Dwelling on downfall

London, June 9: (India Abroad News Service): It was the end of a long dream, the dream which close to a billion people in India had shared. Australian fast bowler Glenn McGrath woke the Indian batsmen up to face reality and they came down to earth with a thump.

Unless other sides perform so badly that a logjam comes about for one or two spots, India will probably be going home after the Super Six. After the defeat at the Oval, which sported by far the best pitch of the tournament which gave an equal chance for the bat and the ball, India have lost to three of five competitors and the chances of the team squeezing through with two wins and a tie are very remote.

India's downfall had been plotted by a superior think tank. But someone had to find that extra bounce to get batsmen who were in top form out. McGrath's performance was a real standout.

Steve Waugh had got it just right. The Indians have a few good batsmen and it is a question of getting them out soon, he had said in a pre-match press conference and his primary pace bowler carried out the hit job to perfection.

The match had been built up as a great conflict between Sachin Tendulkar, the world's best batsman, and McGrath, one of world cricket's most lethal new ball bowlers. The contest lasted just a few minutes with the pace bowler getting Sachin to spar at the fourth ball that bounced on him. Very soon the Indians were left only with a theoretical chance of reaching the semi-finals.

With Sachin's dismissal began the procession. The World Cup's highest scorer Rahul Dravid followed suit and Saurav Ganguly chopped Fleming on. There was to be relief only after McGrath, three wickets in a match award winning performance, had brought out a very old chink in Azharuddin's armour by turning him inside out with bounce and getting him to spoon a catch to gully for an ignominious exit.

Bounce was the key. Indians were simply done in because they could not negotiate McGrath's pace and lift. A very old chink in Indian batting had been brought out again by a great fast bowler. And he was bowling in the second half of the day when there was less in the pitch than when Javagal Srinath first topped the radar gun with a strapping delivery of 93 miles per hour.

The Kennington Oval could well have been Wankhede Stadium at Churchgate.

So widespread was the support for India. In such an atmosphere and with light rain falling in the morning, Azhar had allowed himself to commit the error of asking Australia to bat first. But then this was the most successful tactic of the World Cup and who could blame him for allowing himself to be misled into chasing. The sobering thought is had India batted first, they may have been decimated by pace.

The Azhar effigy-burning time may have come again in India as their team crashed to the low of 17 for four. Those familiar with India's Test batting in foreign lands would have seen this phenomenon many a time. For a fast bowler to recreate the same situation in a one-day international and scythe through the top order was an awesome performance.

But there was some retrieval of honour as India retained the monopoly on the century scoring with Ajay Jadeja in his never-say-die spirit finishing with an unbeaten 100. But the question such statistics raised was are individual milestones more important than team results.

That is a question Azhar was not asked and he said only the usual things about the fall of early wickets being crucial. "I thought our bowlers bowled well," he said, which represented a change. The credit actually must go to the Australian batsmen, most of all Mark Waugh who came through a trying time against the swinging ball to play a classy knock that made all the difference between a settled innings and a big total and a side batting first losing their way in a seam-dominated

World Cup.

The Indians kept beating the bat so often the batsmen appeared to be playing blind man's bluff. But not once did Srinath & Co. find the decisive edge to carry the ball to the cord. The lack of thrust in the bowling was the clear failing, again an old weakness of Indian cricket. In one-day cricket bowlers must get batsmen out in order to contain sides.

Although some lost ground was retrieved by Robin Singh who came into the side because Sachin was sent back to the opening slot after ending a long period of confused thinking in the Indian camp, the bowlers were over generous in the end overs. What should actually have been a fair sized total in fine batting conditions became a huge target which India have rarely achieved save in one successful chase of 314 against Pakistan at Dhaka.

To be asked to open against such a target did not mean any additional responsibility being thrust upon Sachin. So accustomed is he to the job that he may have made a match of it had he succeeded in seeing off McGrath's first spell. But then Sachin has not had a great World Cup and India were the lesser side for it. His run of three centuries against

Australia came to an end with a nought which just emphasises the unpredictable nature of the game.

The disappointment was deeper because the batting had seemed solid in the league even in the matches which were lost. Having turned the corner in their decimation of the West Indies in the league, the Aussies were on a roll and it would have taken an improved performance from India to stay in touch with a fitter side.

Bob Simpson, the man who had trained Australia to a World Cup win, viewed all this with mixed feelings. On the one hand was his country and on the other the team he was coaching. There could only be one winner. And how Bob fared in the Simpson Test of loyalty is a well kept secret. Not so the public reaction to yet another Indian defeat.

