

What's on today Health spending should focus on diseases that mostly affect the poor

Governments of developing nations must guard against the temptation to concentrate spending on "rich diseases" and must shift their focus to diseases of the poor if they aim to best improve the lives of people in the poorest countries, a new World Bank report co-published yesterday with the Global Forum for Health Research said, reports BSS.

The report said health experts have focused on the global rise of non-communicable diseases such as heart disease, cancer, and diabetes in recent

The new Bank study 'The Burden of Disease among the Global Poor: Current Situation, Future Trends, and Implications for Strategy' points out, however, that focus on these non communicable ailments is biased against the poor because the poorest fifth of the world's population suffers disproportionately from communicable diseases such as malaria, maternal conditions, and diarrheal ailments.

"We don't want to downplay the gravity of non-communicable diseases in the world," Davidson R Gwatkin and Michel Guillot. "But we would

like to emphasize that in the developing world, policymakers need to realise that focusing attention and spending on communicable diseases now will save lives among the poor

in the short and long term. The report says that, on the one hand, the poorest 20 per cent of the global population would gain over ten times as much as the richest 20 per cent, in terms of added life expectancy during the period from 1990 to 2020, by doubling the rate of decline for mortality from communicable diseases spread evenly across all economic groups. Life expectancy in these poorest countries would then increase by 12.7 years to 66.3 years by 2020.

On the other hand, a comparably-distributed doubling in the rate of decline for non communicable diseases during the same period would benefit the world's richest 20 per cent nearly four times as much as it would the global poorest 20 per

The report observes that seven types of diseases were responsible for nearly threequarters of the difference in population groups. The most opment efforts.

important among these were respiratory infections, diarrheal diseases, and other communicable diseases that particularly affect infants and children.

One possibility for closing the gap between the rich and the poor, the report suggests, would be a global research effort to develop an inexpensive, easily administered vaccine against respiratory or other widely distributed infections.

Such an innovation could, in theory at least, be delivered with relative ease to all population groups worldwide, regardless of income. In this case, the intervention could bring roughly the same degree of health advancement to all segments of the population.

The World Bank and other partner agencies have begun to close this gap through such initiatives as the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization, or GAVI, to be launched January 31, 2000, at the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland. The people ignored oppression and repression of the Pakistani rulers and defied curfew on this day when Matiur Rahman, a student of Class IX, was killed in police firing.

Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had declared the six-point programme, a charter for freedom, in 1969 in order to free the nation from the clutches of Pakistani colonial rule. The pace of struggle for self-determination got momentum, recalled the prime minis-

Khaleda begins Kushtia tour Jan 26



keep the mask on," said the official. "He needs to whistle and do a lot of shouting to manage the traffic."

Sources said three traffic policemen died last year from complications arising from exposure to pollution. Two of the constables died of cardiac arrest -- one on the street -- and another died of various complications.

Another traffic department official said they are cracking down on the faulty vehicles plying the streets. In the last ten day, at least 1,500 two-stroke vehicles have been booked.

However, the crackdown has sparked violence. Scooter drivers went on a rampage yesterday, barricading roads at Mirpur. Syedabad and other areas to protest the police action.

The BNP chief also announced movement programmes including "mass processions" across the country on February 3 and said from now on, there will be tougher programmes till resignation of the government.

She said there are many things including matters related to the Election Commission, "false" cases against BNP leaders and activists, AL's politicisation of administration and political murders to be discussed with the caretaker government.

The BNP Chairperson said the Jatiya Sangad has became "one-party parliament" as AL has turned it into a "discussion forum" of the party. "The parliament has been made ineffective and even ruling party MPs have lost interest in it" Khaleda Zia alleged that the

Sangsad was being used by the ruling party as a place for telling lies and character assassination of opposition parties and leaders.

"It is now time to dissolve the parliament as ruling party MPs do not want to attend the session. It is being run without quorum. Dissolution of this ineffective parliament has now become the desire of ruling party leaders and the people". She hoped that the government would realise it soon and act accordingly.

The fresh programmes announced at the meeting include: Democracy Killing Day on January 25, countrywide "Resistance Day" on January 27 to protest government's move to introduce a "black law" in the name of Public Safety Act

Jatiya Party, Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Oikya Jote also announced similar programmes at separate public meetings in the city.

From page 1 eral elections, the EC had to allocate symbols to 90 political parties. Of the parties, 15 did not field any candidate, 16 parties had only one candidate each and nine others only two candidates each.

In the June 1996 national polls, 119 political parties were allocated election symbols. Of those, 31 parties did not field any candidate, 33 fielded only one candidate each and 10 parties had only two candidates

"Many of these parties fared so poorly in the elections that statistics reflecting percentage of votes polled by each could only be expressed in fractions," the EC official said. 'It clearly indicates that a number of those parties did not deserve to be recognised as political parties' fit for contesting polls, he added.

The EC, however, categorically said. "Non-registration of a political party would not debar it from carrying on its political agenda. Registration with the EC is only a pre-requisite for participation in election as a political party."

The EC proposal said, "Election is a serious business in a democratic process. So the Commission should not recognise the non-serious individuals, associations or groups as active political parties and encourage them to take part in the national polls".

Insisting on 'certain legal guidelines for registration of political parties', the Commission said that for registration, a political party should submit to the EC, along with its name, address, constitution and leadership hierarchy, a verified list of 1000 members of the party with their serial numbers in the electoral roll, a copy of the statement describing its latest annual income and expenditure and the name and address of its appointed auditor with a written statement from him that he has accepted the appointment. "The law should also autho-

rise the Commission to strike off names of previously registered parties which have become moribund or extinct or those failing to abide by certain provisions to be laid down in the law," the EC proposal said.

The EC noted that 'there is a strong need for transparency in the collection of funds and the manner in which the funds are used by political parties'. So, 'the political parties may be made to publish their accounts annually for information of the members of the public and all concerned', while 'a ceiling may be imposed on the amount of contributions to be made to political parties by individuals and profit earning companies',

the EC proposal said. Emphasising the need for legal provisions regulating funds of political parties, the proposal said, "Absence of such a regulation allows political parties to use their unrestricted influence to raise funds and indulge in the use of these funds in any manner they dim fit. Affluent persons and business firms contribute huge sums to political parties in the hope that if elected to power, the party would squarely return such

"Unrestricted and unregulated fund raising may, at times, make it difficult for a party in power to rise above the baneful influence of such big contributors and resolve the conflict between the public and the private interests.

In this regard, the Commission referred to a presidential observation made last year. "The political parties obtain huge funds from big bank loan defaulters and shelter them", President Shabuddin Ahmed noted while addressing the inaugural function of silver jubilee celebration of Bangladesh Institute of Bank Management.

To reduce the adverse effect of big money on politics", the EC suggested, "The legislators may also examine the feasibility of making the political parties maintain accurate accounts of their income and expenditure and get those audited every year by agencies approved by the Commission'

The question of accountability or responsible behaviour of political parties is of paramount importance for successful working of democracy, the EC observes. "To facilitate both - organisation and accountability - existence of certain legal provisions has. proved immensely helpful in many democratic countries."

From page 1 about paying PDB's monthly bills. Normally, PDB charges a monthly bill of around Tk. 100 crore from DESA for the power sold to it. "But DESA seldom pays more than Tk 50 crore a month. Moreover, It did not pay bills for over three months last

year," said the source. Different types of clients including government offices and industries owe DESA over Tk 1400 crore. "If every thing was in order in DESA, it would have made a profit of over Tk 20 crore a month," the source noted.
