

FA & Beckham to talk informally

LONDON, Oct 2: The English Football Association confirmed on Friday that Manchester United and England player David Beckham would be attending informal talks to discuss his behaviour on the pitch, reports Reuters.

British newspapers had reported that Manchester United would visit the talks, but FA spokesman Steve Double said: "It's news to us."

"There is no issue between us and Manchester United about the talks."

The talks would be going ahead, Double said.

Soccer officials have said Beckham did not face any disciplinary action but that the FA wanted to talk about incidents at recent matches.

Beckham has been booked five times this season, including a yellow card in United's last European Champions League game in Austria against Sturm Graz when he kicked out at an opponent.

Newspaper reports also said on Friday Beckham had been fined for breaking the club's curfew by visiting a fashion show two days before his team's Champions League clash with Sturm Graz.

Beckham was fined 50,000 pounds (\$2,510 dollars) for attending a jewellery collection launch party with his wife, "Posh Spice" Victoria Adams, newspapers said.

United declined to comment on the fine or on newspaper reports.

Better news for the club is that annual turnover is expected to crash through the 100 million pound (\$165 million dollar) barrier when the European champions report results for their treble-winning season on Monday.

Most analysts are forecasting a profit of 30-31 million pounds before transfer and exceptional costs, up from 29.6 million pounds a year ago as the club nets gains from its unprecedented success at home and abroad.

Owen in Villa boss' bad books

BIRMINGHAM, England, Oct 2: Aston Villa boss John Gregory today labelled Liverpool striker Michael Owen a 'baby-faced assassin' and believes the teenage star gets away with more than his fair share of things on the pitch because of his squeaky clean image, reports AFP.

The Liverpool wonderboy, who became a household name after scoring a stunning goal in England's World Cup defeat by Argentina last year, came under fire from Gregory ahead of today's Premiership game between Liverpool and Villa.

Gregory, who already faces a Football Association misconduct charge for speaking out of turn, said: "Owen is a constant irritation to opposing defenders, and some people think he gets away with quite a lot because he is this boy wonder, Mr Squeaky Clean."

"It is all a question of the size of your reputation and how the public perceive you."

In the same way, Alan Shearer escaped possible punishment for a number of years.

"But in comparison, someone like Vinnie Jones only had to look at an opponent and the referee would be reaching for the yellow card. I saw Owen's tackle on David Weir during the Everton game on Monday and it was a little naughty."

Meanwhile, Liverpool boss Gerard Houllier has defended Owen over his yellow card following a bad tackle on Weir in the Merseyside derby at Anfield on Monday.

Family feud at Grand Slam



MUNICH, Oct 2 (AP) - This time, both Williams sisters did their part and set up a family showdown in the most lucrative tournament in the world.

Serena Williams, the US Open champion, beat Lindsay Davenport 6-3, 6-4 and older sister Venus defeated top-ranked Martina Hingis 6-2, 6-7, 9-7 in Friday, semifinals of the 6-7 million-dollar Grand Slam Cup.

Sunday's final will add 1.3 million dollars to the family budget, with 800,000 dollars going to the winner.

It will also give Serena, at 18 one year younger than Venus, the chance to gain her first victory in the historic sister-sister series. She also collects 100,000 dollar bonus for her US Open title, or lose.

Serena and Venus became the first sisters to meet in a WTA Tour final when they played at Key Biscayne, Florida, in March, with Venus winning 6-1, 4-6, 6-4.

Venus also won their two previous pro non-title matches, in the second round of the 1998 Australian Open, and in the quarters of the 1998 Italian Open.

They could have met in the final of the US Open three weeks ago, but Venus lost to Hingis in the semis. Serena beat Davenport in the semis and then defeated Hingis to win the family's first Grand Slam title.

Venus, who snapped a two-match losing streak to Hingis, didn't want to take her latest success in the sisters' bitter rivalry with Hingis as revenge.

"I don't believe in revenge. No matter what happened, I still lost at the US Open," she said.

