seemingly easy match at Villareal.

## SERIE A

With three matches left in the Italian season, Lazio have an easy fixture at home to Bologna, a midtable side who have sadly gone to pieces since last month's UEFA Cup semi-final exit.

Lazio striker Christian Vieri is enjoying a great run of form and will be joined up from veteran Roberto Mancini, with Chilean Marcelo Salas still serving out a spell on the subs' bench.

Coach Sven Goran Eriksson has only one doubt, whether Yugoslav midfielder Dejan Stankovic will recover from a tweaked thigh muscle and whether Aussie Paul Okon will have to take his place.

Milan can expect a rougher ride in Turin, where they face reigning champs Juventus, who will be missing several players, but still nurturing hopes of pipping Parma to that last Champions' League slot.

However, Alberto Zaccaroni's men will be at full strength -- Librarian ace George Weah having returned from suspension, at the expense of Maurizio Ganz, whose deflected shot in the 95th minute last weekend earned Milan a priceless 3-2 win over Sampdoria.

Zaccaroni has only one decision to make, the embarrassment of riches being that he must choose between Croatia captain Zvonimir Boban or Brazilian Leonardo to help the

attack.

By contrast, Juventus have three important players suspended -- Dutch midfielder Edgar Davids and two defenders, Mark Iuliano and Yugoslav Zoran Mirkovic.

Victory for Lazio and defeat of Milan would clearly put the Rome club in the driving seat, four points in front and just two more matches to negotiate before lifting the title again after a gap of 25 years.

However, the sting in the tail is that Lazio are playing their last easy match before two tough ones (Fiorentina, Parma), while Milan are playing their last hard game before two easy ones (Empoli, Perugia).

Should Lazio lose of draw and Milan win, the current leaders can kiss the championship goodbye.

## PRIMERA LIGA

Barcelona continue their canter towards a 16th Spanish title with a game on Sunday at Villareal, who almost managed to eject Louis Van Gaal as Barcelona coach when they shocked the league leaders 3-1 at the Nou Camp last December.

Since then, Barcelona have ironed out most of their defensive frailties, taking 47 points from 18 games to bulldoze their way to the top.

That form has persuaded the fans to put away their white handkerchiefs which were bidding an angry if premature farewell to their Dutch coach five months ago.

With a nine-point lead and just six games to go, the Catalan giants have one hand on the championship trophy and looked almost invincible in beating Deportivo La Coruna last week.

Celta Vigo and Real Mallorca, joint second, hope to keep in the hunt for Champions' League berths at the expense of Real Madrid, who set the weekend programme rolling with a match on Saturday at midtable Real Sociedad.

Vigo travel to 11th-placed Espanyol while Mallorca, who

face Lazio in the Cup Winners Cup final later this month, host Zaragoza, fading in the race for Europe.

## BUNDESLIGA

Denied by a late Bayer Leverkusen goal on Wednesday evening, Bayern Munich finally seal their 15th Bundesliga title this weekend with a win over Hertha Berlin -- and they're already busy getting the beer in.

"I had a word with the boss of Erdinger Weissbier and told him to send round a whole tanker load of beer. I've got a feeling we may be drink glass or two," Bayern's Mario Basler quipped.

Regardless of what second-placed Leverkusen do Saturday at home to Bochum if Bayern beat Hertha they will have an unassailable lead in the championship.

The champagne corks almost popped prematurely Wednesday evening when Nuremberg took the lead against Leverkusen. But Brazilian Emerson equalise the 85th minute and Bayern's title dreams were postponed a few days.

"If Bayern are honest they are probably thankful we drew," Leverkusen trainer Christoph Daum said. "It will be much nicer for them to celebrate title win with their home fans in Munich's Olympic stadium."

Even if they do win, the trophy won't be physically handed over to Bayern until their final home game against Bochum on May 22nd.

## FRANCE

In France, there is no league programme this weekend. Instead, Metz and Lens will battle it out in the league cup final at Stade de France.

This time last season the two were neck-and-neck in the league title although Lens had crept into pole position with a crucial win at Metz.

In the event, Lens took the championship, their first ever, on goal difference.

## Janata Bank clinch office soccer title

Janata Bank lifted the title of the first-ever Office Football League beating Neer Limited by 2-1 in the final yesterday, reports APB.

