**BRAVE PUNTER**  
DARWIN, Australia, May 26 (AFP): Australia's slim chance of winning the World Cup has not stopped one punter risking 10,000 dollars (6,600 US) on Steve Waugh's team.  
A spokesman for Darwin Allsports said today his staff were amazed at the bet, which was made after Australia's odds blew out to 10 to one following their loss to Pakistan earlier this week.

"He stands to win 100,000 dollars from us, but boy we reckon it's a pretty brave bet," spokesman Andrew Penders said.  
After the bet was placed Australia's odds shortened to 8-1 while South Africa were still favourites at 13-10, ahead of Pakistan at 23-10.

**MARSHAL STABLE**  
BIRMINGHAM, England, May 26: West Indies coach Malcolm Marshall is in stable condition after a major abdominal surgery here, the West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) said today, reports AFP.  
WICB chiefs said that the former fast bowling ace was expected to stay in hospital for at least 10 days.  
Marshall is "recovering from his operation and is in a stable condition," the WICB said.  
Manager Clive Lloyd will continue as coach of the West Indian World Cup squad in Marshall's absence.

## Security call, yet

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is unlikely to introduce emergency legislation to combat pitch invasions.  
A Home Office spokesman said: "Given the existing legislative programme, it does not appear feasible. There is not enough time in the legislative programme."  
Australia's captain Steve Waugh has led the calls for tough action to be taken and India captain Mohammad Azharuddin has warned someone could get killed.  
World Cup organisers are holding a meeting on Thursday with police and cricket ground safety officers at the Edgbaston ground where England meet India in a first round match on Saturday. Home Office officials will not attend the meeting.  
The British Home Office is responsible for public order. In relative terms the incidents are not a major threat to public order like the numerous incidents of hooliganism which tarnished English soccer's reputation for much of the 1970s and 1980s.  
Organisers stressed on Wednesday that they had been working on plans for security for two years and said "investigations were still open" with the Home Office about legislation.

World Cup events manager Michael Brown said earlier this week: "We are taking this very seriously. It is not enough for the players to be safe; they have to feel safe as well. Clearly they don't feel safe at the moment."  
Birmingham has been chosen as the venue because of its location in central England, not because it is hosting the England-India game. Safety officers from all the leading World Cup grounds will be attending.  
But there is likely to be an intense atmosphere at Saturday's match as Birmingham has a high population of cricket fans of Indian descent. Organisers are not concerned about the behaviour of fans during games which has largely been good.

## Bookies held

CALCUTTA, India, May 26 (Reuters/Internet): Indian police have arrested 11 people over their alleged involvement in betting on World Cup matches, officials said on Wednesday.

Eight people were arrested in Barrackpore, 30 kms from the eastern city of Calcutta, while allegedly settling claims for bets during the group B match between New Zealand and West Indies, police said.

Police seized 14 mobile phones, two laptop computers, cash cards, television sets and 16,000 rupees (\$375) from them.  
"The bookies were earning millions of rupees from bets placed in every match in the World Cup," a police official said.

The official said that they were alerted by local people who spotted a group of strangers with mobile telephones on Tuesday.

"Mobile phones are very unusual for this area," district magistrate Arun Mishra said.  
In New Delhi police arrested three people on Tuesday for alleged betting on cricket matches and seized nine mobile phones and 15,000 rupees of stake money, news agency Press Trust of India reported.

Betting is illegal in India, except on horse racing. Many Indians bet regularly, often in large amounts placed on trust.

Most of the business is conducted via telephone and bets are accepted only from people introduced by reliable friends.  
A police officer in Barrackpore said they were investigating the links of local bookies with other bookies in Bombay, Delhi, Madras and Bangalore and possible links with bigger operators abroad.

## Calculation curse

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West Indies will be endeavouring to do the same against Scotland, although captain Brian Lara was trying to look at the Australia game more positively.  
"We know that if we win our last two games we will go through and we are concentrating on doing that," he said.  
New Zealand, despite their heavy defeat by Lara's side on Monday, have a good run rate and look assured of progress if they can avoid a disaster against Pakistan. A narrow defeat and then a straightforward win over Scotland in their final game will probably be enough regardless of what happens at Old Trafford.

England's victory over Zimbabwe on Tuesday made them favourites to join South Africa in the second round — although it is not yet certain.  
Zimbabwe, India and Sri Lanka could be battling it out for third spot and one of them could advance with just four points.

However, if Zimbabwe were to pull off a surprise victory over their southern African neighbours in their final game they would still not be assured of a place even with six points.  
That situation would need India to beat Sri Lanka and England — or Sri Lanka to beat India and Kenya.  
Then the top four would all have six points and would be split by run rate.  
If, in the unlikely event of any teams having an identical run rate (to two decimal places) then the decision would be made on the basis of wickets taken per ball bowled.  
Finally, six teams will go through to the second round of course carrying with them only the points won against fellow-qualifiers.  
And then we will have to go through the whole thing again to decide the four semi-finalists.

## Lara will be watching Yorke

LONDON, May 26: West Indies cricket captain Brian Lara is plumping for his close friend Dwight Yorke to earn Manchester United the European Cup trophy in Barcelona tonight, reports AFP.  
Lara will take time off from his side's World Cup campaign to watch Yorke and co bid to lift the trophy for the first time in 31 years against Bayern Munich at the Nou Camp stadium.

Lara had originally hoped to fly out to the Catalan capital to watch the United striker whom he grew up with on the beaches back in Trinidad.

