Seed crisis hits jute farming

MADRIPUR, Sept 7: Jute production here is unlikely to achieve the target this year due to unfavourable weather and seed crisis, reports UNB.

According to local Agriculture office, some 10,668 hectares of land were projected to be brought under jute farming in four thanas here this season. But untimely rainfall caused huge damage to transplanted jute on about 10,085 hectares of land. Local farmers alleged that low quality jute seeds imported from neighbouring India might affect jute output this season. Some growers at Lakshminagar village in Sadar thana said the vagaries of weather — first drought and then flood — have taken their toll on jute cultivation.

12 shop owners fined

CHANDPUR, Sept 7: A mobile court, led by a First Class Magistrate, fined 12 shop owners in the town on charge of swindling shoppers through inaccurate weighing machines on Sunday, reports UNB.

The court conducted the sudden drive in eight jewelry shops, three confectioneries and one rod-ment shop at 3pm and fined the shop owners Tk 1,000 each under the Standard of Weights and Measures Ordinance 1982. They also seized a good number of incorrect measuring machines.

250 schemes to be implemented

MEHERPUR, Sept 7: A total of 250 small schemes under the Test Relief (TR) Programme will be implemented in the two thanas here in the next winter season, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the government allocated 1,598 tons of wheat for execution of the schemes. Work of the schemes included repair and reconstruction of rural roads and embankments and earth-work in different educational institutions. Work will begin by the first week of October.

Massive hemp farming

GAIBANDHA, Sept 7: In a new sign of trouble for the administration, a section of people have embarked on massive hemp cultivation in shoal areas of Phulchhara and Saghata thanas, reports UNB.

Witnesses said the natural cannabis is being cultivated mainly in remote areas of Gabgachhichar, Patichar, Guabichar, Haldiachar and Zamirchar of the two thanas. They said a section of villagers process hemp in their houses and supply to some businessmen in different areas including Tulshighal, Komarpur and Modhupur. Local people have urged the authorities concerned to take immediate steps to crack down on the hemp growers and traders and thus put a lid on drug addiction.

133 women sterilised

BRAHMANBARIA, Sept 7: A total of 133 women have been sterilised in a three-day sterilisation camp at Nasirnagar on August 29-31, reports BSS.

Jointly organised by the Family Planning Department and Mervi Stores Clinic of Brahmanbaria, the camp was inaugurated by Md Mohibul Rahman, Deputy Director of the Family Planning Department. Dr Mahibubur Rahman, a family planning consultant, conducted the operation.

Training on bio-gas

CORILLA, Sept 7: A two-day training course on production and use of bio-gas and organic fertiliser for maintaining environmental balance was held at the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) training centre here on September 1-2, reports BSS.

Dr M Solaiman, Additional Director General of the Bangladesh Academy of Rural Development (BARD) inaugurated the training course as the chief guest. Executive Engineer of the LGED Kazi Mujibur Rahman presided over the function. Deputy Director of Agriculture Extension Department Abul Hossain Mollah and Project Director of Bio-gas project Swapan Kumar Charkavarty, among others, spoke on the occasion.

Smuggled goods seized

CORILLA, Sept 7: The Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) seized contraband goods worth Taka 7,51,38,997 from different border areas of Comilla, Habiganj, Feni and Sunamganj districts during the last eight months from January 1 to August 31, a BDR source said here, reports BSS.

BDR seized Indian goods worth Taka 7,42,78,000 while being smuggled into Bangladesh and Bangladesh goods worth about Taka 8,60,000 while those were being smuggled out of the country. The goods included saree, sugar, salt, stainless steel, medicine, by-cycle parts, phenisyl syrup, onion and spices.

Six schemes being implemented

CHUDANGA, Sept 7: Work on six schemes taken up by the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED) under its 'Construction and Reconstruction of Infrastructures on Priority Basis in the Rural Areas including Damage by Flood Programme' is in full swing in the four thanas, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the government sanctioned Taka 38,95,000 for execution of the schemes in the current fiscal. Of the total schemes, one each is in Chudanga thana and Damurhuda, and two each are in Alamdanga and Jibannagar. About 60 per cent work has already been completed.

