Abahani run off with important win

Referee makes Muktis fume

Abahani Krira Chakra bounced back into the title race with a lone-goal win over Muktijoddha Sangsad Krira Chakra in a crucial Keya Premier Football League match at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Iqbal, the hard-working national midfielder, scored the all-important goal in the very first minute of the battle between the two domestic biggies where adrenaline was running high.

The league's fastest goal also ended Muktijoddha's seven-match unbeaten run. But not before a sickly exhibition of barbarism in which the belligerent players kicked and punched referee Golam Mostafa after he ruled out their 60th minute 'equaliser' with a belated off-side call.

Although the clash of the giants got off to a wonderful start in front of a strong 25,000 crowd at the big bowl, the match eventually ended on a sour note because of a bad ruling by the man in uniform.

The match was suspended for about five minutes in the second half when the aggrieved Muktijoddha booters first swooped on Golam Mostafa, who cancelled Masud Rana's volley into the upper right-hand corner of the net, and then walked off the ground in protest against the offside ruling.

Although the linesman at the western end raised the flag on time, it took him more than half-a-minute to draw the attention of an apparently 'blind' Mostafa and that too after a fair attempt by Masud Rana. Muktijoddha for obvious reasons felt wronged, but their reaction can not be condoned.

This was not the only occasion that Mostafa's sub-standard refereeing had made news. His bizarre ruling throughout the match had effectively created an explosive environment on the terrace. Thankfully, the tense situation did not take any ominous turn, perhaps because the Muktijoddha supporters were few in numbers.

Mostafa's refereeing only epitomised the dwindling condition of our overall football. The 'spineless' man-in-black, however, did not forget to put the dubious 'check and balance' trick into practice when he showed a token yellow card to Mukti's Arif Khan Joy—a perfect scapegoat indeed.

Moreover, Mostafa's wayward approach towards tough tackling also cost Abahani dearly as the sky blues painfully watched their two Ghanaian booters being carried off the ground after sustaining severe injuries.

Opuju, who failed to impress the Dhaka crowd in his maiden appearance, left the field with a dislocated shoulder after being harshly treated by Muktijoddha's Nigerian recruit Aliyu Rahman. Surprisingly though, the stocky Nigerian was not even cautioned by the referee for the cynical tackle on Opuju.

Benin, the other Ghanaian in the team, also faced the same fate in his first appearance, forcing Abahani to a double-change midway through the second half.

Apart from Mostafa's part in the play, it was Muktijoddha who enjoyed a territorial dominance over Abahani. They got more chances than Abahani in both the halves, but Aminul, who was unconquered under the bar, kept them at bay with some spectacular saves.

Iqbal did steal the limelight with a powerful grounder, which found the right-hand corner of the net past a shaky Biplob, but it was Aminul who fought alone against an all-out Muktijoddha to confirm the popular Dhanmondi outfit's fifth win in the League.

The national custodian came to Abahani's rescue in the 36th minute when he splendidly saved a Jewel Rana header from close. Jewel made a second

attempt from the rebound, but this time Iqbal blocked the goal-bound shot for a corner.

Aminul's brilliance came to play again five minutes later when he clung on to an Aliyu freekick from the top of the box.

