Mahbub, who won the 200m gold at the Madras SAF Games. finished with Pakistan's Maqsood Ahmed on equal 21.15 seconds. But he was declared second in the 'photo finish' after a half-an-hour study by the technical committee. Maqsood Ahmed, who seemed to have dipped first at the finishing line, won the gold.

Ajay Raj Singh of India bagged the bronze with a timing of 21.16 seconds.

Mahbub. a Petty Officer of Bangladesh Navy, made a brilliant start on lane 7 and was running quite well until the curve where he seemed to slow down a little. However, he ran the last 25 metres like an express train to finish at par with the gold medallist.

"I had pulled a muscle at the curve in the heat. That's why slowed down there in the final, said a demoralised Mahbub, who nevertheless bettered his own timing.

At the 7th SAF Games, Mahbub won the gold in 21.22 seconds.

Bangladesh footballers disgruntled

SAF management under fire

Sep 28: Bangladesh footballers made known the grievances they hold against manager Abdul Gaffar and assistant manager Jahangir Alam.

This surfaced when this correspondent met the members of the team, including skipper Jewel Rana, at their hotel room this morning.

The players said they had to buy their drinking water for the last ten days since arriving in the Nepalese capital on September 17.

"We are getting free drinking water only from yesterday. Before that we had to buy water on our own account and neither the manager nor his assistant looked into the matter," said captain Jewel Rana.

"Unlike other teams, we were deprived of water and soft drinks during our practice sessions," said Jewel.

"When we asked for laundry service the manager advised us to do it ourselves. Have I come here to wash my clothes or play football? This is not the way

you deal with the players in an international meet," said a

visibly dejected Jewel. "They use their political influence to get the post without having the experience of how to do the managerial job. As long as this practice continues we will never have good football management," Jewel said.

Defender Masud Rana, forward Alfaz and goalkeeper Ponir were also present at the

"Three of us are sharing a double room here. Two are sleeping on the bed while the other on the floor. On the other hand, the manager is staying in a suite. Can you imagine such a thing at this international level?" asked Masud Rana.

Goalkeeper Ponir looked very much annoyed. He revealed that only two sets of jerseys were given to the three goalkeepers.

"Biplab and I got our jersey while the other keeper Rakib Mahmud (Apel) is yet to get anything. When I asked the manager he told me to sacrifice my jersey. How can Apel use my jersey when the number and the name is written on the back?

"This shows how much they know about football," said

"I feel pity for Apel because this is his first national assignment and he is yet to get his outfit," added the soft-spoken

Ponir. Striker Alfaz added that they were facing a lot of prob-lems with the food and it was the duty of the manager and his

deputy to look after them. "We are not habituated with the food that is being provided here. They (the manager and his deputy) could have very well looked into the matter and provided us with some Bangladeshi food for at least

one day," said Alfaz. "We don't want to make all these sound as the excuse for

our loss to Maldives, but it affects the team morale in some way." said the four booters. Neither the manager nor his assistant was available at the

NAIROBI, Sept 28 (Internet report): South African skipper Hansie Cronje is looking for a 400 per cent improvement from his team after their humiliating eightwicket defeat to India at
