Afforestation programme

GAIBANDHA, May 29: An extensive afforestation programme has been undertaken in 38 thanas of the northern region during this fiscal year.

A total of 533 kilometre roadside places will be brought under this programme. Of the total areas, 102 kilometre roads in Gaibandha, 152 kilometre in Rangpur, 116 kilometre in Kurigram, 192 kilometre in Nilphamari and 70 kilometre in Lalmonirhat district will be brought under this programme. The programme will be conducted by Local Government Engineering Department (LGED). The programme will continue for the next five years. The aim of the programme is to increase forest areas in the northern region.

Couple roasted alive

BRAHMANBARIA, May 29: Both husband and wife were roasted alive and their two children received burn injuries in a devastating fire at village Nishindipur of Mozlishpur union in Brahmanbaria sadar thana recently.

According to eyewitnesses the fire originated from a lamp which engulfed the house. As a result, Abul Hashim, his wife Kurshida Akter and their son Md Lukman, 16, daughter Julekha Begum, 8, sustained burn injuries. In a critical condition all of them were admitted to Brahmanbaria Modern Hospital where the couple succumbed to their injuries, while their ill-fated son and daughter were undergoing treatment.

Divorce rate up

JAMALPUR, May 29: The number of divorces in seven thanas of the district is increasing day by day.

More than 2,000 marriages were terminated during the last six months in the district. According to sources, primary causes of divorce have been attributed to dowry, polygamy and immoral activities. Poor women are the worst victims. Due to non-registration of marriages they do not get the legal protection. Marriage registrars in the remote areas demand higher fees which the poor parents and guardians can not afford. Besides, despite legal restrictions, many men marry several times in villages without obtaining the written permission from the first wife.

7,000 affected by iodine deficiency

NETRAKONA, May 29: About 7,000 people in 10 thanas of the district have been affected by iodine deficiency.

Particularly the children and women have been affected by Iodine Deficiency Disorders (IDD) causing physical and mental problem including reducing of IQ, doctors said. Iodine deficiency causes goitre, physical and mental retardation to the children, deafness and dumbness and retardation of normal development of brain and nervous system. The deficiency of iodine may also cause abortion to pregnant mothers.

Showcase notice on hat leasee

PANCHAGARH, May 29: The Mareya hat of Boda thana has been given on lease following regular and normal procedure but the cheque of Tk 2 lakh has been dishonoured by the local branch of Sonali Bank, reports UNB.

TNO of Boda thana and chairman of the thana hat development committee issued a showcase notice on the leasee Nur Islam but has not yet cancelled the lease. The matter raised suspicion in the public mind in the thana. Some members of local elite have sent a petition to the Divisional Commissioner calling for investigating the suspected corruption.

Mother, children vaccinated

PIROJPOUR, May 29: A total of 1,36,879 mother and children of the district have been vaccinated and inoculated under the Extended Programme of Immunisation last year, health officials said here, reports UNB.

Of them, 21,137 were immunised in sadar, 27,059 in Mothbaria, 29,699 in Nessorabad, 21,750 in Nazirpur, 19,555 in Bhandaria and 10,928 in Kaulkhali thanas besides, 6,251 mothers and children in the Pirojpur municipality. The immunisation comprised of BCG, DPT, measles, polio, and tetanus for pregnant mother.

VGP allocated rice seized

BAGERHAT, May 29: Police seized some 1 metric ton of rice and wheat allocated for distribution under VGP programme from the houses of a UP chairman and his neighbour at Deura village in sadar thana Tuesday night, reports UNB.

Acting on a tip-off, police raided the houses of Atahar Ali, chairman of Dema union, and Yunus, and recovered the foodgrains. None was arrested. The police action came when local people lodged complaint against the chairman as he was making unusual delay in distributing the grains.

Bridge construction begins soon

ISWARDI, May 29: Construction of the long awaited Bhairab Bridge and Pakshay Bridge will begin in August and October respectively, reports APB.

