"We have now the comfort that we can manage this market, at least in terms of looking at it, getting the right information, analysing it and quickly responding to any market disruptive elements," State Bank of Pakistan Governor Muhammad Yagub said.

## China not quite ready for e-commerce

commerce may be eager to tackle the 1.25-billion strong Chinese market, but it seems China isn't quite ready for ecommerce, says AP.

Although Internet access remains relatively limited in this developing country with only 7 million users, it is expanding rapidly. Electronic businesses are keen to grab a niche of the world's largest potential market.

But as is often the case in China, the emphasis is on the word "potential." While Webbased businesses abound, the infrastructure to support them
credit cards, reliable delivery systems, consumer protection is minimal.

The big problem is online payments," says Duncan Clark of BDA, a China-based Internet consultancy. "Then there's the whole delivery and advertising question. There are so many obstacles.

Chinese banks are beginning to offer services over the Internet, but a lack of regulatory guidelines and computer security are slowing those efforts.

"Cybersecurity in China is such a problem it cannot be solved by us alone. So we're providing just limited personal services," said Deng Huafeng of the China Construction Bank's Internet banking services department.

# WB sees 'localisation' as 21st century trend

WASHINGTON, Sept 16: Localisation and globalisation are the twin forces that will shape the global economy in the 21st century, the World Bank

said yesterday, reports AFP. In its World Development Report 1999/2000, the bank said localisation, or the growing economic and political power of cities, provinces and other sub-national entities. will be one of the most important trends and, together with globalisation, could revolutionize human development.

"Globalisation is like a giant wave that can either capsize nations of carry them forward," said World Bank chief economist Joseph Stiglitz.

"Successful localisation creates a situation where local entitles and other groups in society - the crew of the boat if you will - are free to exercise individual autonomy but also

have incentives to work together."

The number of democracies in the world has expanded in the last quarter-century from 30 per cent to 60 per cent of all nations and almost all of them have local elections, the report

Stiglitz said globalisation represented a challenge to national governments, stressing that better institutions, such as legal and political systems, will be more necessary than ever to create the right climate for growth.

From the past half-century development, the report cities four essential conditions for growth: ensuring macroeconomic stability, addressing human needs directly, providing a comprehensive approach, and offering a socially inclusive and flexible approach to sustained development.

These lessons "are central to how the World Bank envisions its work in the 21st century,' the report said.

Localisation can be a mixed blessing, according to the report. When it works well, such decentralisation can make local authorities more efficient and more responsive to the needs of the people.

The report cities parts of Latin America where public services such as education, health, roads, water supply and sanitation are controlled by local authorities. Central government budget contributions to local authorities in Brazil. Mexico and Colombia have increased substantially.

However, when localisation is mishandled local governments can be overburdened and incapable of meeting demands for infrastructure and services

# \$792 b Republican tax cut bill heads for Clinton veto

WASHINGTON, Sept 16: Congressional Republicans prepared to send their \$792 billion tax cut bill with fanfare to President Bill Clinton yesterday as Democrats rallied behind his certain veto, says Reuters.

Republican leaders planned to host a ceremony for the doomed tax relief plan on Wednesday afternoon when they sign the bill and send it to the White House.

Meanwhile: Vice President Al Gore was expected to join his fellow Democrats to support the veto and criticise the Republican plan as a reckless endeavour that threatens the reform of the Social Security retirement programme and the Medicare elderly health care programme. Republicans, who spent

much of the August recess trying to build public support for their plan to cut income tax rates and provide a number of tax breaks for businesses and families, said the veto would effectively kill chances for a

major tax cut this year. bill, we don't think tax cuts are completely off the table, but we pivot and try to do this appropriations process," US House of Representatives Speaker Dennis Hastert, an Illinois Republican, said on Wednesday.

### Surveillance report says IMF fails to warn of global economic risks

WASHINGTON, Sept 16: The International Monetary Fund failed to warn forcefully of risks to the global economy and is getting its priorities wrong in assessing problems around the world, according to a report re-

Reuter. The strongly worded report, an external assessment of IMF surveillance activities, urged the fund to concentrate on its traditional core areas - currency regimes and macroeconomic indicators.

leased yesterday, reports

The report, and a second external review document looking at IMF research, complained about poor communication between IMF departments and between the fund and the World Bank.

"The IMF is in danger of losing its focus, without gaining much in compensation," former Bank of Canada governor John Crow, one of the authors of the surveillance report, told a news conference. He added: 'The fund is not that good at spreading its views or spreading its information."

The experts said IMF surveillance - its advice to member states - was comprehensive and well-regarded, and some research was top-notch. But staff tended to be too cautious, perhaps because they were afraid of upsetting mem-

ber states.

"The problem of insufficient frankness is one of both substance and language," the surveillance report said. "Staff may diagnose a problem, but present their analysis in rather indirect language. This problem has long been recognised, yet it has persisted."

Surveillance, including annual reviews of the economies of IMF members and twiceyearly World Economic Outlooks (WEO), forms a key element of IMF activities, and the report said the fund should consider releasing a WEO four times a year.

But surveillance has also been controversial, amid complaints that the IMF did not spot banking sector problems, publicise its blunt warnings to Thailand before its July 1997 currency crash or realise that Thailand's problems could have a dangerous impact in Asia and

The dollar staged a short-lived bounce against the yen in late Tokyo on Thursday as news of a meeting between the heads of Japan's Finance Ministry and central bank raised speculation of official intervention to stem the yen's rise, the BOJ said Finance Minister Kiichi Miyazawa and BOJ Governor Masaru Hayami would meet to discuss foreign exchange and other issues.

The news of the meeting fuelled speculation that the BOJ may be persuaded to take more credit-easing steps to help dampen the yen. The market became increasing wary of possible intervention after Miyazawa said there was a need to exchange views on the situation with other countries and that Kuroda, vice finance minister for international affairs had gone to Washington to discuss the situation with officials there. But the market remained skeptical over whether the US would agree to coordinated intervention with Japan, as the yen's rise has not caused instability in US financial markets. But they said the BOJ could still buy dollars for yen via other central banks in overseas markets as it did in the last series of interventions.

The dollar rose from the previous day's 3-1/2 -year lows against the yen on Thursday in Europe amid speculation Japan authorities might take more decisive action to curb the yen's strength. News of Japanese finance minister was to meet BOJ's Governor to discuss foreign exchange and monetary issues boosted the dollar to above 105 yen. Also the news of top official Haruhiko Kuroda had been sent to Washington added to the dollars boost. Market makers said the dollar recovery was far from being secured as the US currency had shed around eight yen since the release of Japan's strong second quarter GDP data. Market makers said a 2.73 drop in the Nikkei on Thursday had temporarily damaged the confidence of yen bulls and would be taken into account by Japanese officials during their meeting. The issue of whether or not Japanese authorities would agree to conduct unsterilised intervention would be crucial for the market.

At around 0808 GMT, major currencies closed against USD at 105.10/105/15 JPY, 1.5332/1.5342 CHF, Euro at \$ 1.0443/1 1.0448, GBP at \$ 1.6180.
