A Struggle for Rain

Loko Nattyadal's 21st production Tapasshi 'o Tarangini staged

THE famous director of Kanjush, Liyakat Ali Lucky along with Loko Nattyadal presented their 21st production, Tapasshi 'o Tarangini at the Mahila Shamiti Stage October 11. Written by Budhadeb Basu the drama depicts the suffering of humans due to the paucity of rain and a story of love.

The lack of rain brought out the glutony in a particular country during the mediaeval time period. The knights were out collecting food, but food was somehow being stolen - even a ship full of food sank mysteriously, causing major problems related to hunger and starvation. Having no other option the King ordered his sorcerer to stop the holocaust. The sorcerer then told him that the dry spell will come to an end if the bachelor saint (shadhu), Hrissha Shringa (Samsuddin Ahmed Sagar) got married. So, the King's men called in a powerful fortune-teller by the name of Lolapangi (Zeenat Jahan Anita) and her beautiful daughter Tarangini (Sabina Bari Lucky) to seduce Hrissha Shringa with her beauty, so that he breaks away from his trance.

While the enchantress Tarangini enticed Hrissha Shringa, the King prepared his daughter Princess Shanta (Lavly Mahmud) for her marriage with the saint. The King figured that the only way to bring Hrissha Shringa to his kingdom was to attract him with the feminine beauty of Tarangini, where Shanta will wait for him, dressed as a bride. The next scene shows Tarangini, looking beautiful and seductive, trying to attract Hrissha Shringa while he was praying. She tells him that she went there to serve him. A very

good combination of dance music and stage lighting gave the scene a wondrous look. According to the King's plan, Hrissha Shringa was brought to the city, with the help of the femme fatale. When Hrissha Shringa entered the city, there was a sudden lightning in the sky and then it started to rain. Everyone screamed 'Rain! Rain!' in joy and happiness - it was the first rainfall in a long time. After that Hrissha Shringa and princess Shanta got married, thus normalising the lives of the people.

When Tarangini had met Hrissha Shringa, he had described to her the Goddess like beauty that she possesses. After returning from the jungle she became unkind and always looked for a mirror to see herself. Her dark life as an enchantress started to look brighter.

The National Arts and Crafts Fair ends today

DHAKA Sheraton Winter Garden is hosting the National Arts and Crafts Fair organised by the Export Processing Zone and Bangla Craft. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina had inaugurated the 3-day long fair on October 17, 1999 at 11 am.

Just inside the entrance of the Winter Garden, one will see two weaving machines

(courtesy of Bibi Productions and Probertana) and two weavers operating them. This is one of the main attraction of the fair.

This fair is playing quite a role in upholding the tradition and culture of this country. Most of the stalls have been decorated with traditional Bengali decoration and they even sell traditional clothing, ornaments, toys, bed-sheets, towels and so on. The fair has given the poor weavers a chance

to show-off their talents as artists and craftsmen and has proved that the products 'Made in Bangladesh' are exotic and

beautiful - not only to Bangladeshis themselves, but to foreigners, who has shown a keen interest in the fair.

One of the most eye catching stall is that of 'Bibi Productions' which has made great use of 'Grameen Check' and made everything starting from clothes to jewellery with it.

Bane Textile of Rangamati has decorated their stall with shirts, panjabi, fatuwas, frocks for children and bed-sheets. Kumudini Welfare Trust is another stall which has attracted a lot of attention. They have the very famous 'Nokshikatha' 'Nokshi Sari', 'Nokshi cushion cover' and shopping bags among their collection.

'Kanishka' has different types of saris which has caused quite a stir. Their 'Rajshahi Silks' are a major hit with the buyers.

The other stalls are BRAC Batic, Uttom, Midas Mini Mart, Maisha Boutique, Nipun and Heed Handicrafts among others. All of these stalls have designed their own products and their own stalls and has done a commendable job.

Such fairs are not only necessary, but mandatory, for the promotion of traditional Bangladeshi products which are directly linked with the culture of this country. 'Nokshi Katha' and Handloom cloths are a vital part of the cultural heritage and it would be a shame to lose it all to modernism. New ideas are welcome, new technology is appreciated, but not at the expense of the age-old traditions which makes this country, what it is.
