Admission fee hike

JU students go on strike from today

An indefinite strike by students demanding withdrawal of increased admission fees for the first year honours classes begins at Jahangirnagar University (JU) today.

The strike has been called by the General Students Unity (GSU) who announced the programme at a rally in front of the Vice Chancellor's office on Thursday. The strike followed an earlier ultimatum given by GSU for withdrawal of the increased fees that ended yester-

and Gonotantrik Chhatra Oikkya (GCO), which expressed their solidarity with the GSU movement against the fee hike, will bring out a torch procession this evening from Prantik' gate. They will also lay siege to Administrative Building tomorrow during the JU Syndicate session.

Both GSU and GCO brought out separate processions and held rallies at all the students' dormitories last night to drum up support for their demand.

The university authority doubled the admission fees with effect from 1998-99 session of honours classes. GCO and GSU brought out a number of processions on the campus and held rallies to protest the move. They also submitted a memorandum to the JU VC demanding withdrawal of the increased fee. The agitating students halted the admission procedures on Thursday and called for the indefinite strike.







Prokrichi rejects JS body approval to upgrade 321 posts

By Special Correspondent The Steering Committee of the Prokrichi-BCS Central Coordination Council has rejected what it said 'one sided' recommendation by the parliamentary standing committee on Establishment Ministry to implement an order to upgrade the posts in BCS (Administration) cadre.

Urging the parliamentary standing committee to reconsider its recommendation the committee reiterated that it would not help resolve the problems in the public administration. Rather, it would create further resentment and frustration among the Prokrichi-BCS cadres, the committee said after a meeting held at the Institution of Engineers on Thursday with Dr Rashid-e-Mahbub, president of the council. In a resolution adopted at

the meeting the council noted that since the partisan declara-tion to unilaterally upgrade pay scale of the 321 posts in December 21, 1997 leading to dispari-ties in scales of BCS (Administration) cadres with other cadres of equal ranks the Prokrichi-BCS cadres were aggrieved. They staged protests and

submitted a memorandum to the prime minister who ordered its suspension and sent it to the standing committee on establishment for review. It renewed hopes among the cadres but the latest recommendation had dampened it again, the council observed.

It also noted that the Prokrichi members had put forward their grievances before the parliamentary committee and pointed out that even some members of the committee had raised questions on the credibility of facts given to it by the Establishment Ministry.

Int'l programming contest Nov 25

North South University (NSU) is hosting the International Collegiate Programming Contest (ICPC) organised by the Association of Computing Machinery (ACM) on November 25. It is the largest computer programming competition among the university students in the world, says a press release. ACM/ICPC is a two-tier

competition. First, teams from universities/degree-colleges participate in the regional event of the ACM/ICPC at the specified date. Second, the winners from the regionals advance to the finals.

This is the third time NSU has been selected for hosting the event for Bangladesh site. This year there will be six sites in Asia including NSU. The other five sites are: Kyoto University, Japan, Shanghai University, China, Sharif University of Technology, Iran, Indian Institute of Technology, India, and National Taiwan Normal University, Taiwan. Partial travel support of

US\$500 is available to three foreign teams. The winning team of this regional contests will receive US\$3500 to US\$4000 from ACM/IBM to participate the World Finals be held in Orlando, Florida, USA, in March 18,2000. Maximum two teams from

each institution can participate. A team consists of three students out of which two must be at undergraduate level. Registration deadline is October 25. Registration fee for per local team is Tk 2,500. Students of degree colleges may also participate.

Congress of environmental journalists ends

KOTBARI, Comilla, Sept 17: The four-day Congress of environmental journalists from Asia-Pacific and Commonwealth countries ended today with pledges for greater co-operation between newsmen for awareness development, reports BSS.

Jointly organised by the Asia-Pacific Forum of Environmental Journalists (AFEJ) and Commonwealth Environmental Journalists Association, the Congress on the media role on water was attended by journalists as well as experts and representatives of environmental watchdogs from some 30 countries.

They discussed issues related to water, one of the most crucial resources of the current and future world, and exchanges views on the strategies to strengthen the role of the media as an active agent for awareness development.