The proposed 1,800 meter Pakshay Bridge over the Padma will be constructed some 300 meters off the Hardinge Bridges, official source said. The Bhairab bridge will be constructed on the Bhairab river near Khulna city. The total cost of these projects have been estimated at Tk 3,268 crore. The projects will bring about a revolutionary change in the country's communication system, establishing direct road link between northern and south western district and between Dhaka and Mongla port.

Scheme to develop primary schools

CHAPAINAWABGANJ, May 29: The Primary Education Development project under LGED has taken up a scheme for the development of two primary schools in Chapainawabganj district in the current fiscal year, reports BSS.

The scheme includes one new building of Nasirabad Primary School and a new building of Sanpur Primary School. The estimated cost for the scheme is Taka 12 lakh 82 thousand. The implementation of the scheme is progressing satisfactorily and 95 per cent of the work has already been completed. The rest work is expected to be completed by July next.

Housewife beaten to death by husband

RANGPUR, May 29: A young housewife was beaten to death by her husband for dowry at Dhaperhat in Kotwali thana on Tuesday, reports UNB.

Family sources said the husband, Abdul Jalil used to torture his wife Goleja Begum, 20, for dowry money. On the fateful day, he beat his wife mercilessly and at one stage pushed poison into her mouth to cover up the crime. Later on she succumbed to her injuries at Rangpur Medical College Hospital (RMCH). Police sent the body for autopsy. Goleja's father Osman Gani told newsmen that police refrained from taking any action against Abdul Jalil.

Seven-year RI for smuggler

KURIGRAM, May 29: A Special Tribunal Court here convicted a man and sentenced him to seven years' rigorous imprisonment (RI) for smuggling non-iodised salt, reports UNB.

The convict, Mohammad Bakul, of Bazra Union in Ulupur thana, was also fined Taka 5,000, in default, to suffer one year more RI. According to the prosecution, a team of Anti-Smuggling Task Force, on information, raided the godown of Bakul on January 29, 1998 and arrested him with, 3,040 kg non-iodised salt smuggled in from India. Later on a case was lodged with the police in this regard. After examining the records and witnesses, Judge of the court-4, Kazi A M Joyal Abedin awarded the punishment.

PM's assurance yet to be fulfilled

More cyclone shelters needed in offshore islands of Bhola dist

BARISAL, May 29: More multi-purpose cyclone shelters need to be constructed immediately to protect several lakhs of helpless people of different shoals and offshore islands of Bhola district.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina assured to construct more multi-purpose cyclone shelters in the shoals and offshore islands during her visit here on May 30 in 1997.

But the assurance is yet to be fulfilled.

According to official sources, there are 143 cyclone shelters in seven thana areas of Bhola sadar, Daulatkhan, Charfasion, Lalmoahan, Borhanuddin, Tajuddin and

Monpura of Bhola district where the population is now not less than 18 lakhs.

It is assessed that not more than 1.50 lakh people can take shelter in 143 cyclone shelters in time of cyclonic storm and other natural disaster.

Most of the cyclone shelters were constructed after the country's biggest natural disaster in 1970 when several thousands of people were killed.

As a result, due to lack of proper repair and maintenance work the cyclone shelters have turned into dilapidated concrete structures.

Most of the centres' doors, windupans and other structures have already been either

broken down or stolen away, but those were not replaced as yet.

Most of these multi-purpose cyclone shelters, though dilapidated are situated near the villages. These are being used as schools for the rural boys and girls of primary stage.

Monpura being the far off offshore island thana of the district is the worst sufferer in every respect. Even in time of cyclonic storm or tidal surge, records reveal, Monpura becomes most unsafe than anywhere in the district. Over five lakh helpless, poor residents of this offshore island thus become easy prey of natural calamities. There are only 24

cyclone shelters in the island which are protected only by 6 feet high embankment.