The winners led the first half one-nil at the Mirpur Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium. Janata Bank took a first half lead through Parvez in the 41st minute and Hanif doubled the margin in the 56th minute. Amin pulled one back for Neer scoring two minutes before the final whistle.

ASM Shahjahan, Secretary for Youth and Sports, witnessed the final match and distributed trophies.

## Legends' cup

## World XI beat India vets

KATHMANDU, May 7: The World XI beat India Veterans by 20 runs here Thursday on the opening day of the Tempo World Legends Cup 1999, reports AFP.

Despite some lusty hitting late into the innings by Roger Binny, the veterans were unable to stem the steady loss of wickets which saw them bundled out for 188 in 44.1.

Binny remained not out on 23 which included three sixes. The World XI's West Indies veteran Deryck Murray, who scored 39 was declared man-of-the-match.

Officials here hope the Legends Cup will firmly establish Nepal in the international cricket map.

The Indian team was made up of its 1993 World Cup team including Kapil Dev who did not play Thursday.

On Friday the World XI will take on the Pakistan Veterans, who include Abdul Qadir, Majid Khan, Mudassar Nazar and Mohsin Khan.

Pakistan and India are pitted against one another on Saturday with the final on Sunday. Cricketers from both teams praised the ground, the pitch, saying it would only get better with time.

"Kathmandu has all the promises to turn into a good international venue," former Indian fast bowler, Chetan Sharma said.

"The ground would become better after some more time," Indian captain Sandip Patil said.

Mark Greatbatch, captain of the World XI said, "The venue presented a competitive and pleasant atmosphere for the players."

"Since the wicket is new, it will settle in sometime and will be one of the good ones for cricket in the future," Greatbatch added.

## Real interested in Ronaldo

MADRID, May 7: Real Madrid are bidding for the services of Inter Milan's Brazilian striker Ronaldo for next season, Lorenzo Sanz, president of the Spanish giants said here on Friday, reports AFP.

Sanz told the Spanish radio sports show COPE that having the 22-year-old Brazilian in the team would be a dream come true for Real, currently fourth in the Spanish league.

Ronaldo has threatened to quit Italy after his car came under attack by angry fans last month. His recurring tendon trouble and a complete collapse in morale, has left the team ninth in the Serie A and the fans furious at the seemingly unstoppable run of defeats.

"Ronaldo is one of our old aspirations," said Sanz. "In addition, he is not very happy at Inter. His situation is not good and he thinks that it's not worth the effort to continue there."

## Grosjean, Hewitt reach semis

DELRAY BEACH, Florida, May 7: Sebastian Grosjean and Lleyton Hewitt, two players who have climbed up the ATP rankings over the last year, both advanced to the semifinals of the Citrix Tennis Championships here Thursday, reports AFP.

France's Grosjean, the second seed, defeated former US collegiate champion Cecil Mamiit 6-2, 6-1 in the quarter-finals.

Hewitt, the sixth seed, defeated Armenian Sargis Sargisjan 6-3, 6-1.

Third seed Scott Draper of Australia advanced to his second ATP Tour semi-final of the year by rallying past fifth seed Magnus Larsson of Sweden, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3. Draper opened the season by reaching the semi-finals in his homeland tournament in Adelaide.

Also, 18-year-old Belgian Xavier Malisse reached his second career ATP Tour semi-final by defeating Argentina's Hernan Gumy, 7-5, 6-4, in a match of unseeded players.

Last year, Malisse advanced to his first ATP Tour final at the Mexican Open.

Grosjean, 20, was appearing in his second straight quarter-final at this event and advanced to his fourth ATP Tour semi-final in his last six tournaments. He upset then-No. 1 Carlos Moya en route to the final of the Lipton Championships in March and reached the final of last week's tournament in Atlanta.

After starting the year ranked No. 89, Grosjean currently is at a career-best 33rd in the ATP rankings. He already has surpassed his total of match wins from last season with 19 and has gone 18-5 since a 1-3 start through February.

Hewitt was playing in his fourth quarter-final of the year. He opened the year by reaching the final in Adelaide, a tournament he won last year ranked No. 550 in the world.