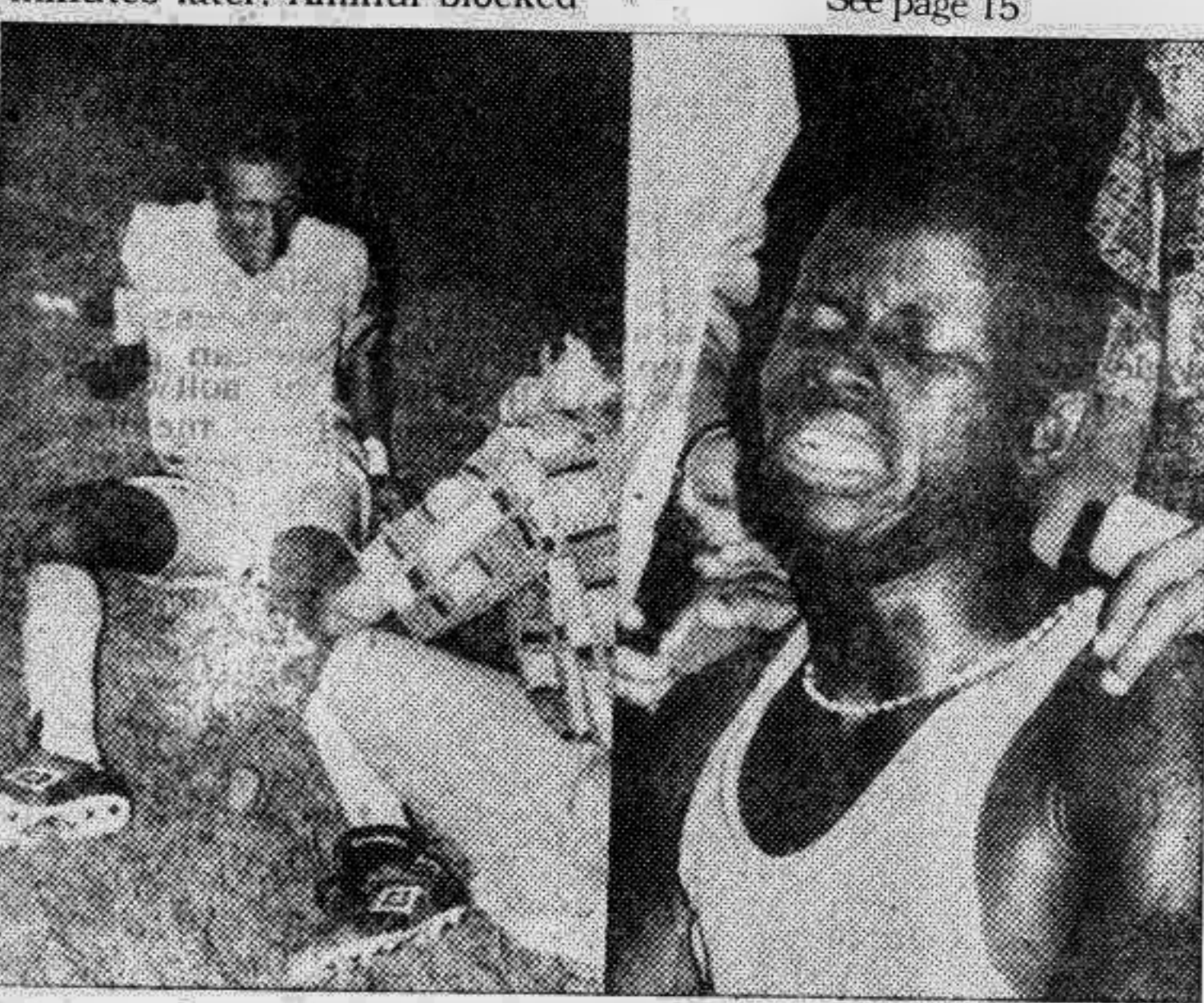
Muktijoddha came up with more vigour in the second half, but Aminul was not ready to resign without a fight. He fisted away a Jewel Rana header for a corner in the 78th minute. Six minutes later, Aminul blocked

a scorching right-footer from Nakib.

Muktijoddha's hopes for even a draw were well and truly over when Abahani's central defender Kingshuk saved Liton's powerful shot from goal-line at the stroke of the final whistle.

With this win Abahani improved their points tally to 17 from eight matches while Muktijoddha remained glued to

LONDON, July 25: New Zealand levelled the series against England on Sunday when they won the second Test at Lord's by nine wickets.

It was the Kiwis' first Test match success at the home of cricket and they now go to Old Trafford for the third Test on August 5 level at 1-1 in the four-match contest.

England will be without captain Nasser Hussain for that match after he missed the second innings at Lord's after breaking a finger.

In Hussain's absence England mustered just 229 in their second innings, setting New Zealand a paltry target of 58 to win.

Matthew Bell duly knocked off the runs to spark wild celebrations among the Kiwi contingent.

England, who had managed 186 in their first innings, to New Zealand's 358, had resumed on Sunday on 107 for four.

Ban slapped on Pak trio



KARACHI, July 25 (Reuters/Internet reports): A top Pakistan cricket official said on Sunday that the captain of the national team,

Wasim Akram, and two other players would not be selected pending the completion of a probe into allegations of match fixing.

Mujeeb Rehman, chairman of the ad hoc committee of the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB), told Reuters from Islamabad that the bar applied to Akram, Ijaz Ahmad and Salim Malik.