"The theme of this international congress of environment journalists is very time-befitting as it has now appeared as one of the most crucial issues for development" of Bangladesh as well as many other countries, Syed Marghub Murshed, secretary of the Forest and Environment Ministry, told the concluding session of the congress. He said environmental prob-

lems in their entirety are global problems and therefore needed international co-operation. Dr Rezaul Karim, the chief of

Environment Section of the Bangkok-based UN-ESCAP, said the environmental journalists were now faced with three major challenges - understanding the difficult environmental issues, awareness generation and using the information technology.

The next joint congress will be held in June 2000 in the Pacific Island of Fiji.

From page 1 50 per cent of the beds in Thana Health Complexes (THCs) are utilised for the patients. We must remember that the existing healthcare system failed due to lack of proper accountability and supervision and clients' confidence in it".

"The CCs are being set up for political gains. Some people are behind this to make money,"said Dr Morshed Chowdhury, a director of Ganashasthya Nagar Hospital.

"Over the last decades, a few initiatives were taken to improve healthcare services and health of the people. There are health centres at union and thana levels as well as health professionals. Despite these,

The respondents said they had no confidence in police force and alleged that both the ruling and the opposition parties were sheltering terrorists.

Earlier, Jana Odhikar activist Jannatul Baker presented a monitoring report on the state of social security in July. Chaired by Ahmed Kamal,

the discussion was participated by, among others, Prof Anu Muhammad of Jahangirnagar University, Shahdhin Malik of human rights group BLAST. economist Hossain Zillur Rahman, Farhad Mazhar of UBINIG. due to growing insecurity in public life, the country's fragile economy had to pay dearly. Unless something is done immediately to check decay of social values and deterioration of law and order, the economy would remain stagnant and investors would not dare to expand their business. They said that the recent in-

cident of 'illegal occupation of a bank' in Dhaka and subsequent indifference shown by the government on that issue had sent a wrong signal to the outside world, making them 'extra cautious' in dealing with Bangladeshi banks. The media and the judiciary

can play a vital role in putting the country on right track, to take the challenge of a new millenium, the panelists noted. They expressed deep concern

at 'non- trial and delay in trial of cases' where police personnel are accused and referred to Rubel murder case as an example of this. One speaker narrated how an eight-year-old boy was shown as accused in 16 cases after his family refused to stop its fight against police harassment.

From page 1 Hasina said her government had undertaken perhaps the most comprehensive set of economic, social and cultural reforms ever in the history to set

every sector in motion. "For their success we need resources ... I can assure you that you would find this a most rewarding experience," she told the American businessmen.

Hasina said there were hardly any trade restrictions in the country, tariff rates being rationalised and had been declining across-the-board and among the lowest in South Asia.

"To promote investment. both direct and portfolio, we have very attractive and competitive incentive packages. Taka, the Bangladesh currency, is convertible to remit profit, dividends and capital etc.

The Prime Minister, however, admitted various shortcomings that stand in the way, but assured that her government wanted to be decisive and remove "bureaucratic roadblocks and foot dragging." "We have sent clear signals about our intention by speedily removing the bottlenecks."

Spelling out the incentives offered by the government under a liberal trade and investment policy, Hasina said the private power companies had been exempted from corporate income tax for 15 years.

She said the exemption of capital gains from transfer of shares by the investing companies had been granted. Avoidance of double-taxation for foreign investors has been ensured through bilateral agreements.

Hasina said investors had started taking Bangladesh seriously. Initial signs indicate a clear rise in registration for foreign direct investment.

Currently, direct investments in Bangladesh stand at nearly 6.7 billion dollars with employment opportunities for 400,000 people. Hasina said the Industrial Policy 1999 decided to offer

Hasina mentioned an Infrastructure Investment Facilitation Company (IIFC) had been set up with the backing of the World Bank to catalyse investment by the private sector in the development of ports, roads, energy, telecoms and water supply

Founded at a cost of 15 million the centre will work closely with the Intrastructure Development Company. The aim is to channel nearly 225 million dollars to the private companies as equity which is expected to attract private capital to the tune of 1.5 billion US dollars in few years.

Turning to political scenario, Hasina said her government does not believe in confrontation but in conciliation. "Opposition groups are con-

sulted on regular basis and all major issues are discussed in Parliament," she said. "We have been relentlessly working to create a stable climate for unhindered economic activities." Giving a resume of the eco-

nomic performance, she said inflation has stabilised around 4 per cent, industrial production is rising steadily and the growth rate is now estimated to be around 8-9 per cent while export and import trade is growing robustly. With private remittances of around 1.5 billion US dollars.