Uplift projects implemented

MANIKGANJ, Sept 7: A total of 230 development projects under Rural Infrastructure Maintenance Programme have been implemented in seven thanas recently, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the government sanctioned 3,231 tons of wheat for implementation of the projects in the last fiscal year. The projects implemented by the Relief and Disaster Management Department included construction and reconstruction of rural roads and earthwork in the premises of educational institutions.

Vegetables farming programme

CHUDANGA, Sept 7: Around 3,100 hectares of land have been brought under vegetables cultivation four thanas in the current summer season, reports BSS.

According to the Agriculture Extension Department, vegetables have been cultivated on 832 hectares in Chudanga thana, 780 hectares on Alamdanga thana, 950 hectares on Damurhuda thana and 514 hectares on Jibannagar thana. The Agriculture Department has estimated that about 40,000 tons of vegetables including various leafy vegetables would be produced in the current season. 30,000 tons of vegetables have already been produced.

Training for farmers

MADRIPUR, Sept 7: A daylong training course for farmers organised by the Bangladeshi Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC) was held at local TTDC auditorium on August 30, reports BSS.

A total of 60 farmers from different thanas participated in the training. The participants were imparted training on modern methods of cultivation of paddy and other crops and protection of crops from various disasters including attacks of pest and harmful insects.

150 Projects under Special TR

CHUDANGA, Sept 7: A total of 150 projects under the Special Test relief programme were implemented in four thanas and three pourasabhas here in the last fiscal year, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the government sanctioned 188 tons of wheat for execution of the projects. Thirty-one projects were implemented in Chudanga thana, 53 projects in Alamdanga, 29 projects in Damurhuda, 11 projects in Jibannagar, 117 projects in Chudanga pourashabha, seven projects in Alamdanga pourashabha and two projects were implemented in Darshana pourashabha.

Work progressing

BARISAL, Sept 7: The construction of a 70-metre long bridge over the River Khakdan in Barguna district is in full swing at a cost of Taka 3,50, reports BSS.

According to the Local Government Engineering Department (LGED), the Dutch government has provided financial assistance for construction of the bridge. It will take more than one year to complete the bridge. Communication between Bakerganj thana headquarters and Barguna district headquarters will be easier after completion of construction of the bridge.

Woman commits suicide

SATKHIRA, Sept 7: An elderly woman allegedly committed suicide at Faingri in sadar thana Saturday night, reports UNB.

Sources said Katangani, wife of Late Shetal Saha, killed herself following a family feud. A UD case was filed.

Water receding from Gaibandha slowly

Flood hits hard 7 lakh people in Bogra

BOGRA, Sept 7: About seven lakh people of Sharikandi, Dhunat Sherpur, Sadar, Shiband and Sonatola thanas were affected by flood.

District Relief and Rehabilitation Office (DRRO) sources said that, at least six lakh 99 thousand six hundred 65 people of 56 union in six thanas were seriously affected.

Agriculture Extension Department (AED) sources said that, more than one lakh hectares of Aman and other seasonal crops were damaged. One thousand kilometers of roads were damaged fully or

are Gaibandha sadar, Fulchari, Shaghata, Sadullapur and Gobindaganj.

A test tract of land under Gobindaganj thana has been submerged by flood water following development of breaches at two points of Karotia embankment. At one kilometre area along Gobindaganj — Ghoraghat highway has been submerged by flood water after the breach at Tarafmanu.

Although flood water in Brahmaputra basin is receding gradually, the overall situation is yet to be improved. This time over three lakh people in 30



Purb Kamanai, Kuthipara, Banjirajan, Munshipara and Bopbarpa. One child named Raihan, 3, of village Jogipara under Shaghata thana drowned in flood water.

Meanwhile, part of Sadullapur — Rangpur highway went under knee-deep water after following breach on Jamudanga embankment.

BSS reports: The flood situation in Madaripur district has improved following recession of water of the River Arial Khan, according to the district Flood Information Centre.

UNB reports: About one kilometer of Sherpur-Jamalpur feeder road was devoured by Kularchar by heavy erosion of the River Brahmaputra.

Crop lands and homesteads were being washed away by the strong current of the river rendering hundreds of people homeless and pauper.

The feeder road remained closed to the vehicular traffic since August 17.

