

## Stoichkov set to coach Bulgaria

SOFIA, Oct 6: Bulgaria's most popular soccer player Hristo Stoichkov has been approved by the country's soccer federation as coach of the national team, sports officials announced Wednesday, reports AP.

The 33-year-old midfielder, considered in Bulgaria the country's most prominent ambassador to the world in recent years, will run the team together with sports manager Dimitar Dimitrov.

Stoichkov's career peaked during the 1994 World Cup finals in the United States where Bulgaria clinched its all-time best fourth place. The sturdy, left-footed player shared the leading scorer standings with six goals.

In 1994, he also collected the European player-of-the-year award after helping Spanish soccer giant FC Barcelona to its fourth successive Spanish league title.

Two years later, he left Barcelona following numerous run-ins with former coach Louis van Gaal and returned to his native club of CSKA Sofia. In 1998, he moved to Japan where he signed with Kashiyawa Reysol of the J-League.

## Injury worry for England

LONDON, Oct 6: Five first-choice England players missed training through injury on Tuesday ahead of the soccer friendly against Belgium on Sunday, reports AFP.

Captain Alan Shearer and defender Martin Keown both have ankle injuries, while Keown's Arsenal team-mate Tony Adams received treatment on an Achilles problem.

Manchester United midfielders Paul Scholes (foot) and David Beckham (hamstring) were also unable to take part in the training session at Bisham Abbey.

There was no immediate news on how serious the injuries were and all five players will be assessed again on Wednesday before a decision is taken on whether they should train or receive further treatment.

Given that the game at Sunderland's Stadium of Light is a friendly, coach Kevin Keegan would be unwilling to risk any players with slight injuries but it may be that some or all of the problems clear up before the game.

Garth Southgate is the only recognised central defensive back-up to Keown and Adams in the 24-man squad after Jonathon Woodgate was unable to join up with the party due to a back problem.

## Walter wants Costa Rica job

SAN JOSE, Oct 6: Former Italy goalkeeper Walter Zenga on Tuesday applied for the vacant position as coach to the Costa Rican national team, reports AFP.

Al Dia newspaper revealed that Zenga had sent his application to the Costa Rican Football Federation (FEDEFUT) to replace Colombian Francisco 'Pacho' Maturana, who controversially quit to become coach to Peru.

Last month Costa Rican officials claimed that Brazilian legend Mario Zagallo -- associated as a player, technical director and coach with all four of Brazil's World Cup triumphs -- had also applied for the vacancy.

Zagallo was Monday sacked as coach of Brazilian side Portuguesa, based in Sao Paulo, and could now immediately take up the Costa Rica job.

## Britain seeded in 2000 Davis Cup draw

LONDON, Oct 6: Great Britain's hopes of progressing in the 2000 Davis Cup were boosted on Tuesday when they were named as a seed for Thursday's World Group draw, reports AFP.

Britain are one of eight seeds in the 16-team elite group, meaning they will avoid the other seven strongest teams in the draw for the first round.

The other seeds are Australia, the United States, France, Spain, Russia, Slovak Republic and Germany.

British Davis Cup captain David Lloyd was furious his team were not seeded earlier this year when they were drawn against and ultimately beaten by the United States in the first round.

## Novotna leaves a loser

FILDERSTADT, Oct 6: Jana Novotna retired from professional tennis after losing in the first round of the 520,000-dollar Filderstadt Grand Prix here Tuesday, reports AFP.

The 31-year-old Czech, who has captured 24 singles titles during her 13-year career, was ousted 6-3, 6-4 by Italian qualifier Silvia Farina in an hour and 25 minutes.

There were contrasting victories for wild card entries Jennifer Capriati, of the United States, and Anke Huber, of Germany. Capriati, enjoying a resurgence back up the rankings, upset Romanian Irina Spirlea 6-4, 6-1 to set up a second round meeting with top seed Martina Hingis.

Huber, champion in 1991 and 1994, saved two match points in a remarkable recovery against seventh seed Julie Halard-Decugis, of France. The German trailed 6-4, 5-1, before capturing 12 of the last 13 games to win 4-6, 7-5, 6-1.

