UNICEF publication launched

RANGAMATI, Dec 14: The launching ceremony of UNICEF's publication, 'The State of World's Children 2000,' was held at the local Tribal Cultural Institute auditorium on Monday evening, reports BSS.

Crackdown on hemp growers

RANGAMATI, Dec 14: Responding to a government instruction, security forces have launched a crackdown on hemp cultivators and illegal drug traffickers in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, reports UNB.

The security forces unearthed a huge quantity of hemp filed in Kalapahar area and destroyed hemp plants on about 5 acres of land. Earlier, the security men destroyed hemp plants on about 1,000 acres of land in Lanhudu and Bilaichhari thana.

Pirates barricade road

NAOGAON. Dec 14: Highwaymen barricaded the Naogaon-Patnitola road at Matazi village in Mahadevpur thana on the night of Dec 8 and committed dacoity in nine trucks, reports

Truckers said a gang of 25-30 road pirates barricaded the road by felling trees at midnight and looted goods and valuables from the trucks. The robbers also snatched the belongings of a motorcyclist.

Arms recovered

BRAHMANBARIA, Dec 14: Sarail Thana Police recovered different smuggled materials including fire arms from the house of Abdul Kader of Kalikaccha, an alleged gang leader of interdistrict highway dacoits, and arrested Asia Khatun, 45, recently, reports BSS.

Police sources said, the recovered items included a pipe gun. one cartridge, on kiriz, one Chinese axe, a saw, an iron rod and two tape-recorders. A case has been filed in this connection.

Foundation-laying ceremony

PABNA, Dec 14: State Minister for Information Prof Abu Sayeed said here recently that government of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has been making all-out efforts to build a poverty-free prosperous Bangladesh to improve the lot of the people, reports BSS.

Speaking as the chief guest at the foundation-laying ceremony of Sathia thana sub-registry office here, Prof Sayeed said that the Awami League government had always stood beside the people in their woes. He said that the government had successfully faced the last year's devastating flood through coordinated efforts. The Sathia thana sub-registry office will be constructed at a cost of Taka about 32 lakhs 15 thousand. officials said.

Prisoner injured

SHERPUR. Dec 14: An inmate of the district jail was seriously injured by jail police on Monday, reports UNB.

The victim Suruj Member who is a member of Nalitabari thana Awami League was hit hard on the head by a jail cop in the morning. He was rushed to sadar hospital in a critical condition on Monday morning. The reason for beating of Surui was not disclosed by the jail authority but informed sources said he went unruly inside the prison. As his condition deteriorated, doctors shifted him to Mymensingh Medical College Hospital. Police super and jailer admitted the incident. Deputy Commissioner and Police Super visited the spot.

Youth dies in clash

CHAPAINAWABGANJ, Dec 14: A fierce clash between two feuding groups left a youth dead and 30 others injured at Rashiknagar village in Shibganj thana on Monday, reports UNB. Police and hospital sources said the henchmen of Nayaladanaga union chairman Ashraf and his rival Golam Mostafa Panchu locked in a clash on Sunday night in a sequel to their longstanding enmity. Ekramul, 19, killed in a bomb attack when the two groups resumed fighting with firearms on Monday morning. Some 30 people on both sides suffered bomb injuries during the protracted rioting. The injured were admitted to sadar hospital and Rajshahi Medical College Hospital. Additional Police Super M Anwar Hossain and ASP M Nurul Islam vis the spot. Police were deployed in the area to fend off fur.

Robbers kill man

SUNAMGANJ, Dec 14: Armed robbers opened fire on the villagers killing a man and injuring a woman at village Chhatrish Kalipur in Chhatak thana here on Sunday night reports UNB.

The dead was identified as Kasab Ali, 32, and the injured as Kanchan Mala, 36. Police said the robbers looted valuables worth over Tk one lakh from the house of Kanan Chandra Pal of the village. When the bandits were fleeing the scene, villagers laid siege to them hearing the hue and cry of the family members of Chandra Pal. The robbers opened gunshots to disperse the people leaving the man dead on the spot. A case was filed with Chhatak thana.

