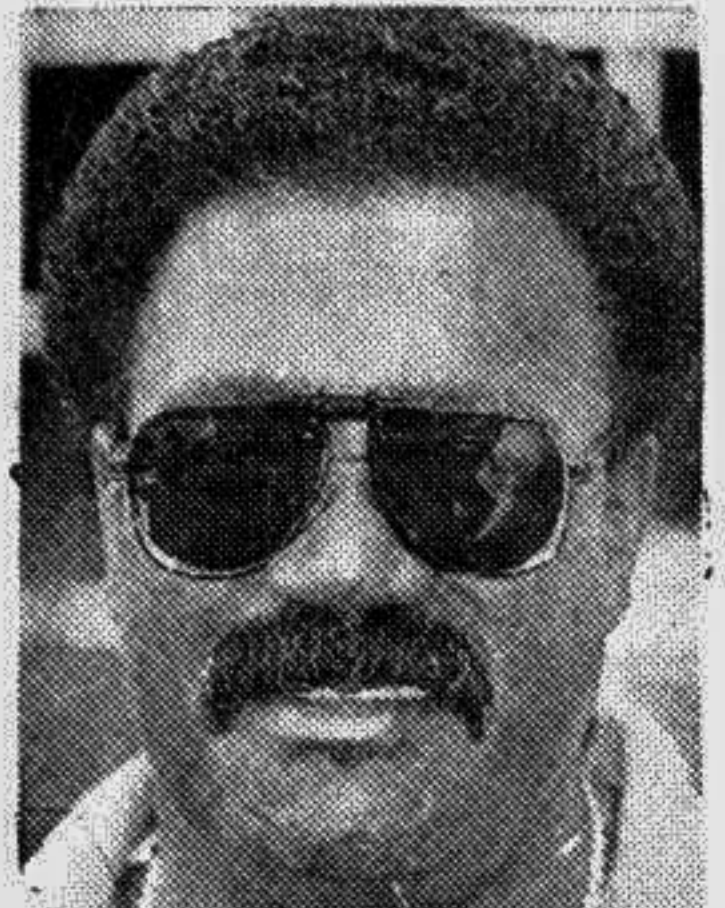

FedEx speedster
launched

LONDON, June 17: Some of cricket's "fastest deliveries" — India's Jagavul Srinath, Australia's Gleen McGrath and former Australian player, Jeff Thomson, holder of the speed record at 99.7 mph — have launched the FedEx Speedster, a radar device used to measure bowling speeds during the remaining matches of the World Cup, says a press release.

Sponsored by FedEx, and accurate to within 2km/h, the FedEx Speedster has already begun measuring bowling speeds at the World Cup, starting with the Super Six match between India and Australia.

A sigh of relief for Wimbledon

LONDON, June 17: Last year's World Cup ran roughshod over the Wimbledon tennis championships, much to the disapproval of those who prefer blazers and Pimm's to replica shirts and lager, reports AFP.

This year, however, cricket's World Cup will politely end on June 20, allowing tennis's grasscourt Grand Slam at the All England Club the centre stage it deserves.

For once the weather looks set fair for the 113th championships with the mercury touching 27 degrees Celsius in the week before the tournament, which starts next Monday. Never mind the cricket's Barmy Army, that is just plain balm for June in the English capital.

Wimbledon, of course, features as high on the social calendar as the sporting one.

In all, well over 400,000 spectators, officials, media and players will come through the Club gates over the next fortnight, consuming some 27,000 kilos of strawberries, 7,000 litres of cream and 12,500 bottles of champagne.

The continuing modernisation of the venue means 2,000 extra seats will be available this year, giving a new capacity of 35,000 and some London agencies are charging a wallet-busting 1,600 pounds (2,400 dollars) for a Centre Court seat at the final on July 4.

The tournament's ever-increasing popularity has much to do with the resurgence of British tennis, spearheaded by sixth seed Tim Henman and his Canadian-born compatriot Greg Rusedski.

