Plant 100 trees each, PM's call to campaigners

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged those who opposed the felling of trees at Osmany Udyan and formed human chain in protest to plant 100 trees each, reports BSS.

Addressing the conference of the DUJ yesterday she said "It gives me pain when I see that my good motives are sometimes criticised for no reason."

She said there are only 1600 trees at Osmany Udyan, of which only 400 will be cut for construction of the Convention Hall for the NAM summit. She said the premises can not contain 11,000 trees as claimed. She said the environmentalists have opined that the trees in the Osmany Udyan were not environment friendly.

She reiterated her government's decision to plant 1,200 trees in place of the 400 trees. She said during her nearly three years' stay in the Ganobhaban she has planted 400 trees there. "My party leaders and workers also plant trees regularly," she said.

Referring to the selection of site, the prime minister said many areas such as the old drum factory and the area adjacent to the Old Airport were considered for the Convention Hall but later those places were found unsuitable for the purpose. "I myself saw three designs of the proposed hall and approved the one which can be constructed with less felling of trees," she said.

Of this amount, Tk 7,666 crore came from internal resources while project aid was Tk 5774 crore and food-based programme Tk 560 crore. The revised ADP projects were 1,330 in number.

Main feature of the 1999-2000 development budget, to be announced along with the next national budget, is human resource development by means of rapid spread of education.

Education sector got Tk 1960.31 crore from the development budget, which is 14 per cent of the proposed ADP. In overall considerations social sectors have been given priority in the new ADP with rural development, education, health and family welfare, woman and child development, sports and culture, and training skilled manpower identified as thrust sectors.

Special thrust has been given on poverty alleviation through manpower development, agriculture and rural uplift.

Transportation, physical planning, housing infrastructure development and development of labour-intensive sectors will also be given importance, the meeting was told.

The crisis-ridden power sector has also been given importance in the proposed development plan, with a total allocation of Tk 1800 crore or 13 per cent of the total ADP earmarked, including project aid component of Tk 550 crore.

For development of energy, gas, oil and mineral resources Tk 745 crore has been allocated.

tating," she said. "Now the elections will be held on schedule," she said.

Sheikh Hasina also asked the Leader of the Opposition to launch movement with economic and social issues. "I have got a long experience of movements. I started movement as a school girl against the Ayub regime," she said, adding "We also launched movements against General Zia and General Ershad." She said people would not lend their support to any movement unless they have a stake in it.

The Prime Minister said that when the opposition created agitation for electricity and water, people responded. "We were in a bad position over those issues," she admitted. She said her government had been able to generate additional 700 MW in the past three years. She said the country would have 2,200 MW of power by the end of 2002.

She said during the BNP rule gas transmission suffered and many mills did not get gas connection. She said her government had to manage "misdeeds" of the previous government and set everything to order.

Referring to the demands of the journalists, the Prime Minister said the government would try to solve their housing problem. She said that journalists would be able to buy flats on hire-purchase basis. She said plans were also there to give them plots for housing purposes.

Chaired by DUJ acting president Shuva Rahman, the function was also addressed by State Minister for Information Prof Abu Sayeed, BFUJ president Abul Kalam Azad, BFUJ secretary general Akhtar Ahmed Khan and DUJ general secretary Azizul Islam Bhuiyan. Manzurul Ahsan Bulbul conducted the meeting.

CHITTAGONG, May 26: One of the top terrorists in the city and reportedly a Shibir cadre was shot dead by some armed miscreants at Madunaghat under Hathazari thana last night.

The victim Mohibul alias Khuku Moni was at his sister's residence in Madunaghat area during the incident.

A group of miscreants boarding a microbus reached there at around 11-30 pm and entered the house forcibly. They dragged Mohibul out of the house and shot him point blank. He died on the spot.

Police said Mohibul was wanted in a number of criminal cases, including a triple murder case in Bahadderhat CDA Residential Area.

The previous record of 275 was set by Mohammad Azharuddin and Ajay Jadeja for the fourth wicket against Zimbabwe in the 1997-98 season in Cuttack.

Dravid was run out for 145 when Ganguly was not out 159, the highest individual score of the 1999 World Cup.

BCB president Saber Hossain Chowdhury accompanied the team to Durham from Edinburgh on the team coach responding to requests from the players. The team reached Durham yesterday afternoon.

Reuters adds from Chester-le-Street: Bangladesh harboured few illusions today about their World Cup chances against Australia.

"I'm really hoping we win the toss so we'll bat first to stop them making a big score," said Shahul Gordon Greenidge.

"They'll probably give us a huge beating. But the team was in jubilant mood after their first group B win over Scotland when it arrived in this north-eastern town."

"The reaction at home has been fantastic," said team manager Tanvir Mazharul Islam as the Bangladesh team kicked a football around in cloudy conditions at the Riverside Ground.