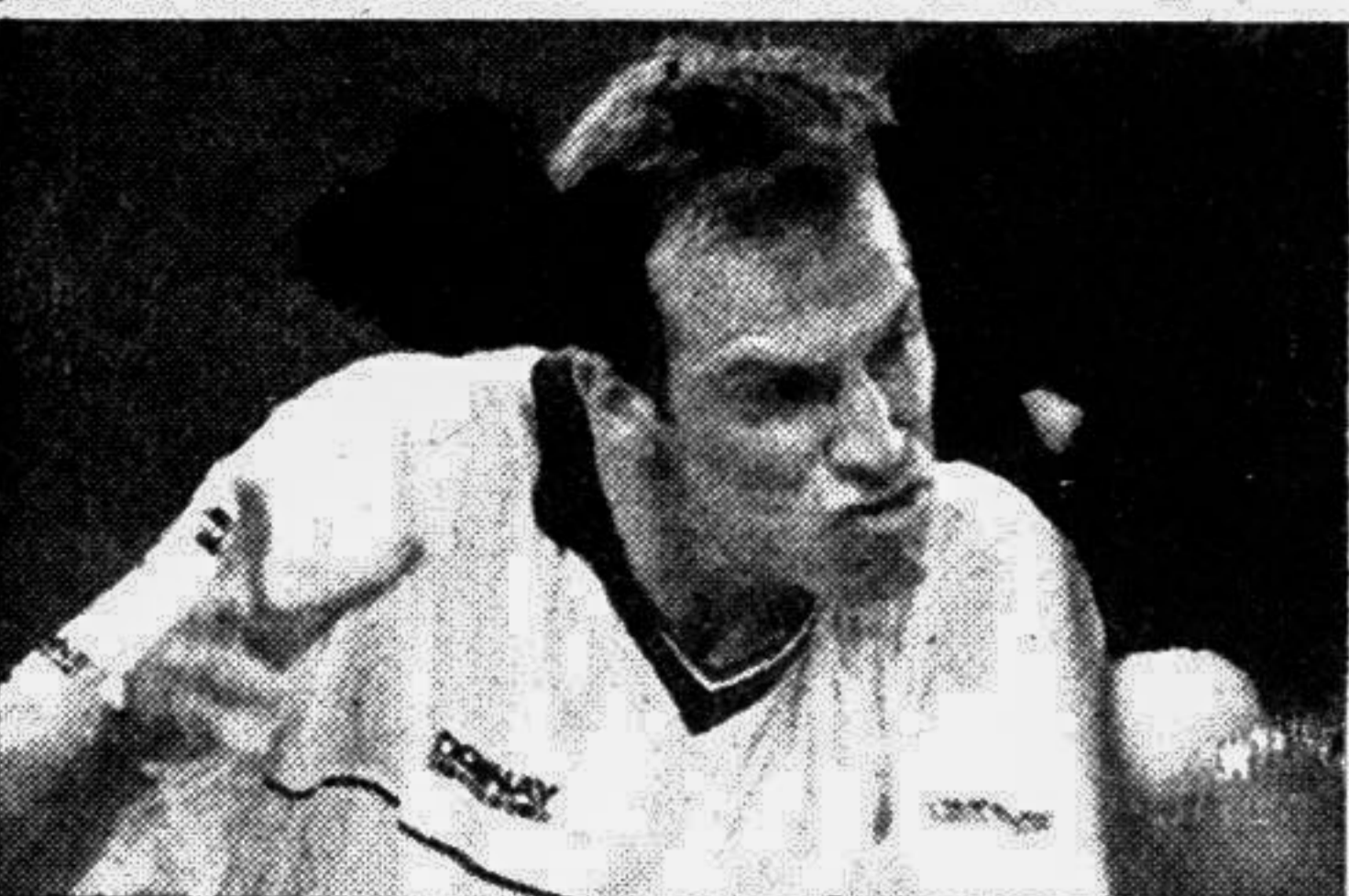
In an often electrifying showdown between two 19-year-olds that took 2 hours, 31 minutes, Venus relied on her big serve and sheer power to rally against Hingis, who was two points away from victory.

Serena had a considerably smoother path into the final, winning in 73 minutes and never looking in danger.

Venus, the defending champion, started well, firing winners and dominating the match, rolling through the opening set and seizing a 4-1 lead in the second.

Hingis celebrated her 19th birthday the day before with a visit to the Oktoberfest, but she said this was not the cause of

her slow start.