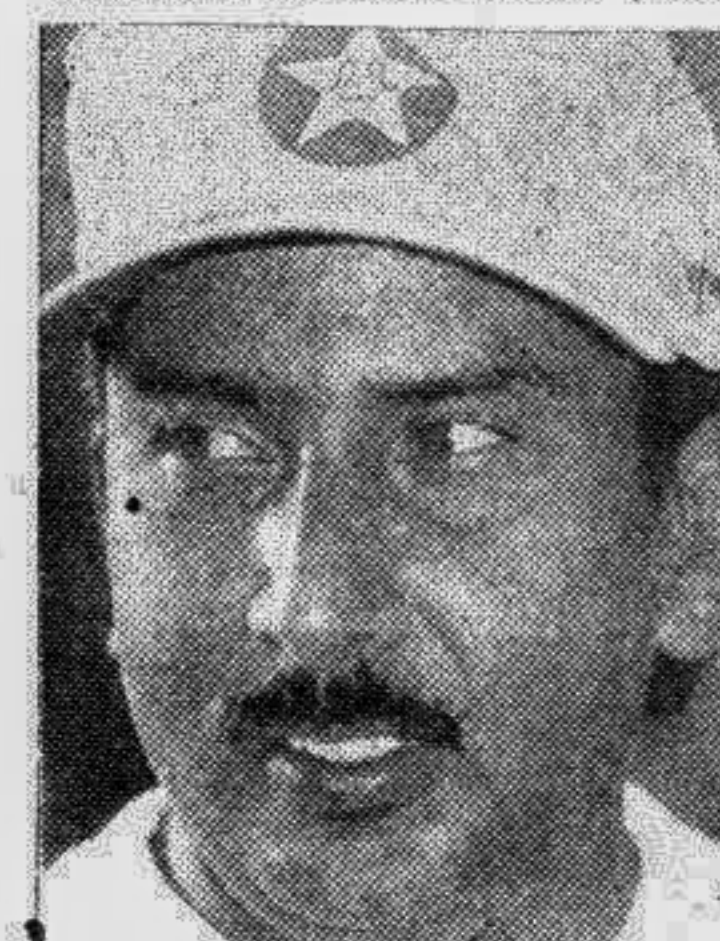
"They will not be considered for selection in the coming season," he said.

Rehman added: "Until the investigation as to whether they are really involved in corruption or not is completed, they will not be available for selection."

His statement followed the disclosure of a report by Pakistan government's anti-corruption team on Saturday that alleged involvement of captain Wasim Akram and other play-

ers in match-fixing, the official APP news agency said.

The allegations by the Ehtesab (Accountability) Bureau (EB), were based on a confidential report drawn up for the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB)

Final wasn't fixed, says IB report

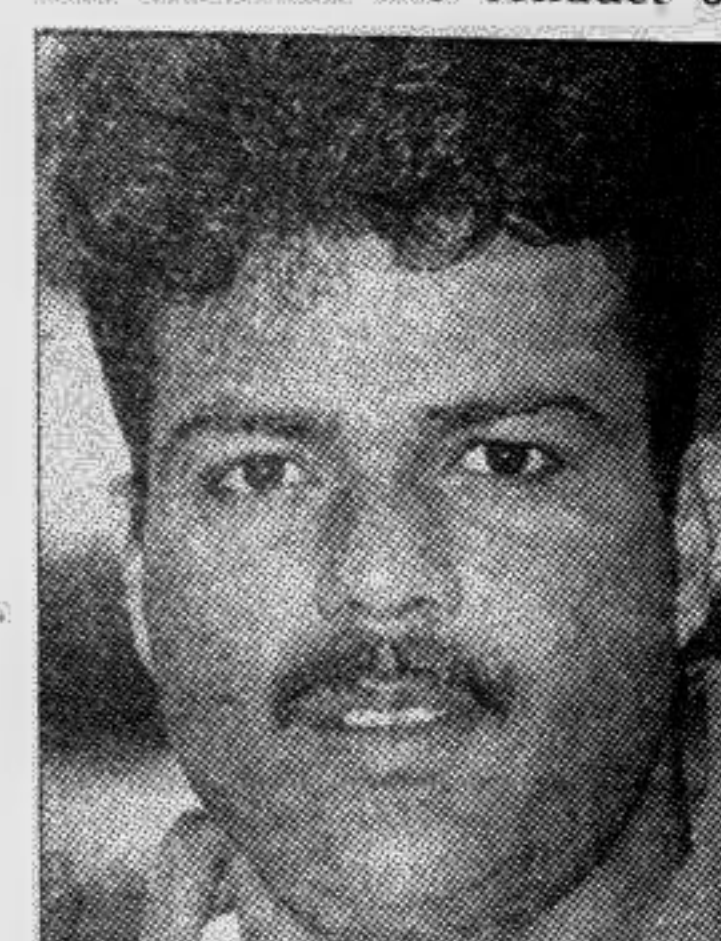
KARACHI, July 25 (Internet report): The Intelligence Bureau (IB) have forwarded their report on the Pakistan cricket team's activities during the World Cup in England to the Ehtesab Bureau (EB), with no evidence being found of the final being fixed," says a report of The News.