Six injured in clash

TANGAIL. Dec 14: Six persons were injured in a clash between two rival groups at Shuvulla Fatepur in Mirzapur thana recently, reports BSS.

According to local sources, the injured persons were admitted

into Kumudini Hospital in Mirzapur thana. The two rival groups attacked each other for a dispute of land causing six persons injured.

Exam for pry teachers

NARSINGDI. Dec 14: The written test examination for primary school teachers were held here on December 10. reports BSS.

According to official sources, a total of 6,183 persons have appeared in the written test examination for 74 posts of assistant teachers of primary schools. Of the total, 4,910 females and 1,273 males appeared in the examination.

12,002 candidates for 269 posts

CHITTAGONG. Dec 14: Three dedicated teachers of Raozan Gourmoni High School who have sought appointment in primary school said there was no academic atmosphere and respectability in the high school, reports UNB.

Requesting anonymity they said they had opted for teaching profession imbued by the lofty ideal. They hope of getting some satisfaction among the younger children in primary school. They are among 12,002 candidates selected for the written test for recruitment of 269 primary teachers.

Body recovered

JESSORE, Dec 14: Police recovered the beheaded body of a boy from the rooftop of a four-storied building at Beltala area in

the town here on Thursday night, reports UNB. On information, police came to the house, owned by Monwar

Hossain, and found the beheaded body of Monayem Munna, 15, son of Abdus Sabur of Gopalganj district, on the top of the under-construction building. Police, who entered into the house by breaking open the door, found all the cages and steel almirahs broken but could found none in the room. Neighbours said Munna came to the house of his brother-in-law Monwar some 15 days back. Monwar along with his family members went to Dhaka a few days ago leaving the boy in the house alone. But the boy was missing from 10pm on Wednesday night keeping the house under lock and key. The neighbours informed the matter to the police.

Tussle over appointment

RANGAMATI, Dec 14: Chittagong Hill Tracts Regional Council and Rangamati District Council are engaged in a power tussle over appointment of school teachers, reports UNB.

Official sources said the CHT Regional Council recently cancelled the appointment of primary school teachers given by the district council and ordered fresh appointments. But the district council in a special meeting on December 5 called the order "illegal" and asked the district primary education officer to disburse salary and allowances of all the primary teachers appointed on August 26. Presided over by district council chairman Ching Kye Roaza, the meeting was attended by members of the council, its officials, legal advisor and the primary education officer. The district council asked for disbursement of salary after expiry of a stay order of the High Court on the appointment of teachers on November 27 and rejection of a writ petition on November 30.

None of the leading people wanted to cause any kind of damage to the Haripur Oil Project, the transmission building of the Radio at Tilagarh area and Sylhet Government College which are located on the entry points of the town on Sylhet-Tamabil Road. In compliance with the plan

prepared in the meeting, the freedom fighters and the Allied forces began proceeding towards the town under the leadership of Dewan Farid Gazi. Colonel C R Dutta and Colonel Bagchi. By this time, there were information that, the occupation forces had retreated from their previous position at Government College areas. It was later found correct. They took shelter at their main base at Saluktikar area along with bag and baggage. The lighters

entered into the town without facing any resistance. In the meantime, another big contingent of freedom fighters of 'Z' force under the leadership of Zizur Rahman reached the Cattle Farm area at Alurtal at the suburb of the town. Pak Army became crippled fully this time. but they damaged a part of the Keane Bridge while fleeing from the main town on Dec 13 December. The bridge over the river Surma was then connecting the two parts of Sylhet town. It was also the main entry point to the town. The blasts with big bangs shook the whole

The freedom fighters began entering into the town since the night of December 14 in groups from different directions. Jubilant people in thousands were seen on the streets at midnight The whole town was humming with joyous slogans. Sylhet became a town of processions and slogans. It was declared enemyfree on December. However, the Pak Army and its main collaborators surrendered after two days on December 17.


meeting. The 13th regional office of HBFC started its operation from a hired space at Ranga-mati Press Club building soon after inauguration.

