Tragedy at WWF

KANSAS CITY, Missouri, May 24: A World Wrestling Federation (WWF) wrestler was fatally injured when he fell 50 feet (15 meters) into the ring as he was lowered from the ceiling of the arena — stunning the sold-out crowd that initially thought the accident was a stunt, reports AP.

Owen Hart, 33, hit his head on a turnbuckle. Hart, who wrestled under the nickname "Blue Blazer," was given cardiopulmonary resuscitation in the ring in front of the audience at Kemper Arena Sunday and then taken to a nearby hospital. It wasn't immediately clear how Hart fell, but witnesses said the cable he was connected to either broke or became disconnected. The WWF said it was investigated.

Milan delivered when it mattered

MILAN, May 24 (AFP) AC Milan may be swigging champagne and celebrating the 16th league championship of their history, but Italy's league crown this season has gone to a team that no-one took seriously as title contenders until the end of the campaign.

Consistency has triumphed for Milan, where better quality football and better individual skills have failed to lift either Lazio or Fiorentina to the most hallowed accolade in Italian soccer.

Milan succeeded for their ability to put points on the board, even in the face of some miserable football during the first six months of the season, and for an unstoppable late run of victories.

They were also helped by being spared the public limelight and pressure which was to cause Lazio so much trouble in the final weeks, simply because nobody took AC Milan seriously. Potential champions in Italy are judged on the quality of their football, and Milan's was the worst of the top clubs.

However, that relieved new coach Alberto Zaccaroni of all but the lowest expectations, particularly after two disastrous seasons in which they had failed to qualify for Europe, and gave him the time needed to turn a decade of 4-4-2 football into an attacking 3-4-3.

The sudden changes in tactics and fortunes were mean-

while not the only differences. On Sunday night, Milan were

being hailed by the same volatile fans they'd been living in fear of for two long years. Vice-president Adriano Galliani watched his team beat Bologna 3-0 in their first match last September, but he admitted that the goalless start to the match at San Siro had been an ordeal.

"We were frightened, I can't hide that," he said. "There's feeling of terror that has arisen after two years without success. Now I just hope that the ghosts have been driven away for good."

Though the ghosts did leave San Siro, Zaccaroni had more than a few scares in the following months as his team suffered bouts of collective amnesia during their matches.

Week drumming would spend all attacking, football in the squad, but by the middle Sunday afternoon it was all history.

Zac had taken Udinese to third place in the Serie A the previous season by playing 90 minutes of total football, while AC Milan were used to scoring one goal and then defending the rest.

The two cultures were inevitably set on a collision course and the first clashes were not long in coming. Milan's fourth game of the season was a 2-0 win over Venezia which left Zaccaroni furious.

"That was a step backwards for us," he said. "Everyone can have off days like that one, but I didn't like the way Milan played."

My team just sat on the re-

sult, they scored early and instead of killing the match there and then they just nodded off; they slowed the rhythm down and all the passes started going sideways instead of forwards.

"For me, that's not good enough," he spat. "There's no point having three strikers if after scoring the first goal, you don't then go on and score a second and then a third and so on and so on."

Otherwise, we might as well play with just one man up front."

In January, Milan were 1-0 up and dominating a match here against Juventus before inexplicably beating a second half retreat and allowing the reigning champions to equalise.

Zaccaroni went straight to the changing rooms for another shouting session with the team.

To their credit, Milan kept plugging away at the problem, and were rewarded by many deserved results, along with a few fortuitous ones in injury time — the most recent being a crucial 3-2 win over Sampdoria secured by an own goal five minutes into injury time.

It was a victory which said much about Milan's season, a heady mixture of undoubted skill, sheer determination and a sizeable dollop of luck.

Milan didn't have a goal-

scorer like Fiorentina's Gabriel Batistuta, who hit 18 goals in the first 19 games, and they didn't have a 17-match unbeaten run like Lazio enjoyed from November to March.

