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Monsoon rains wreck havoc across Asia

HONG KONG, Aug 2: Monsoon rains have left hundreds dead and millions homeless as floods and landslides wreak havoc across Asia, threatening a repeat of last year's disaster which was the worst in decades, reports AFP.

China and India have been worst hit by the deluge, but Vietnam, the Korean peninsula and Bangladesh have also been badly affected.

More than 300 people have already been killed in China this summer in flooding along the mighty Yangtze river and three provinces have declared states of emergency.

Some 1.4 million Chinese

Official corruption and rampant deforestation were blamed as the chief culprits.

In India, where floods began late June after torrential monsoon rains, the death toll has breached the 300 mark, including 135 in the eastern state of Bihar.

The situation in Bihar remained grim, with water levels on five major rivers rising above the danger mark. State opposition leaders have flayed the government for not implementing flood-control mea-

sures earlier. Floods in the northeastern state of Assam are also threatening the world's last major concentration of one-horned rhino -- a nearly extinct species. Last year's floods killed

65 of the state's 1,500 rhinos. At least 40 South Koreans are feared dead in the monsoon rains, among them 13 people buried in mudslides triggered by torrential downpours which have left swathes of the country under water.

Electrocution Villagers attack REB office in Narsingdi

From Our Correspondent NARSINGDI, Aug 2: At least 20 people were injured in a clash between villagers and employees of Rural Electrification Board (REB) after a pedestrian was electrocuted by a loose live electric wire this afternoon.

According to witnesses, the incident took place when one Al Amin, 18, a rickshawpuller and an inhabitant of Salida village, was electrocuted as he came in touch with a broken wire of the REB at about 1:00 pm.

The villagers of Salida and Chowla alleged that they had repeatedly requested officials of the REB to remove the unsafe wire since morning but there was no response.

Later, villagers sieged the local REB office and allegedly attacked some employees. They also ransacked the office and damaged furniture and a car of the board. Six persons were arrested in

According to an investigation report, the deal was pushed by the then President HM Ershad while some bigwigs were involved in promoting the company.
