KARACHI, Dec 1: Former world class all-rounder Imran Khan called on the International Cricket Council to introduce neutral umpires at both ends in international cricket, reports AFP.

"I think the time has come to introduce two neutral umpires in international cricket and it will put most of the controversies in the sport to end." Imran, now a politician, told the news

The move comes after Pakistan's resounding defeat in Australia, although Imran insisted his call had nothing to do with the matches there.

Nevertheless in the second Test of the just-ended series, Australian umpire Peter Parker turned down a confident caught behind appeal against Aussie batsman Justin Langer which riled Pakistan captain Wasim Akram.

"I am not saying this because of any specific incident but in my opinion there remains an element of doubt with the home umpires standing in a match, said Imran, who boasts an ag-gregate of 3,807 runs and 362 wickets in 88 Tests.

Pakistan captain Wasim Akram, who was left seething at Parker's decision, has also argued in favour of two neutral umpires in Test matches.

The Pakistan team, due back home later today, were clean swept 3-0 in the series by Steve Waugh's Australia.

When we have two neutral umpires in other sports why can't we have this in cricket? The factor of home bias has to be eliminated," Imran said. Pakistan Cricket Board's ad-

hoc committee chief Zafar Altaf is reportedly to raise the issue at the ICC annual meeting. "Besides having neutral um-

pires at both ends I think it's about time we took more assistance from TV replays in crucial decisions like caught behind, there is no harm in it. Khan said. Imran was full of praise for

The notice, served on Rediff editor Nikhil Lakshman, said the website had intentionally sought to malign Lele.



FIFA, soccer's governing body, said the mascots reflected the hi-tech reputation of cohosts Japan and South Korea.

"Mascots in the past have been two-dimensional and quite cruder said Glen Kirton, a senior executive with ISL. FI-FA's marketing partner. "We wanted to use the latest technology to reflect the modernity of the host countries."

The Atmos are unlike mascots used to market any major sporting event before and are . light years away from World Cup Willie, the first World Cup mascot used in England in

may frighten younger children. According to a statement accompanying their introduction, the Atmos live high in the sky in a place called Atmozone where they play their own ver-

sion of socer called Atmoball. There, they create a great atmosphere around the game -the kind of atmosphere created back here on earth when humans go to a match. The Great Atmo Leader is challenged by his father, King of All Atomzone, to go and create a special atmosphere for the 2002 World

Story-lines will be developed over the next 2-1/2 years plotting the adventures of a family of Atmos as they try to find their way to the 2002 World Cup

"Mascots for our events have evolved over the years but this is a giant leap into the future of staging our biggest event," said FIFA general secretary Michel Zen-Ruffinen.

"We hope that the end result will contribute to full stadiums with a fabulous atmosphere at all 64 matches.' FIFA say they are delighted with the creations which have

cost around 1 million Swiss francs (631,300 dollars) to develop over the past 18 months. "We have long felt more could be done than just have a furry little animal - cute and cuddly as mascots like World

others have been in their day," Kirton said.

"The whole concept of the Atmos is different and will add significant muscle to the marketing programme. They have neither Korean or Japanese characteristics, but are very much in keeping with the oriental cartoon feel and animation from this part of the world.

"A number of ideas were suggested like having the Atmos live under the ocean between Korea and Japan, but I think the space-age feel is perfect for the start of the new millennium.

"A number of people within FIFA have said that some of the imagery is a little frightening -but I think kids like to be frightened a little bit. And they are quite loveable and mischevious once you get to know them."

Footballer of the Year award. the Confederation of African Football (CAF) announced on Wednesday.

It is the second time the 23year-old Arsenal forward has won the award, following his triumph in 1996 when he captained Nigeria's under-23 team to the Olympic title in Atlanta.

Kanu, who has made a remarkable recovery from a lifethreatening heart ailment, has been a relevation in the English league since he joined Arsenal from Inter Milan in January. He previously played for Ajax Amsterdam.

He finished with 46 points, just two points more than Ghanaian defender Samuel Osei Kuffour of Bayern Munich in the poll of members of CAF's technical and press committees.

Ivory Coast striker Ibrahima Bakayoko of French club Olympique Marseille was third with 42 points, two points ahead of former World Footballer of the Year George Weah of Liberia.

Mustapha Hadji of Morocco. last year's African poll winner, finished joint eighth, one place below 1997 winner Victor Ikpeba of Nigeria.

Kanu's selection means Nigeria have won four African Footballer of the Year awards in the last six years since CAF took over the running of the award from the magazine France Football.

Teenage striker Aruna Dindane of Ivorian club ASEC Abidjan was the highest-placed player with an African club. He finished sixth. One controversial selection in the top 10 was that of Algerian-born Ali Benarbia of French club Paris St Germain. He has consistently refused to play for his country but was still voted equal eighth.

# World champs richest of all



LONDON, Dec 1: Manchester United remain the world's richest soccer club but

Spanish and Ital ian rivals could overtake them soon, according to a survey published today, reports Reuters. The Rich List survey by ac-

countants Deloitte and Touche and soccer magazine FourFour Two revealed that all the 20 wealthiest clubs were in Europe and 14 of them were either English or Italian. Flamengo of Brazil were

11th in the last Rich List, with clubs ranked according to turnover, but this time they were pushed out by the Europeans with their flow of cash from satellite television.

Spain's Atletico Madrid and Dutch club Ajax Amsterdam also slipped out of the superrich group.

United, who on Tuesday beat Palmeiras of Brazil 1-0 in Tokyo to become the first British side to win the World Club Cup, generated income of 87.9 million pounds (140.1 million dollars) from all sources in

the 1997/98 season. That figure was unchanged from the 1996-97 season but is expected to increase dramatically next year.

"At 87.9 million pounds, their turnover in 1997/98 was around 20 per cent more than that of Real Madrid who, with a turnover of 72.2 million pounds, have knocked Barcelona from the number two spot this year." the survey said.

Real's turnover increased by almost 17 million pounds (27.09 million dollars), much of it derived from pay television and the club's Champions League triumph in 1998. "The fact that Manchester

United's turnover did not change highlights its impressive capacity for generating in-

come," the survey said. These figures come from the season when they won nothing yet they were still able to easily outstrip all the world's other

clubs," added the survey. "Next year's figures will show an increase of more than 25 per cent to more than 111

million pounds. "Yet incredibly this may not be enough to keep United top of the financial pops for long be-cause of the size of deals that Spain and Italy's top clubs are

doing with TV companies." Gerry Boon, partner in charge of Deloitte and Touche's Football Industry team, said television income was also leading to increased polarisation of wealth.

"Polarisation is occurring

not only within leagues but also between them," he said. "Last year there were eight different countries represented in the Rich List while this year there are only six - Brazil and Holland having dropped out." "Unless the structure of the

premier league TV deal changes in 2001, English clubs just won't be able to compete with that soon," said FourFour Two editor Michael Hann. United, who won the English

league and FA Cup last season as well as the European Cup. were easily the wealthiest club

in the premier league. Newcastle United, the "magpies" who have a huge support but last won the league in 1927, were the second wealthiest English club in fifth place with 49.2 million pounds (78.39 million dollars)
