Loan for jobless poor men

BRAHMANBARIA, Oct 10: The Social Welfare Department recently disbursed Taka 47,500 as interest free loan among the unemployed poor persons of village Ghatira in the sadar under the poverty alleviation programme of the government, reports BSS.

According to an official source, the loan has been given to utilise in cattle rearing, dairy farm, small trade and other economic activities aiming at the socio-economic development of the rural poor. The department has been distributing this interest free loan in other villages.

Elderly Day observed in B'baria

BRAHMANBARIA, Oct 10: The International Elderly Day was observed in Brahmanbaria town and different upazila headquarters on October 2, reports BSS.

To mark the occasion a discussion meeting organised by the district social welfare office was held in the zila parishad auditorium here. Presided over by Al-Amin Jamali, Social Welfare Registration Officer, the discussion was addressed, among others, by Additional Deputy Commissioner (General) Ananta Kumar Chowdhury.

Khas land distributed

CHUADANGA, Oct 10: A total of 888 acres of arable khas land has so far been distributed among 3,000 landless families of four upazilas, reports BSS.

According to an official source, 192 acres were distributed in Chuadanga sadar, 215 acres in Alandanga upazila, 392 acres in Damurhuda upazila and 89 acres in Jibannagar upazila. A total of 1,442 acres of cultivable khas land will again be distributed among the poor farmers in phases. The distribution has been going on.

Flood damages betel leaf

RAJSHAHI, Oct 10: Betel leaf on 600 bighas of land in Mo-hanup thana was severely damaged by recent flooding inflicting a loss of about Tk 6 crore to the growers, reports UNB.

The floodwater submerged most of the betel leaf fields in the thana and water is yet to be removed. Some farmers tried to drain out water from their lands but their efforts failed. Local farmers said they have to spend Tk 20,000 for cultivating betel leaf per bigha of land. If the harvest is good they can earn upto Tk 80,000 from one bigha of land.

Health complex opens

NETRAKONA, Oct 10: Health and Family Welfare Minister Salauddin Yusuf opened the Khalajuri Thana Health Complex constructed by the Construction, Maintenance and Management unit (CMMU) of the Health and Family Welfare Ministry at a cost of Taka 8 crore financed by the World Bank, reports BSS.

The well-equipped 31-bed hospital, which has two operating theatres, will offer medical care mainly to about two lakh people of 'haar' area. In his speech to the opening ceremony, the health minister said the present government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is firmly committed to providing better health services to the people, particularly those in the far-flung rural areas. The government attaches top priority to ensuring health for all by the year 2000 as a national goal and has brought reforms to the health sector by launching the Health and Population Sector Programme (HPSP) in June 1998, he said.

Phensidyl seized

JHENIDAH, Oct 10: Police seized 100 bottles of phensidyl from a coach at Hatgopalpur in sadar thana on Friday, reports UNB.

Acting on a tip-off, police halted the Faridpur-bound bus and recovered the Indian drug from under a seat. In another raid, BDR personnel seized a truck, carrying Indian goods worth about Tk 8 lakh, from Purapara bazaar in Moreshpur thana on October 1. The haul, including onion, sugar and spare motor parts, have been deposited with Jessore adda, BDR jawans and members of Narcotics Control Department (NDC) recovered 230 bottles of phensidyl and 20 bottles of Indian wine from separate places of the district on October 6. On information, BDR jawans raided a bus, coming from Benapole, at Lajaujan on Jersore-Benapole road and recovered 130 bottles of phensidyl.

Telephone exchange project

RANGAMATI, Oct 10: A Tk 120 crore project has been undertaken to set up a 300-line digital telephone exchange in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, reports UNB.

A Japanese expert has already visited the district while a Chinese expert team is scheduled to visit the three hill districts this month to make a preliminary assessment on the project. Under the project, a Bhutan will be constructed for the modern telephone exchange. The project works also include installing a new cable network. They said each and every thana of the three hill districts would gradually be brought under the telephone exchange.

Power outage affects normal life

KUSHTIA, Oct 10: As other parts of the country, economic activities in the district are also seriously being hampered due to frequent power outages, reports UNB.

Production in almost all mills, factories and other establishments remain suspended for nearly six hours a day because of erratic power supply. Local people alleged that the entire town plunges into darkness with the sunset everyday, affecting normal life. More alarming is that at times emergency operations have to be put off in hospitals due to power outages attributed to short supply from the national grid. Shop owners of busy markets of the town are occasionally seen to shutter their shops soon after the sunset due to power failure.

21 seed storehouses in shambles

MADARIPUR, Oct 10: Twenty-one seed storehouses are in shambles due to lack of renovation and maintenance, reports UNB.

There were once 27 storehouses and six of them, located in Shibchar and Kalkini thanas, went into the gorges of rivers. Agriculture officials said the seed granaries were set up in the 60s to preserve seeds and distribute those among the farmers. But the storehouses of Madbarerchar, Bandarkhola, Kathalbari, Charjanajat and Shiruinal in Shibchar thana and Alinagar in Kalkini thana were devoured by rivers Padma and Arial Khan in last few years. If the seed storehouses could be repaired, they said, the block supervisors would be able to use those as their residences.