Champs' Trophy from today

BRISBANE, June 9: Olympic and world champions Netherlands are again the team to beat in the 21st men's Champions Trophy field hockey tournament that gets underway here Thursday.

The Dutch have dominated the sport since their gold medal win over Spain at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics and with the next Olympic tournament 15 months away in Sydney they will get a further insight into their chances of successfully defending their Olympic crown.

The Netherlands head into the Brisbane top-six ranked Trophy winners of a unique grand slam of titles — besides the 1996 Olympic gold, they have won the 1998 World Cup on their own Utrecht pitch and last year's Champions Trophy in Lahore.

The consistent Spaniards loom as the Dutch team's main rivals having finished runner-up to them at the Atlanta Olympics and at last year's Utrecht World Cup.

Hosts Australia will attempt to hoist their bridesmaid tag in their home tournament having chalked up a frustrating sequence of placings — except for last year's Commonwealth Games gold medal win over Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur.

Australia finished bronze medalists at Atlanta, fourth at last year's World Cup, third at

the 1998 Champions Trophy and were beaten by a golden goal in extra time by Germany in the final of the 1997 Champions Trophy in Adelaide.

Putting the Hockeyroos to the test will be World Cup runners-up Netherlands, the 1997 Champions Trophy beaten finalists Germany and Olympic silver medalists Korea, Argentina and New Zealand make up the six.

On Thursday, Argentina open the Women's tournament against the Netherlands, with Australia and New Zealand playing in the late game.

MANCHESTER, June 9: South African cricket officials visited the Manchester United football headquarters here today — too soon, they say, to see how best they can host the cricket World Cup in 2003, reports AFP.

The South African delegation met officials from United, football champions of England and Europe and one of the most successful sporting businesses in the world.

A tour of the Old Trafford football stadium, a kick away from the cricket ground, and a presentation of United's marketing and licensing campaigns, left the South Africans impressed.

"It has been a fantastic experience to see at first hand how such a successful business is run," said Imtiaz Patel, South Africa's director of professional cricket.

Patel stopped short of drawing any comparisons with the current World Cup, whose organisers have been widely criticised for failing to capture the imagination of the British sporting public.

"We are here to learn as much as possible. Our main function is to study the World Cup, with a view to putting on a successful event in 2003," Patel said.

Brazil defeat Holland

GOIANIA, Brazil, June 9: Five players were sent off as Brazil beat the Netherlands 3-1 in a niggly, bad-tempered friendly on Tuesday, reports Reuters.

The Dutch finished a peculiar match with eight men after having Edgar Davids, Andre Ooijer and Peter van Vossen dismissed while Brazil ended with nine after Rivaldo and Amoroso, who opened the scoring, were shown the red card.

The sendings-off all came in the second half after Brazil had taken a 3-0 first half lead with two goals from Leonardo and one from Amoroso. Pierre van Hooijdonk, recalled for the first time since last year's World Cup, scored a late consolation for the Dutch after coming on as a substitute.

Strangely, both sets of players were lethargic for much of the game but when they decided to show some aggression it was channelled the wrong way, into nasty kicks and late tackles.

The most bizarre sending-off involved Davids and Rivaldo, dismissed in injury time after a clash in which the Brazilian pulled the deadlocked Dutchman's hair as they tumbled after a challenge. The incident came after the teams had spent the last few minutes kicking the ball aimlessly around waiting for the final whistle.

Van Vossen, hero of last Saturday's 2-2 draw between the same teams when he scored a spectacular equaliser, started the early procession towards the dressing room when he was sent off for a second bookable offence midway through the second half.

He was followed almost immediately by Amoroso, whose second yellow card offence was to stop Dutch goalkeeper Sander Westerveld from taking a goal kick. His first was a vicious lunge at Ooijer's groin in the first half, which had deserved a red on its own.

Ooijer's foul went for two bookable offences.

Amoroso fired Brazil's opening goal after 16 minutes, converting an easy chance set up by Rivaldo, shortly after he had an effort disallowed for offside.

Leonardo prodded the ball home in the 38th minute after winning a tussle with Frank de Boer and scored again four minutes later, slipping the ball through an opponent's legs and firing a left-foot shot into the roof of the net.

Brazil threatened a rout but, as in Saturday's game when they threw away a two-goal lead, they eased off after the break.

Inter revise Vieri's tag



MILAN, June 9: Lazio president Sergio Cragnotti confirmed on Wednesday that he had sold Christian Vieri to Inter Milan, but said the striker's fee was even bigger than thought, at nearly 50 million dollars, reports AFP.

