SYLHET, Nov 26: India is built, the entire northeastern and southern parts of Bangladesh could turn into deserts while the Sylhet region would come under threat of fre-

quent earthquakes. They caution that the Surma and Kushiara rivers, tributaries of the Barak, would lose their flow with the construction of the dam, leaving far-reaching adverse effects on socioeconomic condition of one-fourth area of the country, from Sylhet to Barisal.

If the dam is constructed power generation in Ashugani plant and production in Fenchuganj Fertilizer Factory will also be threatened, the experts say.

They say production in 130 tea gardens of Sylhet region would come down drastically due to the adverse effects of the

The river Barak enters into Bangladesh through the Amalshid frontier and splits into Kushiara and Surma. The Surma falls in the Bay

of Bengal running through Sylhet, Sunamganj, Mymensingh, Kishoreganj, Brahmanbaria, Chandpur and Bhola districts while Kushiara merges with Surma at Markuli in Ajmiriganj after passing through Zakiganj, Bianibazar, Fenchuganj, Golapganj, Balaganj, Rajnagar, Moulavibazar, Nabiganj and Jagannathpur.

India first took up the initiative to build the dam in the early 90s and later suspended the programme amid strong protest by the people of greater Sylhet.

But it has again embarked on the project in spite of objection by the government of Manipur State. The state government argued that construction of any dam in the river would only prompt earth-

quakes. Experts as well as the people of Sylhet region has urged the government to undertake diplomatic efforts to restrain India from constructing the

Hotel expansion plan Business offices asked to vacate Sheraton premises

By Staff Correspondent Business organisations us-ing premises of the Sheraton hotel have been asked to vacate their offices by the end of January next as the hotel gears up for a massive expansion programme.

"We have been advised by our owning company Bangladesh Services Ltd (BSL) that in the backdrop of the NAM summit they will be carrying out an expansion work," said the hotel authorities in a letter sent to the business organisations. The expansion plans include a lobby with an atrium, a grand ballroom, meeting rooms, office space and underground car parking facilities.

"The owners would like to start the expansion work immediately and requires the space to be available from February 1," the letter said. "We request you to kindly

hand over the keys of your offices to our possession by January 31, next". "Bangladesh Services Ltd. has some vacant space available and the hotel can also offer

you space in the guest rooms on the third floor should you want to rent these." the letter added. At least 24 business organisations occupy 17,000 square feet, sources said, adding that all the organisations have been served with notices to vacate the premises by the end of December. The notice was

served on November 9. However, some top executives of the business organisations said they don't have enough time to move before the January 31 deadline. Others complained the space offered was insufficient.

A Sheraton executive dismissed the claim. He said the organisations were given enough time as stipulated by the hotel's "leave and license agreement". Either party may terminate the contract with one month's notice, he added.

Most of the offices have been offered space for relocation in the BSL complex, at the backyard of Hotel Sheraton, sources said. Efforts are underway to accommodate all the organisations in the available space

Asked whether the space was sufficient to accommodate all these offices, a source in the BSL administration said that 14,000 sq. ft area was available with the complex.
