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## Opposition yet to finalise road march programme

Opposition alliance is yet to finalise the schedule for its proposed road march, reports UNB.

A meeting of the liaison committee comprising BNP, Jatiya Party, Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Oikya Jote yesterday discussed the issue but could not fix a date for the proposed programme.

The question of current monsoon rain and flash flood came up for discussion. Further consultation will take place to decide whether it would be appropriate to take up the programme like road march which involves both manpower and money," a liaison committee member told the agency.

Sources, however, said that as the movement has slowed down for discontinuation of agitation programmes, some programmes would be taken up to gear up anti-government movement.

As part of the programmes the opposition may lay siege to TV Bhawan and the Home Ministry.

The liaison committee will sit on Monday to finalise the next course of action.

BNP will hold a public meeting at Paltan Maidan tomorrow. Party chairperson Begum Khaleda Zia will address the meeting.

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## Kibria seeks aid from donors for power, energy sectors

Finance Minister SAMS Kibria has sought financial assistance from the donors for development of the country's power and energy sector, reports UNB.

He made the call in a meeting between the government and the World Bank and Asian Development Bank on energy and power sector in the NEC conference room here yesterday.

Ms. Mieke Nishimizu, Vice-President for South Asia region of the World Bank, led the Bank team at the talks.

State Minister for Energy, Power and Mineral Resources Prof Rafiqul Islam was present in the meeting that discussed problems and present situation of power generation, transmission and distribution in the country.

The donor-government meet also focused on the steps to be taken on immediate, mid-term and long-term basis to resolve the problems.

"Power is very crucial for national development," said Kibria giving a resume on various steps taken for improvement of the sector.

Following unusual system loss the donors had once put off funding the sector to press for necessary reform to get rid of the power theft and streamline its management.

Later, a meeting on financial-sector reform in Bangladesh was held here. In the meeting, the Finance Minister briefed the team about the present status of reform programmes in the sector.

Country Director of the World Bank Frederic Temple, Resident Representative of ADB Phipphat Suphaphiphat, ERD Secretary, Finance Secretary, Power Secretary, NBR Chairman and Governor of Bangladesh Bank attended the meeting.

## World Bank sets 'borderline'

# No pvt sector project over 1330mw capacity

The World Bank has asked the government not to pursue any power project with a capacity of more than 1330 MW in the private sector, saying that the country could not afford further power generation in the sector.

The "borderline" for private sector power generation was set at a meeting between visiting World Bank Vice-president Mieke Nishimizu and the Secretary for power on Wednesday, sources said.

The "borderline" was set as a "basic condition" for a 600 million dollar WB loan, promised earlier for a series of unidentified power projects.

In addition, the WB has imposed some other conditions for the loan, to be disbursed over 12 years.

However, the government may ignore the WB condition, the sources said.

World Bank did not give any loan since 1991 and it has virtually no role in the power sector in the country. Now, it is not offering us anything grand. A loan of 600 million dollars over a period of 12 years will not help us bring about any meaningful change in the grim situation. Why should we listen to the World Bank?" said an official.

The 1330 MW borderline means, WB supports the three large-scale power projects (each having 100 to 110 MW capacity), the 450 MW Meghnath project, the 360 MW Haripur project and the 100 MW Baghabari project, the sources

said. "It also means that the World Bank does not unsolicited power projects under the Western Region Integrated Project (WRIP) pursued by Unocal and another by Marubeni," the official said.

The WB calculated that the country was losing 0.5 per cent GDP every year due to power crisis. The DESA and PDB incurred a loss of 150 million dollars in 1998.

Besides the 30 per cent chronic system loss in the power sector, lack of investment is responsible for the prevailing grim situation, the WB says.

"We'll need more than 600 million dollar investments in

## Controversy over death of an accused

A young man drowned in Mirbagh jheel in the city yesterday while trying to escape arrest, police said.

The victim was identified as Shah Mohammad Tuku, 25, son of Abu Taher.

Local people, however, alleged that Tuku fell into the jheel when a police man kicked him.

Denying the allegation, police said that Tuku, an accused in a number of criminal cases, jumped into the jheel when they were about to arrest him.

According to a number of local people, a team of Ramna police in plain clothes went to Mirbagh area at about 11.40 am. Tuku, a resident of the area, along with his accomplices were gossiping at Mirbagh crossing.

Sensing police presence, Tuku and his associates ran helter-skelter to escape arrest

as police chased them.

While others managed to run away, Tuku and his accomplice Polish could not. As policemen continued chasing them, Polish jumped into the jheel while Tuku, tried to hide near the jheel.

But Tuku fell into the jheel when a police man kicked him, according to a number of local people. However, police were able to arrest Polish.

Fire brigade sources said their divers rescued an unconscious Tuku from the jheel after about two hours of the incident.

Tuku was rushed to Holy Family Hospital where the attending doctors declared him dead. Later his body was sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) morgue for autopsy.

Hospital sources said there were minor injury marks on the face and back of Tuku's body.

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## 10 killed as buses collide in N'ganj

NARAYANGANJ, July 3: Ten passengers, including two children and five women, were killed and more than 50 injured in a collision between two buses at Arathazar thana on Dhaka-Sylhet highway today, reports UNB.

The identity of the victims could not be known immediately.

