India is willing to accept more 'goods and services' from Bangladesh's 'limited export basket' and a Technical Expert Group will select those.

The two countries also 'agreed on the restoration of multi-modal communication links' between them.

This was stated by Indian Prime Minister Atal Behari Vajpayee at a joint press conference with his Bangladesh counterpart Sheikh Hasina prior to his departure from Dhaka yesterday afternoon after a two-day visit to Bangladesh.

The Indian premier said, "I am aware of the concern in Bangladesh of the need to increase its exports to India. These include elimination of Quantitative Restrictions and deepening of concessions under

Vajpayee however observed, "(But) we need to recognise that Bangladesh's export basket is limited at present, and needs to be augmented by the inclusion of goods and services that are of interest to India."

Besides, he said, "India has accepted in principle the request for duty free access on a

Bangladesh and India yesterday signed two agreements to promote economic and commercial cooperation between the two countries, report agen-

Under the government to government agreement. India will provide Bangladesh a credit of Rupees 200 crore over the next three years.

Referring to Rupees 200 crore agreement, Vajpayee told the newsmen that the credit line would enable supply of transport equipment and capital goods to upgrade infrastructure. in keeping with Bangladesh priorities.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said the utilisation of the credit would be discussed in the Indo-Bangladesh Joint

Economic Commission (JEC) meeting expected to be held early next month. Another agreement was

signed between the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industries (FBCCI) and the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industries (FICCI).

The agreement was signed by President of FBCCI Abdul Awal Mintoo and FICCI President A S Kasliwala at Hotel Sheraton in presence of the prime ministers of both countries.

Under the agreement the two apex chamber bodies have decided to set up a joint chamber to promote economic activities between businessmen and industrialists of the two neighbouring countries.

Parliament passes suppl budget

The Jatiya Sangsad yester-day adopted the Appropriation (Supplementary) Bill, 1999 granting the government an additional amount of Tk 4374 crore 7 lakh and 53 thousand for the 1998-1999 fiscal ending on June 30.

The bill, however, incorporated an amount of Tk 1043 crore 14 lakh and one thousand non-votable account. The rest of the money was granted by voice vote.

Finance Minister S A M S Kibria placed the supplementary budget — along with the budget for 1999-2000 — on June 10 and the House witnessed a two-day general debate on the

supplementary budget.
The opposition MPs moved several hundred cut motions, disapproving a total of 93 demands of grant made by various ministries. But the Chair allowed them to deliberate only on a couple of motions of the foreign ministry and the home ministry, while applying guil-lotine for the rest of the moIn his winding up speech on the supplementary budget, the finance minister told the House

that its size was smaller than those of the government of

Khaleda Zia. Referring to opposition criticism about the government claim of 5.2 per cent economic growth in the current fiscal, the minister said that the estimate was based on data provided by the Bureau of Statistics. "It is a rough estimate based on reports of growth upto April, the min-ister said adding: "The figure might go up further following a

Two murdered in city
