JU students to lay siege to Shikkha Bhaban today

By JU Correspondent Students of Jahangirnagar University will lay a siege to the Shikkha Bhaban today and

submit a memorandum to the **Education Minister demanding** withdrawal of enhanced admission fees and re-opening of the university.

These are part of a series of programmes announced by the students on October 1 after the authorities closed the university sine die in the face of their movement for withdrawal of enhanced admission fees for first year honours classes. The students are continuing their movement under the banner of Admission Fee Hike Resistance

Committee (AFHRC). The JU Syndicate at an emergency meeting on September 30 decided to reduce the admission fees to Tk 860 from Tk 1703. But the students continued their agitation for with-

drawal of the enhanced fees. AFHRC will also organise a token hunger strike in front of 'Madhur Canteen' at Dhaka University on October7, a human chain at DU on October 9 and launch a signature-collecting campaign.

By Court Correspondent Four persons arrested Saturday night in connection with the biggest ever heroin haul in the country were produced before the CMM's Court, Dhaka, yesterday and the court placed them on remand for interrogation by the Department of Nar-cotics Control (DNC).

Two of them -- Akther Hossain and Mohammad Zakaria-were placed on two-day remand and the other two-- Zamshed Alam and Ramzan -- on one-

day remand. They were arrested from different areas of the city.

Final phase of Indian polls

Violence kills 39, most in northeastern states

NEW DELHI, Oct 3: Although half a million police, soldiers and officials were deployed to limit violence and vote fraud, 39 people were killed in shootings and bombings before polls closed today in the final phase of India's parliamentary elections, reports AP

"We can take some satisfaction that with a difficult election with limited forces ... it's gone off very well," said Election Commissioner Manmohar Singh Gill after a month in which 605 million Indians were given the opportunity to choose 543 parliament

About 500,000 troops and government officials were deployed across 10 states today to ensure free and fair polling for 133 million eligible voters. Gill said there was a 56 per cent turnout today.

Since voting started September 3, about 95 people

were killed in clashes between rival party supporters and in bombings and shootings by separatist militants trying to enforce election boycotts in the several states.

Although a handful of constituencies must still vote tomorrow, on Tuesday and on Oct 28, because flooding, ballot fraud or candidates' assassinations forced postponement, the main vote counting will begin Wednesday.

Most of the deaths today occurred in Manipur, Assam and Tripura, where separatist militants had threatened bloodbaths if people voted.



The Dutch-Bangla three-day match will start at 10 am. Bangladesh Television will cover the match live from the big bowl.


