

## Italian Cup A happy day for Napoli

ROME, Oct 14: Fallen giants Napoli enjoyed a blast from their happier past when they beat Serie A opponents Bari 1-0 in the second round of the Italian Cup yesterday, reports Reuters.

Napoli, Italian champions in 1987 and 1990 and cup finalists as recently as 1997 before they slid into Serie B, outplayed their southern rivals before grabbing an injury time winner through midfielder Cristiano Scarpato.

Bari, cowed by a vocal 40,000-strong crowd at the San Paolo stadium, ended the first leg match with 10 men after midfielder Simone Perrotta was sent off in the 67th minute. If Napoli hold on to their advantage in the second leg in two weeks they face an enticing third round clash with Juventus. Small town Ravenna also conquered top flight opposition, coming from behind to beat last year's Serie B champions Verona 2-1 thanks to goals from Francesco Dell'Anno and Mauro Bertarelli.

Elsewhere, Cagliari shook off their poor league form to beat second-division Genoa 2-1 and complete a miserable 24 hours for the city of Genoa.

On Tuesday night the match between Genoa and Bologna was abandoned after Sampdoria fans threw objects including two metal bath taps at their former goalkeeper Gianluca Pagliuca, now with Bologna.

Pagliuca was unhurt but Sampdoria, who were trailing 1-0, face almost certain expulsion from the competition and a possible ban from their Marassi stadium.

The match was the first official Italian tie to be officiated by two referees and was watched by top FIFA and UEFA officials. The dual referee system was also used in yesterday's ties without notable incident.

Serie A side Perugia beat second-division Ternana 2-1 while the matches between Pescara and Venezia and Reggina and Piacenza ended goalless.

Serie B leaders Atalanta Bergamo take on newly promoted first division side Torino yesterday.

## Kafelnikov in semis

VIENNA, Oct 14: Top seed Yevgeny Kafelnikov reached the quarterfinals of the Austrian indoor tournament without hitting a shot yesterday, reports Reuters.

But there was disappointment for fourth seed Tim Henman. He lost in the first round 6-4, 2-6, 6-3 to Russian Marat Safin. Just a few days after reaching the final in Basel, Kafelnikov had the day off after his Dutch opponent Jan Siemerink pulled out with a knee injury.

A visibly disappointed Henman said Safin, who earned his first ATP tournament win in Boston in August, had "dictated the match."

# Real, Barca share spoils



MADRID, Oct 14: Real Madrid and Barcelona fought out a 2-2 draw at Barcelona's Nou Camp stronghold Wednesday in an eventful match between the two eternal rivals of Spanish football, who met for the last time before the dawn of the year 2000.

Real played some superb football and came very close to ending a 16-year winless run in the Primera Liga in the world famous Catalan arena.

Real's attacking quartet of Fernando Morientes, Raul, Brazilian Saviola and Frenchman Nicolas Anelka were a constant thorn in Barca's side with Anelka hitting the bar in

the first half.

In the 27th minutes the merengues deservedly took the lead when Raul and Saviola worked a neat move with Raul outfoxing Barcelona's Dutch goalkeeper Ruud Hesp. It was Real's first league goal at the Nou Camp since September 1992.

But within two minutes Barca were level. Spanish international Luis Enrique centred the ball to Brazilian Rivaldo who scored from 16 yards out.

But Real continued to create the best opportunities with Morientes and Anelka going close. And the reigning world champions were denied a penalty when Sergi seemed to handle the ball on the goaline.

After the break the game swung the way of Barca, the reigning Spanish champions.

Josep Guardiola worked the ball through to Portuguese star Luis Figo whose shot went just inside Bodo Illgner's left-hand post to make it 2-1 to the home team.

Then, in another twist, Barca's Dutch striker Patrick Kluivert was sent off for insulting the referee, giving the numerical advantage to Real.

Real pressed for the equaliser with Anelka and Clarence Seedorf keeping the 100,000 crowd - nearly all backing Barca - on tenterhooks.

