Spurious liquor kills 2 more in Rajshahi

RAJSHAHI, June 9: Spurious liquor claimed two more lives in the district within a span of 24 hours.

Besides, three others fell sick in the same incident that occurred at village Kaliganj Borsha in Tanor thana yesterday.

The dead were identified as Mozammel, 25, son of Moslemuddin and Ershad Ali, 25, son of Haru Mondal of Kaliganj.

Those who fell sick are Ataur Rahman, 18, Babu, 21, and Shamim, 24, of the same village.

Police said the victims purchased liquor from one Anwar Ali at Kaliganj Bazaar at around 11 pm on Sunday.

They fell sick soon after taking the drug and were rushed to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital where Mozammel and Ershad died yesterday.

The condition of three others are stated to be critical, hospital sources said.

Police Superintendent, Rajshahi today visited the spot to investigate the incident.

Meanwhile, two persons were arrested in connection with Amnura liquor tragedy in Chapainawabganj that claimed three lives on Monday. A probe committee, headed by additional district magistrate has been formed to investigate the matter.

One killed as smugglers clash with BDR

JAIPURHAT, June 9: One person was killed and two others injured seriously as BDR personnel fired on a group of alleged smugglers at Panchibibi frontier early today, reports UNB.

Officials and local people said a group of smugglers swooped on BDR men when they challenged them at Dargapara in Panchibibi thana. At one stage, the BDR opened fire, killing one on the spot and injuring two.

The dead was identified as Rustam Ali, 40, of Dargapara. The injured are Nasiruddin, 30, of Nowda, Dargapara, and Bazlu Hossain, 21, of Nayapara in the thana.

Bazlu's condition was stated to be critical as a bullet pierced his head. Both the injured were sent to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital.

After the BDR firing, tension

Budget with bigger deficit likely

In its fourth financial year, the Awami League government still has its hands full of concerns like a burgeoning current expenditure, severe strains on revenue collection and a weak balance of payment (BOP) to contend in the budget to be placed today.

Business circles will closely watch how Finance Minister SAMS Kibria lends support to a sagging export sector and an under-performing industrial base.

The government's development and current expenditures have overshoot estimates by many percentage points putting fresh strains on the economy. According to sources, this year's current expenditure,

mainly used for paying salaries and wages have increased 10 per cent to about Tk 17,600 crore from an estimated Tk 15,937 cr. At the same time, development expenditure has increased Tk 400 crore, which does not cheer

one up, as most of it was due to flood rehabilitation programmes. The main development concern of improving the project implementation rate remains elusive at only 53 per cent till March this year.

All these factors mean the budget deficit will increase, further, this year putting fresh pressure on the economy. When the international aid scenario rules out the possibility of increased aid and domestic revenue collection remains handicapped, deep concerns about further domestic borrowing surface, once again. The net domestic borrowing, which was 5.8 per cent of total expenditure in 1990-91, had already shot up

Reconciliatory mood in Jatiya Sangsad

Both the Treasury and the Opposition benches in the House on Tuesday appeared to be in a reconciliatory mood yesterday as the two sides discussed their fight in the House on the previous day.

There was a near pandemonium situation in the House on Tuesday when angry BNP members hurled abuses at Industries Minister Tofail Ahmed following his comments on Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia for her earlier remarks about he Speaker.

But the two sides spoke in a reconciliatory tone yesterday, requesting each other to go by parliamentary rules and practices.

Responding to a demand by BNP leader M. Saifur Rahman, Deputy Speaker Abdul Hamid, who was chairing yesterday's sitting, also assured the House

of expunging all 'unparliamentary' words from Tuesday's proceedings.

Saifur regretted Tofail Ahmed's comment on the Opposition Leader, which led to Tuesday's situation.

Terming Khaleda's comment a usual Opposition practice, the former finance minister said, "Had the Speaker felt insulted by the remark, he could have talked to her."

The senior BNP leader also said that the way "irrelevant" charges were brought against the Leader of the Opposition and former prime minister was unfortunate.

Earlier, BNP lawmaker Fazlur Rahman Patal said Tofail Ahmed's remark on the Opposition Leader was unfortunate. "We did not expect such a behaviour from a senior leader

4 days in police custody without any charge

A seven-year-old boy was kept in custody by Mohammadpur police for about four days without any charge.

The boy, Firoy, was freed at around 2-30 p.m. yesterday when news of his detention became known and newsmen rushed to the thana. There was no case against the boy nor any General Diary filed.

According to Mohammadpur police, owner of a building near the Aziz Moholla had shifted to another flat of his building on Saturday. The owner of the building, an engineer, engaged Firoy's father Jobed Ali of the same area to help him shift.

Firoy also went to the flat to see his father's activities. The engineer's family later found that a mobile set was missing. The family then informed police. But no case or GD was filed.

90pc hand-pumped tubewells not functioning in greater Rajshahi

Over 90 per cent of hand-pumped tubewells in greater Rajshahi district (Barind region) and Pabna are not functioning due to fall in the groundwater level, officials have said.

The situation has caused a serious drinking water crisis for about 50 lakh people in at least 20 thanas in Chapainawabganj, Rajshahi, Natore, Pabna and Naogaon districts covering about 3,000 square miles.

The water table in the region has dropped by at least 10 feet on an average over the last five years, a senior official of the Barind Multipurpose Development Authority (BMDA), told The Daily Star on Monday.