South African Amanda Coetzer became the second seeded casualty when she lost 7-6 (7/5), 6-2 to Belgian qualifier Sabine Appelmans.

Novotna elected to retire after the Filderstadt event after failing to make a full recovery from a right ankle sprain and torn ligament suffered at the French Open in May. She managed to reach the quarter-finals at Wimbledon, but had only two victories in four events coming into this tournament.

Farina, who had lost all five previous meetings against the Czech, took advantage of her lack of mobility to break serve twice in the opening set. Novotna delighted the packed centre court crowd by recovering from 0-3 to 4-4 in the second set, only to drop serve again to lose the match.

Afterwards Novotna stated that she had been advised by doctors to rest her ankle for six weeks in order for it to heal properly.

She said, "I'm relieved it's over. It was not easy coming to Filderstadt after announcing my retirement at the US Open, but it was a good decision to end my career here."

"I would have liked to win the match, but I had a difficult opponent. I have had so little training I knew it was going to be tough, but I am glad it happened against such a hard-working player."

## Pele's son sentenced

SAN PAULO, Oct 6: The son of Brazilian soccer legend Pele was convicted of murder early Wednesday for taking part in a street car race that resulted in the death of a passing motorcyclist, reports AP.

Edson Cholbi do Nascimento, 29, was sentenced to six years in "semi-open" prison, which means he must sleep in the prison but may leave during the day to go to work.

Nascimento and Marcello Marcilio Jose Marinho de Melo, 25 — who also was convicted and sentenced to 6 years in semi-open prison — were accused of racing their cars in Santos, a port town 48 miles (77 kilometers) southeast of Sao Paulo, when they struck and killed 50-year-old retiree Pedro Simoes Neto.

Although Melo's car was the one that hit Neto, Nascimento was found guilty for taking part in the race, which occurred in October 1992.

The pair will be free while they appeal the decision.

Prosecutor Octavio Borba de Vasconcellos began to present his case before a jury at 8 am Tuesday and, except for breaks for lunch and dinner, ran straight through to 1:00 am (0300 GMT) Wednesday.

Most Brazilian trials last around 24 hours, usually running through the night.

## Beckham sidelined

LONDON, Oct 6: A hamstring injury will prevent England's star midfielder player David Beckham from taking part in Sunday's friendly against Belgium, it was announced Wednesday, reports AFP.

Beckham missed the opening day of training to receive treatment but was forced to return to Manchester United today after it became apparent the injury would not recover in time for the game at Sunderland's Stadium of Light.

The midfielder was one of five players to sit out training yesterday, along with captain Alan Shearer and defender Martin Keown who both have ankle injuries. Tony Adams who has an Achilles problem and Paul Scholes who is suffering from a foot injury.

Their injuries will be further assessed today and again later in the week before coach Kevin Keegan decides whether to call up any reinforcements, especially in central defence, where Gareth Southgate is the only cover for Keown and Adams.

Beckham's injury will be especially frustrating for Keegan, whose 25-man squad has now been reduced by two after Jonathon Woodgate of Leeds was unable to join up because of a back problem.

In Beckham's absence, Ray Parlour and Kieron Dyer would be the favourites to fill the right-sided role in midfield, although Trevor Sinclair could also fill in.

## Davis Cup Australian team after tests on Pat, Mark

SHANGHAI, Oct 6: Australia's Davis Cup finale line-up against France in December will be decided in the next days after fitness tests on Pat Rafter and Mark Philippoussis, coach Tony Roche said Wednesday, reports AFP.

"Over the next few weeks we'll be looking at the boys to see how they pull up," Roche said after a tennis clinic he staged here at the 350,000-dollar Heineken Open.

"We'll get the medical reports, then go ahead and announce our line-up."

Rafter, the double US Open champion, has not played since pulling out of his first match at the Open in August to let a muscle tear in his right shoulder heal.

Philippoussis is due back on court next week at the Heineken event in Singapore, his first tournament since losing in the first round in mid-August at Indianapolis and deciding that a knee injured in Wimbledon was still not healed.

The world number 21 will be joined in Singapore by teenage Lleyton Hewitt, the teenage hero of the Aussie game who has held a stitched-together side unified through wins over the United States and Russia this summer.