With five minutes left Real grabbed a share of the spoils when Raul, set up again by Saviola, deceived Hesp again.

# Ronaldo raring to go



MILAN, Oct 14 (AFP): Ronaldo has staked his claim to a rare place in Inter Milan's starting line-up this weekend when they try to increase their lead at the top of the Serie A.

Ronaldo was in sparkling form in a midweek friendly against Swiss club Grasshoppers, picking up the latest confidence boost for the Brazilian after a year of injury and disappointment.

The Swiss, coached by former Inter boss Roy Hodgson, were 2-0 up before Ronaldo helped Inter accelerate into a 5-2 lead before finally settling for a 3-3 victory in Zurich.

"I'm feeling better every day," he said. "I'm gradually getting my old form back. I'm better able to cope with prolonged physical effort and instinctively I'm feeling sharper."

Ronaldo, who has spent much of the last two months on

the subs' bench, followed up a matchwinner against Piacenza two weeks ago with three goal assists against the Swiss.

"I feel I'm 80 percent there," he said. "But the important thing is that now I want to play well for 90 minutes. Your physical condition improves with your self too is coming back."

"I always enjoy playing football, but it's true that if you're feeling good, you enjoy it more. And I really enjoyed myself (against Grasshoppers)."

Ronaldo, who turned 23 last month, said the fact that he is to become a father has also helped his football.

"Being settled off the pitch is very important," he said. "And I feel that I'm a very happy man, and that helps me to be a better player."

He also played down his failure to score against the Swiss, saying: "Scoring isn't the most important thing in matches like those. The goals will come. I'm sure about that."

"What counts is reaching your best physical condition and then maintaining it."

Ronaldo was also buoyed up by the team's performance, saying: "We were losing 2-0 and came back to 5-2. That's the mentality we need to have in every match. We have to be aggressive, to create space and to provide as many balls forward to the strikers as possible."

"We need to be an Inter who always wants to win."

Their next chance to do that comes on Sunday in Venice. With second placed clubs AS Roma and Lazio both facing tricky fixtures this weekend, it could be a chance for Inter to extend their two-point lead.

"We have to try and leave the others behind," Ronaldo told the Gazzetta dello Sport. "We have to think about winning Sunday after Sunday."

Asked if he would start, Ronaldo said: "I think I'm ready for it. But it's only right that it's the coach who decides."

## Argentina break the spell

CORDOBA, Argentina, Oct 14: Ariel Ortega hit a spectacular goal to give Argentina a 2-1 win over Colombia in a soccer friendly yesterday, reports Reuters.

Ortega scored from outside the area in the 71st minute after Gabriel Batistuta had given the home side an early lead and Colombia had equalised from a penalty by Ivan Cordoba, who was later sent off.

Ortega's goal gave Argentina their first home win over Colombia in 14 years.

Argentina coach Marcelo Bielsa recalled Batistuta and midfielder Juan Sebastian Veron, who he agreed to rest during the Copa America earlier this year. Batistuta replaced Boca Juniors' marksman Martin Palermo, who remarkably missed three penalties when the two sides met in the Copa America and Colombia won 3-0.

The Fiorentina striker took only seven minutes to make his mark, outpacing two defenders and then beating Colombia goalkeeper Oscar Cordoba with a powerful shot.

Colombian midfielder Freddy Rincun, making his first appearance after going back on his decision to quit the national team, nearly grabbed an equaliser before halftime but saw his effort saved by Roberto Bonano.

But the Colombians leveled three minutes after the break. Cordoba converting after Walter Samuel had fouled Henry Zambrano.

Cordoba was shown the red card in the 89th minute for a second bookable offence.

## Bayissa at his best

BELGRADE, Oct 14: Fita Bayissa of Ethiopia, who was competing at the top level before Paul Tergat even started running, beat the five-time world cross country champion into second place in the Belgrade Race Through History on Wednesday, reports Reuters.