Police said the accident occurred in Palla area at around noon when a Dhaka-bound bus from Sylhet collided with a Narsingdi-bound minibus, killing ten people on the spot.

Of the injured, 30 were rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

The bodies were sent to Narayanganj Hospital morgue for autopsy. A case was filed with Arathazar police.

## DMCH obstetrics dept in shambles

# 15 caesareans a day, only one set of instrument!

The Gynaecology and Obstetrics Department of Dhaka Medical College Hospital has only one set of operation instrument against a requirement of at least 15.

Doctors in most cases keep emergency delivery patients waiting due to lack of required number of caesarean operation sets that consist of at least 22 instruments. Without the equipment, the operation is not possible, they maintained.

Dr Farhana Dewan, a senior consultant with the department, said, "We deal with at least 15 caesareans (operations) a day. The patients have to wait until the single set is ready for use."

caesarean is a process by

which babies are taken out from the uterus by cutting the walls of abdomen.

She added: "If we had another set or two, the operation for the next patient in line would not have to be delayed. Just imagine what would happen if, in case, the instruments were not in place for use. Patients would either die or continue to suffer."

The poor condition of the instruments and the obstetric operation theatres was visible during a visit to the hospital yesterday.

Doctors said they had to take the risk of operating upon emergency patients without having the instruments properly sterilised.

There is no diathermy machine, one of the most essential apparatus to check bleeding during labour. The overhead OT lights had not been working properly. Water supply was irregular. Several doctors and nurses said that they often had to keep reserve water just in case.

The two operation theatres were also in an unhygienic condition. People were wandering around in the "sterilised zone" next to the operation theatre.

The corridor floors were in a shambles with water scattered all over the floor. There was no trace of cleaners around.

"We just put the instruments in boiling water, but ideally the

## BCS exams near but no move yet to approve new rules

Implementation of the proposed new rules in the 21st BCS examination, as scheduled, has become uncertain as the rules are yet to be approved by the Secretariat Committee, highly placed sources said.

The Public Service Commission (PSC) is preparing to start the first phase of the examination from the middle of this month, but the Secretariat Committee headed by Cabinet Secretary Kazi Shamsul Alam is still to sit for scrutiny and approval of the new rules.

Establishment Ministry officials said yesterday that no date was yet fixed for a meeting of the Committee.

The PSC recommended were sent to the Committee in November last year. There was a series of correspondence between the two sides in the previous two years as they differed on some points.

PSC favours 200 marks for viva voce while the Secretariat Committee thinks it should not carry more than 100 marks.

Earlier, the two bodies agreed that candidates both for

technical and general cadres would have to sit for the same written tests in all the subjects.

They also agreed that students who appeared at Degree and Master's examinations could sit for the BCS examination if they submitted certificates stating that they had completed their respective examinations.

Agreement was also reached on raising the average pass marks to 50 per cent from 45 per cent now and that there would be no separate psychological test as the candidates would have to appear at a written test on Mathematical Logic and Psychological Skill.

Despite consensus on almost all the issues, PSC stuck to its earlier position that written tests should carry 800 marks and viva voce 200 marks.

PSC suggested that written examinations in Bangla, English, Bangladesh Affairs, International Affairs, Mathematical Logic, Psychological Skill, General Science and Technology and General Social Science should carry 100 marks each and viva voce 200 marks, the

sources mentioned.

When contacted, a PSC member said, "The proposed rules are aimed at avoiding complexity, reducing time, publishing the results of BCS examinations in a short time and making the examinations more effective for recruitment more efficient civil servants." But realisation of these is being frustrated due to the Secretariat Committee's unusual delay in approving the new rules.

Talking to The Daily Star, PSC Chairman Prof Mostafa Chowdhury said, "We are advertising for the 21st BCS examination this month and it will be held as per the existing rules if the new rules are not passed."

He went on, "I have already reminded the chief of the Secretariat Committee, Kazi Shamsul Alam, to quickly dispose of the matter. But if it takes time, we will go ahead with the present rules."

The committee chief could not be contacted for his comment.

## Their ordeals do not end with death

Authorities of all the graveyards in Narayanganj have refused to allow Jesmin's body to be buried in there. A local non-government social welfare body, Tanzim Association, which takes responsibility of burial of unclaimed bodies, has also refused to take her body for burial.

## BUET reopens today

Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (BUET) reopens today two months after the authorities closed it for an indefinite period following a series of vandalism and terrorist activities.

The dormitories of the university will open for the students at 9 am today while classes will resume tomorrow. The suspended examinations of different terms/levels of different faculties will also begin July 20.

BUET was closed sine die on April 27 following a massive vandalism on the campus on April 25 and 26.

BUET authorities expelled one student for life, three others for four terms with two terms suspended expulsion for their involvement in the vandalism.

The authorities also ordered suspended expulsion of 22 students for varying periods. The decision was taken on the basis of a probe report submitted to the authorities on May 30. BUET authorities, however, did not disclose the names of the expelled students.

Meanwhile, the All-Party Student Union (APSU) threatened to launch a movement on the BUET campus if the authorities failed to reconsider its decision.

APSU, a platform of four student organisations of BUET, has rejected the report of the probe body and demanded a judicial inquiry into the incidents.
