## 47000 terrorists held, 1500 arms seized in 47 days

Home Minister Mohammad Nasim yesterday disclosed in Parliament that 47,000 terrorists were rounded up and 1,500 arms seized in 47 days from April 23 during a special combing operation across the country, reports UNB.

"People got back confidence and peace has been restored in southwestern region," he said making a statement under Rule 300.

"But it's unfortunate that many hardened criminals, who were arrested by police taking lot of risks, are getting bail from the court within 24 hours," the Home Minister said. "I don't disrespect the court, but the criminals are taking advantage of legal loopholes."

Reiterating the government's pledge to eliminate terrorists, he said: "We will never compromise nor give any concession to them since this government was voted to power by the people, not by the terrorists."

The Home Minister said that over the years terrorist groups had created a reign of terror in the southwestern region under different imaginary political groups. They were used during local and national elections by different political parties and given shelter.

"Today, they are surrendering their arms and returning to normal life," he said.

Nasim said more than 200 terrorists surrendered to the government Monday at the Jessore Town Hall midan.

**Biman** opens bids for consultant today

Bangladesh Biman opens bids today to choose a consultant who will prepare guidelines for privatisation of 40 per cent shares of the national flag carrier.

Under a two million dollar World Bank aided project, Biman invited bids from consultants last year and shortlisted four companies in March this year.

They are ANZ Investment Consortium of UK, Citibank, USA, Flemings Consortium, UK and ABT Associates, USA.

Biman sources said that the selected consultant would design a privatisation programme that would include finding a strategic partner for an alliance to take the airline to new heights in Asian sky.

The privatisation process is expected to be completed by June 2000.

The airline has a fleet of four DC-10-30 wide-bodied aircraft, two A310 medium haul aircraft, three F-28 and two Advance Turboprops. It also has 5,500 personnel.

Another DC-10-30 is likely to join Biman's fleet sometime this month to bolster its international operations. It is currently operating in 24 destinations across the globe.

Biman's attempts to sell the Advance Turboprops have so far failed.

## 7 pc growth rate projected in FFYP, Kibria tells JS

Finance Minister Shah AMS Kibria told the Jatiya Sangsad yesterday that the Fifth Five-Year Plan has projected an average growth rate at seven per cent during the five years of the plan period from 1997-98 to 2001-2002, reports BSS.

Replying to a question from Mostafizur Rahman (AL-Chittagong), the finance minister said that the annual growth rate was projected at 6.30 per cent in 1998-99, 6.80 per cent in 1999-2000, 7.60 per cent in 2000-2001 and 8.32 per cent in 2001-2002.

The minister furnished a list of growth rate achieved so far

### Share scam case

Mohiuddin's quashment petition undisputed

The High Court fixed June 23 for verdict as hearing of the petition seeking quashment on a charge framing order by Third Additional Metropolitan Sessions' Court concluded yesterday.

Barrister Rafique-ul-Huq, petitioner MKM Mohiuddin's lawyer, argued that the Metro court framed the charge against Mohiuddin as director of First Capital Securities for an offence committed between July-December 1996 while, Mohiuddin had resigned on December 31, 1995 from the company.

Huq also produced copies of the resignation and communication between the company and Dhaka Stock Exchange (DSE), Chittagong Stock Exchange (CSE) and Registrar of Joint Stock Companies.

Additional Attorney General Mahbub-e-Alam said, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) filed the case against the directors of the company and before filing the cases the SEC had not received Mohiuddin's resignation letter.

He, however, said, the SEC now had the letter and was not disputing the submission of the petitioner.

## Evolve strategy to reap maximum benefit from globalisation

Ahmed said the present government has transformed the concerns of regional trade cooperation into opportunities.

He said this was done through a series of negotiations at different levels with the regional and sub-regional trading partners.