FIFA rankings Bangladesh now 148th

Despite finishing runners-up in the South Asian Football Federation Championship in the Indian resort of Goa last May, Bangladesh slipped two places in the latest monthly FIFA world rankings released on Wednesday.

In February, Bangladesh was ranked at 146 out of 201 member countries.

South Asian powerhouse India also dropped from 112 to 113. Except for Sri Lanka and Pakistan who remained unchanged at 142 and 178 respectively, the other countries of this region also fell further.

Looking at the top order four-time world champions Brazil remained number one with World Cup holders France in second place 27 points behind. The Czech Republic moved into third place after qualifying as the first team for Euro 2000. They replaced Germany who now lie in fifth.

World Cup 2002 co-hosts South Korea and Japan also nose-dived to 38th and 42nd spot.

Some solace for Real

MADRID, June 17: Fernando Morientes and Predrag Mijatovic earned Real Madrid a 2-1 victory against Valencia here on Wednesday but lost this Spanish Cup semi-final 7-2 on aggregate, reports AFP.

At least Madrid supporters, who had threatened to stay away from the 106,500-capacity Santiago-Bernabeu stadium in protest at poor results, did turn out to cheer on their team although they had the near-impossible task of trailing 6-0 from the first leg.

Argentina's Claudio Lopez shot home an equalizer for the east coast club with five minutes remaining.

Madrid, who must beat Deportivo La Coruna at the weekend to ensure European Champions League football next season, ironically played Deportivo in the June 26 final.

A header by Morientes after eight minutes following a cross from the left gave them their opener and Mijatovic side-footed home a penalty to the right of the keeper in the 63rd minute for their second.

Madrid looked motivated as players wrenched the ball from the Valencia keeper and ran back to the centre circle to save time for more goals.

No more goals came from the 1998 European Cup champions however and Lopez shot home left-footed between the keeper and the near post to earn Valencia a welcome, if meaningless goal.

Someone on the Real Madrid bench voiced his frustration minutes before the end and the referee showed a yellow.

Real were worried that supporters might boycott the match. This year, arch-rivals Barcelona have won the league title. Madrid are now out of the Spanish Cup, and they lost 3-1 to city rivals Atletico Madrid at the weekend.

Trailing massively from the first leg, the match was clearly not going to be a major drawing card for fans however the snub never happened.

Australia, Holland in eves' final

BRISBANE, June 17: The Netherlands joined Australia in the final of the Champions' Trophy women's hockey tournament after holding the host nation to a 1-1 draw today, reports Reuters.

In drawing the match, the Dutch secured the point they needed to ensure a place in the gold medal match and snuff out the last hopes of Germany.

The Germans would have gone through if the Dutch had slipped up against the Australians after thrashing South Korea earlier in the day.

They will now face Argentina in Saturday's bronze medal play-off after the South Americans drew 2-2 with New Zealand.

With Australia already guaranteed a place in the final after winning their first four games in the six-nation tournament, the Netherlands capitalised on a rare defensive error to take a 1-0 lead when Fleur van de Kieft scored in the 20th minute.

Australian striker Alyson Anna equalised four minutes later but neither side was able to find the net for the remainder of the game as the match faded out to a draw.

The result ended Germany's brave bid to squeeze into the final. Needing to win by a comfortable margin to overhaul the Netherlands' points differential, the Germans did everything that was required of them only to see their dreams dashed by the later draw.

Germany opened their account after just five minutes when Franziska Gude scored but the team failed to find the net again in the first half.

The South Koreans, who lost all five of their round-robin matches, hung on desperately until halftime before folding in the second term as the Germans added a further three goals through Britta Becker, Heike Latzsch and Natascha Keller.

The South Koreans will now play New Zealand in the play-off for fifth spot after New Zealand drew with Argentina.

They escaped with a draw when Mandy Smith struck the equaliser five minutes from time.

