After learning that Shaikhul Hadit might not attend the summit, the full liaison committee team representing leaders of BNP. Jatiya Party and Jamaat-e-Islami met the IOJ chief at 2:30 pm yesterday. They stayed for one hour and finally convinced him to attend the summit.

After the summit, the IOJ leaders were in a meeting till 10 pm to review the outcome of the summit.

Summit brings Khaleda, Ershad together after 17 yrs

Four chiefs hint at coalition govt

Four opposition chiefs have indicated a coalition government in future, but stopped short of making a formal announcement.

The four leaders, at their much-vaunted summit meeting yesterday evening, however belied speculations about an electoral alliance.

They promised to scrap Special Powers Act and free the state-run electronic media when voted to power in an outline of their future government they hope to form very soon.

"The collective efforts of our four parties are to form as soon as possible a strong, patriotic government on a broad-based consensus to face the challenges of the twenty-first century, said the declaration, released after a hour-long meeting. BNP chairperson Khaleda

Zia hosted the meeting, attended by Jatiya Party chief H M Ershad, Jamaat supremo Golam Azam and Islami Oikya Jote chief Azizul Huq, at her Minto Road official residence. Hundreds of leaders and ac-

tivists waited outside the redbrick building as the four leaders sat with their top aides. The leaders also posed for photo. They signed the four-page declaration in presence of secretaries general and leaders of the alliance liaison committee. Two other notable participants



Taka devalued by 3 per cent

The Bangladesh Bank yesterday devalued taka by over three per cent, making dollar costlier by Tk 1.50.

The devaluation, second during the current financial year. is the highest since 1975 when it was devalued by 58 per cent.

The central bank's buying rate of dollar has been fixed at Tk 50.85 and selling rate at Tk 51.15. The mid-rate is now Tk 51, official sources said. When the Awami League gov-

ernment came to power in 1996.

the official buying rate of dollar was Tk 41.75. Since then, taka was devalued 16 times. "We had been closely watching taka value. For the last few weeks, our currency was overvalued by four to five per cent,"

Bangladesh Bank Governor Dr M Farashuddin said while talking to The Daily Star.
"On the other hand, we have to remain competitive in the international market. Our major competitors devalued their cur-

According to figures available. India devalued its currency by 17.18 per cent over the last four years. Pakistan by 32.33 per cent, Thailand by 34.52 per cent, and Indonesia by 67 per cent. With yesterday's downward adjustment, taka has been devalued by 20 per cent over the same period.

The governor said the country needs to boost its export and at the same time go for diversification. Last year, the trade gap was 2.7 billion dollars with imports worth 8 billion dollars and exports worth 5.3 billion dollars.

"We need to keep our product pricing right if we have to bridge this gap, the governor said. He, however, agreed that pricing alone can not boost exports. Improvement in quality of products and law and order are also cardinal factors. Dr Farashuddin also hoped

KHULNA. Nov 30: Chargesheet in the sensational Khalid Murder Case was submitted to the Court of the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate here today accusing 28 people in-cluding Ershad Shikdar. Shikdar is the main accused in the murder case.

Jubo League leader Khalid Hossain was the last victim of murders committed by Ershad and his armed cadres during last 20 years in his illegally occupied railway colony areas and at Skid Ghat under Kotwali thana. Of the 28 accused, 19 are now in jail hajat while the rest are absconding.

Khalid Hossain was beaten to death in the Ice factory at about 8-30 pm on May 16 this year following an altercation

over the lease of Khulna jail river ghats. Awami League activist and businessman Munir Hossain and his younger brother Chayan were also beaten up in

the same attack. The alleged killers later dumped the car of the injured Munir and two motorbikes of his associates into the river Bhairab.

Over eight million Bangladeshis suffer from kidney problems annually, an epidemic overwhelming the na-tion's specialists and treatment facilities, says the vice-chan-

cellor of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University. "It is therefore very important to increase the number of specialists and trained manpower in order to disseminate treatment and management of various speciality based medicine," said Prof. MA Quaderi during his opening address to the Bangladesh Renal Association's 8th National

Over 210 kidney specialists and trainees attended the convention, which featured guest

speakers from the USA. Canada, New Zealand, South Africa, Thailand, India and Pakistan. The International Society of Nephrology sponsored the two-day event.

Doctors estimate 35,000 patients suffer from kidney failure annually. However, there are only 30 kidney specialists in the country, which means few receive the treatment they need to live healthy, productive Habibur Rahman, secretary

has been completed but they will have to wait for an "indefinite period for the final caisson to sink"

Sources said, condition of the soil is so "stiff that on an average, each of the four completed caissons took three years to sink. This is causing heavy loss to the firm that accepted the bridge project at a much lesser cost than that of the China-Bangladesh Friendship

Bridge downstream, the sources claimed. The 42-month project was initially scheduled to be completed in February 1998, but the time was extended to April 1999 as the authorities stopped construction work to relocate the ferry service and utility services' lines passing through the