"Singapore will be the first back for Mark and we'll be looking not so much at results as form" said Roche, who runs the side along with John Newcombe.

Rafter is expected to resume play on the ATP Tour within the month, though he has officially scratched from next week's event in Vienna and the Eurocard Open in Stuttgart starting October 25.

"Pat will obviously need some matches before the Davis Cup final," Roche said of the tie against France set for December 3-5 in Nice. "It's the kind of player who needs to be match-tough."

In the semi-finals, Australia hammered Russia 4-1 in Brisbane with Hewitt getting two singles wins to keep his career Davis record spotless at 4-0. Wayne Arthurs, a debutant at age 28, got the other two points for the home side on grass.

"Lleyton has really come through for us," said Roche. "That's the thing about Australian tennis, we've got depth. We're able to pull in other players."

France will host the finale on clay in hopes of getting an advantage on the hardcourt and grass-keen Aussies.

"It will be a tough tie," said the skipper. "We've got to be careful, but I think it's winnable."

## Bjorkman, Rios in qtrs



SHANGHAI, Oct 6: Fifth seed Jonas Bjorkman and newcomer Andreas Vinciguerra set up an all-Swedish quarterfinal to advance at the 350,000-dollar Shanghai Heineken Open, reports AFP.

Bjorkman, working hard to improve upon a ranking which has dropped to 63rd from fifth just two years ago, overcame a comeback attempt from German Lars Burgsmuller, winning 7-5, 3-6, 6-2.

The 27-year-old will now play his younger countryman, who beat American Cecil Mamiit 6-1, 6-3.

Bjorkman, whose most recent outside interest has been the acquisition of four trotting horses, has beaten the German both times they have met. They last played at Wimbledon four years ago.

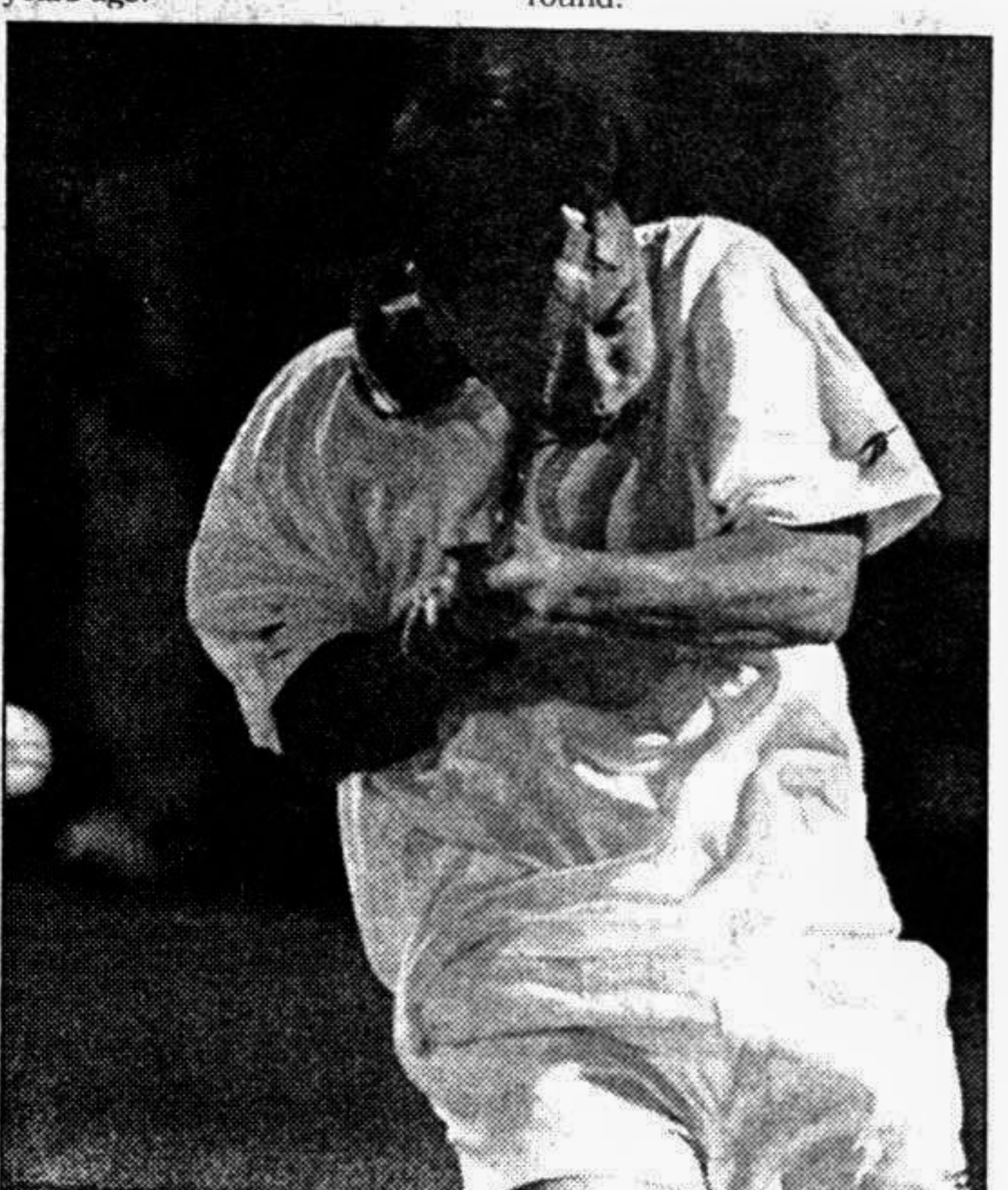
The Swede has had some of his best results of an average year in Asia, reaching the quarter-finals in Hong Kong and semi-finals in Tokyo back-to-back in April.