Inter Milan president Massimo Moratti announced the agreement in Rome on Tuesday, indicating it was in the region of around 80 billion lira, including the handing over of Inter's Argentinian midfielder Diego Simeone.

million dollars). Cragnotti stressed that Vieri wasn't a one-man team at Lazio and that the arrival of Veron from Parma and Simeone from Inter, to join another Argentinian Matias Almeyda, made his mid-field the best in Italy.

Vieri is an important player," said the club president. "He was for Lazio, but Vieri (alone) is not Lazio."

"We are working on the transfer market to replace him, but now we know that we have the best midfielders in circulation with Almeyda, Simeone

adding: "We are building a team which will be even more competitive."

Along with Veron, Lazio are also finalising the signing of Piacenza striker Simone Inzaghi, younger brother of Juventus ace Filippo.

Vieri, currently preparing for Italy's crucial Euro-2000 qualifier with Switzerland in Lausanne on Wednesday night, will reportedly earn around 17 million dollars over the course of a four-year contract with Inter.

Though the agreement was reached on Tuesday with a shake of the hand between Moratti and Cragnotti at a Rome hotel, the paperwork was not signed by the two men until Wednesday morning in the offices here of Inter's managing director Rinaldo Ghelli.

Vieri, 25, will play alongside Brazilian star Ronaldo next season in a new-look Inter Milan being put together by new coach Marcello Lippi.

Lippi, who had Vieri at Juventus during the striker's one season there in 1996-97, will now be expected to take the club back to the very top of Italian football after a disastrous season.

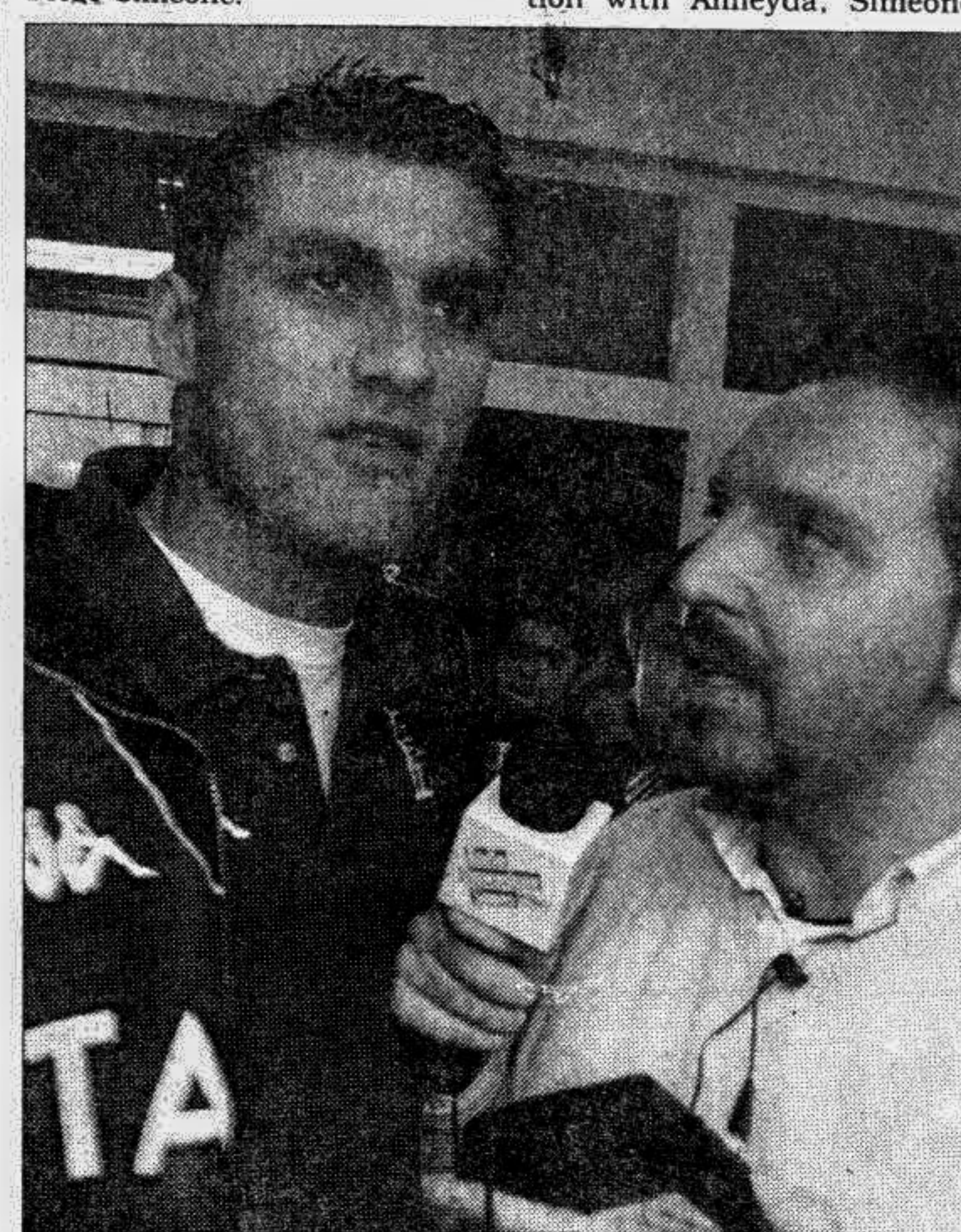
Vieri, powerfully built and able to shoot with either foot, became Italy's most expensive footballer even when he left Juventus for Atletico Madrid for 34 billion lira (18.3 million dollars).

