Australia

Don't write off Steve Waugh's men just yet. The signs are they are beginning to run into form after a lacklustre start. Glenn McGrath, the core of the team's bowling threat, appears to be getting to grips with the tournament's swinging white ball at last, with five wickets against the West Indies. Shane Warne also took three wickets in that game. But there remains a feeling that the team is not match sharp after months of non-stop cricket. Even the fielding has been ragged. The rearguard batting performance against Pakistan, however, showed that this is not a team ready to die quietly. The handicap of going into the second round without any points looks insurmountable but Australia are the one side who might just pull it off.

Sri Lanka The heroes of 1996 were reduced to zeroes as Sri Lanka failed in their defence of their tide. With seniors like skipper Arjuna Ranatunga, and Aravinda De Silva struggling with the bat, the juniors were unable to keep the ship affoat. Skipper Arjuna Ranatunga, meanwhile, failed to change his failing tactics. By the end, he was reduced to blaming his team-mates rather than himself. The bowling, as before, lacked depth but could not be papered over this time. Not even the presence of Muttiah Murlitharan, one of the world's leading spinners, made a difference. They can expect an angry reception from their fans but the pool of talent, as Ranatunga pointed out, is shallow.

West Indies

Brian Lara, struggling with a painful wrist, came but failed to conquer 23 his team, despite a helping hand from Australia, was knocked out in the first round for the third time in the last four World Cups. The captain's poor form contributed to the debacle but he was not the only culprit. There were few heroes, although ageing warhorses Courtney Walsh and Curtly Ambrose continued to astound. With a combined age of more than 70, they worried every bastman that they came across. Soon they will be gone, however, leaving Lara on his own to carry an increasingly heavy burden. The victories of 1975 and 1979 may never be re-

England

Alec Stewart's men became the first England team to fail to progress from the first round. There were fine performances from strike bowlers Alan Mullally and Darren Gough, but the batting failed to fire, despite few sparks from Nasser Hussain and Graeme Hick, But Stewart's poor form and the dependence on 'bits and pieces' players rather than genuine allrounders was cruelly exposed. Stewart may be forced to quit, coach David Lloyd has already gone before being pushed. England's glory days seem a long way behind them but sadly few people seemed to notice they were all watching Manchester United.

Dangladesh

They arrived for their first World Cup worrying as much about the cold as the opposi-

Scotland

First-timers Scotland may have lost all five matches but at least they threw up a player of genuine promise. Gavin Hamilton, the Yorkshire professional, scored 217 runs - the third highest individual total of the first round - in Scottish colours after England decided not to include him in their 15man squad. With both home teams failing to progress, however, there are already calls for England to take a closer look at the 24-year-old all-rounder. Unable to offer him a professional career, Scotland are likely to lose their one gem.

Kenya

The Kenyans continue to ride on the back of their stunning victory over the West Indies in the last World Cup! They promised much here but failed to deliver, losing all five matches. There was little that coach Alvin Kallicharran could do, having taken over only a few months ago. Scoring 230 against Sri Lanka in their last game was some consola-


Pace-setters and wobblers

Saurav Ganguly (India) Stylish left-hander and a major Indian success in the World Cup. English conditions suit him, as he showed here in 1996 when making centuries in his first two Test matches. Made 183 while putting on a world record one-day stand of 318 with Rahul Dravid against Sri Lanka. His bowling is a bonus. Took three for 27 in the bonus. Brian Lara (West Indies)

One of the disappointments of the tournament. Regarded as the best left-hander in the world, he came to the tournament after scoring 213, 153 not out and 100 in consecutive Tests against Australia but, struggling with an injured wrist, he never found any form. The West Indies' bowlers had a fine World Cup but the batting - and Lara in particular - never fired at all. His request to go and see the European & Cup final Barcelona in the middle of the group games said it all.

Rahul Dravid (India)

Considered too slow for oneday cricket until a year ago. The transformation has been remarkable. He now rotates the strike well and goes for his shots while rarely improvising or slogging. Enters the second round as the tournament's leading scorer with 369 runs, including back-to-back centuries against Kenya and Sri Lanka. Put on a world record one-day stand of 318 with Saurav Ganguly against Sri Lanka.