With the Windies having a vital match against Scotland on Thursday, that is not feasible and Lara will, like millions of others, settle for watching the match on television.

But he is confident that 29-goal Yorke will produce the goods — and then Lara would dearly love to complete a Caribbean double by leading the West Indies to success in cricket's premier one-day competition.

Lara said: "I won't be able to really relax when watching the game because we have a big match the next day against Scotland."

"But I am looking forward to a Manchester United win — and after Dwight scores the winning goal we've got to go out and beat the Scots."

"I really hope that Dwight plays well — and in him United have one of the best footballers in the world plus another in David Beckham."

"I think Dwight can play a huge part and, having seen United play, they are capable of taking on the best and beating them."

"My money will be on them today. I shall be speaking to Dwight again before the final but he knows I will be there in spirit."

## Atherton vows to return

LONDON, May 26: Former England captain Mike Atherton, forced to withdraw from the World Cup when his long-term back injury flared up, hopes to be back playing again within two weeks, reports AFP.  
The opener's deteriorating back condition had led to speculation that the career of England's most successful batsman in the 1990s may be over prematurely.

But far from contemplating retirement, the Lancashire batsman is aiming to book his place on England's winter tour of South Africa.

"I'm having regular physiotherapy, running on a treadmill and exercising to strengthen the muscles around my back. I'm totally pain-free for the first time in ages," he said.

"I'll start with a Lancashire second XI game. I aim to score enough runs in the second half of the season to be selected for the tour of South Africa."

"A lot of people have written me off but I aim to prove them wrong."

## Draws for Euro competitions

BARCELONA, May 26: The draws for next season's European Cup competitions will take place in Geneva in June and July, UEFA said Wednesday, reports AFP.  
The draw for the first and second qualifying rounds of both the Champions League and the UEFA Cup will be on June 30, while the draw for the third qualifying phase of the Champions League will be on July 23, UEFA spokesman Frits Alstroem said.

The draws were one of the issues on the agenda at the two-day UEFA executive committee in Barcelona, held to coincide with Wednesday's Champions League final between Manchester United and Bayern Munich.

Alstroem said the committee had also discussed the three berths for the UEFA Cup to be awarded to countries topping the "fair play" table.

He said Scotland, which tops the list, would almost certainly be awarded one more place and there would be a draw in the coming weeks for the other two places among eight nations: England, Norway, Ukraine, Finland, Estonia, Denmark, Sweden and Germany.

Alstroem said the UEFA committee had also discussed the future structure of the body as the game as the competitions get bigger and more money is involved. He said officials also reviewed relations with the European Union and the issue of restrictions on numbers of foreign players in domestic leagues.

There were no reports of any new policy developments on those issues.

In a statement, UEFA said it also dealt with the World Club Championship and the Confederations Cup. Confirming its willingness to cooperate, UEFA said it would invite one club — the winner of Wednesday's final — to take part in the club championship in January 2000 but reiterated that "there was no permanent commitment to entering teams for the competition."

The statement added that Germany would represent Europe in the July 28-Aug 8 Confederations Cup in Mexico but that a European side will only enter the competition once every four years.

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land match, Greenidge was seen drinking at the Peking hotel opposite with friends. He had claimed to journalists later that he had "walked out" of the selection meeting.

At Edinburgh, as elsewhere, Greenidge watched the match just as another spectator. Against Scotland, he was aloof and detached, and did not bother going to the dressing room. He was not advising players, or encouraging them with a pat; not even admonishing them for their lapses. To rub it in, Greenidge did not join the team celebrations after beating Scotland.

It is unfortunate, but his reticence at a crucial juncture of our cricket tells on the lack of his professional responsibility. For the handsome amount he is paid Greenidge's conduct is tantamount to betrayal.

The players have always had a language problem with the West Indian. Several Bangladesh players, as would be obvious, found communicating in Greenidge's English difficult. He made it compulsory for players to speak in English at team meetings. This could hardly be expected to work as players and officials are used to communicating normally in Bangla when talking among themselves.

Only at Edinburgh did the board president Sabir Hossain Chowdhury put his foot down and told the players they could speak in Bangla. Everyone agreed the meeting that followed was a great success with large-scale participation of the players. By contrast, previous meetings were a one-way tirade.

Why players were not allowed to speak in Bangla and an interpreter not used for

Greenidge is something that the board may need to address in the near future.

But, Greenidge must have something against Bangla because on this tour he has banned Bangla songs on the bus when the team is travelling. "You are now in English songs," was his way of elevating team spirit.

Greenidge once stopped the team's bus in London at his daughter's house. As the team sat in the bus for half-an-hour, manager Tanveer Muzhar Islam asked the driver to change the English music and put on something Bangla. The driver said he had no orders from Greenidge. On Tanveer's insistence, Bangla music was put on. But, on his return, Greenidge switched the music to English.

In the beginning of the tour in April, after a practice session, he asked the players to join him to see a movie. The players were hungry and wanted to go for dinner. The team management asked the coach to leave the driver after he had been dropped at the cinema hall, but the West Indian said, "The driver will also see the movie." The team spent 100 pounds on taxi fare to go and have dinner, while Greenidge had the bus in the cinema.

Once he refused to go to join the team at a London reception and sat out the whole programme in the team's bus. It was unusual because Greenidge had joined two previous such receptions and also another hosted by a Bangladeshi at Edinburgh.

Such insulting behaviour can hurt the morale of any player. And, above all, a good coach should know that, said a member of the team management.