Officials of Road and Highways Department said a by-pass was being constructed at a cost of Tk 15 lakh. Work is going on in full swing and the by-pass will be opened to traffic next week.

Another report adds: Poor people marooned by floodwaters in seven thanas of Manikganj district have been facing untold sufferings due to abnormal price-hike of essentials.

At the very beginning of the rainy season, road communications between sadar and other four thanas — Ghor, Daulatpur, Saturia and Harirampur — were disrupted that resulted in unusual price rise of essentials in the remote rural areas.

Taking advantage of the situation, it was alleged, a section of unscrupulous businessmen and hoarders started stockpiling goods to make windfall profit.

The people living in the low-lying areas of Shibalaya, Harirampur, Ghor and Daulatpur thanas are the worst sufferers.

The local administration has taken necessary steps to distribute relief materials among the flood-affected people of the district.

Deputy Commissioner Mozharuddin said the administration is always ready to face any calamity in the coming ahead.

In Chapatnawabganj, CCDB, a non-government organisation, has taken up a rehabilitation scheme for the last year's flood victims, involving Tk 26 lakh.

Meanwhile, 2,500 badly affected families in Dariapur, Upor Rajarampur, Shiyala, Haripur, Mahadanga, Chouhaditola, Gabtala, Namoshankarbat, Swarupnagar, Alinagar and Nayatola areas have been given two bundles of tin and Tk 2,360 each.

CCDB officials said the families, which were partially affected by the devastating flood, have been given Tk 2,500 to 350 each under the programme.

Besides, 1,200 banana trees were distributed among 400 families and Tk 45 to 15,500 people each under its employment generation scheme.

BSS report from Tangail: Compartmental Pilot Project (CPP), Tangail is repairing its 36-km, out of the total 46-km, long embankment known as Karatia Silimpur Road-cum-Embankment at a total cost of taka 2.25 crore. The embankment area was badly damaged during the devastating flood of last year.

According to CPP sources, the embankment required repair on urgent basis after the flood. Wide areas of Tangail sadar and Deldiar thanas were saved from the devastation of flood due to this embankment and farmers could produce rice and paddy in 30,000 hectares in the embankment area.

Seven thousand nine hundred eighty eight houses were totally damaged by flood and erosion by the River Jamuna and Bangali.

Government allocated one lakh fifteen thousand taka and one hundred fifteen metric tons of rice for flood victims of the district during last two weeks.

Most of the areas of Gaibandha pourashabha have been submerged by flood water. The areas are David Copata, Bridge Road, Shandherpara,

Flood victims who took shelter in different institutes and on high lands have been suffering for want of food and drinking water. In many shelters no help reached as yet.

sources. 1,42,543 people belonging to 22,250 families have been affected while 20 per cent roads of Madaripur Pourasabha has gone under one to two feet water. Standing crops including Aus, Aman and jute were partially damaged while 555 houses have been fully damaged and 9,448 houses partially. About 89km roads, 4 km embankment and 4 km bridges and culverts were partially damaged.

The district administration distributed, till Saturday, five tons of rice and 200 tins of biscuit among the flood affected

foreign experts on several occasions, an allegation turned down by the authorities.

According to the Civil Surgeon Office, the district has 100 arsenic patients, but still there is no report of death due to arsenic poisoning.

"The number of arsenic patients would have been much higher if we had not taken any remedial measures," said an official wishing anonymity.

Another report from Mymensingh says: Arsenic beyond

permissible level has been detected in the water of 28 tube-wells in two unions of Trishal thana.

Sources said experts conducted a survey on 530 tube-wells in the two unions and found arsenic in the water of 28 tube-wells.

Rotary Club with the financial assistance of World Bank and Rotary Club of Brisbane West conducted the survey in June and August this year.

They took samples from 204 tube-wells in Tailor Union Parishad and detected the presence of arsenic in 11 tube-wells.

In Kathal Union Parishad, they took samples from 326 tube-wells and found arsenic in the water of 17 tube-wells.

They have sealed the arsenic affected tube-wells and warned the people not to use their water.

Speedboat capsizes in Kirtankhola


BARISAL, Sept 7: A speedboat capsized near IWTA floating dock in the river Kirtankhola Tuesday evening in Barisal.