However, the occupation soldiers faced resistance on the first day at Sirajgani town, the then sub-divisional headquarters. Members of Sechchhasebak Bahani, a voluntary organisation, tried to resist the marauding army. They halted a train carrying Pakistani soldiers in Gatina railway bridge area. However, the soldiers succeeded to enter


day in 1971.

They killed hundreds of innocent people, including women and children, and destroyed a good number of dwelling houses and business establishments. Members of Behari community and Muslim League joined Pakistani forces. They also killed many prominent figures in the town. The army captured all the nine thana headquarters by April 26, 1971. The Pakistani forces setup their camps at government buildings in the town.

Following the crackdown

people fled the town. Most of them took shelter in villages and neighbouring India. Thousands of young men left the country for India to have military training. Many staved in the country and organised pco-

assigned to impart training to local youths. On June 14, the training camp at Bhadraghat under Kamarkhanda thana came under Pakistani attack. During the period between June and July freedom fighters started gaining advances. Freedom fighters led by Amir Hossain Bhulu, Abdul Latif Mirza. Shorab Ali Sarker, Lutfar Rahaman Makhan, Ishak Ali, Alamgir Hossain, Abdul Aziz Sarker, Bimal Kumar Das, Abdul Aziz Mirza, Aminul Islam Chowdhury, Motahar Hossain Talukder, Anwar Hossain Ratu and Ismail Hossain launched fierce guerilla attacks on the occupation soldiers and their local collaborators -- members


of Razakar, Al Badar and Al Shams forces.

Getting lost into oblivion


RAJSHAHI UNIVERSITY Dec 14: As the anniversary of Victory Day of the War of Liberation approaches, people on the campus with heavy heart remember Professor Mir Abdul Quayyum.

Rajshahi University lost many of its distinguished teachers during the turbulent days in 1971. Professor Quayyum is one of them. He was brutally murdered by the antiliberation forces at the fag end of the war. An ardent supporter of freedom fighters. Quayyum was a teacher of the Department of Psychology.

Pakistani occupation sol-diers and their local collaborators picked up him from his fa-ther-in-law's house at Malopara in the city on November 25, 1971 and since then he had been missing. Later on December 30 his body was found on the bank of the River Padma in the city. His hands and legs were tied with rope.

A stenographer of registrar's office of the university called the professor out at 8.30 in the night and waiting soldiers picked up him, said his rela-

Mir Abdul Quayyum was born on July 6, 1939 at Ghgra village under Gafargaon thana

of Mymensingh district. He completed his matriculation from Mymensingh school. He obtained MA in Psychology from the University of Rajshahi with distinction in 1962. Later he joined the university as a lecturer.

But unfortunately nothing has been done so far to commemorate the man, who made the supreme sacrifice for the cause of national independence. No commemorative plaque has been erected. No university building, no residential hall, no road have been renamed or built after him.

Five killed on IU campus in 7 yrs

KUSHTIA, Dec 13: Five people, including a guardian, were killed in clashes on the Islamic University (IU) campus during the seven years since the university was established in December, 1992.

During the period the university was closed for 475 days because of clashes between rival students. In the clashes nearly 900 people were also injured.

In the latest event, on October 30, 1998 two students were killed in a gunfight on the campus between the activists of ruling party Awami Leaguebacked BCL and Islami Chhatra Shibir. The dead students were identified as Mohasin and Al Mamun, activists of Shibir. In the first incident, after 24

days of inauguration, a clash between the activists of Islami Chhatra Shibr and activists of other students' organisations took place. In the clash a Chhatra Shibir activist Saiful Islam was killed and at least 50 others were injured.

On Ápril 28, 1995 a guardian received bullet injuries during a clash between activists of Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal and Chattra Shibir. Ali Azam Khan, commissioner of Kumarkhali Pourasabha, later died in hospital.

On September 26,1996 a lierce gun battle took place on the campus between the activists of Islami Chhatra Shibr and BCL, killing a Shibir ac-