"I just didn't understand in the beginning what was happening," Hingis said. "It was almost embarrassing."

The match suddenly turned around, with Venus making mistakes and Hingis winning 10 of 11 points in a stretch to win four straight games and lead 5-4.

In the tiebreaker, Hingis saved a match point with a volley in the tiebreaker. A forehand error by Venus gave Hingis a set point and she took it with a brilliant passing shot.

Venus overcame a 4-1 deficit in the third and got to 4-4, then dropped serve again and trailed 5-4.

Hingis was two points away from winning, but was unable to serve out the match, falling behind 9-30. On the next point, Williams retrieved everything Hingis fired at her.

Forehand, backhand, from one corner to the other, Williams chased down everything. She switched momentum at the first opportunity, sending Hingis to a corner with a good volley. Hingis sent a lob that sailed long and Williams had three match points.

She needed only one, with Hingis sending a backhand long.

"I was down, I didn't want to lose," Williams said. "I wanted to come out the victor for once."

Hingis admitted she had practiced little since the US Open. "If you lose a match like I

to stay in the top," she said.

Venus, finished with 18 aces, but also had 12 double-faults. Hingis had no aces, but only one double-fault and 23 unforced errors compared to 56 for Venus. She now is 4-8 against Hingis.

In men's quarterfinals, Greg Rusedski fired 19 aces in ousting Yevgeny Kafelnikov, the Australian Open champion, 7-5, 7-6. Kafelnikov, No 2 in the world, came here from Australia, where he lost both singles matches in Russia's Davis Cup defeat to Australia.

Kafelnikov, who had a bye into the quarterfinals, could console himself with the 300,000 dollar he took home. That included a 125,000 dollar bonus for his Australian title. Rusedski picked up 325,000 dollars.

Rusedski's semifinal opponent will be Andrei Medvedev, the French Open finalist, who beat Richard Krajicek 7-6, 6-4. In the other semifinal, Tommy Haas plays Tomas Enqvist.

The tournament invites 12 men and eight women with the best records in the four Grand Slam events of the year. Neither of the two Grand Slam champions present here, Andre Agassi and Kafelnikov, made it to the semifinals.

But for the first time since Wimbledon 1992, a women's semifinal featured the top four players. Hingis is No 1, Davenport No 2, Venus Williams No 3 and her sister No 4.

Escude on a roll

TOULOUSE, France, Oct 2: Making a late bid for a berth in the French Davis Cup team, Nicolas Escude beat countryman Fabrice Santoro 4-6, 7-5, 6-2 Friday to gain his first semi-final of the year in the 400,000 Toulouse Open, reports AP.

Currently ranked 80th in the world, Escude beat the seventh-seeded Santoro, ranked 39, after dominating top-seed Tim Henman in the second round.

A surprise quarter-finalist in this year's US Open, the Frenchman will now meet fifth-seeded, big-serving Swiss player Mark Rusedski.

Rusedski came through a two-hour three-setter against Sweden's Magnus Gustafsson 6-3, 3-6, 6-3 to set up his second semi-final of 1999 on French soil after Marseille in February.

The Czech Republic's Daniel Vacek eased into his fourth semi-final of the year by brushing aside American Jeff Tarango 6-4, 6-1 and will meet third-seed Thomas Johansson from Sweden who struggled to subdue Anthony Dupuis 6-7 (5-7), 6-3, 6-4 in 2 hours and 10 minutes.

Newcombe wants to continue

SYDNEY, Oct 2: John Newcombe says he wants to continue as Australia's Davis Cup co-captain with Tony Roche next year regardless of the result of the final against France in December, reports AFP.

Newcombe said today it would be tempting to leave the job if Australia won the Davis Cup but he wanted at least another year to help nurture the careers of Pat Rafter and Lleyton Hewitt.

"It's been a long and hard six years and it does take a lot of time and energy," Newcombe said.

"But in my way of thinking, there are a couple of things that would entice me to do it for one more year."

Newcombe said he had some "unfinished business" with Rafter next year, believing he and Roche could help the two-time US Open winner achieve greater goals.

The three-time Wimbledon champion said he was also convinced Hewitt was a future Grand Slam winner and that he wanted to make sure he developed along the right lines.

"There's a fire that burns inside Lleyton very deeply and strongly," Newcombe said.

