

### Katich gets the nod Warne chosen for both

SYDNEY, July 13: Spin maestro Shane Warne was included in both the Australian Test and one-day cricket squads named Tuesday for the August-October tours of Sri Lanka and Zimbabwe, reports AFP.

Warne only confirmed his availability last Friday after returning from the World Cup in England expressing doubts about his international future.

The leg spinner was dropped from Australia's Test team on their tour of the West Indies in April, but returned to form with a vengeance at the World Cup finishing with 20 wickets, top equal with New Zealander Geoff Allott, and being named man of the match in Australia's rout of Pakistan in the final.

The two surprises in the 15-man test squad announced by the Australian Cricket Board Tuesday are West Australian batsman Simon Katich and Queensland opener Matthew Hayden.

"This was every young cricketers dream, but it's the last thing I thought would happen," Katich, 23, said.

The selection of left-hander was foreshadowed last week, however, when he was beneficiary of an Australian Cricket Board contract worth a minimum 65,000 dollars (43,000 US).

Captain Steve Waugh and the three-man panel requested the ACB blood a young player as 15th man and Katich has the goods following his 1,039 first-class runs at 61.12 last season.

Katich said he hopes to use the tours to Sri Lanka and later Zimbabwe from August 16 to October 25 as a learning experience.

Hayden, who is playing county cricket in England, takes the place of Victorian opener Matthew Elliott, who was dumped off the contracted player list last week.

Elliott, recalled in February when Mark Taylor retired, had a wretched tour of the West Indies and was dropped for the final Test in Antigua.

Australia play four one-dayers in Sri Lanka followed by three Tests, before flying to Zimbabwe for an inaugural Test and three one-dayers.

### WWC final China allege unfairness

SHANGHAI, July 13: US goalkeeper Briana Scurry made the penalty shoot-out save that decided the Women's World Cup championship through a deliberate rule violation, the official Shanghai News daily charged Tuesday, reports AFP.

It ran time sequence photographs of the crucial save alongside the article and quoted a US newspaper interview in which Scurry allegedly admitted guilt.

"The United States depended on goalkeeper Briana Scurry's save of Liu Ying's penalty shot to become champions," the Shanghai News said.

"But television cameras showed Scurry had already left the goal line to charge forward before Liu Ying kicked the ball."

The US won the World Cup final against China 5-4 on penalties Tuesday before a roaring home crowd that included President Bill Clinton after the two sides battled to a scoreless draw.

In the photographs, Scurry is shown forward of the line crossing the goal mouth while China's Liu was still in the run-up for her penalty shot.

Goalkeepers must remain in position on the line until the moment a penalty kick is struck.

The penalty for the foul is that a penalty be retaken, a former international referee based in Hong Kong, Wu Jian, was quoted as saying.

Scurry was quoted as saying in Sunday's Los Angeles Times that she broke the rule as part of a calculated gamble, the Shanghai News said.

## Still it haunts Ronaldo

PARIS, July 13 (AFP): As France celebrates the first anniversary of their World Cup victory, Brazil striker Ronaldo said Monday he had a 'sad memory' after being made the scapegoat for his team's 3-0 final defeat at the hands of the host nation.

With French TV schedules producing endless anniversary programmes and even re-transmitting the final in its entirety, Ronaldo was one of many key players interviewed by France 2 channel.

What happened to Ronaldo on the day of the final is still shrouded in mystery and the controversy surrounding his performance even eclipsed the match-winning display of France playmaker Zinedine Zidane.

Speaking from Paraguay where he is playing in the Copa America, Ronaldo told France 2 that the fit had 'disturbed his concentration'.

However, the 22-year-old added: "The medical tests showed I was fully fit to play in the match. The decision to play

was a joint decision with the technical staff and I had the last word."

The player denied Brazil's sponsors Nike had influenced the decision, saying: "The sponsors did not have the possibility of going in the dressing rooms at that time."

Asked to explain the team's defeat the Brazilian said: "We did not concentrate as we should have done. The outcome, after Zidane's first goal, was practically settled. The team never got back in the match, it did not play well. Without taking any credit away from France Brazil did not really look like scoring."

He conceded that the World Cup was a 'sad memory'.

Ronaldo had been billed as the tournament's star player months before and during the World Cup and on the day of the final the scene seemed to be set for the Inter Milan striker to be crowned the king of world football.

But when the team sheets were handed out 45 minutes before the final the world press was stunned to see that Ronaldo had been omitted by coach

Mario Zagallo.

As the news was beamed around the world to shocked fans a second team sheet appeared with Ronaldo's name on it. He played but was clearly out of sorts and eventually he was substituted.

It later emerged that Brazilian defender Roberto Carlos had gone to his bedroom in the early afternoon of the day of the final to discover his room-mate in the midst of convulsions.

Initially some of his team-mates thought the striker was dying.