Relief goods distributed

CIMILLA, Oct 10: Bangladesh Red Crescent Society in collaboration with the Federation of International Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies recently distributed relief goods among the flood victims and persons affected by the breach in the embankment on the River Gomti, reports BSS.

An official source said, about 13,000 affected people of 10 unions of Burichang, Chandna and Debidwar upazilas received per capita 10 kilograms of rice and two kilograms of pulse. Red Crescent officials, government officers and public representatives were present on the occasion.

Telephone booths inoperative

SHARIATPUR, Oct 10: Card Phone, a good venture of the government, suffered a setback in the town in absence of proper maintenance of the booths and shortage of cards, reports UNB.

Five booths in the telegram office and the railway station remained inoperative since long. Residents alleged that five other booths give wrong connection most of the time. It is further alleged that the T&T employees sell phone cards outside the windows at higher rates and create artificial crisis. After closure of the markets and the post offices, people cannot use card phone as the booths are located there.

Problems grip IBS

RAJSHAHI UNIVERSITY, Oct 10: The Institute of Bangladesh Studies (IBS), a unique institute to confer M Phil and PhD degrees for advanced studies and research work on the society and culture of Bangladesh, has been facing manifold problems.

The problems include fund crisis, absence of adequate teachers and modern telecommunication facilities.

Located to the East of Rajshahi University (RU) campus, the institute was founded in 1973 by, among others, noted personalities like Prof Kisan Sarwar Morshed, former Vice-Chancellor of Rajshahi University, late Prof Sufiuddin Joarder, former Professor of the Islamic History and Culture Department of Rajshahi and Dhaka universities. The institute, however, is totally dependent on the Rajshahi University authority for financial grants.

Since its inception, the institute has not allotted any grant against development funds to flourish the separate entity of the institute, IBS office sources said.

"The main IBS building was built with the money saved from the budgets of the institute," Prof Atul Hye Shibly, Director of IBS, said while talking with The Daily Star.

The university authority only provides funds for revenue and other purposes. No money comes for development purpose, so we cannot model the institute to the desired level," he informed.

However, the institute enrolls 18-20 M Phil and PhD fellows through widely advertised competitive admission test. It provides Tk 1,500 and Tk 2,000 as scholarship to the students of M

Phil and PhD programmes respectively.

The institute fellows are very frustrated with this 'meagre' amount of scholarship.

They have been demanding increase of the stipend money for a long time. A few months back, they met the Vice Chancellor (VC) and handed over a memorandum to him and the institute's director simultaneously. But no step was taken in this regard till filing of this report.

"Two pay scales have been declared by the government, but our scholarship remains the same as before," one M Phil student regretted. "The amount of scholarship granted by other institutes and universities as well as the University Grants Commission is almost double than that of IBS," he observed.

"On the other hand, all the previous fees of the institute have been increased between 400 per cent to 900 per cent, but there has been no increase in stipend," he lamented.

Asked on the issue of raising fees, the director said that the fees had been raised for all the M Phil and PhD students of IBS.

"The university authority provides us so meagre amount of money that we cannot even think of increasing the scholarship of the fellows," the director commented on the issue of scholarship.

"Had we been given more money on the scholarship head by the university authority, we could increase the amount of scholarship," the director expressed candidly.

The institute has only two full time teachers excluding the director. The director is appointed by the vice chancellor of the university for three years term. He may be the teacher of IBS or of any department of the university.

In addition to the aforesaid problems, there is lot of space constraints at the institute. The seminar room, the conference room and the library building are very congested.

Many scholars from home and abroad come here to attend seminars, but the conference room and seminar room are not up to the desired level.

Chowhali food scandal

Punishment to culprits demanded

SIRAJGANJ, Oct 10: Hundreds of people in Chowhali thana on Friday brought out a procession and demanded 90 metric tons of inferior quality rice supplied to Chowhali warehouse seized immediately.

They also demanded punishment to those involved in the scandal.

Earlier, three food contractors were suspended in the last week of September 1999 for supplying low-quality rice to the godown following submission of a probe body report.

District food control office sources said the three — Korban Ali, Abdul Khaleq and proprietor of Mohana Enterprise — were entrusted to carry 90 metric tons of rice to Chowhali thana godown from Sirajganj district warehouse in the last week of August this year. But the trio supplied inferior qual-

ity of rice to Chowhali instead of quality rice.

It was alleged that the contractors sold the quality rice in black markets and supplied low-quality rice to the thana warehouse.

When contacted Asraf Ali, In-Charge, Sirajganj food warehouse, said he had supplied quality rice from the district godown. The three contractors, however, denied the allegation.

Chairmen of seven union parishes of the thana also demanded fair investigation into the scandal. They said stern action should be taken against culprits.

Local people said food department officials are trying to save the three food contractors.

Referring to different steps undertaken by the government in the health sector, he said it (government) has given utmost priority to the sector for reducing the death rate of mothers and children.

Natore Rickshaw Peddlers' Union (NRPDU) called the strike. During the strike, a big procession of rickshaw pullers paraded the town roads.

Later the union leaders submitted a memorandum to the ADC (general) demanding fair investigation into the killing of Nannu, son of Forman Gazi of Rathbari thana.

The district administration promised to donate Tk 5,000 to the family members of the victim.