Quoting well-placed sources the newspaper reported that the IB had sent four officers to England to monitor the activities of the squad during the

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almost one year ago.

APP made no reference to an earlier story it had issued saying that Akram had been formally charged but made public for the first time allegations to the PCB on the conduct of

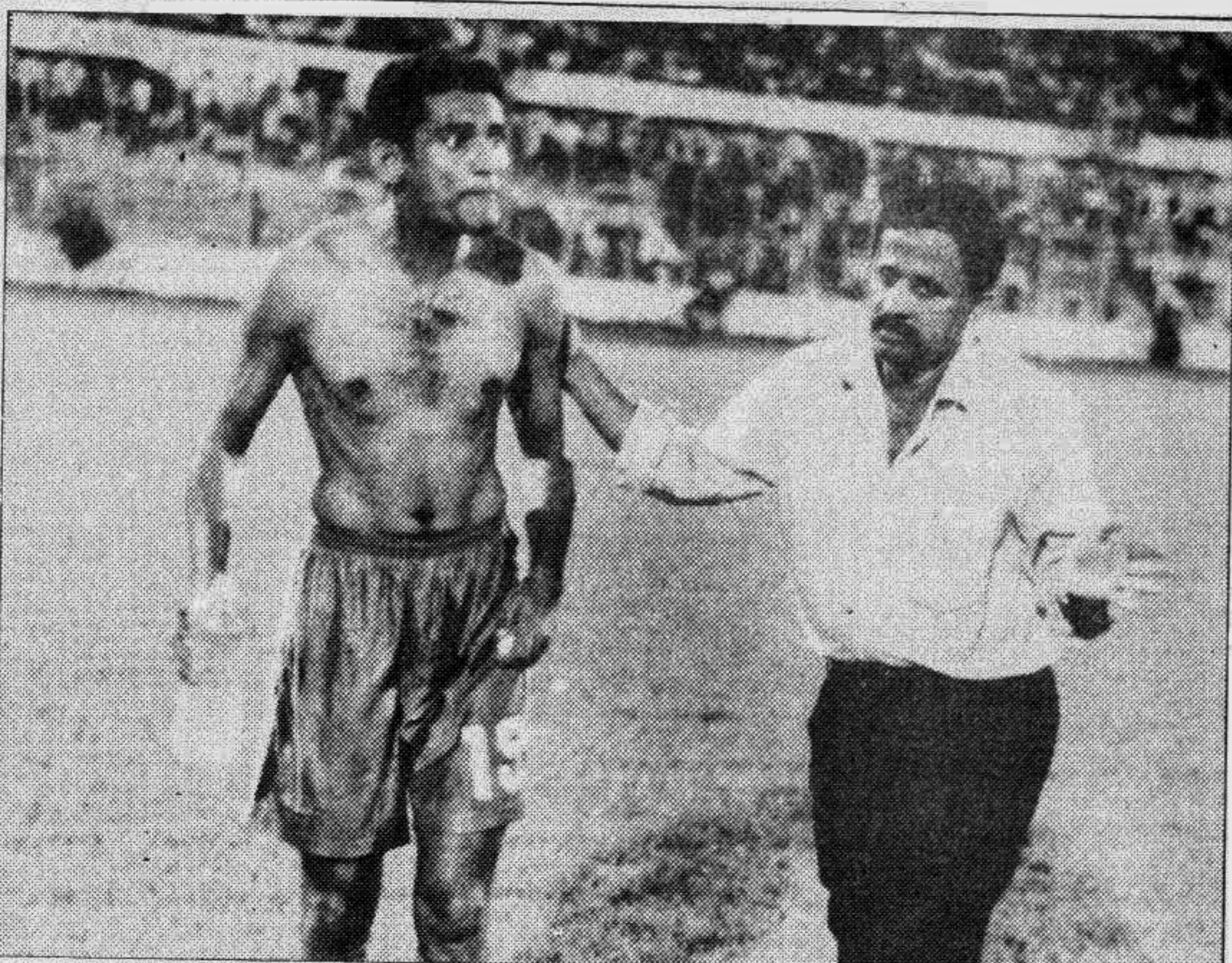
Akram. All the allegations, including ones relating more recently to the World Cup, have always been consistently and strongly denied by players concerned.

