The club have agreed to sell The Dell to developers Barratt Homes for 5 million pounds (8 million dollars) and pay 4.3 million pounds for the gasworks in the St Mary's district of the city which they plan to turn into a 32,000-seat stadium.

The Premiership club's stadium sale will need approval by shareholders in Southampton Leisure, the stock market listed company which owns the football club.

The total cost of buying and converting the gasworks site will be 30 million pounds.

Sir Bobby said England was the best prepared country to host the World Cup and could stage the championship tomor-row if it wanted, with plenty of


modern pitches and new hotels. The former Manchester United star met the secretary general of the Cairo-based

Full strength Socceroos to face Brazil

SYDNEY, Sept 17: Australia will have a near full-strength squad for their two football internationals against Brazil here in November, national coach Frank Farina said Friday, reports AFP.

The internationals, in Syd-ney on November 14 and Melbourne on November 17, will be Farina's first games in charge of the Socceroos and he wants all of his top players to be available.

"At this stage we have confirmation from 16 of the (European) clubs that our players are involved in. They are all keen to represent their country," Farina said Friday.

"Against Brazil we will have virtually a full strength Australian team."

Farina and assistant coach Graham Arnold leave for England this month to talk with British-based Socceroos and show them their plans of future matches.

Farina said Australia had the talent to reach the 2002 World Cup finals in Japan and South Korea and it was now up to him to justify his appoint-ment in the wake of the brief Terry Venables era.

"I think we will qualify for the next World Cup, hopefully we've got the team, we've definitely got the talent, that's for sure," Farina said.

Among Farina's priorities will be to get guarantees that high-profile Socceroos, Mark Bosnich, Harry Kewell, Mark Viduka, Paul Okon and Ned Zelic will get a release from their European clubs to play against Brazil.