This embankment seems very unsafe when the tidal surge rises to 8 to 10 feet height during natural calamities.

More cyclone shelters and 'killas' are also needed in other shoal lands and offshore islands of the district like Dhalchar, Char Nijam, Charpatila, Char Ukrimukri, Char Satyen, Char Jamshed, Ptarchar, Char Zahiruddin, Char Chamiruddin, Char Hosain, Bhelumar Char, Bhe-duria, Kandarpapur, Rajapur, Natun Char, Kakrarchar and others.

Pond burning for 3 months!

RAJSHAHI, May 29: A pond in 'Sabai beel' in Mohanpur thana has been burning for about three months.

The situation has created panic among the local people.

According to villagers, one morning they saw a portion of the bank of an almost dried up pond in the middle of the 'beel' was burning. At first they thought that some one might have ignited fire in the dried up grass and straw which would automatically extinguish.

But in contrary to their idea, the fire started spreading the surrounding areas. The fire turned into a big flame.

Local people tried to extinguish the fire by throwing water with a diesel engine operated shallow tubewell, but failed.

In the meantime, the ground at the burning point had gone down by about five feet.

It has been apprehended that the fire might have been originated from the reaction of mineral resources like gas and oil. Local people feared that the fire might create havoc any time. They have urged the concerned authorities to investigate into the matter.

Sufficient rains have already been experienced, in the mean time, everywhere in the district. The farmers have been very busy with sowing seeds and transplanting saplings in their fields.

Asim Kumar Malaker, an expert in Rajshahi district office of Agriculture Extension Department of BADC said that the weather had been favourable enough to make Aus cultivation a success.

The target of cultivation of Aus paddy will be reached by early June, he said.

BADC has already distributed quality seeds among the farmers through its own channel.

Rajshahi Krishi Unnayan Bank, some other schedule and private banks and some NGOs are also extending cooperation to the farmers in terms of loans for fertilizers, pesticides and irrigation.

Jhenidah Sadar Hospital ailing

JHENIDAH, May 29: Patients are being deprived of proper medicare service at Jhenidah Sadar Hospital due to non-implementation of a former health minister's pledges for the last five years.

Chowdhury Kamal Ibne Yusuf, Minister for Health and Family Planning during Khalea Zia's regime had pledged to turn this 50-bed hospital into 100-bed one on January 1 in 1994 during his visit at Jhenidah. But the pledges were not fulfilled till filing of this report. The posts of anesthesiologist, junior matron, nurses, nursing attendants, pharmacist, cashier, ward master, sweeper, cook mashalchi and MLSS are still lying vacant.

When contacted with the Civil Surgeon (CS) of Jhenidah, he said that they had been provided with diet and medicine and surgical instruments and other necessary items for 100 patients, but the hospital has been running with the manpower for a 50-bed hospital.

The Resident Medical Officer (RMO) of Jhenidah Sadar Hospital said that on average 135 patients are admitted here every day. But they are not able to provide food for more than 100 patients. As a result other patients are compelled to manage their diet from outside the hospital.

The RMO informed that Taka 22 lakh had been allocated for 100 patients of the hospital every year which is spent for purchasing drugs, surgical gauge, bandage, cotton, chemicals, quilt, blanket, mattress, pillow, locker and other

items which is not enough for the patients.

When asked the RMO admitted that the electro cardiography machine remained inoperative and it was being repaired.

There is no ultrasonogram machine here. As a result the patients have to spend much money for ECG and ultrasonography.

The lone ambulance of Jhenidah Sadar Hospital went

out of order a few months back.

When this correspondent visited Jhenidah Sadar Hospital, he saw that a huge number of attendants are attending the patients ignoring the advice of the on-duty physicians. The attendants allegedly crowd there for the whole day. The doctors are helpless.

For want of beds, a good number of patients are flooring on lye on the verandah of the

hospital.

