### Sharmin first in Science group under Ctg Board



Sharmin likes cricket and Pakistan cricket team is her favourite team in the ongoing World Cup.







"We can reject the allegations as the entire election process was completely free and fair," Pro-VC Prof. Shahadat Ali who was Presiding Officer at the TSC said at a press conference yesterday.

Opposition BNP backed JOP at a press conference in the city on Friday rejected the election results, alleging malpractice and irregularities in the polling.

Ruling Awami League backed Ganatantrik Okiya Parisad (GOP) bagged all the 25 posts of registered graduate representatives to the Senate. JOP, left leaning Progati Parisad (PP) and an 'independent panel' also contested the election but failed to secure any post. Prof. Shahadat alleged that

a certain panel tried to make the election result controversial. "Earlier on Thursday night, another group of people also tried to foil the election." he added.

The DU administration, presiding officers and others who were involved in conducting the election have also "firmly rejected" the allega-

"They (leaders of the JOP) have raised these allegations only to fulfil their petty personal and political interests," the Pro-VC said. Speaking at the press con-

ference, DU Vice-chancellor Prof AK Azad Chowdhury ruled out the possibility of holding a fresh election because it was "free and fair". Terming JOP's allegations

pre-planned and fabricated, the VC said, "They are conspiring to destroy the reputation of the university. "They (JOP) could make their

allegation to the presiding officer without holding a press conterence". Among others, Controller of

Use of dio-amonium phosphate (DAP) rose to 39,000 tonnes in 1998-99 from only 7,000 tonnes in the previous

Urea Super Granular (USG), which was introduced in the country in fiscal 1997-98, became popular among farmers and its use rose to 14.846 tonnes in second year.

The government allowed import of hybrid paddy seed which were used in 40,000 hectares or land in the first year. However, BR-29, an indigenous high yielding variety of rice played the magic. BR-29 covered about two lakh hectares of rice land.

Less pest attack and lessthan-normal seasonal hailstorms came as nature's favour contributing to a good harvest.


