

## Nat'l Housing Authority to be formed soon

CHITTAGONG, May 22: Minister for Public Works and Housing, Engineer Musharraf Hussain today said that a national housing authority would soon be constituted to facilitate taking up of housing projects all over the country, reports BSS.

The proposal for forming the national housing authority (NHA) would be placed at the cabinet meeting soon, he said.

Speaking as chief guest at the installation ceremony of Bangabandhu Prakashali Parishad, Chittagong branch, at the engineers' institution here, he said that the proposed housing authority would prepare housing projects in different regions of the country for providing housing facilities to the people at minimum cost.

The function was presided over by parishad convenor Engineer Fazlullah. Chittagong City Corporation Mayor ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury was present as special guest.

Vice-president of Engineers Institution Nurul Huda, president of Bangabandhu Prakashali Parishad AKM Ishaque and Chowdhury Anisul Huq also spoke on the occasion.

The minister said that power problem existed during the time of past governments. But the present government, he added, has been making all-out efforts to solve the power supply problem. The system loss of power is being reduced gradually, he added.

## Call for shifting proposed NAM confce centre

## Road mishaps Two die in Laxmipur, Magura

LAXMIPUR, May 22: A bank officer was killed and four other people were critically injured in a road accident at Mirarber in Ramgati thana here, reports UNB.

The dead was identified as Ahidul Haque (50), principal officer of Sonali Bank, Laxmipur Branch.

Witnesses said the accident took place when a jeep of the bank fell into a roadside ditch on way to the office from Ramgati thana after depositing cash in two branches there.

Of the injured, CBA leader Golam Mostafa was sent to Dhaka in a critical condition while three others, identified as jeep driver Mohiuddin Khan-daker, 32, Sirajullah, 36, and Abdul Hossain, 40, were admitted to the Sadar hospital.

Another report from Magura adds: A minor schoolboy was killed in an accident in front of a textile mill in Sadar thana on Magura-Jessore road on May 15.

Police said, Russell, 8, a student of Bhaina Asia Primary School, met the tragic end of his life when a Jessor-bound bus knocked him down on the road. He died on the spot.

In another incident, at least 20 people were injured in a bus accident near Magura graveyard on Magura-Narail road on the same day.

## Experts suggest at BUET workshop

# Interdisciplinary, eclectic research vital to address water sector issues

Engineers, academicians, officials and diplomats at a workshop at BUET (Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology) yesterday opined that long-term interdisciplinary and eclectic research would pave avenues for addressing different water sector issues, reports BSS.

They said different problems including river regulation, embankment protection, coastal erosion and hazards relating to integrated water resources management could be resolved through actions in conformity with the country and culture specific recommendations of the effective research in the field of water resource engineering.

Vice Chancellor of BUET Professor Dr Nooruddin Ahmed inaugurated the discourse titled 'Workshop on University-Agency Cooperation in the field of Water Resources Engineering' at Council Bhaban of BUET yesterday morning.

DGIS of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands sponsored the workshop, jointly organised by Department of Water Resources Engi-

neering (WRE) of BUET and Delft University of Technology (DUT), Netherlands.

Charge d'Affaires of the Royal Netherlands Embassy in Dhaka W W Mostert, Project Director of DUT Prof R Brouwer, Project Director of BUET Prof M F Bari and Head of the Department of Water Resources Engineering of BUET Prof M M Hossain also addressed the inaugural session.

Prof Nooruddin Ahmed said a long-term research plan has been formulated incorporating different problems in the field of water resources engineering (WRE) while facilities are now available in Bangladesh to address applied topics and problems like river regulation, bank protection, coastal erosion, and integrated water resource management.

The VC said R and D (research and development) is must for staying up-to-date with contemporary engineering practices, improving project performance and finding solutions that are effective for a given country under local conditions.

The VC also said that opportunities for higher education in Bangladesh is limited and although the number of universities and institutions of higher education are increasing, especially with recent private initiatives, many new problems have emerged.

Prof Nooruddin Ahmed said that a record increase was observed in the number of students seeking admission in the universities while limited resources, rapidly expanding and changing knowledge base a critical shortage of experienced teachers, rapid obsolescence and deterioration of laboratory equipment, meager library service and the need to generate new knowledge and lack of strategies for development of human resources have made the academic institutions vulnerable.

He noted that linkage between universities of different countries are must and has been found useful in keeping track of changes and innovations in the field of research, teaching and development of the faculty members.

## Nominate right persons in next polls, speakers urge political parties

Speakers at a seminar in the city yesterday suggested the major political parties nominate the right persons in the next parliamentary elections for the betterment of the country, reports UNB.

"Don't nominate the known godfathers of terrorists, smugglers, black money holders and armed cadres of political parties," said the speakers, mostly retired bureaucrats, at the day-long discussion on "Criteria for Nominating Members of Parliament by Political Parties."