The player was transported in high secrecy to a Paris clinic and turned up at the Stade de France after Zagallo had handed in his team sheet.

Even though it was clear that Ronaldo was not himself during the game and despite the later revelations he had suffered a fit he was scapegoated by many Brazilian fans for the defeat.

He was jeered by fans in some of the early Copa America games but now -- as top scorer and with Brazil in the last four -- he seems to have won back the hearts of some of the world's most demanding football fans.

### Confederations Cup Luxemburgo gives rookies a chance

FOZ DE IGUAZU, Brazil, July 13/Reuters/Internet): Brazil announced on Monday that they would rest several top players for the Confederations Cup, which begins later this month in Mexico.

Strikers Ronaldo and Amoroso, full-backs Cafu and Roberto Carlos and midfielder Rivaldo were all given time to rest and prepare for the next European season.

Instead, coach Wanderley Luxemburgo opted to bring in younger players including uncapped goalkeeper Renato, striker Warley, defender Luis Alberto and left-back Athirson.

The squad was announced in the border town of Foz de Iguaçu, where Brazil have based themselves for the Copa America in neighboring Paraguay.

Brazil, who beat Argentina 2-1 in their quarter-final on Sunday, only cross into Paraguay across the Parana river to play their games and then return immediately.

They face Mexico in their semifinal on Wednesday.

### Granada, Liverpool strike deal

LIVERPOOL, July 13: Granada, a British media company, bought a 22-million-pound (35 million dollars) stake Tuesday in the Liverpool soccer club, reports AP.

In what both sides described as a 'ground-breaking strategic partnership', Granada acquired a 9.9 per cent share in the famous club.

A joint statement said Granada purchased 'new shares created by Liverpool' and that David Moors was not selling any of his shares.

The statement said 20 million pound (32 million dollars) would go toward strengthening the team through the signing of new players. The remaining 2 million pounds (3.2 million dollars) will be invested in a soccer academy.

### Gough on way back

LONDON, July 13: England paceman Darren Gough made a surprise comeback for Yorkshire when he was included in their side for Tuesday's County Championship match with Warwickshire at Edgbaston, reports AFP.

Gough was back ahead of schedule after nearly a month out of action with a calf tendon injury which caused him to miss the first Test with New Zealand on the same ground two weeks ago.

There were weekend reports that Gough would be eased back into action via a second-team game with Worcestershire at Kidderminster on Wednesday.

But he underwent a fitness test on Monday and was named in the Yorkshire line-up after feeling no reaction.

Gough came back from England's early exit from the World Cup and played for Yorkshire in a National League clash with Hampshire and a Championship match with Sussex.

But news of his injury was announced on the day before the World Cup final - on June 19 - after he had failed to appear in the National League clash with Essex.

His return will be a boost to England skipper Nasser Hussain, who has said that Gough will play in the second Test at Lord's if the country's leading strike bowler proves his fitness.

But it could also provide Hussain with a selection headache after the success of Alex Tudor in the first-Test win.

## Tug-of-Anelka continues

LONDON, July 13: English Premier League side Arsenal are prepared to call Lazio's bluff and keep French international striker Nicolas Anelka if the Italian Serie A club do not significantly increase their 20 million pounds offer (34 million dollars) for the player, reports AFP.

Arsenal still want to keep Anelka despite his evident dissatisfaction with life in London -- and firm indications by his unofficial agents, brothers Claude and Didier, that he would be prepared to go on strike if forced to honour his five-year deal.

Lazio president Sergio Cragnotti said: "I will be making a new offer to Arsenal for Anelka tonight (Monday)."

"We will make a small improvement to the offer but it will be our final offer and if that is not accepted by tomorrow night (Tuesday) we will leave the negotiating table."

Cragnotti, who is expected to increase his offer to 40 million dollars, told the Italian press: "Tuesday we'll get the definitive answer."

Weekend talks here between Cragnotti and Arsenal's influential vice-chairman David Dein and his French coach Arsene Wenger failed to bridge the gap, with the Gunners looking

for nearly 50 million dollars and Lazio, the Cup Winners' Cup holders, offering 34 million dollars.

But Dein, who conducts most of the club's transfer business, is confident Lazio's Serie A rivals Juventus would still top the Roman club's 'final offer'.

Although the Italian press claim that the major obstacle is Juventus, Cragnotti said: "Arsenal haven't talked to me about Juventus. So, for me, Juventus are not a problem."

The reality of the situation is that Arsenal have good negotiators, who are trying to get the most they can from the sale. Obviously, they want more.

"We will make a small improvement to the offer. But it won't just be a question of money. It will be something a bit more articulated," he said, without giving details.

As for Lazio's future, the club's owner claims that with the 20-year-old French ace: "It will all the same be a great Lazio team. With Anelka, the team will be in the spotlight, and seen as the one to beat."