Islam said Australia, who are in real danger of missing out on the second stage of the tournament, should beware of over-confidence.

"In our first three matches our batting has failed totally and it's about time we reached 230 or 240. We want to take the fight to the Aussies tomorrow and give them a shock," he said.

Of the team that beat Scotland in Edinburgh by 22 runs, Islam said allrounder Naimur Rahman had suffered an ankle injury and might not make the Australia match.

Shahriar Hossain, who scored a career-best 95 against Kenya in February this year, or Nectamur Rashid could step in to replace Rahman.

GSS crisis: Report sent to PMO

There is still no headway in resolving crises of the GSS, one of the largest NGOs of the country, which has been exposed to allegations of various irregularities on the one hand and internal feuds on the other.

The rivalry between the groups, one supporting the NGO's executive director Dr FR Mahmood Hassan and the other opposing him, resulted in several rounds of clashes in the last few weeks. The latest such clash took place Tuesday that left a good number of people belonging to both the sides injured. Besides, the opposing groups filed cases against each other.

Meantime, the NGO Affairs Bureau that investigated into the allegations against the management of the NGO and its controversial executive director has sent a set of recommendations to the Prime Minister's Office.

Inshallah, we will win WC one day, hopes Hasina

"Inshallah, Bangladesh will win the World Cup one day," hoped Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina while expressing her happiness over the first World Cup victory of Bangladesh team against Scotland on Monday last, reports BSS.

"I don't expect that Bangladesh cricket team will clinch the title just now, but hope one day they will win the cricket World Cup," said Hasina while speaking at the Annual General Meeting of DUJ yesterday.

She urged the cricketers to show their best on all fronts of the arena — bowling, batting and fielding.

The appeal by the Prime Minister came a day ahead of Bangladesh's encounter with Australia at Durham today and their last group match against Pakistan at Northampton on May 31.

In its recommendations, the Bureau held Dr Hassan responsible for most of the trouble the organisation has now been exposed to and suggested his removal from the post. The Bureau recommended that an 'interim administrator', acceptable to all concerned, be appointed by the government soon.

The Bureau has also found the present executive committee of the GSS to be an 'ineffective' one and recommended that the committee be dissolved immediately. The interim ED, if appointed, would take steps to resolve the internecine conflicts of the organisation and constitute an effective executive body.

Observing that there have been serious problems with GSS fund management for the last few years, the Bureau suggested that the government conduct a fresh audit of the entire funds the organisation has received since its inception. It said that the ADAB (Association of the Developing Agencies in Bangladesh) should finance the audit.

The GSS workers who have been accusing Dr Hassan of various malpractices are waiting for the PMO's response to the NGO Bureau recommendations.

But they said they were worried because "the other group" was busy lobbying with the PMO.

voted man of the 1996 tournament, was run out with five on the board.

Soon it was 79 for four and the game was over. Aravinda de Silva made 56 and Ranatunga 42 as the crowd began celebrating victory with 20 overs still to bat out.

SKOP strike passes off peacefully

The 24-hour general strike across the country called by Sramik Karmachari Oikya Parishad (SKOP) yesterday passed off peacefully.

No long-distance transports left the city's Sayedabad and Gabtali bus terminal till 9:30 p.m. last night. However, some district buses bound for nearby districts left the capital during the strike that began at 6:00 a.m.

SKOP, a conglomerate of 16 federations of workers and employees unions, called the strike to press implementation of its 12-point agreement with the government.

There was no production at Adamjee Jute Mills and Latif Bawani Jute Mills due to the strike. Some industries in Harjibagh and Demra industrial areas also remained closed.

Leaders and activists of SKOP in the morning brought out a procession in the city demanding immediate implementation of the agreement between SKOP and the government reached on January 20, 1998.

The SKOP demands include enactment of a law paving way for constitution of a 'National Minimum Wage Commission' within six months of signing of the agreement.

Once formed, the commission is supposed to fix a 'national minimum wage' for the workers. But nothing has been done as yet.

SKOP leaders at a brief rally at Shapla Chattar criticised the government for its dilly-dally in implementing the agreement.

The SKOP leaders threatened the government that they would go for a tougher action programmes.

The rally was also addressed among other by Abdullah Sarker, Abdul Kader, Abdul Wahed and Khalur Rahman.

Even in the name of creative programme BTV used to buy some sub-standard programmes from their near and dear ones, despite the fact that about 400 programmes of skilled and professional package producers had been waiting in the pipeline for review," said another package programme producer who also preferred not to be identified.

When the package programmes aimed at improving the quality of television programmes and promoting alternative TV programmes, a section of unscrupulous BTV officials aired some of "trash" dubbed programmes for "promotion of the state language", he said.

When contacted one programme producer of the BTV said, "It was not possible to hold the meeting of the appeal committee due to unavailability of the committee members and indisposition of the chairman."