# World Cup business

CALCUTTA, May 7 (Reuters): If an Indian wants the chance to visit England for the cricket World Cup, all he has to do is buy some biscuits, sip a soft drink or answer trivial questions in a competition.

Indian firms have targeted fans to boost sales on the sub-continent, bombarding consumers with discounts, incentives and contests offering winners the opportunity of a dream ticket to see the World Cup starting on May 14.

The love for cricket cuts across product segments: music systems, televisions, cigarettes, beer, fabrics, pens, soft drinks, biscuits, paints and motorcycles.

"Everyone wants to get on to the cricket bandwagon. You have to build an association with cricket. No other game has such a fan following," said Sandip Rakshit, who heads the Calcutta branch of Trikaya Grey Advertising India Ltd.

World Cup-related campaigns have livened up advertising in the hot summer months, normally a dull period for consumer goods.

Barring products such as ceiling fans and soft drinks which thrive in summer, Indian firms normally step up their campaigns on the eve of the festival season from October to December.

This time it is different. Koushik Roy, head of corporate brand strategy at Philips India Ltd., said: "Consumer electronics firm could spend up to 35 per cent of their advertisement budgets in the April-June quarter instead of 15-20 per cent in other years."

Roy expected television makers to spend up to 800 million Indian rupees (18.7 million dollars) on cricket-related campaigns and account for about 80 per cent of the total expenditure on World Cup advertising in India.

Leading the World Cup campaigners are consumer electronics firms aiming for a spectacular jump in sales, especially from television buyers eager to watch cricket on the latest models.

At least 80 per cent of the expenditure is going to be for television sets," said a spokesman for Hindustan Thompson Associates.

"Most certainly, every consumer electronics firm is looking at the World Cup as a great opportunity," Roy of Philips India said. "Performance of the television set is very critical. Every viewer is an umpire in his own right."

The television market in India, estimated to be about 3.6 million sets a year with an average cost of about 12,000 Indian rupees each, could grow significantly in 1999. The companies expect the World Cup to generate 30-40 per cent this year's sales.

Others expect more from the Cup.

"We expect a 70 per cent increase in sales of television sets in the second quarter over the same period last year," said an official at Samsung India Electronics Ltd., a unit of South Korea's Samsung Electronics.

The firm has booked 70 per cent of the time reserved for consumer electronics products during the live telecasts of Cup matches, and plans to launch 15 new products including washing machines, television sets, air conditioners, refrigerators and microwave ovens.

LG Electronics India Pvt. Ltd., a unit of South Korea's LG Electronics, has flagged an 80-million rupee campaign with three contests to take the winners to Lord's for the World Cup final.

Philips has a direct offer in its 120-million-rupee campaign promising better picture and sound quality with a 24-hour after sales service during the

matches, which start late afternoon local time.

Companies are looking for innovative ways to stand apart in the rush of firms jostling for the consumers' attention.

Biscuit maker Britannia Industries Ltd offering 100 tickets to the Cup, used the timing of its contest to stand out.

"We chose to steal the thunder before the noise level went up... We planned our promo in February, at least a clear month ahead of most companies," the firm's vice-president of marketing and exports Vikram Kaushik said.

Some have simply opted out of the World Cup campaign. General Motors India, which has sponsored a one-day cricket tournament in the past, has decided to lie low.

"There is too much advert clutter in the World Cup," Rajiv Chhaba, vice-president, sales and marketing, said.

Soft drinks maker Coca Cola chose the Asian Test Championship on the subcontinent and the recent triangular one-day tournament in Sharjah for its cricket-related campaigns.

"We have no plans for the World Cup," a company spokesman said, citing the volume of advertising. But its rival, Pepsi, is in aggressive mode.

It has big plans to make a push in the Indian soft drink market of an estimated 250 million 24-bottle crates per year, which translates into a revenue of around 48 billion rupees (1.12 billion dollars).

It has planned a flood of advertisements and is organising contests to select five winners for tickets to the final. Also on offer are 100 television sets and 10,000 watches.

"It is our endeavour to make people's dreams come true. That's really all there is," said Vibha Paul Rishi, marketing vice-president at Pepsi Foods Ltd., a unit of the US-based PepsiCo Inc.