APP reported: "Under the first count, he (Akram) was charged with conspiring to fix the one-day international against New Zealand at Christchurch on March 16, 1994."

"The second charge against (Wasim) Akram is that he purposely lost the Sahara Cup match against India in Toronto (Canada) on September 17, 1996."

The report for the PCB followed claims of foul play over a six-year period and also named vice-captain Moin Khan, Salim Malik, Ijaz Ahmad, Inzamamul Haq, Mushtaq Ahmad, Waqar Younis and Saqlain Mushtaq.

Wasim can't believe it



LONDON, July 25 (AFP/Internet reports): Pakistan captain Wasim Akram today emphatically refuted claims of match-fixing and insisted: "I have done nothing wrong."

A judicial inquiry has been set up in Pakistan to investigate allegations that players were involved in fixing matches and Wasim plans to return home next week to "sort this out".

It had been claimed that

Pakistan deliberately lost the World Cup final against Australia at Lord's last month.

Wasim, commenting for Channel 4 on the second Test between England and New Zealand, said: "It is a long story. I think what has happened is that in Pakistan sport has a lot to do with politics and this is more political than anything else. I am going to go back next week to sort this out."

"It is getting too much. They are ruining Pakistan cricket and the youngsters in Pakistan are scared of losing now. You won't be able to win in future."

Akram is also critical of the press for fuelling the rumours. "I don't know what they are doing to their own team. I don't believe what is happening. The press in Pakistan can do anything they want. You can sue them but it takes about 100 years to sort the case out."

"They write what they want to write, whatever will sell them, so the press and media in Pakistan have a big hand in this campaign."

But Wasim emphasised he is innocent, insisting: "I refute any charges. I always have done. I haven't done anything wrong."

The problem in Pakistan is that everybody gambles, rich guy, poor guy, lawyer, they all gamble and when they lose they have to blame someone so they blame the Pakistan team."

Wasim's comments followed a statement in Pakistan from Mujeeb Rehman, chairman of the ad hoc committee of the PCB that he and two other senior players, Ijaz Ahmad and Salim Malik, would not be considered for selection pending the completion of the match-fixing investigation.

The suspended chief of the Pakistan Cricket Board has already denied allegations that the team deliberately lost the World Cup final.

PCB chairman Khalid

Mehmood claimed in Karachi that a "conspiracy" had been hatched against the board and Pakistan's World Cup stars after their crushing eight-wicket defeat by Australia at Lord's.

Pakistan's government has suspended the board pending an investigation into the claims.

Mehmood described the allegations of match-fixing as "ridiculous", adding: "The team performed very well except for one bad game. You cannot sack the whole board for it."

"I always defended the players and I am ready to defend them even now. They are wonderful players and a very talented side. None of the matches in the World Cup were fixed. It is ridiculous."

Wasim's counsel Khawaja Tariq Rahim termed the charges a "media trial of players."

"I think the Accountability Bureau is bypassing the judicial commission and there is no legal validity for these charges," he told AFP.

"If somebody thinks the careers of Wasim and others are over, he is living in a fool's paradise," the counsel said, adding: "Wasim is a world class player who has been victimised."

Ijaz and Malik were not available for comment.

It had been claimed by some within Pakistan that Akram's team deliberately lost the World Cup final against Australia at Lord's last month. Their defeats to India and minnows Bangladesh earlier in the tournament also raised some eyebrows.

Pakistani cricket has been embroiled in match-fixing allegations since 1994, when three top Australian players, including Shane Warne, said they were offered money by Pakistan star Salim Malik to lose a Test.

Several other allegations, many of them levelled by Pakistani players themselves, have been made in recent seasons.