But they did have a knack of scoring goals, despite the ups and downs of German striker Oliver Bierhoff, while the revered "Old Guard" of Paolo Maldini and Alessandro Costacurta, who had each won 17 trophies in their career before Sunday, ensured that Milan kept their heads while Lazio's youngsters were losing theirs.

And on Sunday, that consistency paid dividends. On the eve of the match, club president Silvio Berlusconi admitted: "Being top of the table feels all the better because it's so unexpected. It's down to the club, the players and the coaching and medical staff."

"But it's also down to the other teams, who unexpectedly dropped so many points along the way."

MSC defeat F'ganj

Mohammedan SC made an auspicious start in the second round of the Pedrollo 15th Federation Cup football tournament with a 2-1 win over Farashganj SC at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday, reports UNB.

Ivanisevic bids Paris 'bye



PARIS, May 24: Defending champion Carlos Moya survived a tough five-set match at the French Open.

Monday to advance to the second round over Markus Hipfl of Austria, 3-6, 1-6, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4, reports AP.

Goran Ivanisevic wasn't so lucky. The 15th-seeded Croatian became the first seeded player to go down, losing on opening day to Hicham Arazi of Morocco in four sets, 6-4, 1-6, 6-3, 6-1.

A clearly nervous Moya, seeded fourth here, played poorly in the first two sets, having trouble staying within the lines. Early in the fourth, Hipfl, ranked No 92 in the world, began cramping. Moya, despite being down a break in the set, soon gained control.

"I never gave up and I had to fight a lot to win," Moya said, acknowledging he was nervous about defending his title. "The important thing is I won."

Ivanisevic has had bad luck on the red clay of Roland Garros. He lost last year in the first round as well. But he didn't seem too upset after his loss Monday.

"I played the tennis I was supposed to play," Ivanisevic said. "I lost, but there's nothing more to say."

Like Moya, Hingis said she was "always a bit nervous at the start of a Grand Slam."

She could be headed for a second-round meeting with Amelie Mauresmo of France, whom she defeated in the Australian Open final this year after causing controversy with comments about Mauresmo's sexual orientation.

Mauresmo was playing unseeded Tara Snyder of the United States on Monday.

"I am going to watch her (Mauresmo) today to see how she does," Hingis said. "It's definitely going to be a good match. It's going to be like a soccer match, like last time we played."

Mauresmo took her revenge over Hingis at the Gaz de France tournament in Paris in February.