Bangladesh Sports Writers' Association (BSWA) general secretary Rezaul Karim Rahman will join the Congress as an official delegate from Bangladesh.

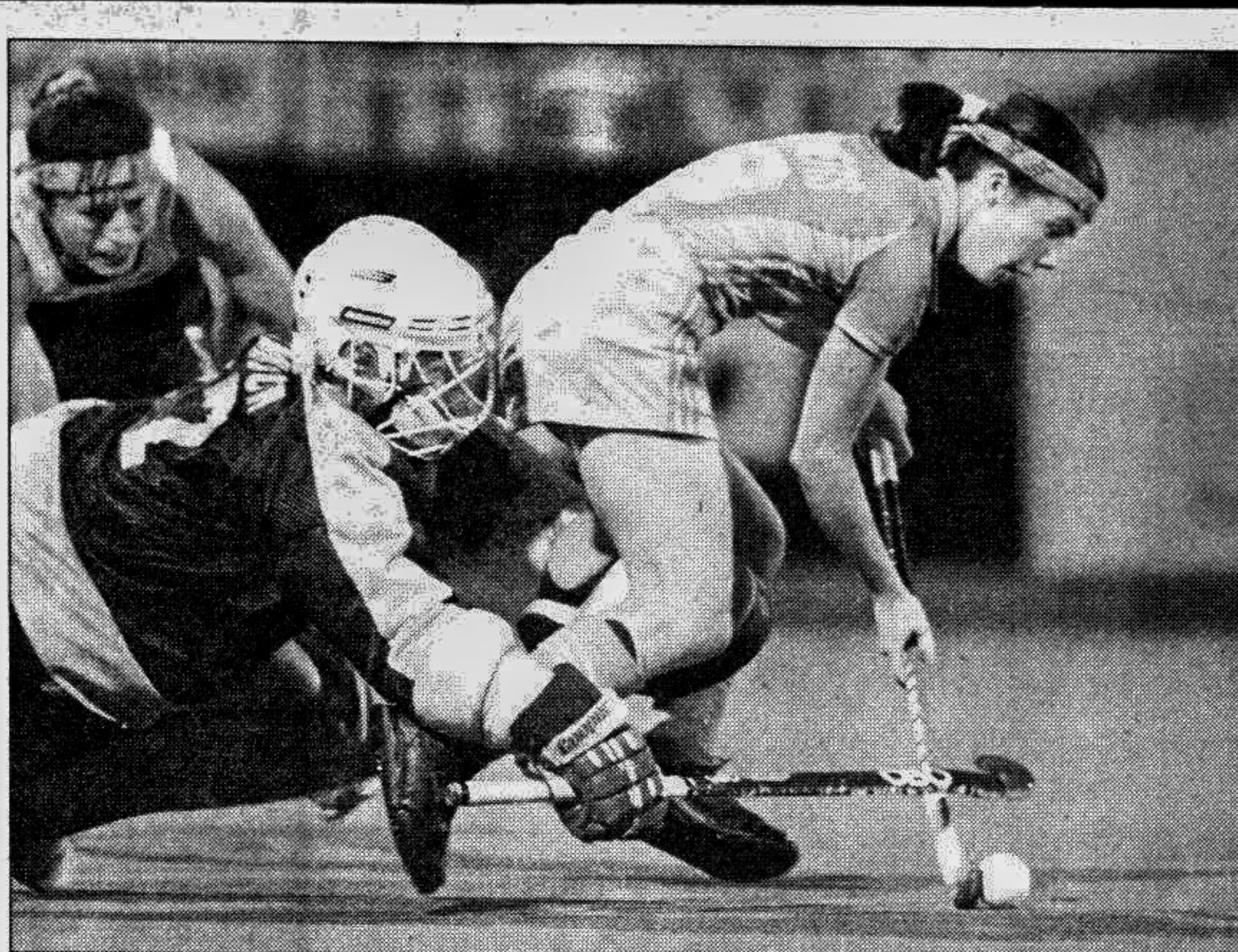
Rezaul Rahman will leave for Hungary tonight and is expected to return on July 2, says a BSWA press release.

