PARIS, Nov 24: Footballers and rugby players may perform better if they have sex before the match, according to new research that turns on its head the conventional belief that sportsmen should become monks before a key game, reports AFP.

The widely-held belief is that testosterone, the hormone related to sex and aggression. builds up if a player has no sex, making him friskier and feistier on the field.

But, reports the British weekly New Scientist in Thursday's edition, researchers at Italy's University of l'Aquila have found that testosterone levels in fact build up after an increase in sexual activity.

They made the discovery after measuring the testosterone in the blood of more than 80 patients with long-term impotence, and found their levels of the hormone to be about twothirds of those of sexually active men of equivalent age.

The group then underwent three months of non-hormone therapy for impotence. Those who were treated successfully showed a "dramatic rise" in testosterone levels, while those who made a partial recovery had a smaller rise.

The ones who remained impotent continued to produce low amounts of testosterone.

"It's the restoration of sexual activity that raises testosterone to normal levels," a researcher, Emmanule Jannini, was quoted as saying.

She believes that in men, the body adjusts testosterone levels to match sexual drive to the level of sexual activity - and the same may be true for women.

"It's an adaptive mechanism. If a man has sexual intercourse, testosterone causes him to desire the next sexual intercourse."

The conclusion, he says, is that sportsmen do not necessarily have to be closeted into a life of abstinence before the game.

"It's a matter of the character of the athlete. If he needs to be more aggressive, it's better to have sex."