Organised by 'Centre For Micro Studies CMS', a forum of retired professionals, it was addressed, among others, by Barrister Abdul Haq, Kafiluddin Mahmud, Barrister Rabia Bhuiyan, LK Siddiqui, Mesbahuddin Khan, KM Rabbani, Prof Muzaffar Ahmed, Shafique Rehman, Dr Muntasir Mamun, Advocate Salma Ali, Dr Faizur Rahman Al Siddique and Dr Binayek Sen.

The participants at the

seminar agreed on a number of criteria for the nominees of parliamentary election. These are: a candidate must retain membership of his party for at least five years, be known as honest by his actions and have clear ideas about his programmes for the people, if elected.

Abdullah Siddiqui read out the keynote paper at the seminar, presided over by AM Mesbahuddin.

Former minister Barrister Abdul Haq blamed the major political parties, including Awami League and BNP, for ignoring the democratic process in nominating candidates for election to Parliament. He said objective of both of the parties is same — one wants to retain power and another to regain it.

Noted economist Prof Muzaffar Ahmed said after the nomination, smooth activities in Parliament depended on the nomination of the right person. Citing example of the speakers,

he said they caused hindrance to work for their partisan attitude.

"After our independence, not a single Speaker was impartial and fair," he said.

Dr Muntasir Mamun called for boycotting some 15 politicians, including Barrister Moudud Ahmed and Kazi Zafar Ahmed, for their "frequent change of party." This will restore credibility and transparency in politics and in the political parties.

Shafique Rehman said: "If we are to boycott the political turncoats, the parties which welcome them are also to be boycotted."

In this context, he mentioned the names of Hasibur Rahman Swapan MP and Dr Alauddin MP who deserted BNP and joined the Awami League government as ministers.

Barrister Rabia Bhuiyan urged all parties, irrespective of their ideological differences, to be more active against repression on women.

## 5 cops suspended in Bagerhat

BAGERHAT, May 22: Five policemen of Sadar Thana were suspended today for negligence of duty, reports UNB.

Two under-trial prisoners escaped from the custody of the policemen when taking them to Rajshahi court for trial.

Those suspended are havildar Bazlur Rahman and constables Babul, Yunus, Anwar and Babul-2.

Officials said prisoners Syed and Nekbar gave the policemen drug and fled leaving behind the custodians senseless in the train when it reached Ishwardi station. They were travelling in Rajshahi-bound 'Kapatakkho' mail train.

## Govt can't be removed thru' force: Zillur

KISHOREGANJ, May 22: LGRD and Cooperatives Minister Zillur Rahman said here today that the Awami League government could not be removed from power through intrigues, movement and hartals, reports BSS.

Speaking as the chief guest at a public meeting at Astagram local ground, Rahman said the opposition BNP was bent upon going to power even through conspiracies sensing that it would not be able to do the same through voting.

The Minister said opposition leader Begum Khaleda Zia had organised the road march along with autocrat Ershad and 'collaborator' Golam Azam since she has become impatient for power. He said the three evil cliques were engaged in a new conspiracy to oust the elected government with a motive to push back the country to the post-1975 situation.

Reiterating the government's firm determination to curb terrorism, Rahman said stern legal actions were being taken against those engaged in extortion, hijacking and sabotage.

The Minister described as false the allegation of the opposition leader regarding political harassment and repression on the opposition leaders and workers.

## Bangladesh envoy presents credentials

The Bangladesh Ambassador to Lebanon presented his credentials to the Lebanese President General Emile Lahoud on May 18, foreign ministry sources said.

Ambassador Tufail K Haider, resident in Tehran, presented the credentials to the Lebanese President at the Presidential palace.

Earlier, Ambassador Haider held separate meetings with Prime Minister and Foreign Minister of Lebanon Dr Salim El-Hoss and El-Hoss and Secretary General of Ministry of Foreign Affairs Dr El-Hassan.

## School teacher shot dead in Satkhira

SATKHIRA, May 22: A school teacher was shot dead by some armed miscreants at Khersha village under Tala Thana on Wednesday night, reports BSS.

The victim was identified as Yamin Ali, 30, of Khersha village under Tala Thana. He was a teacher of Khersha Girls High School.

Police sources said, some armed miscreants raided the home of Yamin Ali in the night entering his room after breaking open the door. They shot at him from close range.

Yamin Ali died on the spot.

## Youth killed in Magura

MAGURA, May 22: A youth was killed and at least 10 people were injured, two critically, in a clash between two rival groups at Dhalahara village in Sadar thana on Friday, reports UNB.

Police and local people said supporters of UP members Khaleq and Awal locked in the clash over establishing suzannagar in the area leaving a dozen people injured.

