



JU student bodies demand punishment of rapists, killers

Gonotantrik Chhatra Oikkya (GCO) and Sanskritik Jote (SJ) of Jahangirnagar University (JU) yesterday brought out separate processions and held rallies on the campus demanding expulsion and cancellation of certificates of the students responsible for rapes, killings, terrorism and extortions on the compus during the last couple of years. Activists of SJ, a conglom-

eration of 30 cultural organisations of JU, brought out a silent procession from the central cafeteria. The SJ activists were carrying placards containing anti-rape, anti-killing, antiterrorism and anti-extortion slogans. The procession ended at the Arts Faculty premises.

GCO brought out another procession from the central cafeteria to press their sevenpoint demand including expulsion and cancellation of certificates of rapists, killers and extortionists. Marching through the campus, the procession ended at the Academic Building,

SJ organised a cultural function at the foot of Amar Ekushey as a part of their protest programme. They also screened two films - 'Nine Month to Freedom' and 'Zoo'

there. Addressing a rally at the in front of the VC office, GCO leaders reiterated their demand of expulsion and cancellation of certificates of all seven rapists and their six abettors and all others who were involved in killings vollection of tolls and arms-hadiganism on the campus during the last years.

Among others who addressed the rally, were Aniruddha Das Anjan, organising secretary of Bangladesh Chhatra Union (BCU) and Ariful Haq, president of Samajtantrik Chhatra Front

Talking to the rally, Aniruddha Anjan alleged that the authorities are patronising the killers because the killers of Ananda are roaming on the campus at large till today in presence of police.

Ariful Haq condemned the authorities' filing case against only six of the rapists excluding another identified rapist, their abettors, all other killers and extortionists and he demanded immediate filing of case against all criminals. They also demanded immediate introduction of laws regarding sexual repression.

Besides, GCO also demanded investigation and trial of the teachers who are learned to patronise these rapists, killers and terrorists on the campus. GCO also submitted a memorandum to the Vice Chancellor

NGOs: Slum demolition

From Page 1 Dhaka City Committee of the Grassroots' People's Organisations. Earlier on August 15, they made an appeal to the Prime Minister to stop demolition of the slums before rehabilitation of the concerned poor

However, terming the eviction drive a 'state violence' against the slum dwellers, the letter said, "A good number of slums have already been razed to the ground, rendering 50,000 poor men, women and children homeless and exposing them to the inclement weather in the monsoon. The police, armed hoodlums and bulldozers were wantonly used in this inhuman act of violence on slum dwellers - the most vulnerable section of

the urban population."
The NGOs concerned have accused Sheikh Hasina's government of breaching commitment. "On February 18, 1997, the Prime Minister pledged that no slum would be demolished without making proper rehabilitation arrangements for the victims," the letter said. "But unfortunately, the government has now turned its back on the commitment and virtually waged a war against the slum

dwellers." Reluctant to buy the government arguments for the eviction drive, the NGOs said, "Although elimination of crime and terrorism has been cited as the plea for the government crackdown on slums, it is common knowledge that the ordinary slum dwellers are not involved in criminal activities and terrorism. In fact, they are being held hostages by the real

terrorists and criminals." Criticising the government for indiscriminately branding the slum dwellers as terrorists and criminals, the NGOs said that the attempt amounted to the 'denial of the productive role they are playing in the industrial sectors including garments'. "The dislodging of workers mostly dwelling in the slums will have a telling effect on the overall economy of the country.

Arguing that 'not a single criminal or terrorist has been arrested from the slums demolished so far', the NGOs said that the reality 'raises serious doubts about the professed aim of the operation'. The NGOs find the government argument, 'a hoax.

The NGOs believe that the real purpose behind the eviction drive is to sell out the land. to well-off people. "A recentgovernment decision, communicated through a land ministry circular issued on December 11 last year, to sell out state owned land in urban areas to the well-off section of the population confirms this specula-

The NGOs also said that 'the land mafia in Dhaka are casting a covetous eye on the state owned land, which, they hope, would be up for grabs, once the slum dwellers are ousted'. "Evicting the innocent slum dwellers without taking effective measures against the real culprits is completely unjust, illogical and unethical," the NGOs observed.

The NGOs have found the government expectation that the evicted slum dwellers would duly return to their villages' 'utterly ill-founded.' "The poor people took shelter in the city slums after loosing all their assets and access to livelihoods in their ancestral villages."

They also found the government announcement for post-eviction rehabilitation of the victims impractical: One can easily understand that with no roof over their heads in the ongoing rains and with no immediate means of livelihood, the evicted people will be compelled to disperse for unknown destination - leaving no room to identify for the purpose of re-habilitation."

The letters sent to the 'international community' also said that the NGOs have already invested nearly Tk 2 billion in generating employment and building health, education and other social support networks for the urban poor. "While the government fell short of fulfilling their constitutional obliga-tion to provide food and shelter to the slum dwellers, it should stop destroying the networks which the slum dwellers themselves have built with the help

of NGOs", the letter said. Requesting the national and international quarters concerned to urge the government to stop such eviction, the NGOs said, "Permanent solution to the problem of urban slums lies in the concerted efforts to effectively reduce rural and urban poverty by generating adequate employment opportunity for the poor".
