Iranians leave for **US** adventure

TEHRAN, Jan 5: Iran's footballers left Wednesday for a tour of the United States which will include a friendly international against their hosts on January 16 at the Pasadena Rose Bowl in California, the official news agency IRNA reported, reports AFP.

The 21 players in the squad, headed by coach Mansour Pour-Heidari, will travel via Germany, where they will apply for visas to enter the United States. Ahead of the Pasadena friendly -- eagerly awaited as

the Americans want to put the record straight after losing to the Iranians in the 1998 World Cup -- Iran will take on Mexico on January 9 at the Oakland Coliseum.

The Iranians will then move to Los Angeles for a match with Armenia, though the date has yet to be set, before heading for Pasadena.

Iran will not be short of support as California has a sizeable Iranian community which will not have forgotten June 21, 1998, when their heroes triumphed 2-1 in France.

Both countries are negotiating a tricky path towards normalfsing relations strained for two decades since the overthrow of the Shah and the rise to power of an Islamic fundamentalist regime, which regularly denounced the United States as the Great Satan.

But there has been a gradual rapprochement since the election in May 1997 of president Mohammad Khatami, who supports a policy of deeper international ties and the development of cultural, sporting and tourist exchanges with Ameri-

Top seed falls at first hurdle

MADRAS, India, Jan 5 World number two Yevgeny Kafelnikov was knocked out of the first round of the Gold Flake Open on Tuesday and third seed Carlos Moya withdrew with back problems, reports Reuters.

Defending champion and fifth seed Byron Black of Zimbabwe also lost in straight sets, giving second seed Cedric Pioline, who made an effortless advance into the last 16, a clear shot at the title.

Russia's Kafelnikov, the top seed, went down 6-4, 6-2 to Czech Michal Tabara in a listless performance littered with unforced errors. Tabara, ranked 122 in the world, had never won a match at this level despite winning three Chal-

unable to find his rhythm. "It's the first match of the year and my opponent was playing hard right from the beginning and didn't give me a chance to play my game. I'm obviously very disappointed. said Kafelnikov who now heads for Melbourne to defend his Australian Open title.

Mova was distraught that the back trouble which forced out of last year's US Open had resurfaced right at the start of the new season.

"I had been practising back in Spain before I came here and it seemed that everything was okay. I practised yesterday and this morning when I felt the pain again and it was so bad I had to withdraw," Moya told reporters.

The Spaniard said the trouble appeared to be related to the stress fracture of a vertebra in the lower back that had first occurred four months ago.

He said he was flying straight to Australia, but it was unlikely he would play in Sydnev or Melbourne.

"I'm going to have some Xrays when I get there and I'm always optimistic and there's still some time for the Australian Open. But if I'm not a 100 per cent I'd rather not play." Moya said about the first Grand Slam of the year.

TE, Uruguay, Jan 5: Argentine football legend Diego Maradona was in intensive care in hospital here Wednesday after being admitted with heart

problems, reports AFP. Maradona was receiving treatment at the Cantegrill Clinic after "suffering from a hypertension attack with ventricular arrhythmia, complicated by the fact he already had high blood pressure," said Dr Frank Torres.

Maradona's manager Guillermo Coppola denied reports that his condition had been brought on by drug addiction or an overdose.

"Everyone knows that Maradona has hypertension," Coppola, who was acquitted last year of cocaine possession, told the Radio Mitre radio station. "It's already happened to

him more than once -- in Chile during a television programme and then when playing football in Buenos Aires, but there were no indications that drugs had anything to do with it," he added. "There was no ambulance,

there was no coma, there were no police," he said," blasting what he called sensational press reports of Maradona's ailment.