"This is a serious problem in the region," said Sarwar Jahan, Divisional Executive Engineer of the Department of Public Health and Engineering.

"Normally, the water table gets recharged during rain. But our measurement indicates that the underground water table is declining." The problem becomes acute from mid-February to mid-May, he said. Even tubewells sunk up to 75 feet remain inoperative whereas 30 feet should be enough for a hand-driven one to pump water, he said.

The Barind region experienced no rainfall from

November 23 last year to April this year, meteorologists in Rajshahi said. Since April, there was only 8 millimeters of rain. This is a drop in the ocean, they said.

Mohanpur under Godagari union in Rajshahi, this correspondent found that nine out of eleven tubewells sunk by the government were not functioning. On an average, there is one tubewell for 30 households in the areas.

The situation is no better in Naogaon, Natore and Pabna districts.

People in the region said they collect drinking water from deep tubewells. But in villages where there is none, they have to walk miles.

"We collect a jar of water from deep tubewell in the neighbouring village and use it for two days. For cooking, bathing and washing, we use water from pool but that also remains dry most of the time except during monsoon," said Sirejul Islam, a farmer at Mirapur village.

Shefali Bala of Mondail village under Baghabari in Rajshahi said, "We have to ration drinking water because five members of the family have to pass two days with a jar of water."

Her neighbour Sura Bala said, "We frequently suffer from intestinal diseases when we use surface water."

According to the NGO Forum, an apex body of some small NGOs working for supply of drinking water, 90 per cent of

African lion spending last days at Zoo

Curator, 3 other officials removed

The authorities have ordered removal of the Curator and three other officials of Dhaka Zoo in a belated move to improve its condition in the wake of death of a number of animals recently for lack of care and proper supervision, sources said.

Three veterinarians were transferred from the Central Livestock Hospital yesterday to fill up vacant posts at the Zoo.

The sources said the zoo is running without proper facilities and required manpower, specially veterinarians. A five-month old baby elephant, a tiger and a lion died at the zoo recently.

One of the oldest inmates of the zoo, an African lion—Sudarshan—is spending its last days due to old age complications. It is 23 plus, a zoo official said.

Meanwhile, a high level meeting chaired by Minister for Livestock and Fisheries ASM Abider Rob yesterday reviewed a report by a probe committee

Zimbabwe scare Australia

LONDON, June 9: Opener Neil Johnson saw his brilliant unbeaten knock of 132 off 144 balls go in vain as Australia beat Zimbabwe by 44 runs in the second round of the World Cup here today, reports AFP.

Aussie opener Mark Waugh hit a high-class century to pave the way for his team's much-needed victory. But Australia were given a scare at Lord's as Neil Johnson hit back with a sparkling ton, keeping Zimbabwe in contention for much of the match.

Waugh's 104 came off 120 balls, making him Australia's highest scorer in one-day internationals. He now has 6,594 runs in 189 matches.

He put on 129 for the third wicket with his twin brother Steve who made 62.

Chasing Australia's 303 for four, opener Johnson attacked from the start, putting on 114 with Murray Goodwin (47).

At 153 for one, the Africans, bidding to reach the semi-finals

for the first time, were on course for an upset.

But five wickets then fell for 47 runs to kill off the run chase. Australia now have four points and need to beat South Africa in their final Super Six game to make sure of reaching the last four.

Zimbabwe have five points, with Pakistan to play on Friday.

The Australians - who lost to Zimbabwe in the 1983 World Cup, 16 years ago to the day in one of the tournament's greatest upsets - were left badly bruised despite winning.

Leg spinner Shane Warne had to be withdrawn after his

first five overs went for 44. Paul Reiffel was Australia's best bowler but still conceded 55 runs off his 10 overs, taking three wickets.

It was natural that Lord's should have the best wicket on view so far. It had the best weather as well. Clear blue skies; a hard true batting strip, a typical English crowd, nothing frenetic or jingoistic about the assembled multitude, and some great batting in the classical mould. At last, a taste of the perfect life.

Supporter of CHT peace accord shot dead in Khagrachhari

One person was killed and another critically injured when a group of extortionists fired on them at Mohalchhari bazar, some 25 kilometres from the district headquarters, police said, reports BSS.

Mohalchhari police said peace accord Utpal Chakma, 25, supporter of died on the spot and his fellow Raju Chakma, 24, received serious bullet injuries when a group of extortionists fired on them in front of a local cinema hall at around 10-15 pm last night.

They said the terrorists opened fire after an altercation with the victims.

Members of the law enforcing agencies rescued Raju Chakma, nephew of Chittagong Hill Tracts Regional Council (CHTRC) member Shudhashindhu Khisha, and admitted him to Khagrachhari military hospital in a critical state, police said.

Basu to make a symbolic bus ride to Dhaka

NEW DELHI, June 9: West Bengal Chief Minister Jyoti Basu will undertake only a symbolic ride on board the Calcutta-Dhaka bus on January 19 before flying from Jessore to Bangladesh capital, official sources said here today.

They said Basu would fly from Calcutta to Petrapole in Indian side of the border before boarding the bus there and travel three kilometres before disembarking in Bangladesh territory.

The veteran Marxist leader will then fly from Jessore to Dhaka where he will join Indian Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee and External Affairs Minister Jaswant Singh to receive the bus passengers from Calcutta.

A temporary helipad is being constructed at Petrapole to enable Basu to land there.
