KISHOREGANJ, June 23: One 18-year-old girl has ended her life recently by taking poison at village Kumarpur in Pakundia thana.



GOLAPGANJ, June 23: Erratic power supply here seriously hit the subscribers hampering normal activities in daily life, reports UNB.

Local residents complained that power goes off for at least five to six hours daily. Particularly the children and aged people are worst-hit in the prevailing sultry weather. The condition of patients in the hospital are beyond description, said the sources adding that a generator, given by the government, is yet to be installed. In many cases, emergency operation can not be performed due to power failure threatening the lives of patients. Many small mills and factories are on the verge of closure due to the power problem. Small traders are the worst-hit and the students are also hit badly.

New paddy procurement target a blow to Jamalpur farmers

JAMALPUR, June 23: As paddy growers in the district are not getting fair prices of their products the farmers are resorting to ancient barter system, replacing money as the mode for exchanging goods.

Farmers have attributed the situation to inadequate government intervention in procuring paddy at government fixed prices during the current paddy season, which has witnessed a bumper production, and activities of middlemen with crop markets.

The system has been put into practice in Jamalpur sadar.

maund to Tk 215 under the current paddy procurement drive.

The decision came as a blow to the district's farmers at a time when the government has withdrawn almost all the subsidies from agriculture inputs, said local growers.

As fertiliser prices have been on the increase because of withdrawal of subsidy and absence of fair prices of the products experts apprehend drastic fall in the output of HYV paddy in the next season.

Abdul Karim, a paddy grower of village Binander para under Jamalpur sadar thana, said he

had earmarked only 10 bighas of land for cultivation of HYV paddy for next season against 30 bighas last season.

Farmers in the village told this correspondent that they had already decided to reduce high yielding variety paddy farming, popularly known as irri, in the next season.

Farmers said total expenditure, including labour, fertilisers and irrigation costs, for growing per maund of paddy is about Tk 280 while the current market price of rice is Tk 230 to Tk 240 per maund.

A brilliant result by Pabna boys

PABNA, June 23: School boys of this district have scored an extra-ordinarily brilliant result in the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) examination under the Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education, Rajshahi, this year.

As many as 30 boys and girls from different educational institutions of the district have been placed in the merit list in different groups. There are also some rural educational institutions which earn the glory of good results.

Of these 30 meritorious students, 22 are from Pabna Cadet College. From Pabna Zilla School four examinees obtained places in the merit list of the board. Besides, one female examinee from Pabna Government Girls' High School, one from Santhia Pilot High School, one from Dulai High School and another from Sunanagar Pilot High School scored brilliant results.



Unabated fishing of 'jatka' in Jhalakati

JHALAKATI, June 23: "Rupali Biplob" launched by the government to increase fish production and save fish fry has not made much headway in the district as elsewhere in the country, reports UNB.

Reason: Unabated fishing of special 'jatka' (hilsa fry).

Fishing of 'jatka' and other fry from rivers is strictly prohibited for safe breeding to increase production of fish, the main source of protein. But unscrupulous fishermen are openly engaged in such illegal fishing using current nets.

As per the Fish Resources Preservation Act of 1950, any one fishing or trading fry below nine inches are liable to be punished with two years' imprisonment or a fine of Tk 500 or both.

It is alleged that middlemen trade fry openly violating the law, but no action is taken against them by the concerned officials for reasons unknown.

Production of many local varieties of fish is gradually de-

clining in the region. Tengra, puti, pabda, khaise, cheela, shing, magur and kol have almost vanished from the market giving an abnormal rise to prices, said a fish trader here.

According to the District Fisheries Department, annual fish production in the district is about 6,500 metric tons against the demand of some 9,000 tons.

The government imposed ban in fiscal 1986-87 on the import of current net from Thailand and other countries to save the country's fish resources. But current net is being smuggled into the country from India.

There were some half-hearted attempts by the authorities to bring the violators to book, but without much success.

The district administration and the local Fisheries Department, in separate drives, in Sadar and Nalchit thanas, seized seven current nets worth Tk 70,000 from the Sugandha river on Saturday (June 19).

Hard days for 3,000 'kulus' of Kishoreganj

KISHOREGANJ, June 23: Over 3,000 'kulus' (oilmen) in 13 thanas have been facing hardship to run their bullock-driven 'ghanis' (expellers for edible oil) for lack of adequate funding, reports UNB.

Many such indigenous oil producers were forced to close their mills and turned unemployed. About 1,800 bullock-driven oil expellers used to provide for some 12,000 families here.

There has been a steady decline in the number of such indigenous oil mills as more efficient and cheaper mechanised oil mills are being set up in various parts, including the thana headquarters of Katiadi, Hossainpur, Pakundia, Mithamoin, Itna, Kuliarchar,

Bajitpur, Bhairab, Tarai, Karimganj, Austagram, Nikli and Sadar.

The demand for edible oil produced by 'ghani', once a must for every household, is on the wane with cheaper, imported soybean and palm oil flooding the local markets.

According to sources, Tk 8,000 is needed to operate a bullock-driven 'ghani', but the poor oilmen cannot manage this amount for their own resources.

Some of them are running their 'ghani' taking loan at exorbitant rate of interest from local moneylenders. This raises their cost of production and many were forced to stop operating their 'ghani'.

Telephone subscribers' sufferings increase

MOULVIBAZAR, June 23: Telephone subscribers often suffer due to various problems and shortcomings of the telephone exchanges here, reports UNB.

According to T&T sources, there are 10 telephone exchanges in the district, including the digital exchange at the district headquarter.

Besides, there are analog, CB system and magneto exchanges in the thana headquarters and other important places of the district.

Telephone subscribers suffer mainly due to inadequate maintenance and staff. They alleged negligence and widespread corruption.

Ten card phone booths were installed at different places for providing better telecommunication services to the people, but at present only four are in operation. The other six have gone out of order.

Almost all the exchanges are

running with less than the required number of operators. At the district headquarters, with 1,500 subscribers (digital), there are only 13 posts of operators. Of them, only 10 are now working.

There are 350 subscribers in Srimangal exchange. Only eight operators are working at the exchange.

Recently, the exchange has been expanded with additional 400 lines. Work of the new lines was completed about 10 months ago, but these are yet to be formally inaugurated.

The number of subscribers at Kulaura exchange is 351. Only three of the seven operators are presently working at the exchange.