Women's WC soccer from tomorrow

NEW YORK, June 17: China and the United States begin a Women's World Cup journey Saturday that could lead to a championship showdown next month between the political rivals, favourites in the 16-team field, reports AFP.

The reigning Olympic champion US team features Mia Hamm, whose 108 international goals make her the sport's all-time scoring leader for men or women, and a huge promotional push to arouse support and sell tickets.

More than 74,000 have been sold for the US-Denmark tournament opener Saturday in East Rutherford, New Jersey. A total of 450,000 tickets have been sold for matches in seven US cities, including the July 10 final.

But the Chinese, featuring goalkeeper Gao Hong, have beaten the US team twice this year. They downed the Americans in Portugal's Algarve Cup final and snapped a 50-game US unbeaten streak on home soil.

China brings back eight players from the team that lost to the US squad in the 1996 Olympic final. They would face 13 of 16 US Olympians if both teams reach the championship game at the Rose Bowl.

In their path are 14 rivals

hoping to upset the favourites and bring glory to themselves on the world stage.

China is the top seed in first round Group D, which also features Ghana, Sweden and Australia, which boosted the Matildas for hosting the Sydney Olympics after their last-place finish at the 1995 World Cup.

Also on their side of the bracket are teams from Group C, which features reigning champion Norway, Canada, Russia and Japan. Injuries have slowed the Norwegians, the Atlanta Olympic bronze medalists.

"We know we can beat the US," Norway coach Per-Mathias Hogmo said. "But I don't want to talk about that because we have a long road to get there."

Japan has improved since a 7-0 loss to the US team May 2 in which Japanese goalkeeper Nozomi Yamago suffered an injured right shoulder. "Gradually, our conditioning is getting better," Japan coach Miyachi Satoshi said. "Yamago looks like she's OK so everything is very positive."

The US team is in group A with Denmark, Nigeria and North Korea, which plays the US team June 27 in a matchup between political foes with

overtones similar to the US-Iran men's match at last year's World Cup.

"It's a means of bridging a gap in a very small way," Women's World Cup president Marla Messing said.

"Sport is always a catalyst for things in a positive way," North Korea Olympic secretary general Ryu Son Il said.

Group B features the tightest first-round matchup with Germany the slight favourite over Brazil with Mexico and Italy rounding out the group. Brazil's women feel the pressure to match the success of their men.

"Like the men, we have great players and have a good team and our country expects us to win. There is a lot of pressure on us to at least make the final," forward Delma Goncalves said.

"I can't imagine playing in front of 75,000 people, but I'm looking forward to it because I will fulfil this crazy dream to be in the World Cup and all the work I have done will be worth it," she said.

Thuram chooses Parma

MILAN, June 17: Parma's French World Cup winning defender Lilian Thuram ended weeks of speculation on Thursday by saying he will stay with the club, rather than join Serie A rivals Inter Milan or Lazio, reports AFP.

Thuram seemed to be heading for Inter after saying that he wanted to play in a big club in front of a crowd of 80,000 people, only for Lazio boss Sergio Cragnotti to wade into the negotiations.

Club president Stefano Tanzi had said all along that he wanted to keep a player widely rated as the world's best defender.

And now the Frenchman has scotched all the transfer talk, telling the Corriere dello Sport in a telephone interview from Paris: "It's all over. I spoke last week with the president, who said I couldn't go."

"I realised then that he admires me as a footballer and as a person. And that's a wonderful thing. There's so much money in football at the mo-

ment, when a club president turns down offers that are four or five times what they paid for you, it means they really want you in the team."

"The way this has all worked out fills me with pride."

As for his comment about the big stadium, Thuram stuck to his guns.

"I don't think that's just my dream, but also that of many footballers," he said. "To play in a legendary stadium such as San Siro must be very stimulating if nothing else."