"When you find someone who has that particular talent you really need to nurture them and bring them up the right way to make sure that fire is always used in a positive vein."

"He has a very good coach in Darren Cahill but I think the influence and advice from Tony and myself next year could help to solidify that whole thing."

Newcombe was careful not to raise expectations of an Australian victory against the French in 2000, although he said he was optimistic.

"I would think given that we're playing over there and given the volatility of the French crowd I rate the matches as 50-50," Newcombe said.

"But I feel we have something going inside the team and it's something like a big locomotive that's built up a head of steam and is going to be terribly hard to stop."

Newcombe said the injuries to Rafter and Mark Philippoussis would be monitored over the next two months.

He said he was "100 per cent hopeful" that Rafter's shoulder would stand up to the strain of playing Davis Cup.

World Rhythmic Gymnastics

Russians steal the show

OSAKA, Oct 2: Alina Kabaeva of Russia was awarded her third perfect 10 points of the year Saturday on way to her first world rhythmic gymnastics title in the individual all-around event, reports AP.

Kabaeva scored a total of 39,924 points from four routines, while her closest rival, Yulia Raskina of Belarus, tallied 39,774 points for the silver medal.

Winning the bronze was Russian Yulia Barsoukova, who had 39,723 points.

Eva Serrano of France placed fourth with 39,632 points, followed by Ukrainian Elena Vitrichenko's 39,631. Vitrichenko was the world's individual overall champion in 1997.

The 23rd Rhythmic Gymnastics World Championships, the first of its kind ever staged in Asia, serve as a qualifying event for the Sydney Olympics next year.

The Russians continued to dominate by winning the group competition later Friday with a total of 39,500 points. Greece was second with 38,466 points and Belarus third with 39,433.

Countries that placed eighth or better all qualified for the group event in the Olympics. They included Japan, Germany, Italy, Spain and France.

In addition to the eight countries, two additional teams will be determined by the International Gymnastics Federation (FIG) in consultation with continental unions.

The FIG on Friday announced 19 of 24 individual berths for the Olympics next year, based on the results in the preliminary round of the team competition held Wednesday and Thursday.

The berths included two each from Russia, Ukraine, Belarus, Germany and Spain, and one each from France, Bulgaria, Japan, Greece, Israel, Italy, Poland, Hungary and Finland.

The remaining five individual berths will include one each from Africa, the American continent, Asia, Europe and Oceania.

The announcement also said that men's artistic, women's artistic and, for the first time in Olympic history, the flying men of trampolines will compete for their tickets to Sydney in their respective world championships.

"After Sydney? Well, I would like to return to the Olympics in 2004, depending on my health and fitness at the time," Kabaeva declared.

There are five different hand apparatus used in rhythmic gymnastics — ropes, hoops, balls, clubs, and ribbons. Four of them are used in the individual competitions, one at a time.

The group competitions in Osaka included one routine performed only with five pairs of clubs for five gymnasts in each group, and another routine performed with a combination of two hoops and three ribbons.

Six more individual and group competitions take place on Sunday, the final day of the six-day event.

Osaka, Japan's largest industrial complex located near the ancient capital of Kyoto, is bidding for the 2008 Olympic Games.

'Doping passport' sought

ATHENS, Oct 2: Athletes should be ineligible to compete in future Olympic Games unless they carry a "doping passport" proving they have undergone regular out-of-competition drug tests, an Olympic athletes' group said Saturday, reports AP.

The International Olympic Committee executive board, meanwhile, endorsed proposals for 15 athletes to be appointed as members of a reformed IOC.

The IOC athletes' commission met with the executive board Saturday to push for a bigger role in the running of the Olympics and press for stronger

measures to fight performance-enhancing drugs.

Commission member Johann Olav Koss, the Norwegian speed skater who won three gold medals at the 1994 Lillehammer Games, said all Olympic athletes should carry a "doping passport" requiring them to be available for out-of-competition controls 365 days a year.

The passport would be stamped each time the athlete is tested. Details would be forwarded to a new international anti-doping agency, which would keep records of who had been tested, where and when.

If approved, passports would start to be issued before next year's Sydney Games, but the project would only go into full effect in time for the 2004 Summer Games in Athens.