"This is my first visit to Shanghai, and I haven't seen much more than the courts and the hotel," said Bjorkman. "But it certainly has more of a European feel to it than anywhere else in China I've seen."

Promising Vinciguerra reached the Australian Open junior final last year.

Top seed Marcelo Rios beat a Croatian to reach the last eight, easily taming Croatian Ivan Ljubicic 6-3, 6-2.

Rios, bidding for a 15th career title, never allowed Ljubicic into their 50-minute encounter. The Chilean, a debutant at Shanghai, was playing for the first time since the US Open, when he lost in the third round.

Rios will Friday take on Australian Todd Woodbridge, who avenged a weekend qualifying loss after getting into the event when Mark Woodforde -- his doubles partner -- withdrew injured.

Woodbridge beat South Korean Hyung-Taik Lee 5-7, 6-3, 7-6 after losing to him in qualifying.

"I've never been in a situation like this -- lose to a guy in qualifying and then play him in the tournament," said Woodbridge. "At least I've had a look at him now."

That look lasted for two hours, 29 minutes as the Aussie scraped through to reach his first quarterfinal in exactly a year.

"I've been really lucky this week and I'm riding it," said the winner. "I haven't played that well for a long time. It's been a while for me."

Among Thursday's matches to conclude the second round, second seed Magnus Norman will take on Peter Wessels of the Netherlands and sixth seed Michael Chang is due to meet Max Mirnyi of Belarus.

Earlier, defending champion Chang hit his Asian comfort zone Tuesday night and emerged with a win into the second round.

The world number 65 beat fellow American Brian MacPhie, a qualifier, 7-5, 7-6 and pronounced himself glad to be back in the land of his forebears.

Top seed Marcelo Rios of Chile was barely tested as he dispatched Laurence Tielemans of Italy 6-2, 6-1, while second seeded Swede Magnus Norman -- with four titles already this year -- put out Tuomas Ketola of Finland 6-1, 6-3.

Two seeds were eliminated on Tuesday outdoors on the hardcourts.

Swedish qualifier Andreas Vinciguerra upset Holland's Sjeng Schalken, the number three, 6-4, 6-4, while number six Canadian Daniel Nestor lost to the world's 169th-best, Thai wild card entry Paradorn Srichaphan, 6-4, 6-4.

Another Asian pulled off a surprise as qualifier Hyung-Taik Lee of Korea beat Paraguay's Ramon Delgado 6-3, 4-6, 6-1.