A bigger disappointment than Jayasuriya. The hero of Sri Lanka's victory in the previous World Cup final, when he made an undefeated century, he has fallen from grace, with many speculating that the 33-year-old's glorious career may be heading towards its end. He looked out of form from the looked out of form from the start, but had to continue because of the lack of a suitable replacement. Like Jayasuriya, the movement in the air and off the wicket undid him, even though he was a huge success when playing in England for Kent in 1995.



Shoaib Akhtar (Pakistan) Has lived up to the hype of being the fastest bowler in the



Who can forget his first delivery in the competition, rising sharply on West Indian opener Sherwin Campbell who unwittingly topedged the ball for six over third man. With speed guns installed for the second round, the world will soon know exactly how fast Akhtar is. He was timed at 97 miles an hour in Sharjah in April

Courtney Walsh (West Indies) The ageing Jamaican paceman and former captain distinguished himself in an otherwise unimpressive West Indian campaign with 11 wickets in five matches. Appears certain to overtake Kapil Dev's Test world record of 434 wickets soon - he is just 12 short. But his last World Cup appearance ended sadly, when New Zealand nudged the West Indies out of



The star of 1996, anonymous in 1999. The world's most swashbuckling opener, he has been unable to repeat the form that made him an instant hit on Asia's flat tracks during the last World Cup. Injuries and personal problems before the tournament hardly helped. Seaming English conditions have not either. With the ball coming onto the bat, he should be much happier for Sri Lanka's home series against Australia in August - as long as he is not made into a scapegoat by the selectors. 
South Africa's hero of the first round, with 13 wickets and 164 runs without being dismissed. The hard-hitting, fastscoring left-hander twice won close games with the bat and had a hand in his team's other two victories with the ball. But even an unbeaten 52 against Zimbabwe could not prevent a shock defeat for the favourites. If South Africa go on to win the World Cup, Klusener will be a major factor in the team's engine room. 
Jacques Kallis (South Africa) Another all-rounder playing an important role in South Africa's success, after a phenomenal improvement in his bowling over the last season. Began with 96 against India. then defeated Sri Lanka with three quick wickets with the new ball. Bats at number three and is often given the new ball to allow Allan Donald to come on first change. Once a mediumpaced swing bowler, he is now decidedly sharp and many regard him today as the number one all-rounder in the game. Still describes himself as a batsman who bowls a bit.

Saqlain Mushtaq (Pakistan)
The world's leading off spinner and a master of the one-day game, he lends tremendous sup-port to his fast bowlers. His nagging length and line and his deadly "sliders" that drift from leg to off give batsmen no respite. Took three crucial wickets in his team's 10-wicket win over Australia in what was the most hotly-contested match of the first round. His experi-ence with Surrey has helped him outshine his rival spinners during the first round.

Muttiah Muralitharan (Sri Lanka)

Like his team, the gifted off spinner with the double-jointed wrist and bent elbow did not get into the right groove as Sri Lanka made an early and ignominious exit. Even his haul of three for 25 against South Africa was not enough to save them from defeat. Came to the World Cup with high expectations after taking 16 wickets in a one-off Test against England at The Oval last year and five wickets in the triangular final at Lord's. At least he will get a few weeks' rest before starting his county career at Lancashire. Performances: 1-33 v



Ridley Jacobs (West Indies) A wicket-keeper doubling up

as an opening batsman, he did everything right as the batsmen around him did everything wrong. Produced several outstanding dislays with bat and gloves but could not save the former double champions from an early return home. The Antiguan was brilliant against New Zealand, taking five catches before scoring a matchwinning 80 not out. Against Australia, he carried his bat for 49 as the team was skittled for 110. Made his debut last year as a 30-year-old. What a waste.



The only bowler in the world to take more than 350 wickets in both Test and one-day cricket, he is also a useful lower order batsman. Many thought he was in the twilight of his career. He clearly isn't.




