### Rangpur Poura budget announced

RANGPUR, July 12: A Taka 17.86 crore balanced budget of Rangpur Pourasabha for the 1999-2000 fiscal was announced here recently, reports BSS.

Of the budget, Taka 5.17 crore will come from revenue earnings while the rest from government grants. A total of Taka 5.21 crore have been earmarked for revenue expenditures while Taka 1.41 crore for the infrastructure development and Taka 10.02 crore for the second water supply and sanitation project.

MADRIPUR, July 12: A three-day training course on self-employment for the unemployed youths organised by the Bangladesh Small and Cottage Industries Corporation (BSCIC) concluded recently at BSCIC, Kalkini office, reports BSS.

### Demonstration plots for Boro paddy

NETRAKONA, July 12: A total of 46 block demonstration plots for Boro paddy have been set up in 10 thanas this year under the supervision of Netrakona District Agriculture Extension Department, reports BSS.

An official source here said, the demonstration plots were set up to acquaint the farmers on irrigation management, fertiliser use and integrated pest management system. The Agriculture Extension Department supplied seeds, fertilisers, insecticides and other agricultural equipment to the farmers free of cost to set up the demonstration plots.

### Workshop on afforestation

TANGAIL, July 12: A five-day workshop on tree plantation and maintenance of road concluded recently at Madhupur Rani Bhabani High School premises, reports BSS.

Sponsored by the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED), the workshop was inaugurated by S K Chowdhury, Thana Nirbahi Officer, Madhupur. A total of 13 women of the thana participated in the workshop. They were imparted training on the scientific method of planting saplings and maintenance of roads and highways.

### Massive afforestation drive

MEHERPUR, July 12: Afforestation programme has been going on steadily in 18 unions in the current season, reports BSS. A total of 1,20,000 saplings of different varieties will be planted in the district this year, an official source said. Thirteen kilometre rural roads, 15 km feeder road and 10 km roads and highways have been brought under this programme. The Forest Department has raised 2,25,000 saplings of different varieties of fruit-bearing and wooden trees in five nurseries for sale among the people and afforestation under the department in the zone.

### 412 wanted criminals arrested

FENI, July 12: Feni police arrested 412 wanted accused in six thanas during first five months of 1999, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the arrested are accused of various crimes including murder, dacoity, extortion, hijack and theft. A total of 3,291 police warrants were issued by different thanas between January and May. Terrorism has been checked considerably resulting in improvement of law and order situation during the last few weeks.

UNB from Sherpur says: To protect the tiny town from erosion by the river Bhogai and onslaught to recurring floods, a giant project, 'Nalitabari Town Protection Embankment' is underway.

But the construction works on the embankment are being hampered due to a case filed by a contractor against Water Development Board (WDB) concerning irregularities in apportioning contractor.

As per the project profile, undertaken in 1993, a total of 1,200 metres of the embankment were supposed to be constructed at a cost of Tk 2.44 crore.

98 and 1998-99 fiscal years respectively, involving Tk 85 lakh and Tk 77 lakh.

According to competent sources, substandard materials were used in the construction of blocks. On the slope of the riverbank, sand was used instead of brickbats.

They said it's not viable to use sand because it is washed away by the very first flow of water during the monsoon.

Local people said the portion of the embankment, the work of which still remained stopped, is very important for the protection of the town.

Meanwhile, floodwaters poured into the town threatening Nalitabari Madhyabazar and newly set up Shaheed Abdur Rashid Women's College.

is why the loan programme was stopped in 1988.

It is reported that a large number of people from different places under the jurisdiction of this office, are seeking fresh loans for the house building.

But not a single case has been entertained so far following the latest order of the BHBFC, which has very clearly informed that no fresh loan will be given only to the residents of an area where the recovery position of outstanding loans is not at least 40 per cent.

When asked whether any step has been taken by the authority to recover the outstanding loans an official of this office on condition of anonymity told the Daily Star that already 500 cases have been filed with courts for recovery and filing of more cases are in the process.