The RMO informed, there is no guard at Jhenidah Sadar Hospital.

The morgue of Jhenidah Sadar Hospital runs without water. As a result the morgue remains dirty and creates an unhealthy atmosphere.

The suffering patients have urged the government to turn the hospital into 100-bed one immediately.

Date expired medicines flood Bogra markets

BOGRA May 29: About one thousand one hundred twenty-four medicine shops here have no drug license.

Even the Medicine Administration does not know that on average five drug shops were being opened in every month here.

Only five hundred seventy-six medicine shops have been running with drug license, out of a total of one thousand seven hundred medicine shops.

One hundred medicine shop owners did not get licenses as yet despite their prayer for the same. Only two hundred twenty drug licenses were issued during the last 11 years from 1982 to 1993. The number of issuance of drug license among the traders is very negligible in comparison with the demand.

It has been learnt from the Office of the Drug Superinten-

dent that an incumbent applicant for license needs to complete the Pharmacy course. Then they have to deposit an amount as fee to get the license.

Two types of drug courses are available here. One is for three years' and another is for three months'. One must have to complete either of the two courses and obtain a certificate in order to get a license.

There are even some shops here which have no trade license at all, not to speak of drug license. Yet these shops have been selling various kinds of medicines including the life saving drugs.

Innocent rural people are not only deceived after purchasing from these shops, but also suffering from various diseases after taking those medicines.

TLM programme progressing

GAIBANDHA, May 29: This year Gaibandha district will be declared illiteracy-free zone, said the Total Literacy Movement (TLM) committee here.

The programme under the caption 'Bikoshito Gaibandha' started functioning six months ago in seven thanas of the district. Total illiterate persons within the age group between 11 to 45 years have been assessed to be 4,61,468. Out of the total, 4,37,468 illiterate persons have already been brought under the TLM programme here. The remaining 30,000 illiterate persons are being taught in different non-governmental organisations (NGOs).

The government allocated a huge amount of money for promoting the rate of national education. As such the TLM programme has been geared up throughout the country.

In Gaibandha district the authority allocated a fund of Taka 13,41,75,601. Meanwhile, the district administration received an amount of Taka 7,70,00,000. The TLM committee already spent Taka 7,48,17,194.

During implementation of the programme the district TLM committee set up 7,439 male centres and 7,077 female centres throughout the district.

The committee recruited a total of 14,516 teachers and 968 supervisors to conduct the whole literacy programme. Each centre was set up with 30 learners in different remote areas.

While talking to the Deputy Commissioner (DC) of

Gaibandha, Sharafuddin Ahmed he told The Daily Star that despite various problems the programme had been implemented here satisfactorily. Now the committee is getting ready to hold the final test of the learners through an examination expected to be held tomorrow.

Teachers prefer private tuition to taking classes

BRAHMANBARIA, Mar 29: Private tuition has become a common practice at Brahmanbaria town and other thanas.

Teachers of both government and non-government schools and colleges are engaged in private tuition to earn extra money. Many guardians have reported, teachers hardly teach the students sincerely in classes. So the students find it difficult to understand their lessons taught in classes.

As a result, guardians are compelled to engage private tutors to get their wards taught properly. Most of the students in primary, secondary schools and colleges usually employ their respective teachers as house tutors to get good marks in the examination.

The guardians alleged that the private tutorial practice has become a professional business of the teachers. Science and En-

glish teachers get a large number of students for coaching in batches. The teachers of commerce also the students in batches. Private coaching by teachers in batches start before and after school or college hours.

It is also alleged during class hours some teachers coach the students. Many private coaching centres are found both in town and thanas. The number of coaching centres are increasing day by day.

Teachers are getting a handsome amount for private coaching. Private coaching is being practised from one to degree levels. Science students say that it has become impossible to do better results without the aid of private tutors. After school hours private coaching starts in every secondary high schools for the student who are appearing at the SSC examination.