Cragnotti needs to replace Christian Vieri, who he sold to Inter Milan for nearly 50 million dollars last month, as the team's centre-forward for next season.

Narrowly beaten to the league title by AC Milan on the final day of last season, Vieri's contribution was crucial in the closing months.

### Chile's no to venue shifting

wicket full of runs, our boys gave away their wickets. None of them got out playing defensively. In other words, the bowlers did not earn the wickets. They were given away. In spite of early order debates, we still managed to score 175 odd runs.

Against Scotland, from 25 for 5, we scored 182. It only goes to show that if our batting was properly planned and the boys applied themselves, 220-240 was not an impossible target to reach.

The boys need to think about their batting - each and every stroke they have played in the previous innings, specially the one they played that got them out has to be reflected upon, mistakes identified and corrected in the next innings.

The match against Pakistan was extraordinary. Given the next 7 games, Pakistan will probably win them all. If one looks at the game and cuts it up into segments, one will easily realise that the Pakistanis were never in the game. From the very start, our boys were in the driving seat.

It was the best opening start in the World Cup against the host Pakistan. Initially shaky but in the end, very effectively we totalled 223. It is not that the Pakistan attack comprising of Shoaib Akhtar, Waqar Younis and Wasim Akram bowled too badly. On the contrary, had our openers been accomplished players (sometimes, it pays not to be the best), many a delivery from the 'Rawalpindi Express' Waqar and Wasim would have got the outside edge and many a fine player would have got out. But

as the saying goes, "fortune shines on the brave" and our opening duo played with their hearts. Mr. Extras for Pakistan also did not help to their cause.

Moreover, I failed to understand why Wasim Akram continued to bowl without a guilty throughout the opening spell thus leaving a gap that was utilised very well. Pakistan's folly was Bangladesh's joy.

But in spite of all, both our openers Shoaib and Mehrab fought fire with fire and came out unscathed as they set up the opening partnership that laid the foundation for the total. At times they even took the attack to the bowlers. Akram picked up the flow and played an extremely valuable knock that consolidated the middle order.

Pakistan never thought in their wildest dream that the 'babes' of the tournament would rout them. I thought the critical wicket to fall was that of Saeed Anwar when he was run out. Had he stuck, the match would have been an easy one for Pakistan. After his loss, Pakistan was never in the game even though some say that the Moin Khan's wicket may have been the vital one.

At that point, it was not a very easy wicket to bat on. With the ball holding a bit it was not the best type of wicket for stroke players. Moreover, our bowling was accurate and our fielding 'par excellence'.

Simply put, our boys did their basics right on the field and gained by the recklessness of the Pakistanis. Martin Crowe, former Test Player from New Zealand had stated that the Pakistanis had got the World Cup is their arrogance. He could

not have stated more accurately.

Our bowling needs to be improved. What is lacking in speed must be accomplished by accurate bowlers who can bowl good second spells. Hasibul (Shanto) simply does not have a second spell. He tries to bowl fast and, therefore, is unable to bowl a proper line and length. As a result, he is invariably expensive in the second spell. The spinners are average with perhaps, Rafiq a bit ahead of the others. Our bowlers lack penetration and this will come as we play the days ahead. The fast bowlers need to be beefed up -- up so that they can be stronger. They should seriously get into some serious weight training and endurance programs. Just take a look at the legs and shoulders of Shoaib Akhtar, Wasim Akram, Waqar Younis, Ian McGrath and Co. All their power comes from their legs and shoulders.

The fielding was better than expected as they all fielded with puppy like eagerness. The matches we won were an outcome of some high class fielding. Superb catching combined with some brilliant run outs helped our team to notch the victories. The run out Bulbul got against Pakistan was absolutely fascinating.

All is all, it was a triumph of hope and ambition over an unfamiliar level of excellence as well as unfamiliar conditions.

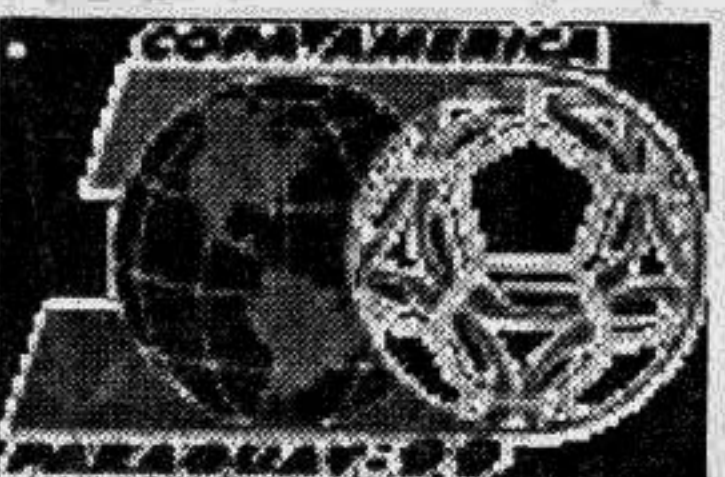

## Argentina looking forward



"I have seen things here which will be useful for the future," was about all that could be extracted from the monosyllabic Bielsa, who comes from a family of lawyers, after the 2-1 loss to Brazil.