Of the injured Rakib, Sakawat and Jubar were admitted to Sadar Hospital. Of them, Rakib succumbed to his injuries on the way to Dhaka this morning.

Separate cases were filed with Magura police in this connection. Police arrested 42 people of the both groups.

A temporary police camp has been set up at the village to avert further clashes.

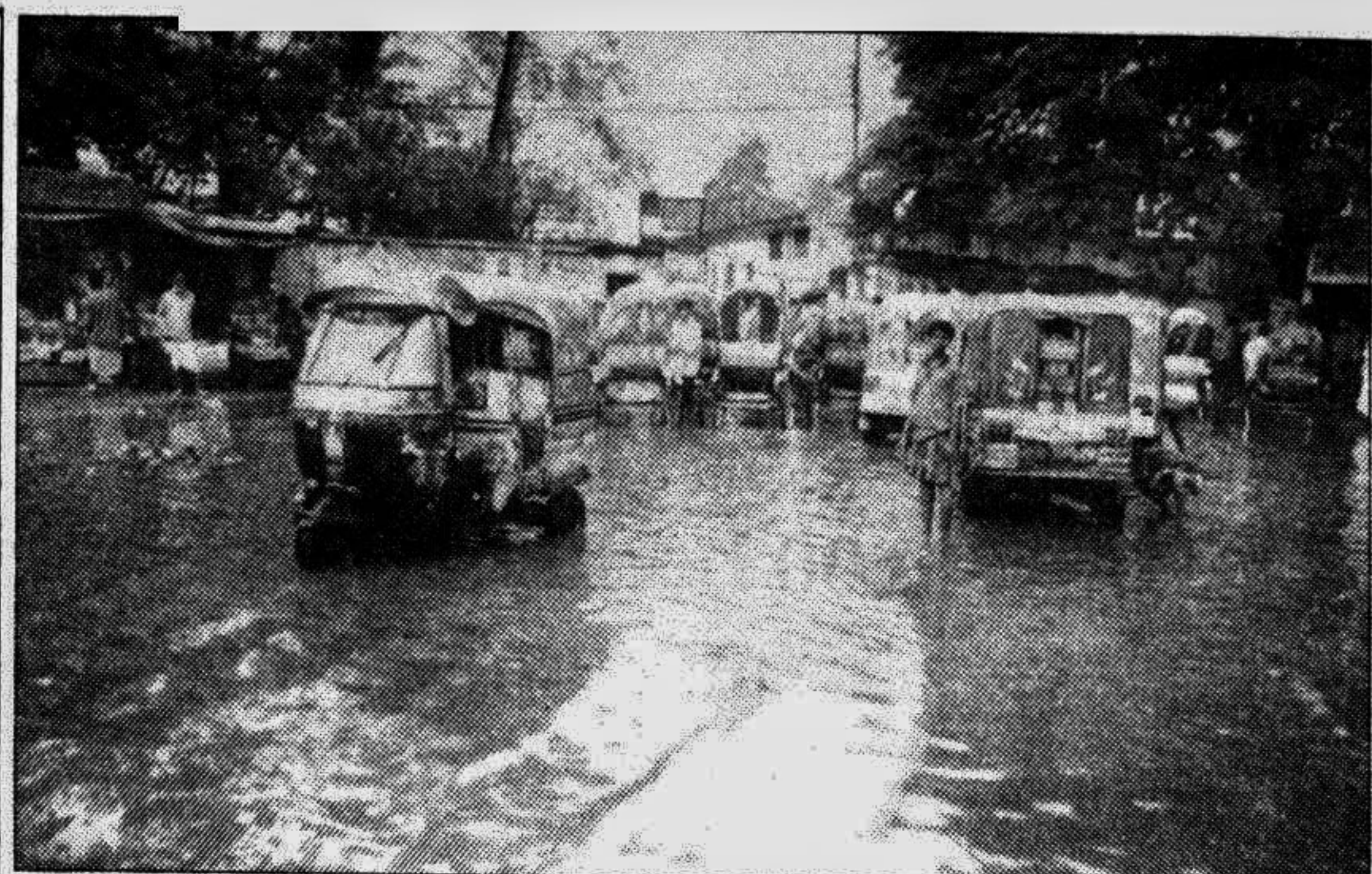
## Training for HR activists ends

## 'Alternative arrangements must before going for eviction of city slums'

Eminent personalities representing different professional groups yesterday urged the government to make alternative arrangements before going for eviction of slums from Dhaka city, reports BSS.

In support of their proposal, they, in a session of exchange of views, said abrupt eviction of 30 lakh slum dwellers from Dhaka city would create a serious socio-political-economic crisis in the country.

On the other hand, they advised the government to devise ways to use this vast manpower in development pursuits through providing them with skills and expertise in different trade and occupation.