The chairman of the BHBFC, SM Atiur Rahman, visited Jessor recently and met the local elite, defaulter loanees and press men to exchange views on improving the loan recovery position and make the fresh loans available.

## House building loan programme remains suspended for 11 yrs

JESSORE, July 12: House building loan programme by Bangladesh House Building Finance Corporation (BHBFC) has remained suspended in greater Jessor for the last 11 years, aggravating the housing problem in the region.

The suspension decision was taken by the authority in view of chronic non-recovery of the loans worth taka 28 crores, of which sources said.

According to official source, the Regional Office of the BHBFC, was set up here to feed the interests of Jessor, Jhenidah, Magura and Narail people in 1975.

This office started its operation in greater Jessor. A total of taka 31 crores were disbursed among 1200 loanees by this office.

Rules and regulations were not followed while disbursing loans. So taking advantage of these loop holes, the loanees changed the purpose of the loan and invested it elsewhere including the business other than house building. This practice of the loanees created problem for its recovery.

According to official statistics, the outstanding loans stand at taka 28 crores and that

## Tale of an unfortunate death

FARIDPUR, July 12: Who is responsible for the death of Kamal Sheikh, 32, a bus driver?

Kamal Sheikh, an undertrial prisoner, died on June 25 of burn injuries he received when he set himself on fire in prison hospital on June 19.

Kamal Sheikh, son of one Shahabuddin Sheikh of village Banjanbandh on the outskirts of the town, was arrested allegedly by mistake for his alleged involvement in the sensational Muksed murder case on March 21 this year.

It was alleged that Kamal Sheikh was not the same Kamal whose name was included in the FIR lodged with Kotwali thana in connection with Muksed murder case.

Kamal Sheikh, however, several times prayed for bail during the last three months. But he could not receive.

Finally Kamal Sheikh developed insanity. Jail authorities then sent him to jail hospital where he set himself on fire in a bid to commit suicide.

He was immediately rushed to Faridpur General Hospital and later he was referred to Dhaka Medical College Hospital following the deterioration of his condition.

After fighting death for five days Kamal Sheikh finally succumbed to his burn injuries.

When body was carried to Faridpur town on June 27, gloom descended on the town dwellers, especially on the working class people.

People in their hundreds brought out a mourning procession in the town carrying the dead body.

The processionists went berserk and pelted brick-bats at the offices of Deputy Commissioner and Superintendent of Police.

However, the situation was brought under control with the help of local leaders and high officials.

Later, the processionists held a rally on Janata Bank square here demanding exemplary punishment to those responsible for this unfortunate death.

One man committee, however, was formed to investigate into the incident.

## Declining trend in using bridge

### Revenue earning from Bangabandhu Bridge falls

SIRAJGANJ, July 12: The number of vehicles crossing Bangabandhu Bridge has reduced remarkably in the recent weeks for various reasons, bringing down its revenue earning, reports BSS.

Official sources said during the last one year ending on June 23, a total 8,17,000 vehicles used the bridge and the authorities earned about Tk 50 crore in revenue.

The officials, who insisted not to be named, said the number of vehicles using the bridge declined in the months of August, September, October and November due to the last year's devastating flood. Many roads were damaged by the floodwaters.

With the overall improvement of the flood situation, traffic movement on the bridge started to increase and it returned to normal during the months of December 1998 and January, February and March this year.

The highest number of vehicles, about one lakh, crossed the bridge in March this year.

But in April, May and June, the number of vehicles again showed a down trend due to transport strike in the northern region of the country, contributing to the fall of revenue earning.

Officials said the overall use of the bridges is less than their expectation.

They also attributed the declining trend in using the bridge to internal conflict between transport owners and workers, extortionism at various places and substantial increase in water level of the River Jamuna.

They said many vehicles are now passing through Aricha ferry ghat as the ferry services have now become smoother with the increase in water level of the river. Besides, the ferry fare is much lower than the toll of the Jamuna Bridge, they added.

Apart from these, some drivers opt out the route due to deplorable condition of Tangail-Gazipur road.
