








Will spring sing for Kiwis?

LONDON, May 16 (Reuters/ Internet): Any team condemned to play regularly in Dunedin have nothing to fear from an English spring.

Based partly on their familiarity with cool, damp weather the New Zealanders, who open their World Cup campaign against Bangladesh at Chelmsford on Monday, are considered a good outside bet at 20-1.

Dunedin, the Scots settlement in the south of the South Island, can be a grim place to play any sport. At one World Cup match in 1992 spectators

lit fires to keep warm. New Zealand have yet to experience weather that cold this May and, in fact, have been lucky with the weather while winning each of their three

warm-up matches. Captain Stephen Fleming agrees that the weather in the South Island comes close to replicating an English spring.
"We are obviously more

suited to playing in these con-

ditions than perhaps the teams

from the sub-continent," he

"Twenty to one is a pretty good bet but we have got a lot of work to do, the other teams are playing very well."

New Zealand, a far more competitive team in the one-day game than the five-day, up matches. McMillan have genuine cause for opti-mism in the weaker of the two

They start with Bangladesh, finish with Scotland, and need to beat one of Australia, West Indies or Pakistan, to grab a second round berth.

"There's no way we just target one game," Fleming said. "A lot of people are talking about the West Indies but you get a green, seaming pitch and you lose the toss and all of a sudden

the opportunity is gone."
New Zealand's one-day successes have usually involved parsimonious bowling from a battery of medium-pacers, keen and reliable fielding, with the batting fireworks coming from the Canterbury quartet of Nathan Astle, Craig McMillan, Fleming himself and Chris

Cairns.

Opener Astle clubs the ball powerfully off the front foot in both one-day and Test cricket but even he has been overshadowed by McMillan in the warm-

McMillan savaged the Sur-rey and Sussex bowling, hitting four huge sixes at The Oval, and with an average of nearly 49 in Tests he is one of the best young batsmen in world cricket.

Cairns, a gloriously clean striker of the ball, may be used as a floater in the order.

He will combine with Dion Nash and either Geoff Allott or Simon Doull plus the miserly slow-medium Gavin Larsen in the attack. They will be assisted by Chris Harris, one of the world's more successful all-round one-day cricketers, who bowls medium-paced leg-cutters

or medium-slow leg spin. Bangladesh, who make their World Cup debut, arrived in England three weeks ago and have spent a lot of time dodging

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LONDON, May 16 (AFP) Former New Zealand Test captain Jeremy Coney had an unhappy start to his World Cup. Arriving at London's Heathrow after a gruelling 20-hour journey to commentate for BBC Radio, he found himself detained for five hours in a windowless room by airport officials.

Coney, who once remembered his guitar but forgot to take his cricket boots on an international tour, had failed to apply for a work permit. Officials scrutinised his documents and debated whether to let him into the country or send him straight back to the other side of the world.

Even his modest revelation that he was a former Test captain and had been awarded the MBE by Queen Elizabeth for his services to cricket failed to impress the airport bureaucrats. Coney's freedom was finally secured when BBC representatives arrived at Heathrow to fill in a 10-page form and vouch for the Kiwi's good character.

KNEE INJURY STILL **HURTS GIBBS**

HOVE, England, May 16 (AFP): South Africa's Herschelle Gibbs could have been a footballer rather than a cricketer if it had not been for a knee injury. The opening batsman, who is also an accomplished rugby union stand-off, had hoped to play for leading English football club Tottenham Hotspur, the team he supported as a soccer-mad young boy. The club even signed him on junior forms before a cruciate liga-ment injury ended his football

"In South Africa, soccer is more prestigious than cricket and at one point I had hopes of playing for my country," says Gibbs. "The injury was very dif-ficult to swallow at the time."