The personalities said the government should immediately retrieve 1,100 khas land from the illegal occupation of housing companies and allow private builders to erect multi-storied buildings on a part of it for the slum dwellers who could buy flats on 12 to 15 years' lease basis.

Poet Shamsur Rahman was the chief guest at the session with the Chairman of ADAB Dr

Kazi Faruq Ahmed presiding. Among others, BFUJ president Abul Kalam Azad, journalist Shahriar Kabir, Dr Nazrul Islam of Urban Development Studies Centre, Dr Masoom of Dhaka University, Prof Kazi Faruque Ahmed of Bangladesh College Teachers' Association and A K M Khorshed Alam of Habitat, Bangladesh, took part in the discussion.

Three slum dwellers — Abdul Aziz, Anwara Begum and Fatema — also took part in the discussion and ruled out the involvement of any slum dweller in the terrorist activities but said some of them were being used forcibly by terrorists as tools.

The poor slum dwellers should not be treated as 'escape goats' in the name of terrorists as these anti-social elements are to be found in all spheres of national life.

"I strongly believe the government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will make alternative arrangements for the rehabilitation of slum dwellers before their eviction," he said.

Dr Kazi Faruq Ahmed, in his presidential speech, said the slum dwellers could be used as an effective working force through developing their skills and expertise as part of the government's ongoing poverty alleviation programme.

"In the greater interest of good governance and poverty alleviation, slums should be developed as partners in development activities to help the dwellers contribute to the economy," he said.

The ADAB Chairman said the Government could allow NGOs and private builders to construct low-cost multi-storied buildings for the slum dwellers who could buy flats on easy installments in 12 to 15 years period.

Other speakers strongly advocated for forming committees at ward, union and thana levels involving all social forces against terrorism.

They said slums should not be identified as the only hub of terrorists but other spheres of national life should be brought into serious consideration to identify terrorists.

## 52 held on various charges in Habiganj, Sylhet

Police arrested 52 people on various charges from different areas of Habiganj and Sylhet districts last week, reports UNB.

In Habiganj, Police and Narcotics Control Department in a joint drive arrested seven people and seized a huge quantity of smuggled contraband drugs.

Police said they caught drug traders Rahmat Ali, Ayub Ali and Zahar Ali and seized 21 bottles of phensidyl, 11 bottles of Indian whiskey and 18 litres country-made liquor from Shayestaganj poura area on Wednesday.

Conducting the drive in the same region, they also arrested Alauddin, Mohammad Mizan

and Nazrul along with 70 bottles of phensidyl from their possession on May 17.

Earlier, police also caught a drug trader named Babul along with 29 bottles of Indian smuggled phensidyl syrup from Rajnagar in the town.

Separate cases were filed with the police. Another report from Sylhet adds: BDR jawans in a drive seized Indian wine and Nasiruddin Bidi worth over Tk 2 lakh from frontier Protapbar area in Goainthar thana last week. Sources said the patrol team recovered the contraband while being smuggled into the area from India.

On May 16, acting on a tip-off, BDR jawans raided Moghlabazar in Sadar thana and seized Nasiruddin Bidi worth about Tk 50,000 from a shop in the bazar. Police also nabbed five people along with 2 kg of hemp from Bandar Bazar and rail-gate area on May 14.

The arrested were identified as Hira Mia, Alauddin, Khurshed Mia, Moinuddin and Maznun Rahman.

In a special drive, police also rounded up 39 people from different areas of Sylhet range on various charges on May 16.

Of the arrested, 16 people were wanted in connection with various cases and 23 others arrested on charge of terrorist acts.

## Take part in dev work, Sajeda tells local leaders

NAGARKANDA, Faridpur, May 22: Minister for Forest and Environment Syeda Sajeda Chowdhury today warned against the acts of terrorism and extortion and said terrorists and extortionists would not be tolerated whichever party they belonged to, reports BSS.

Exchanging views with the local Awami League leaders of Jadunandi, Charjashoredi and Fulsuti unions under Nagarkanda thana, Sajeda Chowdhury asked them to actively participate in the development work of their localities.

## Tongi Pourasabha sanctions Tk 3.6 cr for dev projects

GAZIPUR, May 22: Tongi Pourasabha has sanctioned Tk 3,60,89,112 for the implementation of 205 development projects in the current fiscal year, reports BSS.

According to official sources, the projects to be implemented include the construction, carpeting and repairing of roads, brick pavement, earth filling and construction of box-culvert.

Azmatullah Khan, Chairman of Tongi Pourasabha, told the agency yesterday that a total 168 development projects costing Tk 2,75,00,000 would be implemented by pourasabha's own resources and 37 development projects at a cost of about Taka 85,89,122 would be financed by the government.

## Obituary

Industrialist Mafizuddin Talukder of Sirajganj died at BIRDEM Hospital in the city yesterday evening, says a press release.

Also a social worker, Mafizuddin died at the age of 68.