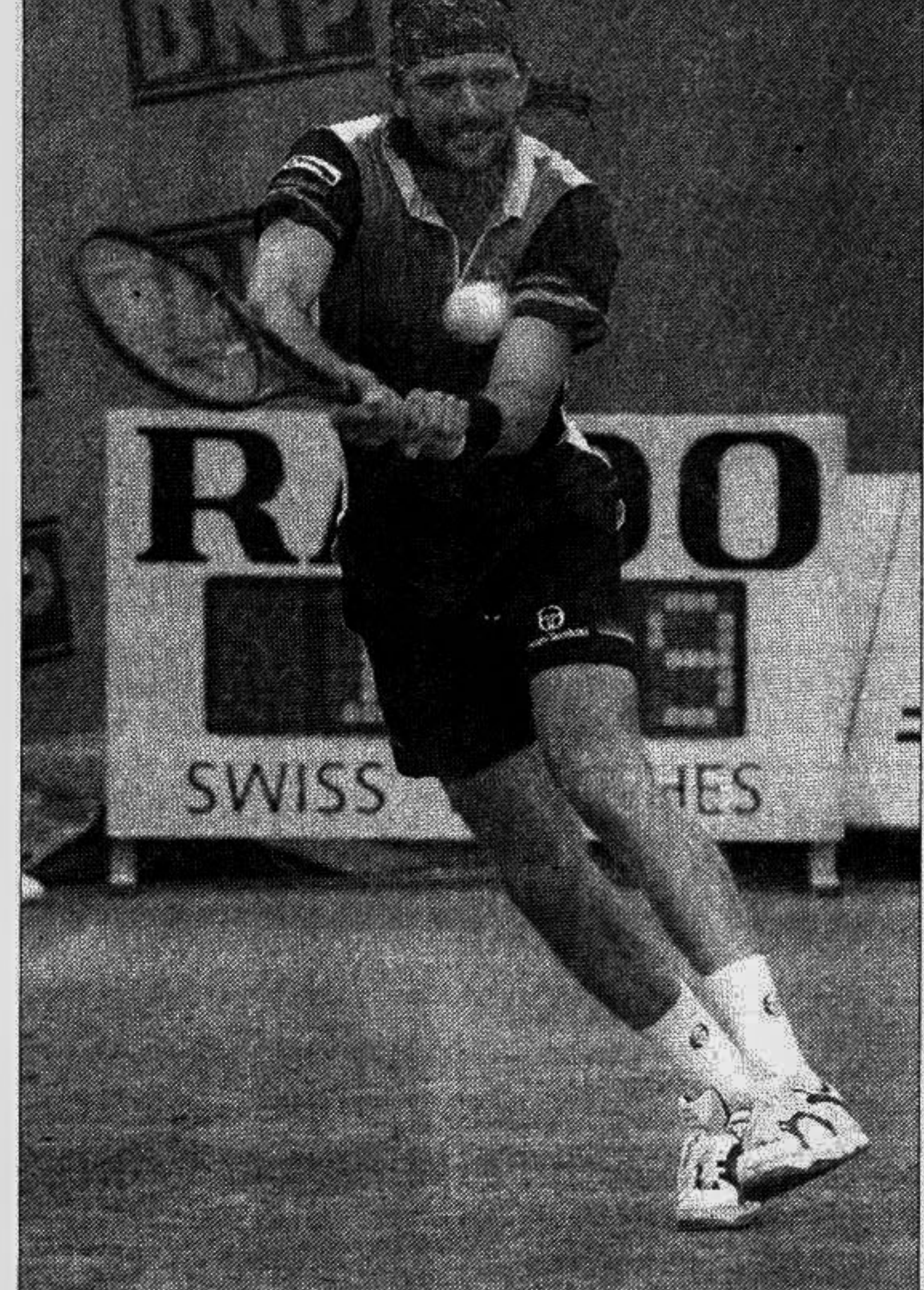

Beyond expectation



LONDON, May 24 (AFP): Striker Dwight Yorke had no doubts his first season with Manchester United had been better than in his wildest dreams.

The 22.6-million-pound (20-million-dollar) player certainly hoped to win trophies when he joined United from Aston Villa in August.

But not the English Premiership and FA Cup double, with the possibility of the treble to come if United beat Bayern Munich in Wednesday's Champions' Cup final in Barcelona.

"It's what I expected but it's more than I expected over a season, if you see what I mean,"

beamed Yorke, his toothpaste-advert grin even wider than usual.

"It's what I expected but not all in one season. To win the double in my first season here with maybe the treble to come is quite something. You just can't imagine what the feeling is like. This is what it is all about."

Despite winning the Premiership and the FA Cup, Yorke wants more and he believes United can go on to complete the hat-trick of trophies and make football history.

"Now that we have two trophies, we feel that we can go on and win a third. We're on a real high," he said.

Yorke hopes to return to the starting line-up against Bayern after he was left on the bench at

Wembley in the 2-0 FA Cup final triumph over Newcastle.

The Trinidad and Tobago international striker was disappointed not to play from the beginning although he did come on for the last half hour when he replaced Andy Cole.

Yorke accepted manager Alex Ferguson's decision to play Ole Gunnar Solskjaer instead of him because at United the team comes first and the individual second.

"The gaffer is the gaffer and at the end of the day he picks the team and you have to respect that. Wednesday is another game and hopefully I might play."
