

Following the footsteps

"Don't think that I'm leaving now... None should leave the House," said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina to her colleagues in the Treasury Bench while going out of the parliament's main chamber at 10.50am yesterday.

However, she did not come back until House was adjourned at 1.20pm.

Her words worked for sometime though. Some 80 lawmakers she left in the House stayed back, although many of them shuttled between the House and the lobbies.

But they started sneaking probably sensing that the PM who is also the Leader of the House is not going to come back.

The number soon came down to 70 and then 60, the minimum requirement for a quorum. By the time the sitting was over, there were only 40 MPs.

Nevertheless, the presence of the prime minister for the second consecutive day yesterday further eased the quorum crisis.

Hasina entered the House at 9.40am, five minutes after Deputy Speaker Abdul Hamid did.

Once the prime minister left, the Deputy Speaker who was presiding the House followed her eight minutes later, handing over the chair to Panel Chairman Ali Ashraf.

Soon after the session began, a messenger came to the press.

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Clinton to visit Bangladesh in Mar: FM

Foreign Minister Abdus Samad Azad yesterday confirmed US President Bill Clinton's visit to Bangladesh in March, reports UNB.

"I confirm that President Clinton will visit Dhaka in the second half of March this year and there is no doubt about it," he told reporters at a briefing at the Foreign Office on his return from Oman.

Azad returned home yesterday morning from Muscat where he attended the two-day extra-ordinary meeting of the Council of Ministers of Indian Ocean Rim Association for Regional Cooperation (IOR-ARC).

Asked about the specific date of Clinton's visit to Dhaka, the Foreign Minister said the date and programme will be announced by the US side.

Tremor shakes Ctg again

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Business bid ends in futility

Khaleda snubs call to shun hartal

Opposition leader Khaleda Zia has rejected the business community's appeal for a dialogue with the government and called upon them to join the current oust-government movement.

"Instead of requesting BNP to sit for dialogue, you urge the government to resign and hand over power to a caretaker government as per the Constitution," she said.

She was addressing a Businessmen's Conference at Osmany Memorial Auditorium in the city on its concluding day yesterday.

Khaleda Zia said, "The current situation does not permit holding of any dialogue with

the government as it is not sincere for a political settlement, and has destroyed the atmosphere for talks".

The BNP Chairperson and former prime minister said opposition parties have already launched a one-point oust-government movement. Resignation of the government is the only solution now to restore peace, political stability and ensure development.



Legal Assistance Bill 2000 passed

The Jatiya Sangsad passed a bill yesterday paving the way for free legal aid to the disadvantaged section of the society.

Under the new law, the state will finance lawyers for those who are needy, hapless and unable to get justice for various socio-economic reasons.

Such people can now apply to court for legal assistance from the state. A state-financed panel of lawyers will come in aid to the deserving persons after scrutiny of their applications by a committee.

Law Minister Abdul Matin Khasru piloted the bill titled "The Legal Assistance Bill, 2000."

Seeking passage of the bill, he described the new law as a "milestone" in upholding people's fundamental rights as prescribed in the Constitution.

He said the law would ensure legal protection to 65 per cent of the population who could not afford legal assistance to address their grievances.

The minister told the House that an extensive publicity campaign through media would be launched to inform especially the disadvantaged section of the society of the new law. Legal aid committees had been formed in 61 of the 64 districts to this end, he added.

Cabinet approves changes in Woman & Child Repression (prevention) Act

The Cabinet yesterday approved a law ministry proposal to re-write certain provisions of the Women and Children Repression (Prevention) Act, allowing courts to award seven years' imprisonment for filing false cases under the law.

Besides, it also okayed another change in the law, widening the courts' scope for granting bail to women and aged and sick people, Cabinet sources said.

Under the original law made in 1995, courts trying such cases do not have the authority to grant bail to any accused before the end of investigation.

"With the proposed changes, the tribunals concerned will enjoy the authority to grant bail to women and aged and sick persons before the investigation is complete. In that case, the court has to hold a hearing of both the sides," said a top official of the law ministry.

Explaining reasons behind the flexibility, the official said, "Under the law, the aggrieved side usually implicates even relatives of the prime accused

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Food output may rise by 1m MT this year

Food production in the country during the current financial year is projected at 22.33 million tonnes, one million tonnes higher than that in the last financial year, official sources said.

The production in the last financial year was 21.35 million tonnes.

Higher production during the current 1999-2000 financial year is due to good yield of Aus crop and bumper production of Aman, he added.
