He said that the matter should be discussed in the regional context rather than bilateral. "The government would have faced lesser criticism and opposition if its proposal in-cluded Bhutan and Nepal."

He pointed out that Bangladesh's interest in transhipment was very marginal compared to that of India.

Regarding government's claim that the issue of transhipment was being raised for duty free access for local goods. Saifur said that it was not possible to assess the benefit of such duty free access because quality of goods was also a major factor.

Squatters gather before Dr Kamal's house

A group of evicted slum dwellers, demanding food and shelter, late Friday night gathered in front of the residence of Dr Kamal Hossain, who leads a team of lawyers for petitioners filing a writ with the High Court challenging the government's eviction drive.

When caretakers declined to open the gate as Dr Kamal and his wife were away in London, the squatters moved away and camped on the pavement of Bailey Road in front of his house.

"Sahib (Dr Kamal) is a good man, he is fighting for us. We have come to get help from him to survive our ordeal", said one of the squatters, Rashid Moral. Moral and at least 50 others

also erected makeshift shelters with bamboos and plastic sheets. He denied that anyone had sent them to squat there. Rather, he said, they felt that 'Sahib' could give them all help. "We shall not move from here till we are provided with alternative accommodation"...

Rokeya, who was a neighbour of Moral at the now demolished slum beside the rail track at Maghbazar, lamented that

they could not find the 'Sahib' who would help them. She alleged that two care-

takers at the residence of the 'Shahib' drove them away when they called for help at about 2 am after police drove them out of their makeshift shelters at the demolished slum. The caretakers - Nur Alam

and Danaruddin Rana - said that Dr Kamal and Mrs Kamal are likely to return from London tomorrow morning.

A police sergeant busy managing traffic in the area at 6-30 pm yesterday said that he had informed his superiors about this. "Ramna thana is to deal with this matter. Besides, we did not get any complaint from Dr Kamal's home".

Lutfar Rahman, President of Bangladesh Bastuhara Samity, told reporters that his organisation did not have any links with those squatters ."My group camping at the Eidgah on the Supreme Court premises would continue squatting there", he

Buriganga swallows huge toxic waste a day

Oxygen now almost non-existent in the water

Save the Buriganga

Each day, the 17 km stretch of Buriganga river receives 16,000 cubic metres of highly toxic waste from Hazaribagh

tanneries. Another 3,500 cubic metres of toxic waste flow into the river from Tejgaon industrial

Along the river from Rayerbazar to Pagla and beyond. some 1,500 industrial units operate with their hazardous waste directly running into the river. These include factories producing aluminium and pharmaceutical products, battery, hardware, dyeing and washing plants and cold stor-

The list goes on. The river is also burdened with untreated sewage from a city of about eight million inhabitants.

Organic waste from kitchen markets along the river, oil and grease from the plying vessels. all contribute to making the Buriganga one of the most polluted rivers in the world.

To curve the alarming rate of pollution of the river, the government so far failed to take any step other than launching a 'campaign' which is now restricted to occasional table

The committees formed in September 1997 and in December 1998 in the light of a Save Buriganga campaign have defaulted on their terms of reference by months. Environment ministry officials who had initiated the campaign were so annoyed at the committee's sluggish progress that they even threatened to lodge an official complaint to the Cabinet Secretary.

The last meeting of the 1998 committee, held on June 22 this year, decided that some surveys have to be conducted before launching any action pro-gramme. But officials of other government departments said there was no need of any fresh See Page 12 Col 8

Dighinala tense: Eleven more hurt in clashes

KHAGRACHHARI, Aug 21: Eleven people including three intelligence agency members were injured at Dighinala thana headquarters as trouble continued there for the second day today, reports UNB.

The trouble begin on Friday following eviction of 12 repatriated tribal refugee families from the Dighinala Model Primary School, a temporary transit camp.

At least 18 people, including five policemen, were injured and a farmhouse of Chittagong Hill Tracts Affairs Minister Kalparanjan Chakma was set afire Friday as the backlash of the eviction.

Police said some tribal youths called out three intelligence agency members-Humayun Kabir, Zakir Hossain and Shamsul Alam- at a tea stall and at one stage beat them up severely today.

As the news spread among the non-tribals, they went on the rampage at Kathaltoli Bazar and attacked the tribal people, injuring eight.

Army troops and police rushed to the spot and brought the situation under control. CHT Regional Council mem-

city's TT Para slum yesterday. Biggest haul of phensidyl 17000 bottles seized from demolished slum

In the biggest ever haul, 17,000 bottles of phensidyl, a banned addictive cough syrup, were recovered yesterday from two underground tunnels at the recently demolished slum on the premises of the Railway Nirapatta Bahini barrack at Gopigabh in the city.

The bottles were recovered in 12-hour police operation starting from the early hours of yesterday.

"A section of RNB personnel must have co-operated with the drug traders in bringing and stockpiling the phensidyl bottles. Otherwise it would not have been possible to stockpile such a huge quantity of drugs in such a planned way at a place close to the barrack", a senior official of DMP's Eastern Zone told The Daily Star last night on condition of anonymity.

Police and other sources said the tunnels might have been used as a 'wholesale centre' by an organised gang. The price of the bottles could be around Tk 22.44 lakh at Tk 132 per bottle. Earlier on Friday, 732 bot-

tles of phensidyl were recovered

from a tunnel in a room at the Sweeper Colony near Gopibagh. In the last six months, police dog squads and narcotics control officials had raided the same area several times but failed to unearth anything. Considering the location of the

tunnels, it is also believed that

phensidyl bottles were being smuggled by train regularly. When asked whether a section of railway personnel were involved in it, the police official replied, " I think most of the phensidyl bottles were smuggled through Akhaura-Cosba area and brought here by

Acting on a tip-off, police personnel from Motijheel thana cordoned-off the area. The dog squad of police also took part in the operation that ended at about noon yesterday. The seventeen thousand bottles were kept in 170 jute sacks in the underground tunnels.

is about 15 feet long, five feet

wide and 9 feet deep. The second

one is a 'bit smaller'. The tun-

nels were covered with concrete

slabs. The slabs were under about one foot of earth. The entry points of the tunnels looked like slabs covering any normal septic tank, police officials

A portable metallic ladder was used for entering the tunnels. " At one stage during today's' (Saturday) operation, we were considering taking legal steps against the RNB and the railway for allowing criminals to establish shanties on railway land", a police official said. However, none was arrested till filing of the report at about 10 last night.

Police suspected that those tunnels were used by drug trader Khokon and his men. Khokon was murdered by his rival group a few months ago following a feud over drug trading. "China", an accomplice of Khokon was controlling the drug trade after his death. In another incident CID re-