In the first major athletics event to be held in Belgrade since the Kosovo crisis, Bayissa tracked the veteran Burundian, Aloys Nizigama through the first four of the six-kilometre race around the 2000-year-old Kalemegdan Fortress which gives the race its title.

With the little known Moroccan, Abderrahim Goumri, also in close attendance, Kenya's Tergat launched his attempt to win with a sprint along the 200 metres straight.

But Bayissa was not to be denied and he held on to win by a stride in 17 minutes, eight seconds with Tergat a second behind, and Goumri third in 17:12, a second ahead of Nizigama.

Tergat, beaten in all three previous runnings of the race, finishing second twice and third once, said: "It looks as if this is one race I will never win, but I'd love to run it again."

# Zidane appeals for time



TURIN, Italy, Oct 14: French World Cup hero Zinedine Zidane appealed to the Juventus boo-boys on Wednesday to give him more time to find his lost form, reports AFP.

Zidane, who is struggling to fully recover from surgery late last season, was whistled by the home fans two weeks ago after a poor team performance against Venezia, salvaged by a late winner from captain Antonio Conte.

"What you're seeing is not yet the true Zidane," said the World Cup winner. "Against Venezia, they were whistling me. Obviously, I didn't like it, but I do understand the fans."

"It's just a question of time and form. It's not easy to get it back after a knee operation like mine, when you still feel a small amount of pain and it, conditions your performance."

Zidane even said he would be willing to rest up for a while if coach Carlo Ancelotti thought it would ultimately help him get back into shape.

"You get your form back by playing," he told ANSA news agency.

"But I don't know what the best thing to do would be in my case; it's only right that the coach decides and even if he told me to stop for a while, I wouldn't get annoyed."

Zidane, who also underperformed last season, said he couldn't explain why he hadn't scored for Juventus since January 24.

"The one who's most unhappy with the situation is me," he said. "Something like this has never happened to me before in my career. But I have to look forward and be positive."

He defended his team's lacklustre start to the Serie A season, and the often poor quality of the football, which has in-

censed the Turin fans.

Inter Milan are top with 13 points, with AS Roma second on goal difference ahead, of Lazio (both 11pts), followed by Juventus (10pts).

"We're not doing that badly in terms of results, because being three points behind the top club is still a good position," he said.

"Certainly, our football does leave something to be desired. But if we're in third place playing like this, that's something to be optimistic about," he claimed. "Because when everyone's on form again, we can only do better."

Zidane faces his biggest challenge of the season this weekend when Juventus take on Roma in the inferno of a packed Olympic stadium.

The Frenchman said: "The whole team have to start giving 100 percent again, even though I realise I'm the first one who should be doing more."

"But the fans have to believe me: I'm doing everything I can

to get back to my former standard."

The Frenchman, who is almost certainly going to start on Sunday night, tried to play down the prospect of taking on Fabio Capello's men.

"It's a match, like any other," he said. "Even though the opponents have a very strong side, I'm confident."

## Cole, Yorke the men to watch

TOKYO, Oct 14: Manchester United strikers Andy Cole and Dwight Yorke hold the key to the outcome of next month's World Cup championship game against Palmeiras in Tokyo, according to Zico, one of Brazil's greatest players, reports Reuters.

Zico, who master-minded Flamengo's 3-0 destruction of Liverpool in the 1981 clash, was quoted as saying by Japan's Daily Yomiuri newspaper: "For me, Yorke and Cole really stand out for Manchester. They are a strong team, very hard in midfield and with great speed in offence through Cole and Yorke. I like these two very much."

Zico, at present technical director and caretaker-manager of Japan champions Kashima Antlers, warned that the South American champions should not be under-estimated by their European counterparts in the November 30 match.

"Palmeiras had many, many problems a short time ago but now their performance is going up. They will arrive here in very good condition, so anything is possible in one match," he said.