But after scoring 24 goals in 24 games for the Spanish club, and becoming the Primera Liga's top scorer in 1997-98, he was recruited by Cragnotti little more than 10 months ago, after falling out with then Atletico coach Arrigo Sacchi, for 48 billion lira (26 million dollars).

His short stays were recorded in a wretched statement issued by Lazio later on Wednesday, which quoted Cragnotti as saying: "I thank Vieri for his contribution to the thrilling season which has just ended, and with him the best of luck in all of the clubs that he will play for in the future."

Italy's best player at the World Cup in France, where he scored five goals, Vieri was injured for more than two months at the start of last season. His goalscoring return helped propel Lazio to the top of the Serie A and he also scored in the 2-1 Cup Winners Cup triumph over Spanish outfit Real Mallorca.

Despite his 12-goal tally for the season, the Rome club lost the championship on the very last day to AC Milan.

Wilander had fun

NEW YORK, June 9 (AP): When Mats Wilander reached the top of the tennis world, he sounded like the old Peggy Lee song. Is that all there is?

At the age of 17, Wilander became the youngest player to win a Grand Slam tournament men's singles title when he captured the 1982 French Open. Later the same year, he faced John McEnroe for 6 hours, 39 minutes on carpet in St. Louis, the longest Davis Cup match in history at that time.

The quiet Swede added two more French Open titles, three Australian Opens and a US Open crown. In 1988, he won three of the four Grand Slam tournaments and was No. 1 in the world.

"It happened so fast," Wilander said from his home in Greenwich, Connecticut. "It happened easy once. I was motivated to try it. In December 1990, he was 41st, having skipped the French Open and Wimbledon and losing in the first round at the US Open."

He hung around for a few more years, never a threat in a

major tournament. Now, he's on the seniors circuit.

Through it all, Wilander says he has had fun.

"I was never really driven to become No. 1 in the world," he said.

Then he had a beer with Matt Doyle, who played Davis Cup for Ireland and, with Wilander, was a member of the ATP board of directors.

"Matt said I could become No. 1 if I practised a little harder, and trained more," Wilander remembered. "I had never given it a thought before. But after that I was more focused."

"I enjoyed winning. Ivan Lendl liked to beat guys 0 — hand — 1. I just liked to beat guys."

But life at the top wasn't really what Wilander expected — or wanted.

"I knew what it took to become No. 1," he said. "Could I keep working this hard and keep focused when I couldn't go up any higher. Once you are No. 1, there's only one direction you can go."

There were other things in his life besides tennis. He married fashion model Sonya, in 1987, just before his big year. Of those were his highs, he was soon to have a deep loss.

"My dad got cancer in 1989 and died five months later," Wilander said.

He missed the French Open and Wimbledon in 1990, skipped Wimbledon and the US Open in 1991, sat out the 1992 season before playing only the US Open in 1993. It wasn't a career in decline, it wasn't even a career at that point.

Then Wilander showed up again.

"I played 1993 through '95 and '96," he said. "So I didn't expect to do that. I enjoyed that."

He retired from the ATP Tour in 1996. "I'm happy I quit," he said — and began playing the senior circuit last year. Tennis is fun for him once again as he prepares for the Citibank Champions in Purchase, New York, this week.

Wilander begins singles play Wednesday night against John Lloyd.