Certainly, he will have to go back to the drawing board as far as free kicks and penalties are concerned. Argentina won four kicks on the edge of the Brazil area early in the second half of Sunday's game and wasted all of them. They also contrived to miss all four penalties they took in the competition.

Goalkeeper German Burgos, given his chance after first choice Carlos Roa quit the game to become an evangelical priest, had an inconsistent tournament, starting well against Ecuador and finishing poorly against Argentina.

He should, however, keep his place with Bielsa reluctant to repeat the last World Cup qualifying campaign when coach Daniel Passarella used five different goalkeepers.

The defense, in which Walter Samuel, Roberto Ayala and Juan Pablo Sorin were ever present, improved with every game and is likely to be kept intact. Against Brazil, they were largely successful in keeping strikers Ronaldo and Amoroso under wraps, Ronaldo in particular seeing most of his attempts to run past defenders end in him losing the ball.

In front of the defense, Javier Zanetti proved himself the most European of players with his non-stop running, while the hugely competitive

Diego Simeone found himself in an unusual role in the middle of midfield. He also lost the captaincy to Ayala after a vote by the players.

"I'm as sad as I would be losing to any other team," he said. "Going out of a competition always leaves you sad and upset."

The problems began in the last third of the field.

Boca Juniors' Guillermo Barros Schelotto was inconsistent, and when Ariel Ortega replaced him against Brazil, having completed a three-match suspension dating from the last World Cup, he concentrated his efforts on falling over and trying to win free kicks.

Juan Riquelme, 20, from Boca Juniors showed he has the style, if not yet the maturity, to control the midfield and certainly stays on his feet longer than Ortega.

In attack, all eyes were on the cumbersome-looking Palermo, finally given a chance after helping his club Boca Juniors win both championships in the last Argentine season.

He began brilliantly with two goals against Ecuador. Then, in his own words, became a nobody after missing three penalties against Colombia. In the next game against Uruguay, he was on the scoresheet again and also received a nasty black eye.

Against Brazil, his limitations were exposed as he was marked out of the game. He is unlikely to get another chance once the likes of Crespo, Batistuta and Lopez return.

## Trist named new NZ coach



CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand, July 13: David Trist will replace Steve Rixon as New Zealand cricket coach when the team's tour of England concludes next month, New Zealand Cricket announced Tuesday, reports AP.

Rixon and manager John Graham, who were appointed in 1996, chose not to renew their contracts after the English tour. Trist, who has coached extensively in New Zealand, South Africa, the Netherlands, and Hong Kong, will assume control from Rixon. The manager's job will be filled by Jeff Crowe, who was captain of New Zealand in six Tests before his seven-year international career ended in 1990.

The first assignment for Trist and Crowe is to guide the New Zealand side on its tour of India starting in October before home series against the West Indies and Australia.

Trist, 51, was widely tipped to secure the job from a list of candidates understood to include former New Zealand players John Wright, John Bracewell and Dipak Patel, as well as former Canterbury coach Denis Aberhart.

A former medium-pacer who played three matches for New Zealand on a tour to India and Pakistan in 1969, Trist did not play a Test.

His coaching experience includes spells with Canterbury and Auckland. He helped guide Eastern Province to win the Castle Cup title in South Africa during a spell there from 1993 to 1995, and coached the Netherlands from 1995 to 1997 during which time they gained entry to the World Cup.

He was director of coaching in Hong Kong in 1998 before being enticed back to New Zealand to coach Auckland last year.

Trist said he is looking forward to taking the team to India where his goal is to win the test and limited-overs series.

"Quite clearly, it's a big ask going to India, but it's not insurmountable," he said. "My only real area of concern is when we start getting beaten

badly. I'm not a big fan of that and nor do I want to see it."

Trist will become the sixth New Zealand coach in seven years.

Auckland agreed to release Trist from the final two years of his contract so he could take on the role with the national side.

New Zealand Cricket chief executive Chris Doig said it's difficult for a national sports team to change coach and manager at the same time.

"We were looking for a combination of expertise and experience to cover the full range of coaching and administrative demands," said Trist.

Crowe's presence helps make up for Trist's inexperience as a player at the highest levels.

Crowe, 41, played 39 Tests and represented Auckland from 1983 to 1992 after earlier playing 36 games for South Australia state.

Since retiring from cricket, Crowe has operated a sports management and event company. He was this year appointed to the board of New Zealand Tennis.
